Dear Representative West:

Please see below in response to your September 2, 2021 follow-up letter.

1. Please update your Program Evaluation Report (e.g., organizational chart, performance metrics, law change recommendations (include strike and insert of amended language), etc.).

- 2. According to agency staff, approximately \$250 million in recurring state funds are needed to accommodate every person currently on a waiting list.
 - a. Please identify the applicable date, or window, this figure is considered accurate.
 - i. The waiting list totals were based on a South Carolina Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DDSN) report as of May 2021 and reflected all-inclusive totals by waiver. Based on updated waiting list data received from DDSN as of August 2021, a revised estimate of the recurring state funds needed to accommodate all unique individuals is approximately \$214 million. The revised total reflects unduplicated counts of individuals on waiting lists. Individuals can be on more than one waiting list concurrently and the revised methodology addresses the necessary de-duplication.
 - b. Please provide your methodology for determining total state funding.
 - i. SCDHHS used the waiting list totals and applied a historical average cost per member per month. This was then annualized to provide total annual expenditures. Total annual expenditures were used to estimate the state share of the cost using 30% of the total, which represents the approximate historic state share for Medicaid services.

What is the average wait time for waivers administered by the agency (i.e., Community Choices; Community Supports; Head and Spinal Cord Injury; HIV/AIDS; Intellectually Disabled and Related Disability; Mechanical Ventilator Dependent; Medical Complex Children; Palmetto Coordinated System of Care for Children Home and Community Based; Pervasive Developmental Disorder; Psychiatric Treatment Facilities; and Alternative Chance)?
 - a. Provide the total number of people currently on each waiting list.
 - There are no waiting lists currently for Community Choices, HIV/AIDS, Mechanical Ventilator Dependent, Medically Complex Children, and Palmetto Coordinated System of Care waiver. The Pervasive Development Disorder and PRFT/Alternative Chance waivers are no longer in operation.
 - ii. As of July 2021, average wait time in years for the DDSN-operated waivers according to DDSN's report are as follows:
 - 1. Intellectually Disabled/Related Disabilities: 5.4
 - 2. Community Supports: 3.6
 - 3. HASCI: 0.4
