





- Permitting is required any time there is an affected action potentially causing environmental impacts covered under any Federal or State environmental laws or regulations.
- Permits are required to be obtained by everyone:
 - Private citizens
 - Businesses,
 - Utilities and Corporations, and
 - State and Federal Agencies

- ☐ Section 404 of the Clean Water Act

- The regulatory agencies accept, and publish permit applications.
- The resource agencies identify the potential impacts and work with the regulatory agencies and applicants to <u>avoid, minimize, or mitigate</u> those impacts.
- DNR is also known as a commenting agency.
- DNR has no environmental regulatory authority.
- Commenting agency = Resource agency.



We Comment on Resource-Related Issues!



How many?

- The regulatory agencies currently public notice approximately 1,000 permit applications each year.
- OEP staff triage these applications to determine which ones require a comprehensive review.
- We perform approximately 200 comprehensive reviews annually.














Mitigation Project Example: Haile Gold Mine

- 120 acres of wetland fill, and 5 miles of stream impacts, most of which would be filled.
- Wetland fill equals approx. 3 years cumulative wetland fill for all of South Carolina.
- Water quality impacts
- Mitigation package was appropriately rigorous




