 - (a) SCDSS v Elizabeth Rochelle Maddox, et al. Termination of parental rights case concerning mother and father's rights to remaining siblings of murdered sibling. Parents had been convicted of murdering their child and the case raised whether termination their rights to their other children was premature while the convictions were on appeal.

 - (b) SCDSS v Partridge, Harris, et al. Children were sexually abused but too young to testify. The parents, boyfriend and grandparents were all suspects.

 - (c) SCDSS v Walker, Thompson, et al. Complicated neglect and custody case where father of all the children and both mothers were all individuals with mental retardation. Each litigant had a lawyer and a guardian and each case was tried carefully to ensure the defendants understood the proceedings against them.

 - (d) SCDSS v Plunkett, Sullivan, et al. Contested four-day termination of parental rights case between the natural parents, who were also full siblings and their mother versus the foster/adoptive parents. The parents relinquished their rights, and then changed their minds forcing a two-day trial on the voluntariness of their relinquishments, followed by a two-day trial between the grandmother and the foster parents.

(e) Hooper v Rockwell, SCDSS, et al. 334 S.C. 281, 513 S.E.2d 358 (1999) Mother appealed termination of her rights which the Court upheld. This case still stands for what matters in family court are interlocutory and which are final.

I received a uniform traffic ticket in 2017 for an alleged violation of SC Code Section 56-5-1538 which carries a fine in excess of \$125. The state trooper cited me for not changing lanes when he was writing a ticket to another motorist on the side of the interstate. As traffic was heavy, I could not safely move over. The statute gives the options of either moving over if safe to do so, or slowing down. I was not speeding nor charged with speeding. I obtained counsel who requested a hearing. The trooper offered a two-point, \$50 fine, which I accepted.

46. Have you, to your knowledge, ever been under federal, state, or local investigation for possible violation of a criminal statute? If yes, explain.

This answer has been previously screened. In 2011, my father's second wife questioned whether my sister and I were entitled to personal property that we had inherited from our mother. There was no merit to the second wife's allegations that the items were hers and not ours. Once the documentation of rightful ownership was provided, the issue was quickly resolved in our favor.

47. Have you ever been sued by a client? Have you ever been a named party (personally or professionally) in or had a pecuniary interest in any civil or criminal proceedings? If so, give details, including, but not limited to, dates, and resolutions.

I have never been sued by a client.

- (a) I was sued in circuit court in my professional capacity as a DSS attorney in the early 1990's by aggrieved grandparents. I was defended under the Torts Claims Act by an Insurance Reserve Fund-appointed attorney. The case was dismissed with prejudice at the first hearing.
 - (b) I was named in a family court contempt action in 2001 by defendants in a DSS action while I was director of Greenville DSS. The parties dismissed the action before trial.
 - (c) I was named in a suit against my father sometime in the early 2000s. My father had given an option to purchase a piece of property that he no longer owned post-divorce from our mother. When my siblings and I sold it, unaware of the option, the option holder sued. The case was dismissed before the issues were joined, as we sold the so-called option holder another piece of property with which he was satisfied.
