

(WLGOS) Why Students Chose to Attend - Academic Years 2016-2018







Ages of Students Attending Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School - Academic Years 2016-2018


Race of Students Attending Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School 2016-2018





Gender of Students Attending Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School 2016-2018












Ages of Students Applying to Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School 2016-2018




Race of Students Applying to Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School 2016-2018

# **EXECUTIVE MARKETING SUMMARY**

Since 1921, the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School (WLGOS) has sustained its rich history as the state's original leader in alternative education; soon to commemorate nearly 100 years of successfully serving the state's undereducated populations. Over nearly a century, the school has diversified programs and services in order to continue attracting and serving those in need. This marketing blueprint for the Opportunity School is strategically designed to target the Palmetto State's most vulnerable at-risk youth, ages 16-19, as aligned with the agency's objectives of attracting young people who have dropped out or at-risk of dropping out of school. This plan is designed based upon empirical data, a diversity of successful strategies implemented during the school year, and new strategies planned for the current year. Even more recent, one basic method of outreach is and continues to be word of mouth, in certain instances enrolling siblings (during various sessions) from the same families for which the WLGOS "brand" of program has proven very successful. The plan incorporates a variety of channels with which to expand reach to a broad-based constituency.

Today's young people are under enormous pressures to succeed and yet face many daily obstacles that discourage them from moving forward with personal goals.

Distractions including peer pressures, the increasing draw of gangs and illegal activities, personal anxieties and learning difficulties, family/community hardships, and regular school environments are not conducive. On a beautiful 87-acre campus, students are given individual attention, and discipline and expectations are clearly defined.

Agency primary goals include:

- a. Contact students and parents/guardians/family authority figures and members of the faith community interested in a viable, caring alternative education environment for at-risk youth ages 16-19 (minimum 175 students accepted per session, 140 students enrolled per session)
- b. Ensure the school's unique and proven "brand" is featured in each medium
- c. Continue developing new community partnerships
- d. Continue local community outreach opportunities with such as school districts and faith community
- e. Attend a minimum of four markets/conferences that provide face-to-face marketing opportunities with key decision makers

Having carefully analyzed the agency's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats, the Opportunity School retains a strong presence throughout South Carolina, the state legislature, school districts, and local communities. Partnerships with key stakeholders are being established to advantageously further awareness of the school's offerings - despite the growth in seemingly similar programs now available on line, through home schooling, military academies, charter schools, nonprofits and such.

Wil Lou Gray is renowned for its caring, state-certified teachers, award winning JROTC program and dedicated staff. The school's graduates and their families are the greatest "marketing returns". Testimony after testimony from graduates and their families are indicative that the WLGOS "brand"... the safe, caring environment provided at Wil Lou Gray incorporating consistent discipline, focus, and strategic learning works. WLGOS is changing lives and families! Helping to change the economic picture of South Carolina, each graduate becomes a productive member of society usually entering the workforce, post-secondary enrollment, or becoming a member of the United States Armed Forces. The school now has a unique software method for determining a student's full viability once enrolled.

(WLGOS) In Fiscal Year 2017-2018, the agency implemented a variety of advertising methods. Mediums were not tracked separately on applications. Applicants however had the option to indicate – "Advertising". Based on 2017-2018 indications, 12% (43) of accepted students indicated on the application they learned about the school through "Advertising" - cost per student \$5,694. Word of mouth currently is the school's best form of "advertising"; 48% of applicants indicated "word of mouth" to be the method by which they learned of WLGOS. During the interview process, Wil Lou Gray has now begun to track more carefully methods by which applicants learn of Wil Lou Gray. More precise data will be available in the near future.

# V. BOARD TRAINING

(WLGOS) Board training includes very precise information on the roles and responsibilities of each board member. Under the leadership of the board, the agency director assumes responsibility for agency operations in accordance with Board policies. As the board is primarily responsible for establishing the agency's mission and vision, developing policy and providing oversight, detailed training on specific administrative areas within the operation of a state agency are not conducted. Board members are provided an extensive, up-to-date Board policy manual which includes comprehensive sections on fiscal management and personnel. A follow-up session for additional training will be conducted at the August board meeting.

(WLGOS) The Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School and the SC Youth ChalleNGe Academy serve a similar population of constituents throughout the State of South Carolina in regards to serving 16-19 year old at-risk students who are not experiencing success in the traditional educational setting. Our program as well as theirs focuses on preparing students for obtaining a GED credential, improving social and behavioral skills, providing pre-vocational training, and transitioning to adulthood as they exit their teen years. In comparison of the two programs, the similarities end with the population served and the differences begin with the high success rate of the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School. After reviewing the data obtained from the SC Legislative Oversight Committee's Study of the Adjutant General's Office, several large differences were apparent when comparing the data submitted by the SC Youth ChalleNGe Academy and that of the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School. The largest noticeable difference is the number of GED credentials issued over a four year period, the second is the rate of completion of students accepted, and the third being the number of students served within an academic school year in the respective programs. The Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School is proud to compare our successes to theirs in the first table, "**Comparable Program Profiles 2013-2017**".

Aside from the great success of the academic and residential programs of Wil Lou Gray providing life changing experiences for at-risk students, it should be noted that in a cost comparison of the two programs that serve the same population, the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School operates a program that is more cost effective as shown in the second table below, "**Comparison of Per Pupil Cost for 2016-2017**".
