




SCDNR Law Enforcement is responsible for patrolling 30,111 square miles of land, 460,000 acres of lakes, 8,000 miles of rivers, and 3,000 miles of coastal waters.



Enforcement of Laws Related to Marine, Wildlife, Boating, and Natural Resources

Officers checked 141,590 hunters and fishermen during daily patrols.



Officers documented 30,960 violations of which 22,644 violations were issued warnings to educate the public on laws and regulations.






Cases made included night hunting of deer, possession of narcotics, alcohol violations, and other criminal offenses



Internal Change # 17

Establish change to officers' work schedule to allow for an additional weekend day off per month.

Due to the rigorous work schedule officers' are required to work 3 weekends a month plus most holidays.

By adding an additional weekend day off per month we feel this will enhance the morale of not only the officer but also the officer's family and support toward the job.

Internal Change # 18

Extending the current 8 week wildlife and marine law enforcement academy to 9 weeks.

This would allow more time for instruction and reduce accumulation of compensatory time.



Internal Change # 19

Implementation of an electronic records management system, e-Citation system, and mobile data information system for patrol officers.



This is currently in the research phase as we determine which system will allow for electronic incident reporting, accident reporting, evidence storage, evidence inventory, e-Citation, and an integration of our violations database.

By integrating our violations database, NCIC, and other violator databases this will enhance the field officers ability to gather vital information while in the field rather than depending on information relayed from another source.
