DHEC has an Office of Internal Audits (OIA) that operates pursuant to the Internal Audit Policy of the Board. See Exhibit 1. This policy was recently updated and will be presented at an upcoming DHEC Board meeting for approval by the DHEC Board. OIA has been operational for more than 20 years. In December 2016, Cynthia F. Rumph was hired as the Director of Internal Audits. The Director of Internal Audits reports administratively to Angela Wertz, Compliance Officer, and functionally to Clarence Batts and Robert Wells of the Audit Committee of the DHEC Board. The Director of Internal Audits, with input from the Agency Director, General Counsel, and the Audit Committee, determines when an internal audit is conducted.

During 2017, OIA has made substantial changes in the way it determines what subject matters will be audited and included in the audit plan. An Audit Universe was developed based on information obtained from the Agency's Executive Leadership Team (ELT), knowledge acquired by the OIA from past audit projects, and from the Agency's Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) process. Each potential audit project included in the Audit Universe was scored based on various risk factors, and a risk ranking, from highest to lowest, was developed. OIA prepared a Five (5) Year Audit Plan for Fiscal Years 2018-2022 for DHEC based on the highest risk ranked audit projects in the Audit Universe. The types of audits in the Five (5) Year Audit Plan are as follows: risk-based recurring audits (34%), risk-based non-recurring audits (51%), and ad-hoc projects (15%).

Internal controls are routinely tested and assessed as a part of most OIA audits, and corrective action plans are required to be submitted and implemented by DHEC management to correct internal control weaknesses identified by the audit. Program compliance reviews are routinely performed at the program level. These audits and reviews help to address the Agency's performance measurement and improvement systems.

In the past 10 years, OIA has completed 65 audits. A listing of all internal audits for the last 10 years in included in *Exhibit 2*. For a listing of all external audits conducted within the agency for the last five years, please see *Exhibit 3*.

The most recent peer review was conducted by the SC State Internal Auditors Association in May 2016. *See Exhibit 4*. This peer review resulted in a **favorable rating of pass**, the highest rating. OIA follows Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards, which require a peer review to be conducted every three (3) years. The next peer review is due in 2019.
