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11 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina:

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SECTION 1. Article 3, Chapter 18, Title 59 of the 15 1976 Code is amended by adding:

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"Section 59-18-355. (A)(1) A revision to a state 18 content standard recommended pursuant to Section 19 59-18-350(A), as well as a new standard or a change 20 in a current standard that the State Board of 21 Education otherwise considers for approval as an accountability measure, may not be adopted and implemented without the:

- (a) advice and consent of the Education Oversight Committee; and 25
 - (b) approval by a Joint Resolution of the General Assembly.
- (2) General Assembly approval required by item 28 (1)(b) does not apply to a revision recommended pursuant to Section 59-18-350(A), other approval of a new standard, and other changes to an old standard 32 if the revision, new standard, or changed standard is 33 developed by the South Carolina Department of 34 Education.
- (B) A revision to an assessment recommended 36 pursuant to Section 59-18-350(A), as well as a new

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18 SECTION 2.Section 59-18-320 of the 1976 Code, 19 as last amended by Act 282 of 2008, is further 20 amended to read:

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"Section 59-18-320. (A) After the first statewide field test of the assessment program that is adopted or developed by the Department of Education in each any one of the four academic areas, and after the field tests of the end of course assessments of high school credit courses that are adopted or developed by the Department of Education, the Education Oversight Committee, established in Section 59-6-10, will review the state assessment program and the course assessments for alignment with the state standards, level of difficulty and validity, and for the ability to differentiate levels of achievement, and will make recommendations for

The review will be provided to the State Board of Education, the State South 3 Carolina Department of Education, the Governor, 4 the Senate Education Committee, and the House Education and Public Works Committee as soon as 6 feasible after the field tests. The Department of Education will then report to the Education 8 Oversight Committee no later than one month after 9 receiving the reports on the changes made to the 10 assessments to comply with the recommendations. If the Board of Education adopts an existing 12 assessment that is available to other states to 13 purchase, the Education Oversight Committee, as 14 established in Section 59-6-10 must review and 15 approve the assessment for its statewide 16 administration and for its use in state accountability. (B) After review and approval by the Education 17 Oversight Committee, the standards 18 assessment of mathematics, English/language arts, social studies, and science will be administered to all 21 public school students in grades three through eight, 22 to include those students as required by the federal 23 Individuals Disabilities with Education 24 Improvement Act and by Title 1 of the Elementary 25 and Secondary Education Act. To reduce the 26 number of days of testing, to the extent possible, 27 field test items must be embedded with the annual 28 assessments. In accordance with the requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind Act, science 30 assessments must be administered annually to all 31 students in one elementary and one middle school 32 grade. The State Department of Education shall 33 develop a sampling plan to administer science and 34 social studies assessments to all other elementary

1 and middle school students. The plan shall provide 2 for all students and both content areas to be assessed 3 annually; however, individual students, except in 4 census testing grades, are not required to take both tests. In the sampling plan, approximately half of the assessments must be administered in science and the other half in social studies in each class. 8 ensure that school districts maintain the high standard of accountability established in 10 Education Accountability Act, performance level results reported on school and district report cards must meet consistently high levels in all four core The core areas must remain 13 content areas. 14 consistent with the following percentage weightings 15 established and approved by the Education 16 Oversight Committee: in grades three through five, 17 thirty percent each for English/language arts and 18 math, and twenty percent each for science and social 19 studies; and in grades six through eight, twenty-five percent each for English/language arts and math, 21 and twenty-five percent each for science and social 22 studies. For students with documented disabilities, the assessments developed by the Department of 24 Education shall include the appropriate 25 modifications and accommodations with necessary 26 supplemental devices as outlined in a student's 27 Individualized Education Program and as stated in 28 the Administrative Guidelines and Procedures for Testing Students with Documented Disabilities. 30 (C) After review and approval by the Education 31 Oversight Committee, the end of course assessments 32 of high school credit courses will be administered to 33 all public school students as they complete each 34 course.

- 1 (D) Beginning in school year 2014-15, for federal
- 2 and state accountability purposes, the State Board of
- 3 Education and the Education Oversight Committee
- 4 must by November 1, 2014, review and approve a
- 5 <u>summative assessment for administration to students</u>
- 6 in grades 3 through 8 that assesses students in
- 7 English, reading, writing and mathematics. This
- 8 assessment does not require field testing prior to
- 9 Education Oversight Committee approval. The
- 10 assessment will be administered to all public school
- 11 students in grades three through eight, to include
- 12 those students as required by the federal Individuals
- 13 with Disabilities Education Improvement Act and by
- 14 Title 1 of the Elementary and Secondary Education
- 15 Act. The assessment must meet the following
- 16 requirements:
- 17 (1) be a vertically-articulated, benchmarked,
- 18 standards-based system of summative and formative
- 19 assessments;
- 20 (2) document student progress toward national
- 21 college and career benchmarks and state standards;
- 22 (3) contain multiple questions types including such
- 23 as constructed response, selected response, and
- 24 technology-enhanced responses;
- 25 (4) be administered either online or with a paper-
- 26 and-pencil option; and
- 27 (5) be anchored to a national college readiness
- 28 assessment already used in the state.
- 29 Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, all
- 30 students in grades 4 through 8 will also take state-
- 31 developed and approved assessments in social
- 32 studies and science.
- 33 (E). All students entering the eleventh grade for the
- 34 <u>first time in school year 2014-2015 and subsequent</u>

- 1 years, and all students entering the twelfth grade for
- 2 the first time in school year 2014-2015 only, will be
- 3 administered both a career readiness assessment, and
- 4 <u>a college readiness assessment that are provided by</u>
- 5 the same vendor. The results of the assessments will
- 6 be provided to each student, to the school and to the
- 7 state in order to:
- 8 (1) assist students, parents, teachers and guidance
- 9 counselors in developing individual graduation plan
- and in selecting courses aligned with each student's
- 11 future ambitions;
- 12 (2) promote South Carolina's Work Ready
- 13 Communities initiative; and
- 14 (3) meet federal and state accountability purposes.
- 15 Students may then use the results of these
- 16 assessments to apply to college or to enter careers.
- 17 The results must be added as part of each student's
- 18 permanent record and maintained at the Department
- 19 of Education for at least ten years. The results will
- 20 also provide instructional information to assist
- 21 students, parents and teachers to plan for each
- 22 student's course selection which might include
- 23 remediation courses, dual-enrollment courses,
- 24 Advanced Placement courses, internships, or other
- 25 options during the remaining semesters in high
- 26 school.
- 27 (D) Any new standards and assessments required
- 28 to be developed by the Department of Education
- 29 and adopted by the State Board of Education,
- 30 through the Department of Education for use as an
- 31 accountability measure, must be developed and
- 32 adopted upon the advice and consent of the
- 33 Education Oversight Committee.

The Department of Education will provide to the 2 Education Oversight Committee 3 performance results on each of the assessments 4 authorized in this section in a format agreed upon by 5 both the Department and the Committee and within 6 thirty days of the data being provided to the school 7 districts. The Committee will use the results of these 8 assessments in school year 2014-2015 and in 2015-9 16 to report on student academic performance in 10 each school and district pursuant to Section 59-18-11 900. However, the Committee may not determine 12 ratings for schools or districts using the results of 13 these new assessments pursuant to Section 59-18-14 900 until after the conclusion of the 2015-16 school 15 year for public reporting beginning in the fall of 16 2016.

17 (F) The Department of Education shall submit a

23 reasonably mitigated by delaying evaluations the
24 Department shall seek a waiver if necessary for
25 federal approval.

13 Education; and
14 (5) propose other methods or measures for
15 assessing how well the purposes of this chapter are
16 met."
17 Any student who is twenty-one years of age or less
18 as of July 1, 2014 and who previously failed to
19 receive a high school diploma or was denied
20 graduation solely for failing to meet the exit exam
21 requirements set forth in Section 59-18-310(B) and
22 State Regulation, may petition the local school
23 board to receive a high school diploma pursuant to
24 this law. The State Board of Education shall remove
  any conflicting requirement and promulgate
  conforming changes in its applicable regulations."

30 (B) The statewide assessment program must 31 include the subjects of English/language arts, 32 mathematics, science, and social studies in grades 33 three through eight, as delineated in Section 59-18-34 320(B), to be first administered in 2009, an exit

1 examination in English/language arts and 2 mathematics to be first administered in a student's second year of high school enrollment beginning 4 with grade nine, and end-of-course tests for gateway courses awarded units of credit in English/language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Student performance targets must be established 8 following the 2009 administration. The assessment program must be used for school and school district 10 accountability purposes beginning with the 2008-11 2009 school year. The publication of the annual 12 school and school district report card may be 13 delayed for the 2008-2009 school year until no later 14 than February 15, 2010. A student's score on an end-15 of-year assessment may not be the sole criterion for 16 placing the student on academic probation, retaining 17 the student in his current grade, or requiring the 18 student to attend summer school. Beginning with the 19 graduating class of 2010, students are required to 20 pass a high school credit course in science and a 21 course in United States history in which end-of-22 course examinations are administered to receive the 23 state high school diploma. Beginning with the 24 graduating class of 2015, students are no longer 25 required to meet the exit examination requirements 26 set forth in Section 59-18-310(310) and State 27 Regulation to earn a South Carolina high school 28 diploma.
