- Dramatic decrease in length of stay waiting for an inpatient bed from a week or more in 2004 to 44 hours in 2018
- A Center Mental Health Professional on duty at Prisma Richland Emergency Department 8:00 a.m. to midnight seven days per week
- > During FY 2019, CAMHC expanded its Mental Health Court program, a voluntary jail diversion program
