

Section I- EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Description of the Department of Transportation

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) is charged with the responsibility of systematic planning, design, construction, maintenance, and operation of the state highway system and coordinating mass transit services. SCDOT operates and maintains 41,500 miles of roads and bridges, which ranks as the fourth largest state-owned highway system in the nation according to the Federal Highway Administration. The agency's emphasis in 2007, and into the foreseeable future, is on system maintenance and preservation, safety, and environmental stewardship.

Mission and Values:

SCDOT coordinates state and federal programs relating to highways and public transportation among all departments, agencies, and government entities throughout South Carolina along with other duties and matters as may be delegated by law. The goal of the Department is to provide adequate, safe, and efficient transportation services for the movement of people and goods. With the recent increase in local-option sales taxes for transportation, the creation of the South Carolina Transportation Infrastructure Bank, and the continued development of regional and metropolitan planning organizations, the importance of partnering has grown. The Department has committed itself to collaboration and consultation in the exercise of its responsibilities.

SCDOT is now a cabinet agency taking much of its operational direction from the executive branch of state government, but it must continue to follow numerous federal laws and regulations associated with the Federal-Aid Highway and Federal Transit programs. SCDOT has embraced a number of recent trends in federal transportation policy, emphasizing the importance of:

1. Making highway safety the agency's number one priority
2. Proactively consulting with affected individuals and stakeholders
3. Addressing congestion management in innovative ways
4. Using intelligent transportation systems (ITS)
5. Making transportation plans consistent with local planned growth and development plans
6. Creating bicycle and pedestrian alternatives
7. Making projects and programs sensitive to the human and natural environment
8. Considering homeland security as a distinct planning factor
9. Forming Public-Private partnerships to meet the transportation needs of the state.

Major Achievements from the Past Year

Key Strategic Goals for Present and Future Years

SCDOT has a Strategic Plan that is also referred to as the “Five Big Rocks.” Below are the key components of the Strategic Plan:

- Increase safety on South Carolina’s transportation system and within the agency;
- Continue to maintain and preserve the infrastructure across South Carolina;
- Excel in customer service, internally and externally;
- Use resources wisely and efficiently; and
- Improve employee development for all employees.

Opportunities and Barriers

During the year, the South Carolina General Assembly held numerous public hearings and committee meetings on the subject of SCDOT reform. This was largely in response to the findings and concerns outlined in a 2006 report by the South Carolina Legislative Audit Council (LAC). As a result of the LAC report and a strong lobbying effort by the states environmental community to revise the way highway projects are selected, Act 114 reforming SCDOT was signed into law by Governor Mark Sanford in June 2007. This legislation will require the development of new procedures and regulations. Upon passage of Act 114, SCDOT immediately began taking action to transform the agency to conform to the requirements of the new law. Governor Sanford appointed H.B. Limehouse, Jr. as the first Secretary of Transportation. The newly constituted SCDOT Commission elected Commissioner Bobby T. Jones as its Chairman.

Aside from restructuring legislation, SCDOT continues to move forward with the implementation of Act 176 of 2005, which provides state funding for system maintenance. Highway maintenance funding resulting from that legislation exceeded first year projections by almost \$4M. Funds resulting from the passage of Act 176 allowed SCDOT to enter contracts to resurface approximately **295** miles of non-federally eligible secondary roads in 2007. The County Transportation Committees awarded contracts for the resurfacing of an additional **112** miles of non-federally eligible roads in 2007. This

resulted in a total of **407** miles; however, the state should be resurfacing roughly 1,400 miles of these roads per year.

The skyrocketing cost of oil has driven the prices of gasoline, asphalt, steel, and cement up to three times the rate of inflation found in the consumer price index (CPI). The revenue impact has been particularly troublesome because South Carolina does not index fuel user fee rates for inflation and because the state is overly dependent on motor fuel revenues for highway funding. State General Fund growth has outpaced state highway funding by almost a four-to-one ratio over the last forty years, yet very few revenue adjustments have been made to share this growth with the highway program. This financial reality was masked in recent years by the state's issuance of highway bonds, but these bonds have been virtually exhausted and recurring state-source highway revenues are the lowest per-mile in the nation.

This financial environment has fostered efficiency and productivity. According to a report by the Reason Foundation, *The 16th Annual Report on the State Highway Systems*, South Carolina is ranked second in the nation for overall cost effectiveness.

Because of South Carolina's relatively low user fee on motor fuel many truckers purchase fuel here before crossing the border into other states. The state is required by International Fuel Tax Agreement (IFTA) to compensate other states when truckers purchase fuel here that is consumed elsewhere. The federally mandated IFTA program is administered by the Department of Motor Vehicles on behalf of the trucking industry; however, funding for administration of the program is currently coming from the State Highway Fund rather than the General Fund. The IFTA program, is not only resulting in the loss of revenue to other states, it is also costing the Highway Fund roughly \$1 million per year to administer.

Federal highway funding for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2006 was less than expected, especially for those programs that are used to develop the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). This lower level of funding carried into FFY 2007 as the Federal Highway Administration operated under a Continuing Resolution until February 2007, when funding levels were finally raised to the levels that were promised in 2005. The lack of growth in the federal-aid program, along with inflation, had a negative impact on the agency's ability to accurately project cash flow for the year. This has caused unpredictability in the advertisement in the award of construction and resurfacing contracts, thus creating a level of uncertainty among the states' highway contractors.

Highway maintenance remains the Department's greatest challenge as the state's 41,500 miles of roads and 8,329 bridges continue to age. This is primarily a state responsibility since federal dollars must be used for specific purposes designated by Congress. While overall highway funding in South Carolina is expected to increase over the next five years, a portion will be in the form of Congressional earmarks. The predicted increases will require additional state matching dollars, thus putting a greater strain on the state's ability to provide highway maintenance dollars. Earmarks actually impact the STIP because funding comes out of the South Carolina federal funding. Because of this

SCDOT informed the state's congressional delegation in 2007 that it could only provide matching funds for earmark projects already poised to move forward as part of the STIP. All other earmarks will require matching dollars from outside sources.

Today's high fuel prices encourage people consider to alternative transportation such as rail and bus. This presents the Department with an opportunity to enhance transit services and advance rail planning. The greatest barrier to progress in the field of public transportation in SC remains funding, Less than 50 cents of every transit dollar sent to Washington is returned to SC for use in Mass Transit.

New Directions - The Secretary of Transportation recommended and the Commission approved the change in South Carolina State Highway Road signs as depicted to the right. These signs will go into effect during the normal replacement cycle of signs currently in use. The SC 90 route was chosen to unveil the new design because it signifies SCDOT's 90th year, 1917-2007.



Funding and Planning - Despite funding barriers, SCDOT has created opportunities to move forward. In 2007, the SCDOT Commission elected to reduce the state secondary system "cap" each time a road was removed from the state system. The Commission also shifted its method of disbursing secondary resurfacing dollars to a formula that takes statewide road conditions more heavily into consideration. The previous formula divided funds strictly on the basis of Engineering Districts, with priorities being set within each district based on need.

In the spring of 2007, the Commission reviewed a draft Statewide Project Priority List that had been prepared by the Engineering Division based on empirical analyses of each identified project throughout the state. Later the Legislature included a similar prioritization requirement in Act 114. This new priority list will provide an excellent tool for selecting projects to be included in the State Transportation Improvement Program. But funding remains to be the biggest challenge facing SCDOT as needs continue to outweigh resources.

Each year, the state appropriations process focuses almost exclusively on general fund agencies with no built-in review of transportation needs that are funded by the State Highway Fund. State Highway Fund revenues are not included in the annual Board of Economic Advisors (BEA) briefing to the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee. This has contributed toward the long-term disparity in growth between the General Fund and the State Highway Fund.

Our neighboring states have done a better job of investing in their state highway systems by either supplementing their motor fuel revenues with other sources of funding, historically placing their roads under local control instead of state ownership, or indexing revenues to inflation. The following chart is based on recurring revenues and cash. This data came from 2005 Federal Highway Administration statistics and 2007 Census Bureau population estimates.

*The "Per Capita Per 100 Miles" number shows how much each citizen contributes annually in user fees for each 100 miles in the state highway system. In effect, the South Carolina taxpayer pays 34¢ per year in user fees for the use of 100 miles of highways, while across the nation taxpayers pay \$1.42.

SCDOT is guided by the 20-year needs assessment and plans from the states ten Councils of Government, ten Metropolitan Planning Organizations, and data derived from the continuous inspection of all roads and bridges. To better understand the state's true needs, SCDOT has convened a comprehensive group of stakeholders in 2007 to update the 20-year Statewide Multimodal Plan that should be completed in early 2008.

Focus on Customer Service

SCDOT takes pride in rapid response, as evidenced by the team repair effort needed to replace a portion of the J. E. McTeer Bridge (Beaufort County) and the Lockhart bridge repair on SC Route 9 (Union County). These efforts involved meeting with community groups to discuss plans and traffic routing. The Secretary of Transportation, State Highway Engineer and District Engineering Administrator personally met with community leaders and the public.

Completion of Projects

The following is a list of major construction projects completed during 2007.

1. 9 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along SC 5 from 1000 feet south of Cherokee County Line to 1600 feet south of US 29. Includes two bridges totaling 300 feet. Performed by Eagle Construction Company for a cost of \$31,837, 913.
2. The upgrade of the West Georgia Road interchange near Simpsonville included the widening of 1.7 miles of I-385 plus 4.5 miles on West Georgia Road, ramps, and side roads, including 1 bridge over I-385. Performed by C.W. Matthews Contracting Company for a cost of \$25,507,973.
3. The upgrade of the Harrison Bridge Road interchange near Simpsonville included the widening of 1.7 miles of I-385 plus 5 miles on Harrison Bridge Road, ramps, and side roads, including 1 bridge over I-385 and 1 bridge over Payne Creek. Performed by U.S. Constructors at a cost of \$24,010,179.
4. 12.8 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along SC 38/US 501 from 0.74 miles east of US 301 to 0.45 miles west of US 501(Marion Bypass) in Dillon and Marion Counties. Includes a 179 foot bridge. Performed by Weaver Company at a cost of \$23,117,688.
5. 7.5 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along SC 290 from SC 296 to US 221. Includes a 201 foot bridge over CSX Railroad. Performed by E.S. Wagner Company at a cost of \$17,419,050.
6. 8.5 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along US 521 from South Guignard Parkway to Clarendon County Line. Includes 0.9 miles along South Guignard Parkway and a 100

- foot bridge over Turkey Creek. Performed by C. Ray Miles Construction at a cost of \$17,271,863.
7. 4.9 mile project on SC 34 over the Great Pee Dee River replaced 6 overflow bridges and approaches. This amounted to 3,724 feet of bridge deck replacement and 4.25 miles of roadway resurfacing. Performed by R.R Dawson Bridge Company at a cost of \$16,928,351.
 8. 7 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along US 378 from US 301 in Turbeville to west of S-18 in Clarendon and Florence Counties. Includes a 135 foot bridge over Douglas Swamp. Performed by U.S. Group Inc. at a cost of \$16,289,919.
 9. 1.8 mile project near the town of Roebuck eliminated an at grade railroad crossing with a bridge over CSX Railroad. It also included a bridge over Reedy Creek. Performed by McMillian-Carter Inc. at a cost of \$15,848,598.
 10. 4.2 miles of widening from 2 to 5 lanes along SC 60 (Lake Murray Blvd.) from S-107 (Old Bush River Road) to S-175 (Irmo Drive). Performed by U.S. Group Inc. at a cost of \$14,120,386.

Ten-Year Highway Plan

Section 57-3-760 describes the requirement for an Annual Report from SCDOT and as part of this report asks for a ten- year plan detailing the future needs of the state in the fields of planning, construction, maintenance, and the operation of the state highway system.

In June of 2007, Act 114 was signed into law requiring the SCDOT Commission to ensure that transportation projects originate from an established priority list to the extent permitted by federal laws taking into consideration the following criteria: Financial viability, public safety, potential for economic development, traffic volume and congestion, truck traffic, pavement quality, environmental impacts, alternative transportation solutions, and consistency with local comprehensive plans.

SCDOT, in consultation with its partners, established ranking procedures for projects in the areas of bridge needs, intersections, primary and secondary system road widenings, new location corridors, interstate widenings, interchange and maintenance, mass transit, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) projects, traffic control devices, and other state and federally funded programs.

Reduce the Number of Miles in the State System

The SCDOT Commission placed a cap on the size of the ever growing secondary system in 1994 in an effort to reduce the burden on the Department's under funded maintenance program. Reducing the size of the system could best be accomplished by transferring all or a portion of the non-federal aid secondary roads to the counties or local municipalities. This is typical in most states. Many of these roads are located in residential areas and are therefore not significant to the movement of goods and services on a statewide basis. Reducing the size of the state system would enable SCDOT to provide a higher level of service on major roads, than is presently possible given the limited funds available for maintenance.

The key goals SCDOT placed emphasis on in 2007 included:

Pavement Improvement and Preservation Program

All roads on the state highway system are evaluated on a regular basis to determine the structural condition of the pavement. Interstate routes are evaluated annually, with primary and secondary roads evaluated every three years(bridges are inspected more routinely). This data, along with the other objective and quantifiable factors approved by the SCDOT Commission, is used to rank roads for one of the following programs:

- Reconstruction - the replacement of the entire existing pavement structure with an equivalent or increased pavement structure. Reconstruction is required when a pavement has failed or reached its minimum acceptable operating condition.
- Rehabilitation - consists of structural enhancements that extend the service life of an existing pavement and/or improve its load carrying capacity. Examples of

- rehabilitation would include asphalt overlays greater than one and a half inches, or lifts of binder course followed by an asphalt overlay.
- Preventive maintenance - a planned strategy of cost-effective treatments to an existing pavement that preserves and retards future deterioration, and maintains or improves the functional condition of the system. Examples of preventive maintenance include crack sealing, bituminous resurfacing, slurry or micro-surfacing, thin lift asphalt overlays, and diamond grinding.

Funding for pavement improvement and preservation in recent years has been inadequate to maintain the highway system at an acceptable level of service. The Pavement Improvement and Preservation Program should be initially funded at a level that will maintain the present condition of the system, and then be incrementally increased to raise the system condition to the desired level of service. An increase in maintenance funding will allow the Department to move away from a reactive mode and allow a more proactive approach that includes the scheduled routine and preventative activities necessary to improve the highway system. The Department is maximizing the use of all available sources of funding for maintenance.

Deficient Bridges

One of the goals of the Department's strategic plan has been to reverse the upward trend in deficient bridge deck area. The present level of federal funding for bridge replacement should provide for a sufficient number of bridge replacement projects to begin to reverse the upward trend in deficient bridge deck area downward. Bridges are prioritized for replacement using objective and quantifiable factors approved by the SCDOT Commission.

Modernize Strategic Corridors

- Implement Statewide Comprehensive Multimodal Transportation Plan
 - Improve Statewide Significant Corridors
 - Address needs related to safety, roadway capacity, freight movement, mass transit, and bike and pedestrian mobility
 - Consider new location corridors to support existing Statewide Significant Corridors

Define a long-range vision for Mass Transit

- Identify needs for intercity transit and passenger rail service
- Implement regional human health service coordination plans to improve efficiencies of resources and service
- Maintain an inventory of all Railroad Right-of-Way
- Coordinate on all railroad right-of-way abandonment actions to ensure that right-of-way is preserved for future public use
- Implement transit service for all 46 counties.

Improve the Interstate System

- Develop a long-range interstate plan to address mainline capacity, interchange improvements, and maintenance.

Coordinate with Metropolitan Planning Organizations and Council of Governments to maintain long-range transportation plans

- Include prioritized projects in the State Transportation Improvement Program based on available funding

Establish a Financial Plan that documents financially constrained and unconstrained needs

- Estimate financial resources over the life of the long-range plan in comparison to estimated needs

Traffic Engineering

Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)

The solutions to the nation's transportation needs include many technological innovations. Federal transportation programs are steadily moving toward the expanded use of such technology to avoid building more highways. This is extremely important for the future of our nation and our state.

The South Carolina Department of Transportation is implementing ITS elements in its statewide traffic management program. ITS elements allow incidents to be detected more quickly, emergency services dispatched sooner, motorist information to be posted on Changeable Message Signs and traffic flow restored. This translates into less secondary collisions from traffic congestion and faster emergency service in rural areas. ITS elements include the use of a motorist's assistance program, video cameras, changeable message signs, speed detection systems and highway advisory radios. Real time information is gathered and used to inform motorists of actual traffic conditions.

With assistance from previous federal funding, the SCDOT ITS program is presently deployed at strategic locations on high volume interstates and in critical areas along the coast. There is a need to expand the system further and to include rural interstate and other primary roadways for traffic management and security. The system has hundreds of applications beyond traffic management. It can also be used to support Emergency Medical Services, Amber Alerts, military convoys, travel advisories issued by the news media and many other applications.

Hurricane activity has brought increased attention to the need for additional ITS coverage on critical evacuation routes. The use of cameras and automatic vehicular speed and count stations are valuable in monitoring progress during evacuations. Expansion of the ITS elements on these routes would provide essential traffic flow information to those who must make critical decisions involving evacuations.

The following are proposed projects for in the Ten Year Plan for expansion and regional traffic management centers for the operation of ITS system including operational space for the incident management patrol (SHEP).

- SCDOT Statewide ITS Expansion - \$2,000,000
- Rock Hill SCDOT Traffic Management Center - \$2,000,000
A permanent Traffic Management Center for the Rock Hill area to replace the existing center located in a temporary manufactured trailer is vitally needed. The existing trailer is near the end of the expected service life. The new center would be constructed at the existing Welcome Center located on I-77 which is the site of the present trailer. This center would be utilized for the day to day traffic operation of 17 mile corridor of I-77 from the North Carolina State line southward.
- Greenville/Spartanburg/Anderson SCDOT Traffic Management Center/SCDPS Dispatch Center - \$1,500,000
A joint SCDOT Traffic Management Center and SCDPS Dispatch Center is needed for the coordination of each agency's operation on the I-85 corridor in the upstate h Carolina. Currently, SCDOT has an undersized traffic management center located in the SCDOT District Office and SCDPS is searching for a site to locate a regional dispatch center. The co-location of these activities will have a significant benefit in addressing the traffic management needs on the I-85 corridor in the Greenville, Spartanburg and Anderson areas. This proposed center would be located within the existing SCDOT District Office building with the work consisting of renovation to accommodate the Information Technology and SCDPS security needs.
- Charleston SCDOT Traffic Management Center - \$2,000,000
A permanent Traffic Management Center for the Charleston area to replace the existing center located in a temporary manufactured trailer is vitally needed. This new center would be a new wing to the existing SCDOT District office. It would be constructed to withstand hurricane winds to assure continuing operation of the SCDOT district operations and traffic monitoring following a hurricane.

Total request of these projects is \$7.5M

511 Traveler Information System

In July 2000, the Federal Communications Commission officially assigned 511 as the abbreviated dialing code for travelers to access Real-time traffic information collected in each state. Currently, 29 states are participating in the program, and the rest are expected to roll out the service by 2010. To this end, SCDOT has been working towards the goal of being the designated the "511" agency for South Carolina. The system for South Carolina is envisioned to incorporate the traffic information gathered from the

Department's ITS systems as well as maintenance and construction activities into one central location that motorists can access by dialing 511 on their phones or may be obtained via the internet for pre-trip planning. This effort is to inform motorists so they can make educated decisions about their travel plans to avoid congested areas and better utilize the capacity of the entire roadway network.

Additional information regarding the highway construction program can be found in two documents:

State Transportation Improvement Program

The STIP is a comprehensive report listing the various types of projects in which work activity is planned within the next six years. The report details the funding of each project and the work phase for each project in the appropriate year.

The present STIP includes the fiscal years 2007 - 2012. It is produced and printed every three years as part of a federal requirement of the safe, accountable, flexible, efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). 10 Year Highway Construction Project Booklets

The 10 Year Highway Construction Projects booklets are prepared annually at the end of each calendar year and are ready for distribution at the end of February. These individual County Booklets contain "10 years of SCDOT Highway Construction Projects". The report consists of "SCDOT Projects Completed Between January 1998 and December 2007" and "Secondary ("C") Projects Completed Between January 1998 and December 2007". The projects appear in ascending order by completion date with costs included.

The County Booklet also contains "Projects Currently Under Construction" with estimated completion dates and estimated construction costs. The data is provided by each SCDOT Engineering District Office for publication electronically using an Excel spreadsheet. The county spreadsheets are then converted into a PDF file format and maps are added by the Traffic Engineering, Road Data Services Section. This allows the 10 Year Construction booklets to be emailed by request, as well as, placed on the SCDOT Internet Website for easy of download by anyone. Each member of the SC House and Senate receives a paper copy of the 10 Year Construction Booklet for each county in his or her congressional district.

Introduction

By statute, the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) Division of Mass Transit must develop and coordinates a general mass transit program and policy for the State of South Carolina in order to encourage the efficient development, implementation, operation, evaluation, and monitoring of mass transit systems, both public and private. The information contained within this report provides a summary of mass transit accomplishments, programs and initiatives during FY2006-2007. This summary is provided to transit system operators, public policymakers, legislators, local governments, human services agencies, and others as a basis to develop future policy making and decision-making related to the planning, establishment and operation of transit services in the state.

The Division of Mass Transit is the primary entity responsible for the provisioning of public transportation services in the State, including the distribution of state and federal funds. In this capacity, the Division of Mass Transit, under the authority of the SCDOT Commission, assists in the development of statewide and regional transit plans, develops and implements transit programs to meet statewide objectives and local needs, and provides ongoing oversight and monitoring of local transit providers and grant programs. In addition, it provides funding for coordination of transit services and technical assistance to local transportation providers. In this role, the Division of Mass Transit works closely with local transit providers to develop and fund demonstration projects and special services to enhance transit services in rural areas of the State.

Profile of Public Transit Providers

Public transit services are provided by a variety of public providers across the State, including urban transit systems, cities, Regional Transit Authorities (RTAs), Councils on Aging, and counties. Under the umbrella of public transit services, providers deliver transportation services that support general public needs, employment, tourism, and economic development across the state. The types of services offered by local transit providers depend on size and population density of the area served, as well as geography. Some agencies provide fixed-route service that operate on a regular timed route, while others offer demand-response service that provides door-to-door transportation. **Figure 1** provides a map of public transit providers across the State operating in FY2006-2007.



Federal and State Funding Programs

The primary goal of the Division of Mass Transit is to facilitate, develop and implement mobility options within South Carolina by partnering with local and regional stakeholders. To meet the public transit needs within the state, the Division of Mass Transit allocated approximately \$19,000,000 in combined federal and state funds to local providers and planning agencies in FY2006-2007. In addition, each large and small urban transit provider receives annual federal funds directly from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

Generally, state funds are utilized to match federal funds, thereby maximizing the state's use of its federal fund allocations. The Division of Mass Transit also provides state funding (on a discretionary basis) for special projects to transit providers. These special projects are designed and implemented to be replicated across the state. During the state fiscal year 2006-2007 (July 1 – June 30), the Division of Mass Transit manages a range of federal and state programs as outlined below:

- ▶ Metropolitan Planning Program (Section 5303) –provided \$565,616 in federal funds to support cooperative, continuous, and comprehensive framework for making transportation investment decisions in metropolitan areas.
- ▶ Statewide Planning Program (Section 5304) – provided approximately \$150,000 in federal funds for statewide initiatives, such as coordination and long range transportation plans.
- ▶ Earmark Program (Section 5309) – provided funds for mass transit capital projects, such as bus purchases, computers, facility upgrades, and rail projects.
- ▶ Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Program (Section 5310) – allocation of approximately \$1.6 million in federal funds to about 45 local human service agencies for vehicle purchases or purchase of service contracts.
- ▶ Rural Transit Program (Section 5311) - provided approximately \$9.1 million in federal and \$3.3 million in state funds that were allocated to about 23 local public transit providers. These funds were used for administration, operations and capital improvement in connection with the provision of rural transportation services.

- ▶ Rural Transportation Assistance Program (Section 5311b) – provided about \$147,000 in federal funds for training programs such as scholarships for conferences and workshops.
- ▶ State Mass Transit Funds (SMTF) – provided approximately \$6.0 million from ¼ of one cent of the state gasoline user fee and \$1.4 million from state general funds that were used as additional matching funds to the federal funds. The Division of Mass Transit provided transit providers with approximately \$1.5 million in state funds to small urban providers, \$2.0 million to large urban, \$3.3 million to rural, and \$600,000 to special projects.
- ▶ In FY 2006-2007, the Division of Mass Transit and Office of Planning began developing the statewide coordination plan. The final plan will include the implementation of the existing Section 5310 - Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Program and two new programs: Job Access and Reverse Commute and the New Freedom Initiative.
- ▶ During FY 2006 – 2007, SCDOT, in partnership with regional COGs and interested stakeholders developed regional coordination plans that meet the requirements of SAFETEA-LU and United We Ride initiatives. Projects funded under the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) formula programs for Sections 5310, 5316 and 5317 must be derived from a coordinated plan, the coordinated plans incorporate activities offered under other programs sponsored by federal, state and local agencies. The purpose of these plans is to ensure that federal requirements regarding coordination are satisfied as well as to assist the state’s regions in their continuing efforts to develop an efficient and effective human services transportation network.

Figures 2 and 3 summarizes the federal and state funds allocated to various transit entities in the past three fiscal years.

SmartRide

In 2004, the SCDOT sponsored commuter express bus service called “SmartRide,” which began as a pilot project that focused on weekday commutes with services to the Columbia metropolitan area from the communities of Camden-Lugoff and Newberry. In FY 2006-2007 the Camden-Lugoff route posted a total ridership of 12,822, and the Newberry route posted 13,158 for a total of 25,980 passenger boardings as shown below/.



SCDOT will continue to pursue other opportunities to partner with transit providers across the State to broaden the availability of commuter-related transit services.

Rail Development

Significant planning has been undertaken to develop rail service in South Carolina. The vision is to have a seamless transportation system that integrates commuter rail, light rail, and bus transportation to provide rapid modes of transportation for the state. These systems, working in unison, should promote the growth of industry and tourism, making the State of South Carolina an appealing place to live, work and visit. A number of meetings were held within the state during FY 2006-2007 in an effort to inform the public and plan and evaluate the future of rail service in the state.

Coordination of Transportation in South Carolina

On December 5, 2006, the SCDOT Commission identified each of the regional Councils of Governments (COG) as designated transportation coordinating bodies. Each designated coordinating body is the primary agent for planning and coordination of programs and transit services for their region. This designation has assisted in the development of local transportation coordination plans by enhancing local support and participation in the development and implementation of coordinated public transportation services in the regions. The designation also provides enhanced opportunity for public participation in identifying and prioritizing transportation projects and expenditures.

Using existing assets and resources, regions are breaking down the barriers between programs and developing local partnerships that generate efficient and economical solutions that address quality of life issues and transportation needs for their communities. By implementing coordination efforts, SCDOT has been successful in expanding services in Aiken, Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Chester, McCormick, and Newberry Counties, as well as supporting innovative methods for increased access to transportation and greater efficiency in service delivery. Additional information regarding the status of coordination in South Carolina is available in a separate report, *Coordination of Transportation Services in South Carolina* dated January 2008 (Appendix A).

Virtual Transportation Enterprise (VTE) Program

The VTE project is a federally-funded intelligent transportation system (ITS) project geared towards utilizing technology to leverage transit resources in the State. The project has four main focus areas: communications, electronic reporting/invoicing, automated scheduling and dispatching, and fleet maintenance management. The program is designed to provide increased operating efficiencies to both transit providers and the Division of Mass Transit.

The VTE vision is to design, develop, demonstrate and implement new technology solutions, which will enable South Carolina's 20 mass transit providers to remotely and cost-effectively share information, resources and software applications; improve and integrate customer service; and improve the efficiency of operational and business-related activities.

Accomplishments realized through the VTE program include RouteMatch Software implementation at the following locations:

- Senior Services of Chester
- McCormick County Senior Center
- Newberry County Council on Aging
- Williamsburg Transit System
- Fairfield County Transit System
- Waccamaw Regional Transportation Authority

The Vehicle Acquisition Program

In FY 2002, the Division of Mass Transit initiated the Vehicle Acquisition Program (VAP). This program was initially designed to maximize available earmark funds to replace South Carolina's aging transit fleet within three to five years, whereas conventional replacement methods would take ten to fifteen years. The expected outcomes are to purchase new vehicles for each transit agency, assist in improving customer satisfaction, ensure vehicle reliability, and reduce maintenance costs. Through assessments, a total of 508 vehicles have been identified to be replaced under this program.

Figure 5 indicates the types of vehicles purchased through the VAP. Cutaways are requested more frequently than any other vehicle. Cutaways are smaller 10- to 17-passenger vehicles, which are more fuel efficient and are Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) compliant. Figure 6 represents the vehicles that have been replaced through the VAP to date. In FY 2006-2007, the total "replaced" vehicles was 346, or 68%. The remaining 32% of vehicles to be replaced under the VAP are planned to be replaced over the next 2 to 3 fiscal years utilizing available Section 5309 earmark funding. The Vehicle Replacement Program is very successful and a cost effective program.

Transit Provider On-Site Reviews

Annual on-site reviews are held to identify potential management and process deficiencies. A part of the division’s oversight and monitoring responsibilities was contracted to Milligan and Company, LLC, who assisted in providing on-site reviews to 11 transit providers.

Key Measures

The Division of Mass Transit’s key measures are total passenger boardings (ridership) and total operational expenses.

- Annual passenger boarding data (Figure 8) provides information that shows how many people actually used the transit service
- Annual operating expenses data (Figure 9) provides information that shows the cost associated with the actual transit service delivery.

On an annual basis, each transit provider submits data for the two key measures to the Division of Mass Transit. The information is then compiled and analyzed to determine statewide trends. The data is critical because it is used to a certain degree to make funding decisions and also provides information for the Mass Transit Annual Report.





Introduction

Personal mobility is a crucial tool required for people to enjoy many significant aspects of their lives. A growing number of transportation-disadvantaged people in the United States—those with an age-related condition, disability, or who are poor—are put at risk by immobility because they cannot access the most common mode of transportation—a car. To address these needs, many federal, state and local agencies provide, administer or support a wide variety of human service transportation programs. These programs serve rural and urban communities, indigent populations, veterans, persons with disabilities, senior citizens and Medicaid recipients.

The large number, diversity and dispersion of specialized transportation programs across many agencies potentially can create ineffective and inefficient service and problems such as duplication of service, underutilization of resources, inconsistent service, gaps in service, inconsistent safety standards and customer inconvenience. To combat these problems, government agencies, human service organizations and transportation planners have advocated improved program coordination.

The Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) created a requirement that a locally-developed, coordinated public transit/human service planning process and an initial plan be developed by 2007 as a condition of receiving funding for certain program funds directed at meeting the needs of older individuals, persons with disabilities and low-income persons. Plans would be developed through a process that includes representatives of public, private, and non-profit transportation and human service providers, as well as the general public.

Through Executive Order 13330: Human Service Transportation Coordination, enacted by the President of the United States in February 2004, the *Interagency Transportation Coordinating Council on Access and Mobility* (CCAM) was created. The Order further directed 10 federal agencies to participate and requires the Council to eliminate duplication and overlapping federal programs and improve the coordination of federally supported transportation services at all levels. The council also must facilitate access to the most appropriate, cost-effective transportation services within existing resources, encourage enhanced customer access to the variety of transportation resources available, and formulate and implement administrative, policy and procedural mechanisms that enhance transportation services at all levels. [*United We Ride*](#) is a five-part initiative to encourage the coordination of transportation services so that people can access health care, employment and employment-related services, and other community resources.

South Carolina Code Ann. Section 57-3-40 provides that the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) Division of Mass Transit must develop and coordinate a general mass transit program and policy for the State in order to encourage the efficient development, implementation, operation, evaluation, and monitoring of mass transit systems, both public and private and further provides that all departments, boards, public authorities, or other agencies of the State or its political subdivisions, local government, transportation authorities, and other local public entities must cooperate with the department, provide assistance, data, and advice.

Additionally, Part 1B, Section 53-U12 of the 2007-2008 General Appropriations Act, provides that SCDOT shall carry out and enhance the coordination planning and demonstration process for public transportation funding and resources in order to improve access and delivery of transportation services, especially in rural areas, and SCDOT is directed to work with state and local agencies that provide funding for transportation and assure input in the process from major local providers of transportation services to the public, including current providers of coordinated public services.

The SCDOT, Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Department of Social Services (DSS), Lt. Governor's Office on Aging, Department of Mental Health, Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DSNB), Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Education, Commission for the Blind, Employment Security Commission (ESC), Commission on Minority Affairs, Department of Veterans Affairs and Department of Commerce are resource agencies which administer state and federal funding programs used by local human service agencies to provide necessary client transportation services.

The Proviso continues by stating that any agency, local government or other entity, including nonprofit organizations, using state funds or state-administered federal funds for the purpose of transporting private citizens on a regular basis must:

1. Provide input and information as requested by SCDOT in a timely manner and in a format specified by SCDOT in order to update data on transportation resources for planning purposes; and
2. Show evidence of progress toward the development of or participation in a coordination plan.

Finally, the Proviso states that no transportation funds may be provided to any entity not in compliance with the requirements of the Proviso.

In April 2005 the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) established an *Interagency Transportation Coordination Council* and an *Interagency Transportation Coordination Committee* which have worked to implement the *United We Ride* concepts that encourage the coordination of transportation services so that consumers can access health care, employment and employment-related services, and other community resources. Coordination of human service transportation expands mobility options to transit dependent populations in South Carolina.

In December 2006, the SCDOT Commission identified each of the regional Councils of Governments (COG) as Designated Transportation Coordinating Bodies. Each Designated Coordinating Body is the primary agent for planning and coordination of programs and transit services for their region. This designation assists in the development of local coordination plans by enhancing local support and participation in the development and implementation of coordinated public transportation services in the regions and provides enhanced opportunity for public participation in identifying and prioritizing transportation projects and expenditures.

SCDOT, in partnership with regional COGs and interested stakeholders has developed regional coordination plans that meet the requirements of SAFETEA-LU and United We Ride initiatives. While at a minimum projects funded under the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) formula

Coordination Goals

- ✓ Promote interagency cooperation and the establishment of appropriate mechanisms to minimize duplication and overlap of Federal, State and local programs and services so that transportation-disadvantaged persons have access to more transportation services;
- ✓ Identify funding streams for human service transportation;
- ✓ Develop and adopt a Statewide Interagency Transportation Coordination policy and plan;
- ✓ Facilitate access to the most appropriate, cost-effective transportation services within existing resources;
- ✓ Encourage enhanced customer access to the variety of transportation and resources available;
- ✓ Formulate and implement administrative, policy, and procedure mechanisms that enhance human service transportation at all levels;
- ✓ Develop and implement a method for monitoring progress on achieving improved local human service transportation;
- ✓ Initiate and conduct studies and demonstration projects that will enhance the coordination and delivery of human service transportation services in the safest, most cost-effective, efficient and customer-focused means possible;
- ✓ Advise and make recommendations to the Governor concerning human service transportation policy and procedure;
- ✓ Develop and submit executive summary of the status of human service transportation in South Carolina; and

- ✓ Call upon other state agencies or other entities as needed for advice, assistance and information;

What is Coordination?

Significant economic benefits — including increased funding, decreased costs, and increased productivity — can be obtained by successfully coordinating human service transportation and transit services. According to a report sponsored by the Federal Transit Administration on the Economic Benefits of Coordination Human Service Transportation¹, coordination strategies could include:

- ✓ Transit agencies providing trips for Medicaid clients;
- ✓ Non-transit agencies providing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other paratransit services;
- ✓ Transportation providers shifting paratransit riders to fixed route services;
- ✓ Local human service agencies coordinating their trips; and
- ✓ Communities expanding transportation services to areas not now served.

Coordination is often touted but often misunderstood, thus lessening its potential benefits. Coordination is a technique for better resource management. It means working together with people from different agencies and backgrounds. It requires shared power: shared responsibility, management, and funding. Many transportation functions, including planning, purchasing, vehicle operations, maintenance, and marketing, can be coordinated.

Typical goals for coordinated transportation services are reduced unit costs, increased ridership, and improved cost effectiveness. Coordination is effective in reducing service duplication and improving resource utilization. Coordinating transportation services has been called “the best way to stretch scarce resources and improve mobility for everyone.”

Coordinating transportation services offers substantial benefits to many communities, but significant investments of time and energy can be required before the desired results are achieved. Coordinating transportation functions is best understood as a political process, which, like many other political processes, may involve changing environments, conflicts regarding power and control over resources, and competing goals. Effective transportation coordination requires a focus on the entire community (even on multiple communities and levels of government). Individuals who may not be used to talking to or working with each other will need to develop the increased levels of trust, respect, and confidence that will permit them to share responsibilities. A willingness to be open-minded about changing long-standing operating procedures is often needed. Once these conditions are met, a wide range of coordinated transportation benefits is then possible.

Coordination covers a wide range of possible activities. The three types of coordination are defined as:


- **Cooperation** – Two or more people or groups working together for improved transportation services through formal or informal agreements;
- **Joint-Use Arrangements** – One or more of the resources are available for use by other participants such as facilities, staff time, vehicles and staff knowledge; and
- **Consolidation** – This is the most comprehensive form of coordination that joins and/or merges two or more transportation systems into a single system through formal agreements.

For the purposes of this report, a "*Coordinated Transportation Service*" is defined to mean: "any passenger transportation service operated by a public, private-for-profit, or private non-profit entity, which has been formed, by contract, for the sharing or pooling of funds, facilities, vehicles, equipment and all other resources used for passenger transportation." The purpose of coordinated transportation services is to improve the mobility of the general public through increased service levels, with a goal that the resulting transportation services serve more passengers for the same or reduced amount of government expenditure than previously uncoordinated services.

The following information reflects some important points to consider in the continued development of transportation coordination in South Carolina:


- There are over 60 federally funded programs that fund transportation (Figure 1):

- Figure 2 shows data reported from human service agencies that operate SCDOT funded vehicles only. This data does not include trips provided by human service agencies using other than SCDOT funded vehicles. The average number of annual trips provided over this period is 3,997,605.

- Through SCDOT Commission action, regional Councils of Governments (COG) are charged to address transportation coordination.

Strategies for Achieving Transportation Coordination

Based on a study conducted by CGA Consulting Group in 1992, many State agencies and local providers in South Carolina said they would like to see new and innovative strategies that would develop a realistic, flexible plan that agencies would be willing to implement with organizational and policy specifications which cut across individual program requirements. Agencies and providers want support for State and local organizational mechanisms, implementation strategies, standards, and cost and service quality evaluation methods.

Many agencies and providers are anxious to consider a concept for a logical scheme encompassing a comprehensive Statewide transportation system which not only coordinates human service/specialized transportation, but also is integrated with public transportation into a total interactive and related system network consisting of a combination of fixed route,

feeder service and demand response as may be required utilizing public and private agencies', operators and volunteers.

There are several points that need to be addressed if coordination is to become a reality in the State of South Carolina:

- Effective **transportation coordination requires the support of government leaders** throughout the State of South Carolina.
- An existing, neutral mechanism with legislative authority to enforce and direct coordination efforts must be designated as the transportation coordination entity in order to begin addressing and resolving Statewide issues and barriers, including, but not limited to:
 - uniform service data reporting;
 - centralized grant review and certification;
 - line item budgets and full cost allocation/accounting/billing;
 - standardized records and reporting;
 - service and performance evaluation standards;
 - vehicle specifications;
 - maintenance;
 - joint purchasing;
 - vehicle sharing;
 - insurance coverage;
 - training and technical assistance; and
 - drug and alcohol requirements.
- Funding must be made available to support the planning and administrative costs associated with implementing successful coordination mechanisms. Further, additional operating funds must be made available to transit systems in general.
- Alternative approaches should be allowed at the regional/local level for implementing service coordination options appropriate to the area's unique combination of demographic, geographic, socio-political conditions and trip demand requirements and needs.

The coordination of transportation resources in many areas of the state has resulted in the elimination of duplicative efforts, enhancements in service quality, and improvements in overall system cost-effectiveness and systems are often in a position to pool fiscal and capital resources available within a region to maximize service delivery and promote operational efficiency. South Carolina can be proud of these successes that compare with coordination efforts anywhere in the United States. The actual benefits to be derived from coordination on a broader statewide scale will depend in large part on the level of commitment not only locally, but also the organizational structure, program administration, and leadership at the State level.

Federal Transit Administration Programs

SECTION 5310 (Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Program)

- **Eligible Recipients:** Private, non-profit organizations, and public bodies that certify to the governor that no non-profit corporations or associations are readily available in an area to provide the service (i.e., Councils on Aging, Disabilities and Special Needs Boards, local and public agencies).
- **Guidelines:** These funds are used to assist private non-profit agencies, local and public agencies in meeting the transportation needs of the elderly individuals and individuals with disabilities. Most of the funds are used for purchase of service contracts from other providers and/or purchase of vehicles. Funds may also be used for mobility management. This program allows up to 10% of the apportionment for state administration.
- **Allocation of Funding:** Federal funds are allocated by formula that considers the number of elderly individuals and individuals with disabilities in each state.
- **Match:** The federal share is 80%; local share is 20%. The State does not provide match for this program; therefore, human service agencies must provide the entire 20% local match.

SECTION 5311 (Rural and Small Urban Areas)

- **Eligible Recipients:** Local governments, non-profit organizations (including Indian tribes and groups), and public transit operators in areas with populations less than 50,000.
- **Guidelines:** Funding for this program is made available through formula grants to states. Funds may be distributed to public, private for-profit, or tribal organizations and used for administration, operations, or capital. Additional funding is made available through the Section 5311 Program grant to support the state's rural training and technical assistance programs. These funds are distributed to public, private for-profit or tribal organizations under the RTAP guidelines.
- **Allocation of Funding:** Funding is appropriated by a statutory formula that is based on the latest U.S. Census Bureau figures of areas with populations less than 50,000. The amount that the state may use for state administration, planning, and technical assistance activities is limited to 15% of the annual apportionment. States must spend 15% of the apportionment to support rural intercity bus service, unless its governor certifies that the intercity bus needs of the state are adequately met. At the state level, a formula is derived to further distribute the funds to rural transit providers.

- **Match:** The maximum federal share for capital and project administration is 80% (except for equipment designed to meet the requirements of the ADA, the Clean Air Act, or bicycle access projects, which may be funded at up to 90%). The maximum federal share for operating assistance is 50% of the net operating costs. The local share is 50%, which comes from program income, county/city allocation, and contract revenue. State funds are made available based on the rural transit funding formula.

SECTION 5316 (Job Access and Reverse Commute (JARC) Program)

- **Eligible Recipients:** Private non-profit organizations, state or local governmental authorities, and public and private operators of public transportation services.
- **Guidelines:** Reverse Commute grants are designated to develop transit services to transport workers to suburban job sites. Eligible activities for Job Access grants include capital and operating costs of equipment, facilities, and associated capital maintenance items related to providing access to jobs. Also included are the costs of promoting the use of transit by workers with nontraditional work schedules, promoting the use of transit vouchers, and promoting the use of employer-provided transportation, including the transit benefits. For Reverse Commute grants, the following activities are eligible: operating costs, capital costs, and other costs associated with reverse commute by bus, train, carpool, van, mobility management, or other transit service.
- **Allocation of Funding:** Through FTA formula. SCDOT, in partnership with local agencies, is responsible for a competitive selection process when funding this program.
- **Match:** 80% federal for capital and 50% for operating. Recipients can use up to 10% for administration at a 100% federal share.

SECTION 5317 (New Freedom Program)

- **Eligible Recipients:** Private non-profit organizations, state or local governmental authorities, and public and private operators of public transportation services.
- **Guidelines:** The designated recipients are responsible for conducting the competitive selection process. Eligible activities encourage services and facility improvements to address the transportation needs of individuals with disabilities that go beyond those required by the ADA. The following activities are eligible: operating costs, capital costs and mobility management costs.
- **Allocation of Funding:** Through FTA formula. SCDOT, in partnership with local agencies, is responsible for a competitive selection process when funding this program.

- **Match:** For capital, the federal share is 80% and the local share is 20%; for operating, the federal share is 50% and local share is 50%. The State can use up to 10% for state administration at a 100% federal share with no match.

SCDOT INITIATIVES

The South Carolina Department of Transportation has fostered many initiatives regarding coordination:

- ✓ Regional Transportation Coordination planning activities;
- ✓ Innovative State and Regional projects;
- ✓ Study of barriers to statewide coordination ;
- ✓ Partnering meetings with planning organizations;

Regional Human Service and Public Transportation Coordination Plans

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT), through the consulting team of TranSystems/URS and in partnership with Councils of Governments (COGs) and interested stakeholders, has developed regional coordinated plans that meet the requirements of SAFETEA-LU and the Federal Coordinating Council on Access and Mobility (CCAM). While at a minimum projects funded under the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) formula programs for Sections 5310, 5316 and 5317 must be derived from a coordinated plan, the coordinated plans incorporate activities offered under other programs sponsored by federal, state and local agencies. The federal coordination initiative, called United We Ride, has identified over 60 federal programs in addition to those sponsored by the FTA which include Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Workforce Investment Act (WIA), Vocational Rehabilitation, Medicaid, Community Action (CAP), Independent Living Centers, and Agency on Aging (AoA) programs among others.

SCDOT has attempted to facilitate this by developing a plan in each region of the state and inviting all of the agencies that meet the letter and intent of this policy to the table and encouraging their participation throughout the plan development process.

Purpose of the Plan

Development and content of coordinated plans have been designed to be specific to the needs and issues of each region. The coordinated plans address intra- and inter-regional needs and issues, and in a manner that allows the COGs, concurrent with regional LRTP updates, to directly update the regional coordinated plan. Further, the coordinated plans have been developed in a manner that allows the COGs to adapt and expand the plans to incorporate programs and initiatives specific to their region.

SAFETEA-LU also allows two significant changes to the standard procedures defined by previous legislation. Under the new regulations, project proponents are allowed to use dollars from other federal programs as match to FTA funds and expenses related to mobility management can be considered a capital expense. These are two significant changes that allow greater flexibility for budgeting and financing human service transportation.

Development of the Plan

Mindful of the fact that different evolution of transportation coordination already exists within each region, SCDOT has endeavored to develop an individual plan for each of the ten regions in the state. The development process from region to region, however, was basically the same and was predicated on a series of three to four facilitated meetings among stakeholders in each region. The consultant team also conducted a survey of human service agencies and transportation providers and reviewed information from previous planning efforts around the State.

Each coordinated plan's development has, at a minimum, addressed the following:

- Assess and document transportation needs in each region for individuals with disabilities, older adults, and persons with limited incomes;
- Inventory available services in each region and identify areas of redundancy and gaps in service;
- Identify and document restrictions on eligibility for funding;
- Identify and document short- and long-range strategies in each region to address the identified gaps in service, including mobility management strategies;
- Identify and document technological resources currently available and appropriate for coordination of transportation services;
- Identify and document coordination actions in each region to eliminate or reduce duplication in services and strategies for more efficient utilization of resources; and
- Document and prioritize implementation strategies to increase coordination of transportation services in each region.

Each plan was focused further on three basic steps:

1. Development of an inventory of services in the region as well as a sense of transportation gaps and needs.
2. Development of strategies and actions.
3. Development of the regional plan document that includes regional priorities of the targeted gaps in transportation to be addressed by projects submitted for FTA funding under Sections 5310, 5316 and 5317.

At each of these steps SCDOT and its consultant team met with representatives of each COG region to solicit input and feedback.

INNOVATIVE STATEWIDE PROJECTS

Lower Savannah Regional Mobility Management Center Project

Design, develop and deploy a central coordination center to improve service, reduce duplication, contain cost, and maximize utilization of existing resources.

The Lower Savannah Regional Mobility Management Center Project is an approach to service development and management that

- focuses on individualized customer markets,
- involves establishing a variety of services tailored to meet the needs of those markets,
- entails a responsibility for establishing a coordinated service delivery network,
- achieve connectivity for customers and efficiency for taxpayers, and
- to design and manage the transportation infrastructure so that the services developed can perform effectively and efficiently.

This project has the support of all counties in the Lower Savannah COG (LSCOG) region and two regional transit providers from neighboring councils of government:

- Aiken, Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Calhoun, Orangeburg counties, and
- Santee Wateree Regional Transportation Authority, and Low Country Regional Transportation Authority.

Bamberg County Transit System Project

Bamberg County is one of the most economically deprived areas of South Carolina and has seen a steady decline in population since the 1930's. Recently, a system was started in Allendale County that allowed medical and human service providers to coordinate their existing resources, i.e. routes, vehicles, transportation dollars and/or drivers and share the empty seats on their vehicles so that members of the general public could ride on human service vehicles.

Bamberg County has replicated the Allendale County project and will further strengthen coordination by utilizing the Allendale mobility manager and existing toll-free line. The mobility manager will coordinate trips for both counties, which is extremely logical, since many of the persons from Allendale travel through Bamberg County to reach destinations and many from Bamberg County travel through Allendale County. Obviously, both counties are extremely economically depressed and this system is desperately needed.

Bamberg County Council endorsed the project and gave their approval for county funding in July 2006. Additionally, the South Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Mass Transit, agreed to provide \$50,000 for the project in July 2006. The community organization, Allendale County Alive, has generously agreed to be the recipient for the Bamberg County funding since this project would serve to enhance efforts of both counties. Allendale County Alive has the financial and programmatic expertise to manage and oversee the funding for this project.

Expanded Public Transit Service

During fiscal year 2007, five new public transit providers were established. Newberry County Council on Aging, McCormick County Senior Services, Chester County Senior Services, York County Government, and Edgefield Senior Services all realized the potential for transportation coordination in their areas. SCDOT initiated public transportation relationships with these agencies by providing Non-urbanized Area program funds in support of coordination of services within their regions. The results have been greater efficiency in service for the customer as well as more appropriate access and delivery transportation in these areas.

STUDY OF BARRIERS TO STATEWIDE COORDINATION

SCDOT sponsored a study by Clemson University during fiscal year 2006 – 2007 that evaluated the barriers to coordination faced by transit providers, populations, and agencies across the state of South Carolina. The study, through on-site interviews, surveys, and research concluded that the mobility and cost advantages achievable with wise land use, transportation coordination, regionalization, development fees, and a centralized location of health care and transit centers would be suggested opportunities for better coordination of transit service and accessibility. Additionally, an efficient network of public transportation would provide a higher quality of life for residents of low incomes, people who are isolated in poverty or rural areas, and those elderly who wish to age in place.

The results and information resulting from this study provides an excellent basis for state agency focus on gaps and barriers to the provision of transportation to citizens of South Carolina.

VIRTUAL TRANSPORTATION ENTERPRISE

RouteMatch Project (Schedule & Dispatch System) Expended

SCDOT Mass Transit selected RouteMatch Software™ to provide the statewide automation solution for scheduling and dispatch which SCDOT has made available to South Carolina public transit operators.

In September 2006, the project was expanded by adding the newly established public providers. The RouteMatch software assists public transit providers automate the business process of collecting and updating client information, scheduling trips and recommending efficient routing, dispatching transit vehicles, and verifying and inputting actual trip data. The system uses geo-coded information for each client and service parameters applied at the funding source level to recommend efficient routing and can export shape files for use in GIS systems to map service region-wide. RouteMatch can use billing parameters for each funding source to produce invoices more efficiently and accurately.

PARTNERING MEETINGS WITH PLANNING ORGANIZATIONS

The SCDOT is partnering with the ten Councils of Government (COGs) and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) in addressing local and regional coordination. This initiative is another opportunity for a regional COG to exercise regional leadership in the development of a coordinated transit system to serve their regions.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR INCREASED COORDINATION

Although the specifics of transportation needs from region to region differ greatly, coordination planning efforts indicate that the needs of each region can be classified under the following:

- Increase service (more days, hours, geographic coverage including rural areas)
- Targeting populations that may not qualify for existing programs (like Medicaid and TANF) but are still low/fixed income and have unmet transportation needs
- Access to jobs many of which are across county or regional boundaries
- Improve response time for return trips through centralized and/or real-time scheduling
- Coordinate fleet replacements and expansion in an effort to reduce capital costs
- Develop programs that increase the utilization of existing services
- Improve the distribution of information to the riding public, human service agencies about available services through the use of a mobility manager (this is underway in the Lower Savannah Region).
- Expense pooling program (fuel, insurance, training etc.)
- Address cost allocation among operators to facilitate greater coordination/cooperation

These issues constitute the commonalities among the regions, but the coordination plan development process did show significant differences in the primary transportation needs of each region. Given the differences in the provision of service and the different evolution of relationships among agencies from region to region, potential strategies to address these issues vary across the state.

There appears to be a perception that a separation between human service and other public transportation has resulted in a limited understanding among agencies and providers Statewide regarding the variety of possible coordination options or mechanisms which could be used at the local level. The experience with so called coordination options has generally been limited to discussions of consolidation or purchase of service from Regional Transit Authorities (RTAs) that are viewed as "public fixed route" transit providers offering only one type service. Conversely, over the last several years, various human service agencies located in areas not served by RTAs have expressed a desire to provide public service, and like many RTAs, are successfully "mixing" client riderships under contracted service.

While the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT), the South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Department of Social Services (DSS) have included coordination provisions in the administration of certain grant programs funding transportation services, SCDOT is responsible for affecting statewide coordination of transportation and there is no requirement for other state agencies to participate in

statewide coordination efforts in order to utilize agency funding for program transportation purposes.

Therefore, it is highly recommended that an Executive Order be affected that directs various agencies, under existing state law, to cooperate with the Secretary of Transportation and his Department in providing assistance and successfully implementing coordinated transportation in South Carolina, and that no agency transportation funds may be provided to any entity not providing input and information for transportation coordination planning and not showing evidence of progress toward the development of or participation in a statewide transportation plan.

Current transportation plans explored the need to insure the greatest efficiency with existing and needed resources through inter-agency coordination, while seeking to address gaps through service enhancement and expansion. One common strategy discussed in most every region was the concept of a mobility manager, designed to coordinate to varying degrees as a “one-stop-shop” the client intake, trip reservation, scheduling and vehicle dispatching among multiple agencies. Stakeholders in multiple regions also identified the need to provide greater outreach and education of public agencies and citizens alike about the level and type of transit service available.

Each regionally developed plan does place the responsibility of developing actual projects to the human service agencies and transportation providers and for the COG to develop an evaluation process to identify which of these projects will receive funding.

Generally, state agencies have not tracked their transportation costs. Without adequate cost data, the state cannot make informed decisions about the cost-effectiveness of agency as compared to contracted transportation services. A full resource cost allocation method should be used to calculate agency transportation costs. Under this method, all costs associated with client transportation would be accounted for, regardless of whether they are actually incurred by the agency. At a minimum, the following costs would be included — labor, fringe benefits, administrative overhead, capital costs, maintenance, insurance, and gas, oil, and tires.

Agencies use different methods to bill their transportation cost. The use of different methodologies does not allow a comparison of transportation costs among offices within the same agency or between different agencies. In addition, the rate at which agencies reimburse individuals for the use of personal vehicles varies both among and within agencies.

Although some state agencies use staff whose duties do not primarily involve driving to transport clients, the agencies do not know the extent to which staff is used. When agencies do not account for staff time spent driving, transportation costs are not accurate, and a comparison of costs is not possible.

PLANNING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The Regional Coordinated Public Transportation Service Plans will serve as an objective statement of public transportation need for regions and will define a program of coordinated

service to efficiently meet this need within the planning area. Additionally, these ten plans will serve as a baseline for the Statewide Multimodal Transportation Plan (available in 2008).

Establish, by Executive Order, the *South Carolina Interagency Coordination Council* which will ensure that wherever practical, existing transportation resources, public and private, shall be maximized. They will promote transportation policies that are customer-centered and support high quality multi-modal transportation systems focused on service, choice and flexibility.

South Carolina, its agencies, commissions and Boards shall cooperate in establishing, following and supporting the policies, procedures and decisions of the Council as described herein. Council members and representatives shall encourage local human service agencies and public transportation systems to participate in the Council's recommendations, and to purchase or provide transportation services in a manner consistent with the Council's recommendation.

Continued partnerships will allow state and local agencies areas to complete the following important objectives:

- **State Objectives**
 - To collect uniform data for use in the preparation of an annual report/inventory of existing transportation services in South Carolina.
 - To resolve or remove identified legal and administrative barriers to the effective operation of local special transportation services.
 - To allocate state resources in the most responsive manner to meet identified special transportation needs.
 - To develop a long-range statewide program of capital improvements and operating funding needed to support local programs over five-year periods.
 - To develop comprehensive annual program guidelines that defines the allocation of capital and operating funds for special transportation.
 - To allocate funds only in accordance with the recommended programs and plans contained in a local special transportation.

- **Local Objectives**
 - To define and enumerate all the populations that may require passenger transportation services and estimates the demand for such service.
 - To inventory and assess the extent to which existing programs and services meet this need.

- To assess the operating productivity and performance of existing transportation services and to assess the extent to which increased coordination could improve the efficiency and effectiveness of existing and proposed services.
- To define programs and plans to meet public transportation needs during a five-year timeframe.
 - To identify administrative and legal barriers to the effective implementation of proposed programs and plans developed at the local level.
 - To quantify the necessary capital and operating resources to implement proposed programs and plans.
 - To determine the appropriate coordinated public transportation service delivery mechanism for the planning area.

Summary of Contract and Procurement Activity

The attached pages reflect contract and procurement activity and list the name of the vendor and the costs of purchased items and services. This summary reflects purchases in the amount of \$93,744,144.20 by the SCDOT Procurement Office, \$12,383,861.72 in Consultant Contracts and \$597,086,200.40 in Construction Contracts.
