- Holds office until his successor is appointed and qualified.
- Serves a six-year term.



SLED ORGANIZATION CHART


South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) Organizational Chart






SLED EXPANDED ORGANIZATION CHART





SLED agents conduct criminal investigations throughout SC, including:

- Officer-involved shootings and in-custody death investigations
- Official misconduct and public corruption cases
- Criminal sexual conduct
- Homicide or death investigations

SPECIAL VICTIMS UNIT (SVU)



Vulnerable Adults Unit:

Investigates reports of alleged abuse, neglect, or exploitation of vulnerable adults in state facilities and coordinates referrals of cases at other facilities.

Child Fatalities Unit:

Investigates deaths involving children upon notification from county coroners or medical examiners.

Forensic Art Unit:


Provides composite sketches, postmortem images, and facial reconstruction on the skull for identification purposes, age progressions, and for use as court exhibits to support the Division.

South Carolina Code of Laws Unannotated

Title 63 - South Carolina Children's Code

SECTION 63-11-1940. Purpose and duties of department.

- (A) The purpose of the department is to expeditiously investigate child deaths in all counties of the State.
- (B) To achieve its purpose, the department shall:
- (1) upon receipt of a report of a child death from the county coroner or medical examiner, as required by Section 17-5-540, investigate and gather all information on the child fatality. The coroner or medical examiner immediately shall request an autopsy if SLED determines that an autopsy is necessary. The autopsy must be performed by a pathologist with forensic training as soon as possible. The pathologist shall inform the department of the findings within forty-eight hours of completion of the autopsy. If the autopsy reveals the cause of death to be pathological or an unavoidable accident, the case must be closed by the department. If the autopsy reveals physical or sexual trauma, suspicious markings, or other findings that are questionable or yields no conclusion to the cause of death, the department immediately must begin an investigation;

FORENSIC ART UNIT



BEHAVIORAL SCIENCE UNIT (BSU)

Uses crime analysis, forensic psychology, and behavioral science to identify a responsible party or unknown perpetrator.

Conducts threat assessments and analysis of individuals who convey threatening or inappropriate communication by determining the level of dangerousness of individuals and providing interventions to lower the risk of harm.

BSU agents also actively work cold cases throughout the state in partnership with local law enforcement agencies.

Conducts investigations for:



POLYGRAPH UNIT


Conducts polygraphs for all applicants seeking agent positions within SLED and when needed for criminal investigations for SLED, other state law enforcement agencies, or local law enforcement.

Regulates polygraph licensure for government examiners and private examiners for the state, with 100 licensed polygraph examiners in SC currently (including interns).










TRAINING

Provides annual training, in-service training, and specialized training to all sworn agents, as well as conducting training for SLED non-sworn staff and partner agencies.

<u>Vehicle Crimes</u> is a stand-alone unit now combined with Social Security Fraud that consists of agents in locations covering the entire state.

 - License fraud
 - Title fraud
- Chop shops
- Vehicle theft rings
- Car dealership violations
- Burned or unidentifiable vehicles
- Salvage yard violations and inspections

South Carolina Code of Laws Unannotated

Title 7 - Elections

SECTION 7-25-30. Public reporting hotline.

The State Law Enforcement Division shall establish a public reporting hotline telephone number and email address for receiving reports of possible election fraud or other violations of the election laws of this State. It shall promptly review all reported violations and take action as it determines appropriate.

SLED operates the <u>South Carolina Law Enforcement Division's Election Fraud Hotline</u> (833) 4SC-VOTE / (833) 472-8683 and <u>4SCVote@sled.sc.gov</u> for email reporting, as well as providing Post Office Box 21398, Columbia, SC 29221 for an additional report by mail option.

All supporting documentation is received and reviewed by SLED, with appropriate and timely follow-up correspondence.

VICTIMS' ADVOCATES





Provide:

- Crisis intervention
- On-scene response
- Emergency assistance with:
 - Securing safe housing
 - Coordinating crime scene cleanup

ALCOHOL, NARCOTICS, & VICE



Purpose:

To assist local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies by providing specialized resources and manpower with the coordinated investigation and enforcement of narcotics, alcohol, tobacco, lottery, and human trafficking crimes.



NARCOTICS

- Enforces South Carolina narcotics laws
- Coordinates with federal agencies on joint task forces
- Manages the law enforcement drug take back program
- Interdicts illegal drugs shipped through parcel businesses
- Provides clandestine lab response to SC law enforcement
- Conducts re-certification
 - Clandestine lab every year
 - Basic certification every three years





Governor's Opioid Emergency Response Team (OERT)

 Maximizes opioid processing identification, protects first responders from exposure to toxins, and reduces supply while supporting the development of services that address the disease and treatment for offenders

Marijuana Eradication Program

Participates in the DEA-led initiative

State Grand Jury

 Investigates high-level drug trafficking organizations that operate large-scale drug operations and conspiracies

PILL TAKEBACKS

SLED 1947 1947

In **2024**, **SLED** hosted **two pill takebacks** to provide secure disposal for unused pills with the goal of curbing diversion

Law enforcement agencies across the state participated:

January 24 – **2,878 pounds** received from **21** agencies

July 24 – 2,456 pounds received from 19 agencies



ALCOHOL

SLED 1947 1947

<u>SLED Alcohol Enforcement Agents</u> conduct alcohol inspections and underage compliance checks for over 20,000 licensed premises in SC. In addition, they assist the SC Department of Revenue (SCDOR) by conducting alcohol license application investigations that involve researching owners, managers, and other interested parties to determine if licenses should be issued.



HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Investigates:

- Human trafficking crimes
- Sex and labor-related businesses

Partners with other local, state, and federal agencies to investigate and prosecute these cases

Coordinates databases for human trafficking

Develops training curriculum(s) for law enforcement across the state



DOG FIGHTING

Enforces federal and state criminal laws pertaining to dog fighting by disrupting and dismantling dog fighting organizations.


Works jointly with federal law enforcement officers and prosecutors to investigate cases.

Regularly trains and educates local and state law enforcement personnel on dog fighting investigative techniques.









DOG FIGHTING

A full-time SLED dog fighting agent was funded and created in fiscal year 2022 (with additional agents approved in subsequent budget):

- Works closely with other SLED agents and local and federal partners to combat dog fighting in SC. Multiple agencies are waiting on SLED to assist them with dog fighting leads.
- Has seized, or assisted in seizing, nearly 1,000 dogs across the state
- Actions have resulted in SLED charging dozens of individuals with felonies and misdemeanors related to dog fighting and animal torture while also assisting the listed agency partners with felony arrests related to these crimes



TOBACCO

Conducts inspections of retail stores to ensure compliance and to prohibit counterfeit or untaxed cigarettes as a result of the national tobacco settlement.









LOTTERY



Investigates criminal violations involving the South Carolina Educational Lottery, including theft and fraud




GAMBLING/GAMING MACHINES

Investigates criminal violations involving illegal gaming machines and operations.

The South Carolina Constitution prohibits lotteries (except those conducted by the state) and games of chance, with few exceptions.

COUNTERTERRORISM



Purpose:

To operate highly specialized, tactical response law enforcement units for counter-terrorism support and assistance to the federal, state, and local, law enforcement partners and the citizens of the State of South Carolina.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES / EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Supports the <u>US Department of Energy (DOE)</u> by planning, coordinating, and executing armed escorts of special nuclear material through South Carolina.



Supports federal, state, and local agencies by providing security for dignitaries, juries, and other required events as well as planning, coordinating, or executing responses for:

- Planned special events
- Emergencies
- Disasters
- Critical incidents





Coordinates, supports, plans, and responds to the South Carolina Emergency Management Division (SCEMD) for all hazard planning regarding critical incidents as the Emergency Support Function 13 (ESF-13) cell.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES / EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Assist with planning, coordinating, and staffing major tourism events which utilized hundreds of agent assignments who work over 10,000 hours annually.



Planned and provided law enforcement protective measures for dignitary protection details throughout the state, using hundreds of agent assignments, working over 5,000 combined hours annually.



SPECIAL WEAPONS AND TACTICS (SWAT) WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION (WMD)

SLED 1947 1947

Provides highly specialized, rapid-response, tactical law enforcement unit(s) to address and mitigate a variety of tactical and Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive (CBRNE) situations.









BOMB SQUAD

Helps mitigate explosive-related threats and incidents by providing subject matter experts to:

- The U.S. military
- Federal law enforcement
- State law enforcement
- Local law enforcement

Supports SLED's SWAT team and other tactical teams in SC by utilizing specialized resources and assets to include a variety of robotic options that are strategically positioned throughout the state and every technician partnering with an Explosive Detection Dog (EDD).









- Conducts proactive protective sweeps at mass gatherings like:
 - Sporting events
 - Concerts
 - Dignitary events
 - Any other venue or critical infrastructure sector(s) deemed a potential target by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

BLOODHOUND TRACKING TEAM

- Assists in locating wanted, missing, and lost individuals by utilizing bloodhound and patrol canine tracking teams.
- Provides K9 support to SWAT and fugitive operations.
- Promotes positive public relations throughout the state by conducting presentations in the community.





AVIATION



AVIATION

In fiscal year 2023, SLED Aviation received 321 requests for service with 546.3 hours of flight time.





ARSON INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

Arson Unit:

- Comprised of subject matter experts in the field of fire and post blast investigations
- Further divided into the Upstate and Coastal Regions that provide quality manpower and technical assistance to both law enforcement and fire service partners across the state

Each year, members of the Arson Unit work alongside the South Carolina Fire Academy to provide accredited training to both law enforcement and fire service professionals.

In addition to fire investigators, the Arson Unit also has three Ignitable Liquid Detection Canines (ILDC) that are positioned strategically throughout the state.









COUNTERTERRORISM DIVE (CDU)



The primary objective of the SLED Counterterrorism Dive Unit (CDU) is counterterrorism diving operations throughout the state focused on port security.

The CDU:

- Responds to any incident in SC where explosives or explosive devices may have been placed in the water or in marine environments
- Conducts underwater searches for any explosive hazards in support of large special events, military operations, and overall port security
- Assists the US Coast Guard and other state/local agencies by providing maritime tactical security for special events and security escorts for cruise ships departing from the Port of Charleston



- Assists in maritime dive operations that do not have a terrorism nexus as a public safety request
 - These usually involve an internal SLED request or a request from a partner agency that needs the specific skills or equipment of the SLED CDU

SC CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE CYBERSECURITY







Purpose:

To facilitate cybersecurity intelligence sharing and improve the overall cybersecurity posture of South Carolina's critical infrastructure.

SC CIC provides key services to private critical infrastructure and local government organizations at no cost to participants.










Purpose:

To provide comprehensive forensic laboratory services to criminal justice agencies throughout SC, operating as the only full-service crime laboratory in the state.

SLED 1947 1947

Since 1994, the <u>American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors / Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB)</u> has accredited SLED's laboratory. Accreditation is maintained through <u>annual internal and periodic external assessments</u>. The laboratory was initially accredited under the Legacy program with reaccreditation granted in 1999, 2004, and 2009.

As ASCLD/LAB transitioned to the ISO/IEC:17025-based program, the laboratory underwent assessment and obtained ASCLD/LAB-International Accreditation on September 19, 2014.

Reaccreditation was granted in February 2019 and January 2023 under <u>ANSI-ASQ</u> National Accreditation Board (ANAB).



SLED 1947 1947

In December 2022, SLED completed the transition from the former Forensic Services Laboratory and officially started accepting all evidence at the new laboratory.

The new laboratory will:

- Increase efficiencies which will lead to decreased backlogs across disciplines
- Provide faster service to our law enforcement partners across South Carolina
- Ultimately help victims get justice in a timely manner





In fiscal year 2023, the <u>SLED Forensic Services Laboratory</u>:

- Received 25,497 new cases and completed 19,341
- New cases consisted of 69,935 submitted items resulting in 29,735 assignments
- Lab personnel completed a total of 22,040 assignments consisting of 70,437 submitted items



DRUG ANALYSIS

Responsible for the analysis of evidentiary items to establish the presence, identity, and quantity of controlled substances.



Performs semi-quantitative and quantitative analysis of cannabis to determine legality as marijuana or hemp.





DNA CASEWORK



Performs scientific analyses and examinations of biological evidence such as blood, semen, and saliva to locate and identify probative biological samples for comparison purposes.

Case types analyzed include but are not limited to:


- Homicides / violent crimes (robbery, assault, etc.)
- Sexual assaults (adults and minors)
- Relationship testing (criminal parentage and missing persons / body identifications)
- Burglary / property crimes

The <u>DNA Casework Department</u> prioritizes the analysis of Homicide and Sexual Assault cases using a team approach and Direct-to-DNA methodology.




DNA CASEWORK PERSONNEL

15 Full Time Employee (FTE) positions were awarded in FY 21-22. Including the Lieutenant and Technical Leader, when all positions are filled, the department will have a staff of 30 FTE's, 22 of which will be fully trained in DNA analysis.



- 10 DNA analysts/technicians are currently in varying phases of training
- 8 new analysts have completed basic training and are performing supervised casework/interpretation training



4 FTE positions (to include technicians and analysts) are currently vacant and interviews are scheduled for December 2024.

**Since 2019, there have been 10 resignations from the department and 1 promotion out of the department.




DNA DATABASE

SLED 1947 1947

Manages the <u>Combined DNA Index</u>
<u>System (CODIS)</u>, a nationwide database containing the DNA profiles of criminal offenders, crime scene evidence, missing persons, and relatives.

Coordinates the state repository for qualifying DNA specimens.

Processes DNA expungement requests in accordance with S.C. Code Ann. § 23-3-660.



EVIDENCE CONTROL

Assists SC law enforcement, both in person and via the iLab internet pre-log system, with the submission of physical evidence involved in criminal investigations.

Manages the Evidence Room, where evidence is transferred for analysis to forensic personnel and then returned to submitting agencies.

Over 25,000 assignments are received annually by the Evidence Control Department. In this section, Forensic Technicians receive evidence and enter corresponding case information into the Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS).

In this past fiscal year, SLED received 68,161 pieces of evidence, resulting in 27,641 assignments. Lab personnel completed a total of 28,367 assignments consisting of 87,754 pieces of evidence.

Distributes evidence kits to local law enforcement for blood, urine, or DNA sample collection as well as drug analysis (B.E.S.T.) and coordinates the distribution of sexual assault evidence collection kits through the <u>SC Victim Assistance Network (SCVAN)</u>.







FIREARMS / TOOLMARKS

Examines firearms to test operability and compliance with various statutory regulations such as:

- Capability for full auto fire
- Barrel length
- Overall length

Examines and microscopically compares fired ammunition components.

Examines tools and microscopically compares tool marks and performs serial number restoration.

Destroys firearms, knives, metal tools, etc. for various agencies in South Carolina.

Operates the <u>Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS)</u> database and the <u>Entry by Appointment (EBA)</u> program designed to increase the efficiency and throughput of the IBIS system.



NATIONAL INTEGRATED BALLISTIC INFORMATION NETWORK (NIBIN)



NIBIN technology compares images of submitted ballistic evidence from shooting scenes and recovered firearms and produces a list of possible similar results. Trained NIBIN technicians then conduct a correlation review of these results, identifying NIBIN leads or potential links or associations from the same firearm. A NIBIN lead is an unconfirmed, potential association between two or more pieces of firearm ballistic evidence and is based on a correlation review of the digital images in the NIBIN database.

SLED continues to be a national leader in NIBIN entries:

In FY 2024, 7,172 cases were entered into the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) through the Entry by Appointment Program resulting in 10,512 correlations and 2,559 investigative leads between cases.

This year, SLED's NIBIN program has consistently ranked in the top five each month on entries and in the top 15 for leads for all programs in the United States.



COMPUTER CRIMES

Encompasses the preservation, processing, and analysis of evidence in an analog or digital format.


Provides expertise to local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies in the scientific examination, repair (if possible), analysis, and/or evaluation of electronically stored information contained on a wide variety of data storage devices.


Conducts investigations of internet child exploitation, child pornography and assist with network intrusion investigations.




TRACE EVIDENCE

- Fire debris
- Glass
- Paint





TOXICOLOGY

Responsible for the analysis of biological fluids and tissues for the presence or absence of alcohol, drugs, and poisons in relation to the following investigations:

- Postmortem
- Driving under the influence (DUI)
- Criminal sexual conduct
- Moonshine





IMPLIED CONSENT

- Regulates the breath testing program for South Carolina
- Certifies, inspects, repairs, and maintains 154 Datamaster DMT instruments at 109 test sites throughout the state for the Breath Testing Program
- Works with IRSA Video to maintain video recording equipment and video storage / accessibility for breath testing program





LATENT PRINTS

- Utilizes various techniques for the development and enhancement of latent fingerprints on submitted evidence
- Conducts examinations of developed and/or submitted latent prints to known standards
- Conducts <u>Automated Fingerprint Identification</u>
 <u>System (AFIS)</u> searches
- Utilizes various techniques to attempt to recover fingerprint standards from the human skin of unknown persons for identification.
- Conducts examinations of known and unknown footwear / tire tread impressions



FORENSIC TECHNOLOGY



The <u>Questioned Documents</u> department conducts scientific examinations on evidence requiring a determination of authorship and authenticity such as:


- Identification and comparison of:
 - Handwriting, hand printing, typewriting, check writers, rubber stamps, and various printing and duplicating processes
- Identification and comparison of inks and paper
- Detection of alterations and obliterations
- Restoration of charred, water soaked, and shredded documents
- Decipherment of indented writing on documents
- Detection of forgery of lottery tickets
- Detection of counterfeit currency, driver's licenses, event tickets, etc.



CRIME SCENE

The <u>Crime Scene</u> department aids local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies in the investigation of crime scenes and assist with Bloodstain Pattern Analysis / Crime Scene Reconstruction, Footwear and Tire Tread Analysis, and Advanced Digital Photography.










CRIME SCENE

SLED Crime Scene Agents are Class I Law Enforcement Certified and respond to crime scene requests 24/7.



Agents respond to scenes such as:

- Officer-Involved Shootings
- Homicides
- Suicides
- Child Fatalities
- Large-scale property crimes



While on scene, agents investigate and document the crime scene as well as locate, collect, and process evidence related to the case. In addition, agents are trained to perform job functions in Advanced Digital Photography, Footwear / Tire Tread Examinations, or Bloodstain Pattern Analysis / Crime Scene Reconstruction Examinations (BPA/CSR).

SCIIC / FUSION



Purpose:

To detect, prevent, apprehend, and respond to criminal and terrorist activity by leveraging the expertise and resources of governmental and private sector security and intelligence professionals to provide data-driven products to all segments of law enforcement personnel, first responders, citizens, businesses, and critical infrastructure in SC.

OPERATIONS DESK (OD)

SLED 1947 1947

- Serves as SLED's dispatch, ensuring that agents and operational units always have access to radio communication
- Enters warrants, stolen articles, and other pertinent law enforcement information into NCIC on behalf of:
 - SLED
 - DHEC
 - The Attorney General's Office

- Assists with creating photo line-ups for law enforcement agencies





CRIMINAL ANALYSIS TEAM (CAT)




Provides information and intelligence to federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies throughout the country to assist with:

- Case development




STATE SURVEILLANCE AND INTELLIGENCE (SSI)

<u>SSI</u> provides trained agents capable of gathering information and intelligence to locate missing and endangered persons, apprehend fugitives, and assist local and state law enforcement.









THREAT ANALYSIS CELL (TAC)

Provides analytical support to various threats received both in the state and nationwide while ensuring that information and intelligence is shared with our local, state, and federal partners.

Performs threat assessments on high profile events throughout the state.

Evaluates and forwards Suspicious Activity Reports to the FBI and/or SLED's Behavioral Science Unit.





INTERAGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER (IOC)

SLED 1947 1947

- Integrates capabilities for homeland security to address all threats associated with the maritime community
- Assists the low country by consolidating maritime security functions across all levels of law enforcement by coordinating resources, operations, and information sharing.
- Supports <u>Seahawk</u> as the IOC Coordinator by working closely with the <u>United States Coast Guard</u>, as well as state and local agencies.






ADMINISTRATION

ALERTS

SLED 1947 1947

The South Carolina AMBER Alert system is a cooperative effort between the state's law enforcement personnel and radio/television broadcasters that facilitates the rapid dissemination of an urgent bulletin in child abduction cases, interrupting regularly scheduled program to achieve the immediate notification that is so critical in solving these cases.

The AMBER Alert system:

- Enhances law enforcement's ability to respond to child abductions
- Quickly enlists assistance from communities
- Makes best effort to result in the quick and safe recovery of abducted children

Similarly, the Endangered Person Notification System facilitates this for information regarding a missing person who is believed to be suffering from dementia or some other cognitive impairment. The Missing Persons Information Center (MPIC) at SLED receives reports from local law enforcement agencies and issues notifications with the appropriate information.



REGULATORY



Purpose:

To oversee investigative and regulatory enforcement for licensed private security companies and officers, private investigation businesses and investigators, the SC Concealed Weapons Permit (CWP) program and instructors, and the State Constable Program, while also coordinating the South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program (SCLEAP) to facilitate SLED's community relations efforts.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Community relations efforts promote SLED and its services while facilitating the exchange of information and concerns related to police activities between law enforcement and the community.



GREG'S GROCERIES PARTNERSHIP

- Greg's Groceries is the only multi-agency, statewide initiative of its kind in America. Since the inception of Greg's Groceries, hundreds of thousands of meals have been delivered by departments across South Carolina, including the first statewide partnership with SLED.

CONCEALED WEAPON PERMIT (CWP)

- Oversees CWP instructor training and qualifications.

NATIONAL INSTANT CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECK SYSTEM (NICS)



NICS is a national, name-based system utilized by federal firearm licensees to check available records on individuals who may be prohibited from owning, purchasing, or possessing firearms in accordance with federal or state law. Coordinates and cooperates with the FBI, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), state, and local law enforcement agencies related to NICS information and firearm prohibitions. Works with the probate courts and other law enforcement agencies to ensure all information provided to NICS is current and accurate.



(SCLEAP)

SCLEAP provides critical incident stress management and chaplaincy services to officers and staff of member agencies as well as all requesting local law enforcement agencies and departments in South Carolina. Consists of a full-time professional staff who, along with a statewide cadre of volunteer chaplains, provides 24/7 statewide service for all law enforcement agencies and departments in South Carolina.





STATE CONSTABLE PROGRAM



Manages the <u>South Carolina State Constable Program</u> to ensure compliance with all state laws and regulations.

State Constables are "appointed officers" by the Governor of South Carolina and regulated by the South Carolina State Law Enforcement Division (SLED.) They serve the public by helping maintain peace as they have for hundreds of years, but with qualifications, training and standards that meet the current requirements of performing law enforcement duties. Volunteer State Constables are uncompensated per state law.



HOMELAND SECURITY



Purpose:

To administer grants received from the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS), coordinate Critical Infrastructure/Key Resources (CI/KR) services and Regional Response Teams (SWAT, Bomb, HazMat, RMAT, IMT, USAR, and CSAR), provide statewide active shooter/active threat training, and facilitate Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) Exercises and WMD/Counterterrorism training for the state.

HOMELAND SECURITY



Manages over 206 Homeland Security sub-grants for:

- Law enforcement, fire, EMS, and emergency management agencies
- Other entities such as churches, schools, governments, and citizens' organizations

Coordinates 37 Regional Response Teams

(SWAT, Bomb, HazMat, RMAT, IMT, USAR, and CSAR teams)

Provides statewide badging, credentialing, oversight, and guidance for Authorities
Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) to assist with the continued implementation of the National Incident
Management Systems
(NIMS)





ACTIVE SHOOTER PROGRAM

SLED 1947 1947

Provides necessary training to first responders such as law enforcement, fire, and EMS personnel to include:

- Active Shooter / Active Threat Instructor certification
- Rescue Task Force
- Bleeding Control
- Basic Reunification

Coordinates and provides <u>Active Shooter / Active Threat training</u> to:

- Civilians, dispatchers, and law enforcement officers
- Churches and other locations associated with worship organizations

Coordinates <u>Active Shooter Guidelines training</u> for South Carolina schools, including children, faculty, and staff which includes specialized training for special needs teachers and assistants in countering violent encounters in an educational setting.

Supports multiple states with training and consultation for active violence training and standardized best practices.



WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION (WMD)

SLED 1947 1947

Conducts challenging live action or simulated WMD/CT exercises to assess capabilities of the State/Regional Response Teams (WMD SWAT, WMD Bomb, WMD HazMat, CSAR, RMAT, and IMT), along with other participating agencies, and identify gaps within these capabilities.

Leverages Homeland Security grant funding in the areas of personnel, organization, equipment, training, and exercises (POETE) to facilitate gap reduction.

End state of the program:
State/Regional Response teams and agencies are familiar with the signs of an event and trained to provide the initial response to a WMD/CT event.



CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE/KEY RESOURCES (CIKR)



Represents SLED CI/KR at statewide meetings

Conducts Site Assistance Visits (SAV)

A SAV is a vulnerability assessment conducted jointly by DHS in coordination and cooperation with Federal, State, local, tribal, territorial, and private sector CI/KR facilities stakeholders. Through SAVs, DHS informs CI/KR owners and operators of protective measures that would increase the ability to detect and prevent attacks, then provides options for reducing vulnerabilities.







CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION SYSTEMS (CJIS)



Purpose:

To serve as the central state criminal justice information repository that collects, processes, stores, and disseminates crime data, criminal identification, and criminal record information.





Provides accurate and timely information to assist with crime prevention and the administration of criminal justice to:

- Local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies
- Civil governmental agencies
- The public

Adheres to, sets, maintains, and enforces the <u>FBI CJIS</u> <u>Security Policy</u> which includes the vetting of all personnel who have access to criminal justice information (CJI). This also includes policy governing computers, access, and any other components that comprise, connect, and support telecommunications networks and related CJIS systems.





<u>SLED CJIS</u> works with each agency's <u>Terminal Agency Coordinator (TAC)</u> to verify training, vetting, and device accessing CJIS systems.

NON-CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION SYSTEMS (NCJIS)



Works with non-criminal agencies

Requires state-passed legislation to collect fingerprint-based background checks

- NCJIS works with agencies to ensure specific language is incorporated into proposed legislation to allow needed access
- Once passed, NCJIS works with the department to gather information to submit to the FBI, who determines if the department can obtain an Originating Agency Identifier (ORI) that will grant the requested access
 - This process can take anywhere between 6 to 9 months
- If an ORI is granted, NCJIS works with the other units of CJIS to set up the necessary connection

NCJIS also vets all outside personnel who will have unescorted access while on SLED property to conduct work. NCJIS assists state and local criminal justice agencies across the state with the vetting of private CJIS vendors to ensure vendors are compliant with <u>FBI CJIS Security Policy</u>.

NATIONAL CRIME INFORMATION CENTER (NCIC)



Administers the use of and entries into the NCIC files, an electronic clearinghouse of crime data used by law enforcement to perform duties, including:

- Apprehending fugitives
- Locating missing or lost persons
- Recovering stolen property

Provides oversight of the state's participation in the NCIC system which includes training and auditing local, state, and federal criminal agencies to ensure compliance with FBI and SLED CJIS policies as well as training on the use of:

- The NCIC system
- Local Terminal Agency Coordinator (TAC) policies and procedures
- NCIC instruction and certification
- Warrant and protection order entry

AUTOMATED FINGERPRINT IDENTIFICATION SYSTEM

(AFIS)

SLED 1947 PARPERT NI

The <u>AFIS Unit</u> receives, processes, and stores fingerprint cards, searching the submitted prints against the state repository to make reliable identifications and return criminal history record information for both criminal and non-criminal justice purposes.

Specialized employees known as Fingerprint examiners:

- Work with the <u>NCJIS Unit</u> to manage the noncriminal and applicant fingerprint cards by ensuring compliance with all laws and regulations
- Process hard copy criminal and applicant fingerprint cards by entering demographic descriptors and scanning images
- Resolve errors that occur with Livescan submissions



COMPUTERIZED CRIMINAL HISTORY (CCH)



The CCH Unit:

Processes final disposition reports from general sessions, magistrate, and municipal courts promptly, ensuring accurate criminal histories at the state and federal level

Enter and modify arrests, judicial and custody information in the criminal history database while verifying all information

Run criminal history reports for the AFIS and FBI record synchronization

PUBLIC DISSEMINATION & CATCH




The <u>Public Dissemination Unit</u> reviews, logs, and processes mail received from citizens on behalf of:

CJIS:

Criminal history requests Name changes

Regulatory:

Concealed weapons permits (CWPs)
Private investigator licenses
Private security guard licenses



Name-based criminal history background checks are provided to the public as well as guidance and support for background checks conducted online through <u>SLED CATCH</u> by troubleshooting, processing refunds, and handling special processing requests.

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY (SOR)

The SOR Unit:



- Manages the state sex offender registry database
- Ensures information is properly provided for the safety of law enforcement and the public
- Trains sheriff's offices and state agencies where sex offender registrations are held for compliance with the <u>National Crime Information Center (NCIC)</u>, state statutes, and federal guidelines



Additional duties include:

- DSS checks for adoptions
- Address checks with the locals
- Name changes in the SORT
- Overseeing all court order removals

SOUTH CAROLINA INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM (SCIBRS)



SCIBRS analysts:

- Collect crime stats from local agencies
- Perform quality assurance on the information
- Submit the information to the FBI
- Conduct training classes at local agencies

SCIBRS is also responsible for working with state and local agencies to collect and report

<u>Use of Force Data</u> to the FBI.

The collected information is used to provide publicly available crime statistics for use by:

- Law enforcement administration
- Policymakers
- Academics
- Journalists
- The public

SOUTH CAROLINA INFORMATION EXCHANGE (SCIEX)



SCIEx provides an online repository of law enforcement records, including incident reports and case files, for sharing, searching, linking, and analyzing crime information across jurisdictional boundaries to aid in investigations.

The <u>SCIEx Unit</u> provides automatic replication of records to the <u>National Data Exchange (N-DEx)</u>, a national repository of criminal justice records used by law enforcement agencies across the nation.
