DJJ PROCESS

- 1. Most juveniles enter the juvenile justice system in South Carolina when they are taken into custody by law enforcement and referred to DJJ. Juveniles may also be referred to DJJ by a Circuit Solicitor, parent, or a school.
- 2. Most juveniles are released to their parents by law enforcement pending referral to DJJ. Law enforcement might also elect to send a juvenile to a SC juvenile detention center, pending a hearing. DJJ conducts intake interviews with juveniles and their
- 3. DJJ makes recommendations to the Circuit Solicitor's Office regarding the case.

 Juvenile at County Detention Center or JDC (This last statement is not accurate. Juveniles can be placed in a number of places including STAP placements or remain at home. In FY 2015-2016 of the 15,429 cases to the solicitor only 3,262 were
- 4. Solicitor chooses to (A) dismiss case entirely; (B) divert a juvenile to a community program (such as a drug court or juvenile arbitration program); (C) require the juvenile to make restitution for the offense; or (D) proceed with prosecution:

 Juvenile at County Detention Center or DJJ Juvenile Detention Center while Solicitor makes a decision. Juveniles can also be placed in a other locations including STAP placements or remain at home. Most children remain at home.
- 5. If a Solicitor chooses to prosecute, the case proceeds to Court.
- 6. The Family Court Judge finds the juvenile "not delinquent" (not guilty) or "delinquent" (guilty) after a plea or a trial.

 A judge may request a DJJ evaluation of the child before making his final dispositional (or sentencing) decision. This involves psychological, social, and educational evaluations conducted either in the community or at one of DJJ's three Juvenile at Juvenile Detention Center or Secure Evaluation Center while awaiting, and during, trial and sentencing.

- 7. If the juvenile is "adjudicated delinquent" (found guilty), the judge may (A) put the juvenile on probation; (B) give a "determinate" (fixed amount of time) commitment; or (C) give an "indeterminate" commitment.
 - If on probation, Juvenile remains in the community either in placement or at home
 - If determinate or indeterminate commitment, Juvenile goes to Admissions at one of the three Evaluation Centers
- 8. Indeterminate commitment is when a juvenile is held for a indefinite period of time, up to age 21. Upon commitment, a juvenile will be given a time range or "guideline," determined by the state Board of Juvenile Parole (for all felonies and select misdemeanors) or DJJ's release authority (for most misdemeanors and all status offenses). This range is based on the severity of the juvenile's offense and his history of previous offenses. These guidelines can run anywhere from 1-3 months up to 36-54
- 9. Juveniles may be (A) paroled prior to their minimum guideline for exceptional behavior and progress; (B) granted unconditional release; or (C) granted a conditional release which might involve requiring the juvenile to complete a local aftercare program or program at a wilderness camp or group home. A conditional release also involves a period of parole

ERS replaced the Event Reporting Management Information System (ERMIS)
Fight	PbS	A fight is defined as a mutual physical assault between two or more youth. It is a subcategory of youth on youth assault.

Incident	PbS	An event or crisis that may compromise the safety and security of staff and residents, and requires staff response and written documentation. Such events occur within the facility (although they may be precipitated by events outside the facility) and may involve staff, youths, or others.
		Examples include assault, escapes, evacuations, vehicular accidents, abuse, disturbances, or riots. Staff observations and/or interactions are to be recorded on the Juvenile Room Confinement/Isolation Record Sheet and Cell Check Log.
Juveniles with Serious Mental Illness (Formerly known as DMH Subclass Youth)	DJJ	Using diagnoses as delineated in the DSM-5, any juvenile who has been professionally diagnosed as having any of the following illnesses shall be considered seriously mentally ill: 1. Psychotic Disorders (Schizoaffective Disorder, Delusional Disorder and Psychotic Disorder Unspecified and Specified) — Not Substance Induced 2. Major Depressive Disorder, Recurrent and Single Episode - Not Substance Induced 3. Bipolar Disorder (All Subtypes except Bipolar Unspecified) 4. Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder — Severe 5. Mechanical restraints used for the routine transport or movement of youth should not be included in PbS data collections. However, mechanical restraints used for transporting a youth from a housing unit to isolation in either an individual room or isolation unit should be counted.
Officer to Juvenile Ratio	DJJ	DJJ has adopted the PREA Juvenile Facility Standard 115.313. Under these standards, secure juvenile facilities are required to maintain staff ratios of a minimum of 1:8 during resident waking hours and 1:16 during resident sleeping hours, except during limited and discrete exigent circumstances. DJJ is working to meet this standard. However, due to staffing shortages, DJJ is currently operating at a 1:10 average juvenile to staff ratio at the Broad River Road Complex (BRRC) and a 1:20 juvenile to staff ratio average at the Evaluation Centers. The Juvenile Detention Center operates within the 1:8 juvenile to staff ratio average on a frequent basis, except in extenuating circumstances.
Parole (Conditional Release)	DJJ	A S.C. Juvenile Parole Board/DJJ Release Authority action allowing a committed juvenile to return to the community on aftercare status, under supervision/authority of the Parole Board/Release Authority, and subject to the general/specific rules established by the Parole Board/Release Authority.
Performance Based Standards(PbS)	PbS	PbS is a project, of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), that sets national standards for safety, security, order, health/mental, education and other programming within facilities, and preparation for community reintegration.
PbS Site Coordinator		The designated PbS trained staff member at each site. This individual serves as PbS chair, oversees PbS practices, collects accurate data, works with and trains staff for PbS administration and reporting.
Physical Restraint	PbS	Facility authorized and trained holds used by staff to subdue an otherwise uncontrollable youth in order to prevent the youth from injuring him or herself, or others. Does not include escort techniques and routine contact with compliant youths. Restraints should never be used as punishment for misconduct.
Placement - Higher level of care	DII	In regards to community alternative placement, this meansUpon discharge from the program, the juvenile went to a higher level of care (more intensive placement)
Placement - Same Level of care	D11	In regards to community alternative placement, this meansUpon discharge from the program, the juvenile went to another program at the same level of care (intermediate or Intensive)
Placement - Home	DJJ	In regards to community alternative placement, this meansUpon discharge from the program, the juvenile went home

DJJ provides juveniles with three levels of community based supervision according to need and risk: standard supervision, moderate supervision and intensive supervision.

Sexual Assault	PbS	Sexual abuse of an inmate, detainee, or resident by another inmate, detainee, or resident includes any of the following acts, if the victim does not consent, is coerced into such act by overt or implied threats of violence, or is unable to consent or refuse: •Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight; • Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva or anus; • Penetration of the anal or genital opening of another person, however slight, by a hand, finger object, or other instrument; and •Any other intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or the buttocks of another person, excluding contact incidental to a physical altercation.
Sexual Abuse	PbS	Sexual abuse of an inmate, detainee, or resident by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer includes any of the following acts, with or without consent of the inmate, detainee, or resident: •Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight; •Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva, or anus; •Contact between the mouth and any body part where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire; •Penetration of the anal or genital opening, however slight, by a hand, finger, object, or other instrument, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire; •Any other intentional contact, either directly or through the clothing, of or with the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or the buttocks, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire; •Any attempt, threat, or request by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer to engage in the activities described above; •Any display by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer of his or her uncovered genitalia,

Sexual inappropriate behavior	PbS	Inappropriate sexual behaviors include a continuum of activities, regardless of voluntariness that may include otherwise developmentally normative behaviors, norm-violating behaviors, sexual harassment, exploitation/taking unfair advantage of another, and sexual assault. Sexually inappropriate behaviors may present a problem to the person who commits them (e.g., risk of harm or other consequences), others (violates rules, norms or values and/or makes others uncomfortable), or are abusive (lack of consent, inequity, coercion) or illegal (as defined by statute or case law).
