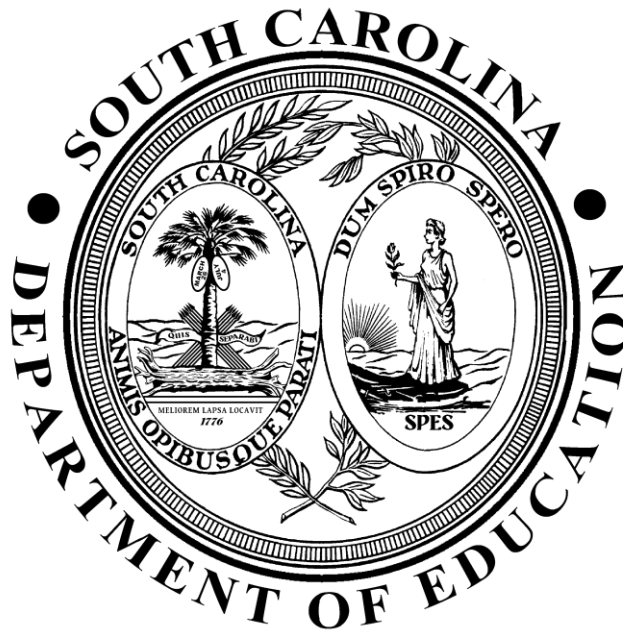

Abbeville Equity Districts Reports
Pursuant to Provisos 1.95

January 26, 2017

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Introduction

Proviso 1.95 of the 2016 Appropriations Act calls for a report on allocations of funds to the *Abbeville* lawsuit districts.

1.95. (SDE: Abbeville Equity Districts Comprehensive Report) Of the appropriations and provision of services that are provided in the current fiscal year's budget for the Abbeville equity districts, the Department of Education must submit a comprehensive report to the General Assembly by January 1, 2017 on the current allocation of funds to the Abbeville equity districts and the provision of services to these districts.

Because the proviso references the current year's budget, this report focuses on state funds targeted to the *Abbeville* districts, not all state and federal funds.

The following are the districts (or the merged successor) that were parties to the *Abbeville* lawsuit.

 - Informing and matching to student postsecondary goals
 - Reading materials matched to student’s Lexile level

Division of Federal, State, and Community Resources

Office of Educator Services

The SCDE's Alternative Certification team in the Office of Educator Services traveled to nine rural districts to conduct information sessions between January 21, 2016, and March 15, 2016. The purpose was to target employees in the designated rural districts who hold a bachelor's degree and could possibly qualify for the Program for Alternative Certification of Educators (PACE). The information sessions did not exclude other interested candidates.

Laura Covington, Alternative Certification Team Leader, contacted each district by phone, and followed up with flyers to be distributed within the districts. The rural districts were asked to identify potential candidates and personally ask these employees to attend.

The sessions were well attended with a total of 184 potential candidates. According to the Center for Educator Recruitment, Retention, and Advancement (CERRA), there are 16 former district employees who attended one of these sessions and is now enrolled in the PACE program.

The below chart demonstrates which of the plaintiff districts are the focus of this year's Proviso 1A.67 incentives through CERRA and will be the focus districts for the SCDE's Equity Plan under Title II of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act ("the Equity Plan"). In relation to the Equity Plan, we are monitoring data related to inexperienced, out-of-field, and ineffective (IOI) teachers and supporting the districts through three of the Equity Plan's strategies as follows:

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1. Support development of a pipeline of educators to high poverty, high minority, and rural schools by assisting districts with strategies to improve their ability to recruit and retain.
2. Promote distributed leadership, instructional support, and improved school climate.
3. Advocate for greater salary equity among South Carolina school districts.

Division of Innovation and Effectiveness

Office of School Transformation

The SCDE's Office of School Transformation provides services to promote public school choice and to support low-performing schools and potentially underperforming schools. See the list here:<http://ed.sc.gov/districts-schools/school-improvement/school-improvement-programs/potentially-underperforming-notification/>The following are some of the services being provided in plaintiff districts:

1. Allendale-has two full time transformation coaches to serve three schools.
2. Clarendon 2 has a transformation coach for Phoenix Charter School.
3. Marion 10, Lexington 4, Florence 3, Barnwell 19 are eligible for special project funding in that they all have at least one school identified as potentially underperforming. Applications for this funding are underway.
4. Jasper has technical assistance funding for three schools, one full-time transformation coach, and one part-time transformation coach. The district will be undergoing an AdvancED diagnostic review this winter.
5. Florence 4 has one full-time and one part-time transformation coach to serve Brockington Elementary and Johnson Middle. In spring 2016 the State Board of Education declared a state of emergency and the State Superintendent assumed operation of these two schools. Substantial additional technical assistance and funding has been to this district under a Memorandum of Agreement. These include:
 - a. Specialized assistance with special education records and finances;
 - b. Technical assistance related to career and technology education, federal programs, and expansion of a 4K CDEP program;
 - c. Assistance with purchasing the standard fiscal accounting software used by most South Carolina School districts;
 - d. Funding for bookkeeping assistance to prepare records for a financial audit;
 - e. Assistance in procuring a reputable audit firm to review the district's finances; and
 - f. Assistance with hiring an interim superintendent and conducting a search for a new superintendent.
6. Hampton 2 as two full-time transformation coaches.
7. Lee as two full-time transformation coaches.

Proviso 1.88, referenced above, targets funds to increase the capacity of *Abbeville* districts to perform online testing as required by law. The funding allocations were based upon needs identified in assessments conducted through the SCDE. The SCDE's staff and contractors have continued to provide technical assistance related to these needs assessments, and have convened collaborative groups to share resources and explore joint purchasing activities.

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
