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Internal Agency Processes

1. At the January 26, 2022 Subcommittee meeting, Director Aiken mentioned the agency's current inability to manage digitization of state documents due to workload volume. Please identify the resources needed to adequately manage the agency's digitization of state documents.

The South Carolina State Library is the state's document depository. The State Library is charged with keeping documents for all state agencies and making those documents available to everyone. We receive documents and publications created by state agencies including books, maps, images, and publications. Physical copies are available at the State Library, but our goal is to digitize all items that we currently have in our collection and new materials received on a regular basis for both preservation of record and accessibility to patrons. Some of those documents date back to the early 20th Century and require specific handling. We have digitized over 32,000 state documents which are available online through the SC State Documents Depository (dc.statelibrary.sc.gov).

With a digitization staff of 3, it is impossible to digitize all of the state documents we currently have and those received on a regular basis in a year. However, we have begun working with an outside vendor who has been able to digitize our most requested item, the South Carolina Legislative manuals for years 1917- 2021 for a cost of \$23,969. We plan to continue to utilize the services of this vendor to aid in our digitization efforts.

The South Carolina State Library provides consulting for libraries in every county of the state. Staff are expected to be experts in their field, in order to provide current and accurate best practices consulting. Conference attendance and conference presentations are the primary reasons for travel. Staff bring information back to share with South Carolina libraries through training, exchanges, and consulting. Additionally, we have several staff who have been recognized on a National level and serve on committees related to libraries.

Travel and education requests must meet certain criteria in order to be considered for approval. In order to be considered, staff must complete a Travel Professional Development Request Form and provide the following information:

- Provide details describing objectives, topics, and content that will be covered during this training.
- Explain briefly what you intend to learn or gain professionally from attending this activity.
- How does this training/development relate to your primary role at SCSL?
- How does this training tie into your EPMS goals for this year?
- How will your attendance at this training benefit the State Library, your fellow employees, and help to fulfill the mission/vision of the State Library?
- Will you be presenting at this professional development event? If so, have you submitted your proposed presentation to your supervisor for approval?
- Have you scheduled a time to share your presentation with the Agency Director?

- How do you plan to share this information to your colleagues?

By requesting to attend professional development activities at the expense of the South Carolina State Library, I agree to attend the activities in full, not to cancel my travel, unless one of the following occurs:

- Termination of employment prior to the conference.
- The employee, or immediate family member, is ill and unable to attend. Proof of illness documentation may be required.
- Death of an immediate family member.

A list of agency funded travel events for the past five fiscal years is attached. There were no travel events in FY21 due to COVID-19.

5. Please identify the services provided by the Book-A-Librarian program. Who utilizes this service and what metrics are tracked to determining its success?

The State Library's Book-A-Librarian service was initiated in the fall of 2020 in order to continue providing professional one-on-one reference services to patrons while we delivered reference and research services off site. The pandemic closure created opportunities for us to provide our services to our patrons in an expanded way. There are a variety of patrons who request assistance through the Book-A-Librarian service including - state employees, state agencies, researchers, and the general public. Topics of questions include:

- Grants research
- Instruction on using the State Library subscription database, The Foundation Center
- Instruction on using our electronic resources
- Genealogy questions
- Historical research questions
- General research questions

After returning to the State Library building, we kept the virtual reference program because we saw that we were able to reach a larger group of our patrons who don't have the ability to travel to Columbia for research and need one-to-one assistance. We will continue to offer this service as a core service, giving our patrons the ability to reach State Library reference staff in person, and via email, phone, and live chat.

Success criteria include tracking the number of Book-A-Librarian appointments each month and the inquiry subject.

6. Please identify active programs or services, implemented as a result of COVID-19, which agency leadership plan to permanently incorporate (e.g., virtual trainings).

There are many programs and services implemented as a result of COVID-19 that the library plans to permanently incorporate. Those include:

- Virtual trainings
- Book-a-librarian service
- Curbside pick-up service
- Hybrid model of events to include virtual
- The addition of Tutor.com to our electronic resources
- TBS Mobile Recording Studio (for volunteer readers to use at home)
- TBS Instructional videos (to replace in-person Duplication on Demand and Technology Petting Zoo events)
- TBS Virtual Art Gallery ceremony (will remain as a hybrid option going forward)
- Printing and distributing Talking Book Topics (NLS ceased a printed option during Covid, and has not resumed)
- Expanded electronic resources and teachers aids to include Teaching Books

The State Library does not track the number of individual library consultations by county; we track the number of consultations. However, consultation was provided for all 46 counties during the time period listed regarding grants, the annual public library survey, and other statewide topics such as additional electronic resources and out of the box programs directly from the State Library.

In FY20 there were 971 consultations. In FY21 there were 2,019 consultations. Consultations include site visits, phone or email consults, or engagement with boards.

South Carolina Government Social Media Idea Exchange

8. When was the South Carolina Government Social Media Idea Exchange created and how often does it meet? Please provide a list of participating state agencies.

The South Carolina Government Social Media Exchange was created in 2009 initially as training provided by the State Library to other state agencies on how to engage social media to support and promote the participating agencies activities. That training grew into a group of state agencies exchanging and sharing ideas and information. The group typically meets quarterly, however there was a disruption in meetings due to COVID-19 the last two years. The group has an active Facebook group where they share information and ideas. The group plans to resume regular meetings in the near future. The group has 293 members representing at least 177 different groups. State (and federal) agencies participating are:

Submission of Required Documents

12. Per Section 60-2-30 of the SC Code of Laws, all state agencies, departments, and state-supported colleges and universities must provide at least fifteen copies of every state publication that the agency, department, college, or university prints or causes to be printed to the State Library within fifteen days after the printing. Are the identified entities providing this information to the State Library as directed in statute?

- a. If not, what is the agency doing to ensure the identified entities submit the required documents?

This mandate was strictly adhered to by state agencies in the early 2000s and before. However as technology changed and more documents were born digitally without a hard copy format, it became increasingly difficult to obtain copies from state agencies. An additional challenge has been the attrition of long term state employees and the knowledge gap created.

State agencies are increasingly, in compliance with this section of the chapter. Over the past number of years, in order to ensure the highest degree of cooperation we can,

In order to define and inform state agencies of our role, we began by making formal requests for state agency documents, by calling the agency directly and establishing contact. We also composed a letter to each state agency informing them of the mandate. The letter included a description of the types of state publications we collect, instructions for sending both physical and electronic documents to the State Library, how many copies to send, and complete contact information. We offered pick-up service, drop off, or mail delivery for physical publications. We created a specific email for delivery of electronic publications, statedocuments@statelibrary.sc.gov, and provided a means by which large document files could be delivered through a secure file sharing program.

We also provided the option for agencies to send an email directing us to agency web pages where newly posted documents could be found, and offered to pick up large groups of files loaded on a flash drive.

We also provided training to agencies who requested it via a brief PowerPoint presentation, "SC State Library Acquisition of State Agency Publications." The training is not available online. We also provide tours of our building and agency collections, to demonstrate to use our SCLENDs catalog to find physical documents, as well as how to find electronic documents in our State Documents Depository digital collection.

To further increase our ability to communicate with state agencies, we created a Constant Contact list which we named "Publications Officers." We added to this list all the email addresses of our Communications Department contacts and the other state agency contacts we'd begun to collect, our goal being to have at least one point person within each state agency or state supported college, technical college, or university.

We created a title for our Constant Contact emails, "A State Government Documents Update for You," and now send regular communications to the nearly 200 state agency contacts on our

Constant Contact list. These communications include reminders to send agency publications and clear instructions, our monthly press release about new electronic state publications, reminders to submit nominations for our annual Notable State Documents awards competition, notifications about programs or presentations, and other points of interest. We frequently coordinate these messages with similar notifications through our social media platforms of Facebook and Twitter, and our usual SC State Library press releases and weekly updates. In all communications, we make a point of including contact information and our state documents email address.

We also direct agency contacts to the subject guide on our web page, Information for SC State Agencies. This page provides complete information regarding our legal role, a quick chart for the number of copies of publications to send, a link to our training PowerPoint, FAQ's and a suggested workflow.

Over the past few years, we've enhanced our Notable State Documents Awards program in order to bring further attention to our role as the official state depository for all outward facing state publications, and we send frequent reminders to agencies instructing them on how to participate. With the document awards, we highlight the contribution of agencies in providing us with documents and showcase the talents and importance of state agency personnel in the creation of these publications. Our revised Notable State Documents Awards Program web page provides state agencies with a history of the program, criteria used, submission guidelines, a link for submitting nominations online, and lists of past winners.

We've also greatly increased our communications with our eleven selective state document depository libraries by holding regular meetings and having in-person and virtual visits. We've encouraged their participation in our Notable State Documents program through inviting contacts to be award judges, sent regular email updates on our activities related to the depositories, added depository contacts and personnel to our Constant Contact list, and we've provided suggestions for the depositories on ways to increase visibility for their document collections. An added benefit for us in this increase of communication has been that those depositories which are also state academic bodies have helped us in the acquisition of publications created by their own institutions.

We also use a web crawler as a back-up measure to help ensure we gather any agency publications which agencies themselves may have overlooked sending to us. We crawl all agencies which we are able to on a monthly basis. State supported colleges and institutions are crawled on a quarterly basis. For those agencies which we are unable to crawl, or for which crawling does not result in satisfactory results, we have begun a list of agency websites we will search manually on a regular basis in order to ensure we collect publications.

We add our state documents email address to state agency distribution lists in order to receive emailed publications like newsletters. If in PDF format, we add these newsletters to our digital collection or, if sent as an email, we convert these newsletters to a PDF document in order to harvest them. We use the Legislative Publications order form to ensure we annually receive documents published through them, and we keep in touch with the state Legislative Council librarian to ensure we are on all necessary mailing lists for law related state publications. Finally, we offer assistance to state agencies with digitization projects, thereby again increasing

opportunities for contact and communication, and providing us with an additional opportunity to identify ourselves, define our role, and request submission of publications by the agency. In addition to all these activities, we have been aided in our efforts by the inclusion of the question in the state's Annual Accountability Reports which asks if the agency responding is "in compliance with S.C. Code Ann. § 2-1-230, which requires submission of certain reports to the Legislative Services Agency for publication online and the State Library."

These multiple efforts have resulted in our not only increasing our receipt of current agency publications, but we have also been able to collect numerous past publications to add to our digital and physical state document collections. Our attention to clarifying our role, defining the publications we collect, and consciously increasing communication with state agencies and providing instructions for them have all worked together to ensure we fulfil our role as the official state depository for agency publications.

13. Per Section 60-1-150 of the SC Code of Laws, every public, college, university, technical college, and state institutional library shall make an annual statistical report to the South Carolina State Library in a form as may be prescribed by the State Library. Are the identified entities providing this information to the State Library as directed in statute?

o If not, what is the agency doing to ensure the identified entities submit the required documents?

Historically a survey has been sent to the institutional libraries. Data exists from 2003-2017. However, no data has been collected since 2017 due to staff attrition at the State Library and institutional libraries. This question from the committee brought the matter to our attention and we will address this by adding the survey back into our collection of information.

Market Assessment/Partnerships

14. Do agency staff conduct an annual assessment of county library resources and utilization?

o If so, what metrics does the agency review during its assessment? Is this information provided in a formal report?

Each year the State Library requires each county library to report on a variety of statistics. The survey has 135 questions. The results of that survey are analyses to provide individual county libraries with consultation on a variety of topics including how to increase circulation, programming, collections, etc. Additionally, the survey is sent to the Institute of Museum and Library Services to be included in the National survey referenced earlier in question #10. The results of the annual survey can be found on our website from 2000-2020.

15. Does South Carolina have an enough library locations to provide equitable services to all state residents? Please provide data to support your response.

County libraries use demographics information, population numbers, circulation numbers, and miles patrons must travel to the nearest library locations as some of the point factors to determine if a new public library is needed or if an existing library meets the needs of the current

population. In September 2021, the State Library surveyed public libraries regarding their needs for renovations to existing public libraries and the need for new construction of libraries. Information from this survey determined that of the 205 South Carolina libraries:

- 64 libraries (31%) are in need of major repair work
- 74 libraries (36%) are in need of major technology upgrades
- 58 libraries (28%) are in need of major electrical upgrades
- 75 libraries (37%) are in need of interior renovations
- 87 libraries (43%) are in need of expansion
- 19 libraries (9%) have construction projects in the planning stage
- 48 libraries (23%) have building projects in the planning stage

The question was asked “How many new libraries need to be built in your system to serve your community adequately?” There were a total of 38 responses, representing 42 counties; all respondents indicated they needed new libraries to meet the needs of the population.

17. How do you find, connect, and nurture relationships with the state's preservationist? Does the agency provide education opportunities to further develop the skills of preservationists?



If this question is referencing the South Carolina Department of Archives and History, we have an ongoing relationship with them. Additionally, the South Carolina Digital Library group shares information and ideas. The South Carolina State Library collaborates with South Carolina public libraries and cultural heritage institutions across the state to increase access to local holdings.

Utilization of Library Resources


The State Library does not collect data in the manner requested. As a result of this question and Legislative Oversight review process, we are in the process of revising how we collect and record statistical data for the State Library. The South Carolina State Library provides assistant to a variety of customer groups, but we do not separate statistics out for each group or location of the customer. Below are statistics of useful information for specific groups and/or services.

The Talking Book Services (TBS) program is utilized by patrons who are blind or print disabled. There are approximately 6,000 active TBS patrons. Patrons contact reader advisors for assistance. The following graphs highlights phone calls taken and items circulated.




The decline in items circulated in the Talking Book Services area in 2019 and 2020 is due to a change in technology which allows patrons to download books directly to their devices.






Statewide Services Transactions FY20 Patron Type

As mentioned in question #1, the State Library is the depository for state documents. We do not require users accessing digital documents to register or identify who they are and which county they are located in. However, below is a graph outlining page views of documents located in our digital depository.



An additional customer group that we provide services to children ages birth to five years old. Day by Day Literacy calendars were provided to all Head Start Centers in every county in South Carolina in 2021 to increase literacy efforts and family engagement with young children to promote literacy. Approximately 31,000 calendars were provided for children participating in Head Start.

Outreach to raise awareness about what the State Library can do to serve the General Assembly, State officers, and State agencies is a high priority to our staff. We continue to seek new ways to serve, offer reference and research services, and to make new connections and potential partnerships throughout the state, especially with State officers and State agencies.

21. According to the FY20 Public Library Survey referenced by agency staff in the letter submitted on March 4, 2022, circulation of juvenile and adult print books were the most utilized resources by patrons. Given the trend away from physical books, does this data counter the move to digital books? Should there be greater investments in physical books by county libraries?

The data provided in the South Carolina Public Library survey and information available nationally, does not indicate a trend away from physical books. In FY20 the circulation of books and other print materials for all ages was 9,885,872; E-books were accessed 2,354,787 times. Our libraries and their print resources are utilized heavily.

South Carolina public libraries spent \$9,601,085.00 on books and print materials and \$8,013,665.00 on electronic books.

Physical books and print materials still remain a major part of library collections and are circulated regularly. As indicated by the data, libraries are investing more funds on physical books and print materials than they are on electronic books. Regarding investment of funds into physical collections, these decisions are made at the county level by the Board of Trustees.

State Depositories

22. How often do State Library staff inspect state depositories to evaluate security measures and ensure the proper maintenance of the physical infrastructure?

Our Government Documents librarian and Technical Services librarian visit each state depository library to speak directly to the depository contact, review depository collections and processes, and provide any additional assistance that may be necessary to the depositories. Some recent meetings took place in person, including meetings with:

- Susie O'Connor at Gregg-Graniteville Library, UofSC, Aiken,
- Amanda McLeod, with Dacus Library
- Winthrop University

During the pandemic, the majority of meetings have been moved to a virtual format. The State Library has met virtually with:

- Jennifer Hughes from Kimbel Library
- Coastal Carolina University
- Melissa Oneill, Cooper Library, Clemson.

A virtual Zoom meeting was coordinated with all the state depository libraries on May 25, 2021. The State Library met with the newest state depository, Horry-Georgetown Technical College, Library on December 16, 2021. The State Library intends to continue these meetings with the individual depositories, and are in the process of scheduling another group meeting through Zoom.

Regarding a formal inspections/evaluation of library security measures or depository building infrastructure, these responsibilities are not directly a part of the SC State Library's role as the official state depository and main collection and distribution point for state agency publications. We do address any concerns regarding document organization, and we provide bibliographic direction and control over the publications. Our South Carolina State Documents Depository subject guide page for the depository libraries provides up to date, introductory information and materials. It includes a link to the most recent edition of the South Carolina State Documents Depository Library Manual. This manual provides the depositories with instruction and direction for the processing of physical and electronic documents, shipment schedules, and the state cataloging system for documents, retention and discard policies, and ideas for promotion of state publication collections. Our staff provide consultation and support, and every effort is made to include the depositories in decisions affecting them and programs involving state publications,

such as our document acquisition training sessions for state agencies, and our annual Notable State Documents Awards program.

23. How much has the State Library absorbed in shipping charges, annually, for the past three fiscal years?

There is no specific documentation related to the cost of shipping boxes of state publications to the depositories, but we can make a general estimate that may be reliable. The cost for the quarterly shipping of publications in boxes ranged from \$10.00 – \$12.00 each, and \$7.00 – \$8.00 for each envelope. Calculating based on the past three fiscal years (2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022), 10 shipments total to 11 depositories, mostly in boxes, but with the last shipment being in envelopes, it is estimated that the cost was approximately \$1,188.00. This was calculated based on 4 shipments going out at \$10.00 for each box, 5 going out at \$12.00 each box, and 1 group going out in envelopes at \$8.00 each envelope.

24. Do State Library staff produce a public report regarding depository holdings and utilization?

The State Library produces an annual report and an annual accountability report, both of which include summaries and/or specifics of information regarding state depository holdings and utilization. The reports include references to: our role as the main collection point for state documents; our efforts to acquire state publications and instruct state agencies as to our role and needs; our regular distribution of documents to the 11 other depository libraries around the state; and our digitization projects involving state publications.

In the recent past, digitization projects involving state publications have included the digitization of the South Carolina Legislative Manuals, the South Carolina Department of Education Annual Reports, and, currently, the digitization of SCDNR's South Carolina Wildlife magazine and of portions of South Carolina Acts and Joint Resolutions.

We also make our available services, projects, and activities known to the wider public through frequent press releases from our Communications Department. These press releases include a monthly article about all the digitally published state documents acquired by the State Library during the previous month. The articles highlight one specific document and directs readers to the full lists and our collection of digital holdings. Links on the lists lead to the specified document, making particular titles easy to find. Additionally, these monthly articles direct the public to our South Carolina State Documents Depository Subject Guide, which includes information about the documents depository system, our physical documents catalog, SCLENDS, and the digital South Carolina State Documents Depository. Other public press releases inform the public about SC document related events and projects, unique state documents we acquire from state agencies through our document acquisition activities, historical documents within our collection, and state documents we may acquire from other library institutions. Press releases are posted to our website home page and are sent through distribution lists.

25. Does South Carolina have adequate state depository locations and space to accommodate the needs of the state?

The South Carolina State Documents Depository System consists of the State Library (the official state depository and the main collection and distribution point), and eleven selective depositories which are located in and serve various regional areas around the state. These satellite depositories are made up of academic and public libraries, and one technical college library. At this time, the number of state depository locations appears adequate to fulfil the needs and requirements of the state, and to accomplish the goals of the depository system. For the eleven selective depository libraries, the requirement to retain physical and/or digital state documents is limited to five years from the date of the document's publication. This limit ensures document collections do not outgrow the space available at the various depositories. The State Library retains copies of both physical (up to three copies of each publication formally printed) and all digital documents permanently.

The vast majority of current publications are born digital and may or may not be released by the publishing agency in print format. While this has resulted in a decrease in the number of physical publications produced by state agencies and acquired by the State Library, it has led to a significant increase in the State Library's acquisition of digital publications. In the future, consideration may need to be given to increasing electronic/digital space in the event of reaching data limits in our electronic documents repository, DSpace.

Library Locations

26. Do State Library staff analyze state demographic trends to develop a public library site plan?

27. What input, if any, does the State Library have on the location of local libraries?

The State Library is not typically involved in the selection of a location of local libraries; however, the State Library may provide data which identifies a certain geographical area of need.

28. How often is a new local library location opened?

New library construction is contingent on the availability of funding. There is no set time between constructions of library locations, it varies greatly depending on a variety of factors including funding availability, location availability, etc.

29. When was the last new local library location opened?

In October 2021, Orangeburg County Library System had a grand opening for the Orangeburg County Library and Conference Center. The new building includes a 50,000 sq. ft. library, 10,000 sq. ft. amphitheater, and a 450 seat conference center.

30. How long has the current number of local libraries been in place?

The age of libraries vary in each county, some dating back to the 1940s.

31. Does the State Library utilize library location information to help fill service gaps, at least in terms of the ability of the public to access a physical location? For example, Lee, Calhoun, Allendale, Saluda, and McCormick appear to only have one local library apiece in the respective counties. Many local organizations use meeting space at local libraries.

The number of library locations is determined by local government and is relevant to the population numbers and available funds for that community.

The State Library is a member of SCLENDS, a consortia of 20 libraries across the state who share their library collections across the state. Some of the counties listed above are in the SCLENDS consortia and thus have access to the materials in the other libraries' collections.

32. How, if at all, are the needs of local libraries impacted by having more than one branch in a county?

Having more than one branch in a system allows the public library to meet the needs of more people in the community. Additionally, having more than one library in a county system has a direct impact on how many people are able to utilize the services of the library. For example, if a community member has to travel a long distance to their local library and they don't have transportation, they may not be able to utilize the resources of the library; limiting their accessibility to needed resources.

It is imperative to remember that libraries are not just places where people check out books. Libraries are community centers; they provide access to needed resources. People go to their libraries to utilize technology to attend school; do research related to education, health, etc.; apply for jobs; apply for social service benefits; participate in programming for all ages which deepen and expand their knowledge base; family engagement; access news and information, etc. The library provides needed resources to a community and in our rural communities specifically it is often the only place where a child can access the internet to do their school work. It is the only place where a child can participate in a STEM program (through use of the State Library kits) to build a robot, or use equipment that may otherwise not be available to them. The library is the space where equal access to information is available to all. If branches are not within a reasonable distance of a community the members of that community suffer.

33. Over the past three years, which local libraries have received the most support (e.g., financial and services) from the State Library and why is that?

Greenville County has received the most in state aid funds which are calculated based on population. Greenville County has the highest population numbers of the 46 counties in South Carolina.

Calhoun County, Charleston County, Dorchester County, Florence County, Georgetown County, Kershaw County, McCormick County, Pickens County, Sumter County, Union County and York

County received the most federal grant funds from the State Library because they applied for additional impact grant funds.

34. Over the past three years, which local libraries have received the least support (e.g., financial and services) from the State Library and why is that?

The minimum grant amount for State Aid is currently \$100,000. The following counties receive the minimum grant amount: Abbeville County, Allendale County, Bamberg County, Barnwell County, Calhoun County, Chester County, Chesterfield County, Clarendon County, Colleton County, Dillon County, Edgefield County, Fairfield County, Hampton County, Jasper County, Lee County, McCormick County, Marion County, Marlboro County, Newberry County, Saluda County, Union County and Williamsburg.

Colleton County, Greenwood County, Lee County and Williamsburg County received the least federal grant funds from the State Library over the past three years because they did not apply for additional grant funds.

35. Do any local libraries receive no support from the State Library? If yes, which one(s) and why is that?

The State Library provides support for all County Library Systems equally in South Carolina. Federal Grant funds are available for all County library Systems to apply.

36. What in your opinion of the relationship of a county's population to the number of local libraries?

The population numbers and community demographics such as age have a significant impact on the services needed in a county library. If library locations and collections are not planned using this statistical information, services may not be planned appropriately. Libraries are busy places – they are community centers and require adequate resources to serve their communities. For example a geographic area with a high number children and schools should have a robust collection for children and teens and should provide a significant number and variety of programs. A geographic area with a high number of retirees would focus more of their resources on developing a relevant collection and programming to this population.

37. As a library professional, what does this map say to you about the “State of Libraries” in South Carolina?

If the question is – do I as a library professional think there are enough public library locations in South Carolina, I do not. Reference the answer given for question #15.

Aid to County Libraries

38. How are local libraries funded?

SC Code § 4-9-39 (2014) states that “County public library systems shall be funded by annual appropriations by the county council including millage, if any, levied specifically for the county

public library system plus aid provided by the state and federal governments and other sources. If any county council levies a tax specifically for the support of a county public library system, such tax shall apply to all persons and corporations subject to school taxes.

All assets and property, both real and personal, owned by any county library prior to the creation of a library system under Section 4-9-35 shall be transferred to the county by the persons or entities owning title thereto provided, however, any decision to sell or otherwise transfer the property for use other than for library purposes must be made by two-thirds majority of the county governing body.

HISTORY: 1978 Act No. 564 Section 2; 1994 Act No. 480, Section 1, eff July 14, 1994.”

Libraries also receive funds from grants that they apply for and are awarded, local Friends groups, State Aid funds, and grant funds from the State Library.

39. In FY 21-22, the State Library received \$10,281,846 in Aid to County Libraries funding. What formula is used to disburse these funds? Please provide data illustrating the amount allocated to each county.

State Aid is calculated on a per capita basis at \$2.00 per capita with a \$100,000 minimum funding. For example, Abbeville County has a population of 25,417. If State Aid were calculated on a \$2.00 per capita basis with no minimum allotment, Abbeville would only receive \$50,834 per year. See Proviso 27.1 below.

SECTION 27 - H870 - STATE LIBRARY

27.1. (LIB: Aid to Counties Libraries Allotment) The amount appropriated in this section for "Aid to County Libraries" shall be allotted to each county on a per capita basis according to the official United States Census For 2010, as aid to the County Library. No county shall be allocated less than \$100,000 under this provision. To receive this aid, local library support shall not be less than the amount actually expended for library operations from local sources in the second preceding year.
