REGULATORY SERVICES



- The Regulatory Services Unit is comprised of Regulatory Enforcement, the South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program (SCLEAP), Community Relations, the National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) and Regulatory administrative element, which are responsible for the various licensing and registration responsibilities.
- SLED is statutorily mandated to facilitate (CWP program, private security, private investigations, CWP Instructors, State Constables, and electronic monitoring).
- SLED Regulatory Services falls under the direct supervision of one (1) Major, one (1) Captain, one (1) Lieutenant and (2) Non-sworn Supervisor.

Office of Regulatory Services



What do we do?.....

The Office of Regulatory Services is a **unique branch** of the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division as we deal directly with the public to issue Concealed Weapon Permits, Private Investigation business and employee licenses, Contract Security business and employee licenses, Proprietary Security business and employee licenses, and the Electronic Monitoring program.

- **Conducts administrative and criminal investigations** for complaints on the aforementioned regulated industries. The department is also responsible for the State Constable program as well as concealed weapons permit instructors.
- The Office of Regulatory Services takes pride in our Community Relations department by **promoting SLED** and encourage exposure of various programs and services to the community.

OFFICE OF REGULATORY SERVICES



Security/PI/CWP Ins./Constables/Elec. Monitoring Job Functions

Functions as a team member in the processing of applications. Receive and compile all fingerprint responses from SLED and the FBI. Answer telephones, interpret state laws, regulations, policies, and procedures regarding SLED Regulatory functions.

- Enter license application information into various databases and assist in the processing of those applications. Enter, process, and retrieve application packets and prepare background investigations.
- Responsible for issuance of company/instructor/investigator licenses in a timely manner as required by law.
- Organize and assist in the maintenance of files on all applicants in this section of Regulatory Services.
- Performs other administrative duties within the unit as required.

SOUTH CAROLINA SECURITY GUARDS



Authorizing Statutes

SC Code of Laws; 40-18-30

- ✓ Determines the qualifications of applicants for licenses or registrations under this chapter.
- ✓ Promulgates regulations necessary to carry out this chapter.
- ✓ Investigation of alleged violations of this chapter and regulations promulgated by SLED.
- ✓ Establishes and enforce standards governing the safety and conduct of persons licensed and registered under this chapter.



Private Investigators Section



Authorizing Statute

Article 9, chapter 73, SC Code of Regulations — Chapter 73-400 to 73-422

(A) A person who desires to operate a private investigation business in this State must apply for a Private Investigation License from SLED and pay an annual license fee which must be set by SLED regulation.



Electronic Monitoring



- In accordance with S.C. Code Ann. § 17-15-37(A), on November 1, 2023, the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) was tasked with developing standards for the use and approval of active electronic monitoring devices, and a process to certify electronic monitoring agencies, including law enforcement agencies, electronic monitoring companies, bondsmen, and bonding companies.
- Accordingly, all entities seeking to engage in the electronic monitoring in South Carolina, including law enforcement agencies, electronic monitoring companies, bondsmen, and bonding companies must be certified by SLED. Also, a SLED certification is not transferable under any circumstances.

Concealed Weapons Permit Instructors Section



South Carolina Law Enforcement Division Code of Regulations

Article 8: Concealable Weapons Permit — Chapter 73-300

The South Carolina Law Enforcement Division shall promulgate regulations containing general guidelines for courses and qualifications of instructors of applicants for concealable weapons permits. A. Qualifications and Certification of Instructors

(1) Any person desiring to conduct training of concealable weapons permit (CWP) applicants must apply to SLED for certification as a CWP Instructor, undergo a criminal record check conducted by SLED, and must receive written notice of certification and a certification number from SLED, prior to conducting such training.



SC STATE CONSTABLES



State Constables are appointed by the Governor of South Carolina Pursuant to the authority of Executive Orders 90-08 and 99-18, the Chief of the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) advises the Governor concerning this program, establishes training requirements, sets standards for conduct, prescribes limits on the use of authority, determines suitability and fitness of applicants, and enforces governing policies.

- **Group I** – Constables employed by government agencies and have a job-related need for law enforcement authority.
- **Group II** – Constables consist of those individuals who have served as sworn law enforcement officers in the State of South Carolina and honorably retired in that capacity.
- **Group III** – Constables provide auxiliary law enforcement assistance services to local law enforcement agencies in a voluntary capacity.

REGULATORY SERVICES — COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The SC Law Enforcement Division (SLED) strives to have a quality workforce that is similar to South Carolina's population. **The agency continues to use a series of recruitment sources** to include, but not limited to the internet, alumni groups, schools, colleges, workforce centers, current employees, former employees, job fairs, other employers, technical and professional publications and professional associations to promote SLED as an equal opportunity employer.

The general purpose of SLED's Community Relations Division is to foster positive attitudes of SLED members toward the community, to encourage exposure of SLED programs and services to the community, and to facilitate the exchange of information and concerns related to police activities between law enforcement and the community.



REGULATORY SERVICES — South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program (SCLEAP)



- SCLEAP is a partnership between SLED, SCDPS, SCDPPPS, SCDNR and SCAG. It provides critical incident stress management services and chaplaincy services to officers and staff of member agencies as well as local law enforcement upon request.
- SCLEAP are full-time professional staff providing **24-hour/7-day per week statewide service** for all SLED employees and their families with a statewide cadre of volunteer chaplains. Maintenance of a trained Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) and Peer Support Team consisting of state and local police officers, mental health professionals and chaplains who provided interagency support to other law enforcement agencies across South Carolina upon request.

REGULATORY ENFORCEMENT



- Regulatory Enforcement maintains responsibility for investigative and enforcement matters pertaining to all licensed private companies, registered private security officers, licensed private security investigation businesses, registered private investigators, certified Concealed Weapons Permits (CWP) instructors, the South Carolina State Constable Program, and the Electronic Monitoring Program.
- In all, these regulated groups compromise approximately 21,944 individuals statewide. During the 2025 calendar year, Regulatory Enforcement Agents conducted 1,161 background investigations, 308 inspections and approximately 28 criminal investigations.

REGULATORY ENFORCEMENT



Authorizing Statute

South Carolina Code of Laws § 40-18-30:

(B) The Chief of SLED has the following powers and duties as they relate to the practice of private investigation businesses:

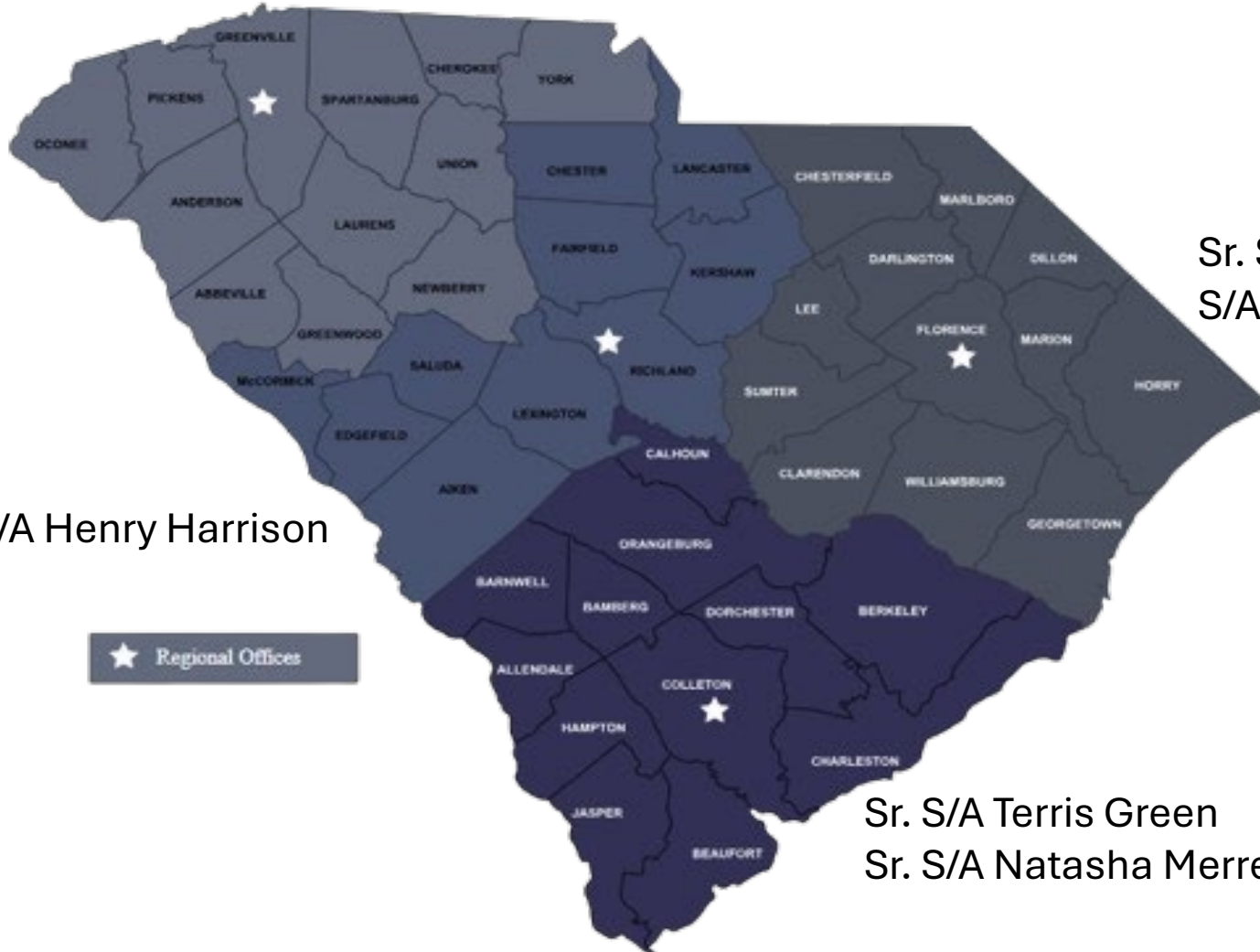
- (1) to determine the eligibility of applicants for licenses and registration under this chapter;
- (2) to investigate alleged violations of this chapter and regulations promulgated by SLED;
- (3) to promulgate regulations necessary to carry out this chapter; and
- (4) to require training necessary to provide for competent delivery of services to the public;

All Regulatory Enforcement Agents regularly assisted SLED's core mission functions through assisting in special assignments such as Nuclear Shipments, crime suppressions, Memorial Day Bike Fest in Myrtle Beach, the Cooper River Bridge Run, Darlington Labor Day Nascar events, football games, numerous political events, dignitary visits, interview panels and assisting other units as requested.
