- Thursday, April 8, 2021, at 1:00 p.m., or 30 minutes after the House adjourns, whichever is later -Room 110 Blatt Building - Opportunity for public input about the Arts Commission; Department of Health and Human Services; Ethics Commission; State Accident Fund; and State Library
