# SENATE BILL 993

Issued permits will be valid until the end of the festival for which the permit was issued. In order to obtain a permit, an applicant must complete a law enforcement notification provision which shall be included in the application. Both the application and the law enforcement notification provision are to be developed by DOR.
