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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

SC First Steps: 2017 in Review

FY17 was an important year for the state's comprehensive school readiness initiative, as SC First Steps oversaw the continued success of its 46 local partnerships, further expansion of private four-year-old kindergarten, the launch of Early Head Start services to low-income infants and toddlers in 11 SC counties (as well as the receipt of a secondary federal grant which will expand this service to an additional 162 children), and the improved compliance of the federal BabyNet early intervention program (which saw its federal determination raise for the first time since 2010).

Since December of 2015, First Steps has:

- Successfully completed review by the House Legislative Oversight Committee, which resulted in a
 unanimous vote to recommend the continuation of First Steps' existing structure and each of its major
 program areas.
- Substantially improved its support of local partnerships, doubling its technical assistance staff and establishing the Executive Director Leadership Council an advisory body comprised by all 45 local partnership directors which has ensured unprecedented levels of state-local collaboration.
- Secured additional Early Head Start grant funding (bringing the agency's total EHS funding to \$34 million over five years) and successfully completed its initial federal review.
- Timely met its legislative mandates and advanced the Vision 2020 strategic plan.
- Overseen the continued growth and complexity of the First Steps 4K program, as it prepares for year-round operation during 2017-2018 in 219 private, community- and faith-based classrooms.
- Advanced the permanent legislative reauthorization of the existing First Steps structure, which now requires only a final Senate vote before passage.

The SC First Steps Board of Trustees is currently undertaking a search for the agency's next permanent director, which it expects to have in place prior to the 2018 legislative session.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies:

Should First Steps fail to meet its goals and objectives, South Carolina's young children will be less prepared for success in school and life. In order to mitigate and prevent this negative and costly impact, First Steps requires the ongoing support of its public and private partners, Governor McMaster, and the SC General Assembly. In order for the agency to continue to support the needs of the state's children and families, First Steps requires a permanent statutory reauthorization during the 2018 session. Failure to secure reauthorization of the initiative's enabling legislation will result in instability, staff turnover and the continued loss of resources from private and philanthropic sources.

To resolve this issue before it reaches a point of crisis, the General Assembly could:


- 1) Honor the findings of the House Legislative Oversight Committee, which determined in May of 2016 following year-long investigatory study that the programs of First Steps should be continued under the agency's existing structure. A durable reauthorization for First Steps will enable the agency to execute the Board's strategic plan as detailed in the pages to follow.
- 2) Consider expanding the resources of the local First Steps Partnerships. As the state considers its response to the ongoing *Abbeville County School District et. al. vs. South Carolina* school equity funding lawsuit, policy makers will be wise to take stock of scientific research suggesting that the years of early

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childhood – and particularly those from birth to three – play a significant role in determining the long-term academic success of young children. This is particularly true of young children in poverty.
