
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CHE Response to Chair Hixon from Director Rusty Monhollon

1) Is there a way to track the amount of debt students accumulate while in non-technical school colleges and universities?

Yes, CHE tracks debt accumulated by students while in non-technical colleges and universities via data sharing with selected partners, including the South Carolina Student Loan Corporation (SCSLC), National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) and the U.S. Department of Education (through their Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS)).

2) Please begin gathering information and state by when you can provide the average salary of graduates one, three-, and five-years post-graduation by degree from each non-technical school colleges and universities.

CHE has already begun the process of gathering information re: the average salary of graduates one, three-, and five-years post-graduation by degree from South Carolina's public non-technical school colleges.

CHE is working with the South Carolina Department of Employment and Workforce (DEW) and the Office of Revenue and Fiscal Affairs (RFA) to determine the average salary of graduates. Based on conversations with these partners, we anticipate that data needed to perform the analysis will be shared no later than June 1, 2022.

3) Please state any changes that have occurred at your agency, or are planned at your agency because of the meeting with the Subcommittee (e.g., joining labor force participation rate taskforce after learning about during the meeting, etc.)

Following the meeting with the Subcommittee on February 28, 2022, CHE has worked with staff at the Education Oversight Committee to review plans for presentation and analysis of NSC data to SC high schools, districts, 2-year and 4-year colleges re: student success and progress metrics for recent high school graduates, including those who enroll at higher education institutions but don't graduate.

 - Universal buy-in, prioritization and support from agency leaders, legislature and Governor
 - Staff turnover and potential loss of institutional knowledge re: workforce issues
