

History of Regional Transportation Planning

Congress began funding urban transportation planning 1973

Regional Council of
Governments began providing
transportation planning
assistance for rural SC
1997

1962

Federal-Aid Highway Act required transportation planning in urban areas

1980's

Reduced federal oversight and delegated responsibility to states and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) 2007

Act 114 required the ranking of projects



Regional Planning Areas

Transportation Management Areas (Population > 200,000)

ARTS, CHATS, COATS, GPATS, GSATS, and RFATS

Metropolitan Planning Organizations

(Population > 50,000)

ANATS, ARTS, CHATS, COATS, FLATS, GPATS, GSATS, LATS, RFATS, SPATS, & SUATS

Council of Governments (COGs)

(Population < 50,000)

Appalachian, Berkeley-Charleston-Dorchester, Catawba, Central Midlands, Lowcountry, Lower Savannah, Pee Dee, Santee Lynches, Upper Savannah, & Waccamaw





Regional Planning – Federal Requirements

- MPOs, in coordination with the state, carry out regional planning in metropolitan areas.
- The state must consult with local officials with nonmetropolitan planning.
- Minimum federal funding distribution only to TMAs, with consideration to allocate funding to MPOs.



Regional Mobility Program

Program established in 1997


 Mechanism to identify, prioritize and fund non-interstate operational improvement projects.
