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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Values

- We believe in a climate built on trust, integrity, and selfless service, therefore we will empower agile and
 adaptive leaders to create a transparent environment of dignity and respect through the fostering of
 cohesive teams, shared understanding, and bold action.
- We believe we have a sacred obligation to uphold the reputation of those who came before us, therefore, we will build a culture that embodies the ideals of our military service and the values of our South Carolina roots to deploy, defend, and serve those who are unwilling or unable.
- We believe innovation and partnerships are key to building agile and adaptive forces, therefore, we will encourage and empower all levels of our workforce to improve the processes entrusted to them.

Goals

The guiding principles of the Office of the Adjutant General and S.C. Military Department are to promote a cohesive, disciplined, and resilient organizational culture, where our people are trained, knowledgeable, and mentor each other in a positive, supportive environment; maintain trained and ready forces for the defense of our country and emergency support of our communities by investing in innovative individual and collective training opportunities and world-class facilities; and strengthen and leverage current relationships while identifying opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships to maximize future competitiveness. The Agency continued to meet these objectives in FY 20-21, both in terms of overall-mission readiness and service to the citizens of South Carolina. The S.C. Military Department also continued working toward the achievement of the organization's strategic goals:

- (1) Promote a cohesive, disciplined, and resilient organizational culture, where our people are trained, knowledgeable, and mentor each other in a positive, supportive environment.
- (2) Maintain trained and ready forces for the defense of our country and emergency support of our communities by investing in innovative individual and collective training opportunities and world-class facilities.
- (3) Strengthen and leverage current relationships while identifying opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships to maximize future competitiveness.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

As it pertains to The State of South Carolina, the most significant negative impacts on the State and the public would occur if the Office of the Adjutant General failed in its responsibilities for the provision of emergency coordination and support. The main concerns are the ability to execute early or timely alerts and warnings, and the risk of complex disasters either exceeding or exhausting the Agency's and State's resources or capabilities.

In the area of alerts and warnings, the Agency is dependent on State and Federal agencies, counties, and external organizations to collect and provide timely information and alerts to the State for dissemination and decision-making. Short or no-notice events (e.g., earthquakes, train wrecks, chemical spills, etc.) could initially result in a slower, less coordinated response. In addition, delays or reluctance in decision-making at the local, county, State or Federal levels would negatively impact the Agency's (and State's) ability to provide timely and effective response and support. The Agency continues to mitigate this challenge by utilizing multiple strategies. State-level exercises and drills incorporate exercising alert and warning systems, as well as working to incorporate county and State agencies and leadership into the decision-making aspects of the exercises. SC Emergency Management Division (SCEMD) continues to exercise and validate their communications and alert and warning systems with the counties, State and Federal agencies. SCEMD continues to expand its use of social media, to include The South Carolina Emergency Manager Mobile App, and established media channels to message and inform the public to provide the public with the latest emergency information and assist in their emergency preparations. Additionally, after action improvement planning done following each major disaster declaration enables the Agency (and State) to improve alert and warning capabilities.

The State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) is the State's coordination center for response and initial recovery actions for disasters or multi-county events, and for coordinating National Guard support to State agencies and counties after all other avenues have been exhausted. In the event of an extremely large or complex event, there is the potential for the resource requirements or length of response actions to exhaust both SEOC and National Guard personnel and resources, or to require resources exceeding the Agency's ability or

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availability. The Agency utilizes multiple, established, and well exercised strategies to mitigate this challenge. FEMA can provide access to Federal resources to assist the State once it has exhausted its resources. In addition, through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC), the State and the National Guard can receive or send state-to-state assistance. Most recently, the Agency utilized these methods during responses to Hurricanes Florence and Irma, and numerous EMAC responses to other states. The State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic did not involve EMAC resources since the entire Nation was impacted simultaneously; however, this could impact the State's ability to acquire resources for the 2021 Hurricane Season.

In response to these areas, the Agency recommends the Legislature take action in three areas:

- Ensure the State Emergency Management Program is adequately funded. There is a potential for additional State fiscal support for emergency management programs in the event there is a decrease in Federal funding. Federal Emergency Management Program Grants (EMPG) currently funds almost 50% of SCEMD's budget. SCEMD passes at least ½ of the EMPG Program grant funds through to county programs through which the counties receive grant allocations ranging from \$56,398 to \$93,503. Reductions could eliminate or reduce county capabilities, restrict travel, exercises and training, and eliminate selected FTEs. Recent major disasters clearly show the need for a strong, robust State and local level emergency management system.
- Be prepared to provide financial assistance to counties and State agencies in the event Federal funding is not
 available. An event whose size or level of damage does not meet the threshold for a Federal declaration has
 the potential to have significant physical and financial impacts on county and local governments, and State
 Agencies' budgets. In addition, indications from FEMA demonstrate that the Federal government is moving
 toward reduced disaster funding and reduced Federal matching for future events. Neither the counties nor
 State agencies are in the position to absorb the increased costs.
- Promote and support county emergency management agencies and State agencies participation in Statelevel drills and exercises in order to exercise communications and decision-making systems, and increase and reinforce familiarity with emergency management systems and processes.

Agency Personnel Strength

As of 30 June 2021, the Agency's State Operations had 507 State employees. In addition, the SC State Guard has 883 volunteer members on its rolls and the Joint Services Detachment has 30 volunteer members.

The South Carolina National Guard (SCNG) was at 102.7% of authorized strength with 10,761 Service Members. The South Carolina Army National Guard (SCARNG) was authorized 9,027 Soldiers with 9,355 assigned (103.6%), and the South Carolina Air National Guard (SCANG) was authorized 1,356 Airmen with 1,312 assigned (97%).

South Carolina Emergency Management Division

SCEMD served as the State Coordinating entity for response and recovery activities while preparing for the next emergency or disaster. Work continues to assist and process eligible reimbursements under the Stafford Act in support of on-going recovery operations from the 2015 Severe Flood, 2016 Hurricane Matthew, 2017 Hurricane Irma, 2018 Hurricane Florence, 2019 Hurricane Dorian, 2020 February Severe Weather and April Tornadoes and the ongoing COVID19 Pandemic.

• COVID-19

On March 13, 2020, the Governor declared a State of Emergency in response to the spread of COVID-19. The SEOC increased readiness level to OPCON 2 and began seven-day-a-week operations. While response support is still ongoing, SEOC operations concluded on 7 June 2021. This incident represents SC's longest activation with a record number of resource requests for logistical support (over 5,700 resource requests). SCEMD provided logistics, information technology, facilities, communications and contracting support to the State for over 15-consecutive months. SCEMD provided PPE, cleaning supplies, equipment and many other materials in support of hospitals, reopening of childcare centers, state elections, employee return-to-work, reopening of schools, and more. Despite international shortages, SCEMD successfully stood up a State PPE stockpile capable of providing a 60-day supply of PPE. SCEMD also leveraged standing contracts for equipment, transportation and response services that made PPE warehousing and distribution possible. The State established a 7-days a week Community Vaccination Center at the Columbia Place Mall, and provided free vaccinations for an 8-week period. SCEMD developed and implemented the State's Medical Surge Plan and Vaccine Distribution Plans, and other important contingency plans. SCEMD's Public Information staff worked from within a Joint Information Center in coordination with SCDHEC and held regular press

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conferences, either virtually or with socially distanced measures in place, to deliver important health information to the media for public dissemination. SCEMD also coordinated with eligible applicants to administer FEMA's Public Assistance program with cost estimates for emergency protective measures currently exceed \$586 Million.

Hurricane Isaias

The State Emergency Response Team responded to Hurricane Isaias on 3 August 2020. This Hurricane tracked along the SC coast and made landfall in NC close to Myrtle Beach. State Emergency Support Functions (ESF) assisted in the SEOC or virtually. Fortunately, no evacuations or emergency sheltering operations were needed.

• Chester County Industrial Fire

In August 2020, a major Industrial fire involving hazardous materials occurred in Chester County. The SEOC, already at OPCON 2 for COVID-19 response actions, coordinated support to the County. Local fire assets, EMS, and Law Enforcement along with 26 fire departments from the Midlands and Upstate responded in support. SCEMD provided on-scene support along with numerous State, Federal and non-profit agencies.

• Additional 2020-2021 SCEMD Highlights:

- Monitored all tropical cyclone activity to include 30 named storms in the Atlantic Basin during the 2020 Hurricane Season, and provided updates to the State Leadership, counties and State Agencies.
- Assisted applicants and processed eligible reimbursements under the Stafford Act in support of on-going recovery operations from the 2015 Severe Flood, 2016 Hurricane Matthew, 2017 Hurricane Irma, 2018 Hurricane Florence, 2019 Hurricane Dorian and 2020 February Severe weather, April Tornadoes and the COVID Pandemic. Since 2014, SCEMD has processed over \$1.6 Billion in eligible claims and over \$200 Million in Hazard Mitigation Grant actions.
- Coordinated with the SC Department of Administration on use of Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) funding for costs not covered by FEMA's PA program, maximizing Federal assistance programs in support of local governments and other eligible applicants.
- Conducted planning workshops with Federal, State, local, tribal, and non-governmental agencies to enhance planning and support for the SC Emergency Operations Plan, and updated 11 other comprehensive plans.
- Along with partner State agencies, affected counties and the State Emergency Response Teams (SERT)
 coordinated and conducted FEMA evaluated Radiological Emergency Preparedness exercises with
 Oconee Nuclear Station, Catawba Nuclear Station and Vogtle Electric Generating Plants.
- Due to impact of COVID-19, SCEMD was only able to coordinate and present 43 training events for more than 1,059 personnel, and developed, coordinated and/or participated in 65 exercises involving more than 1,145 participants.
- With the move to teleworking and offsite working conditions, SCEMD adapted new procedures and new technologies to continue the COVID-19 response. Old teleconference platforms were replaced by video conferences and webinars.
- Coordinated the State's participation in the SC Earthquake Awareness Week and the "Great Southeast Shakeout" exercise which included 268,113 registered participants and an aggressive social media campaign focused on earthquake awareness.

State and Agency Response to Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) Requests During FY 2002-2021, the State did not provide assistance to other states through the EMAC system.

Construction and Facilities Management

The Construction and Facilities Maintenance Office (CFMO) oversees 3.5 million square feet of buildings, over 16,000 acres of training land, and a fully manned, equipped and functional fire department at McCrady Training Center, with a combined State and Federal budget of over \$30 Million. During FY 2020-21, the CFMO awarded renovation contracts for the Sumter and Easley Readiness Centers. The shared State and Federal investment of over \$6.2 Million will ensure these two facilities meet modern codes and address the requirements of the SCARNG units for future years. The CFMO continues to implement the plan of adding full female latrines and showers to existing Readiness Centers to meet the requirements of an increasing number of female Soldiers in

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the SCNG ranks. Female latrine additions at the Rock Hill and Saluda Readiness Centers were completed with investment of \$688,000 of shared State and Federal funds. The design for the Newberry Readiness Center female latrine addition was completed, and a construction contract was awarded at a shared cost of \$187,951. Contracts for designs for the Kingstree, West Columbia, and Walterboro Readiness Center female latrine additions were awarded, with projected construction contracts to be awarded in 2022. To address numerous roof leaks at the Columbia Readiness Center, the CFMO contracted the design and full roof replacement with an investment of \$968,000 of shared State and Federal funds.

The CFMO continues to utilize Builder to assess facilities to identify and project maintenance needs. The Agency completed the Installation Energy and Water Plan to identify priorities for energy projects. The plan will prioritize sustainability projects for Federal funds which will benefit the Agency in potential cost savings and resiliency in energy and water needs. In addition, the CFMO has contracted for the designs of backup generators at the Georgetown and Marion Readiness Centers, and a solar generation bank at McCrady Training Center.

The CFMO is preparing for the construction of new Readiness Centers on Joint Base Charleston and in Aiken County. Construction of the Joint Base Charleston Readiness Center in slated to begin in 2022, and the design for the Aiken Readiness Center in 2023. The Aiken Readiness Center will be co-located with USC-Aiken.

The Agency's efforts resulted in more efficient and sustainable facility operations, and enabled the Agency to provide necessary services to Soldiers and their Families while also supporting the local civilian community. The SCARNG has a physical presence in 40 of the State's 46 counties thereby maintaining its traditional community-based force where feasible and fiscally responsible. These locations include 63 Readiness Centers, 9 Field Maintenance Shops, 2 Army Aviation Support Facilities, a Combined Support Maintenance Shop, a Unit Training Equipment Site, a Major Training Center (McCrady) with one sub-training site (Clarks Hill), one Close-In Training Area at the Savannah River Site, the SCNG Headquarters Complex, and the Olympia Armory.

Service Member and Family Care (SMFC)

SMFC's mission is to posture, promote, and provide regionally accessible programs that support Comprehensive Fitness Dimensions and Employment to reduce stressors for Service Members, Veterans and their families, enabling them to thrive personally and professionally.

Employment Services Program

Since October 2011, the Employment Services Program has trained, connected with employers, and supported the State's Service Members and their families. Through case management and strategic outreach, the Employment Services Program provides resources and direct support to assist in the successful transition into long-term civilian careers for the State's Service Members, Veterans and Military Families.

- Employment Services Resume writing, interview skills, job fairs and hiring events, job search and direct placement services, workforce development, higher education and industry-specific training, connections to other relevant programs and veteran service providers.
- Employer Outreach Job fairs and hiring announcements/events, military-specific training for HR staff and hiring managers, direct referrals based on employer qualifications, opportunities to connect with military job seekers through general HR, and industry-specific training and workshops.
- Operation Palmetto Employment SC's Military Employment Initiative, supported by the Office of the Governor, serves military job seekers and family members from all branches.
- · Outcomes:
 - Placed a total of 523 Service Members, Veterans and family members into new jobs
 - The unemployment rate for SCNG Service Members continues to be less than 2%
 - By networking with over 1,700 business and community partners, successfully reduced the State's veterans' FY 2021unemployment rate to 4.6% which was a reduction of 4.4% from FY 2020

Resilience, Risk Reduction, and Suicide Prevention Program (R3SP)

R3SP integrates, educates and promotes resiliency by synchronizing Soldier, Airman and Family care systems and services in order to posture and promote consistent Resilience, Suicide Prevention, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response, and Substance Abuse Programs for Service Members and their Families, while maintaining a capability to quickly respond to emergent care needs.

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- The Resilience, Risk Reduction (R3) Program had a 95% fill rate for Master Resilience Trainers (MRT) with a fully qualified MRT placed in 57 out of 60 reportable units statewide. The State remains in the top 10 in the nation for MRT fills. This year, 5 Soldiers went to MRT School. R3SP hosted a Resilient Leader Course certifying those Soldiers as Resilience Training Assistants.
- The Suicide Prevention Program (SPP) remains in the top five in the nation for Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training for the 6th year in a row. Since piloting the SC Start Program in FY19, the Start Program is now in its 3rd year as a Pilot for NGB. SC START is an on-line training tool for Service Members, their families, and our community partners in how to start a conversation about suicide prevention and to connect them to resources. As of 2021, the SC National Guard is the only US Military organization employing the full continuum of care for LivingWorks Suicide Prevention training along with the Army's ACE Suicide Prevention efforts. The SPP teamed up with the Substance Abuse Program, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response and Behavioral Health to conduct 900 force focus surveys concentrated on the health and resiliency of SC National Guard's fulltime force. The surveys allowed the Service Members and staff to provide open and honest feedback "directly but indirectly" to the most Agency's Senior Leadership.
- In the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) program credential six new Victim Advocates this year and re-credentialed 14 Victim Advocates. The SAPR program hosted three refresher trainings, which allow the VA to earn the required Continuing Education Units to stay credentialed. In addition, the SAPR Program hosted a Commander's and Senior Leaders training. This training entailed the role of the Commander during a Sexual Assault, the initial first steps, and follow-on care as it pertains to leadership.
- The Substance Abuse Program (SAP) provides case management, risk mitigation, and targeted prevention training for substance use and high-risk areas presented on the Unit Risk Inventories (URI) for each unit. SC's SAP is ranked among the top in the nation for URIs completed and Soldiers trained. In FY 21, The SAP piloted the Army National Guard's Commander's Risk Reduction Toolbox. The SC SAP team successfully case managed over 60 new referrals FY21, to include 44 rehabilitation completions. The SAP now has the ability to conduct substance use assessments in-house utilizing the SASSI Institute at no cost to the Service Member. This allows the SAP to accurately address the specific stressors leading to substance use, make relevant referrals and increase the number of successful completions, which will improve retention and reduce high risk behaviors. The Program was also able to advocate for a Soldier to receive inpatient care through Fort Gordon which opens up an additional resource for Soldiers needing inpatient care.

Behavioral Health Program

The Behavioral Health Program provides counseling, assessment and referrals in supporting the mental health needs of SCNG Service Members, families, and veterans/retirees. Behavior Health Specialists provided assessments, counselling, crises management, and case management for Service Members and their families who were experiencing life stressors or psychological health challenges.

The Behavioral Health Specialists Program reached over 13,102 Service Members, family members and retirees. This total included 4,686 new staff consultations, 5,457 follow up consultations, 2,959 outside referrals, and 5,838 information and referral consultations. Additionally, Behavioral Health Specialists worked 297 counseling/case management (individual service members or family members), 18, 907 outreach efforts, and two Duty-to-Warn cases.

Family Programs

The Family Programs Office currently offers four programs geographically dispersed within the State: Soldier & Family Readiness Specialist (SFRS), Child and Youth (C&Y) Programs, Personal Financial Counselor (PFC) Program, and the Military One Source (MOS) Program. Family Programs Family continued to support Soldiers and Families during deployment cycles including executing socially distanced Homecomings, Holiday Cheer, and the distribution of donated items to all units including BIO Freeze, cookies and masks.

- The SFRS Team provided successful deployment outreach 4,835 contacts. The Team closed 1.267 non-medical cases providing assistance and support and participated in at least 806 community, unit-based events networking with community and military resources, and unit briefings. Additionally, the Team supported all civil disturbance missions, Annual Trainings and deployments.
- The C&Y Program continued to provide support and SC was one of the only states who conducted an inperson event in 2020 with successful execution of the 2020 Teen Youth Retreat at Camp Hannon. The

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Program recently completed 2021 Teen Youth Retreat and is preparing for the 2021SCNG Youth Camp at Camp Bob Cooper.

 The PFC Program provided budget/Financial planning in area of finance to include money management techniques, credit score improvement, retirement & estate planning, savings and investing, student loan/ tuition assistance, consumer awareness, financial planning pre and post deployment for Service Members and Families

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR)

ESGR is a DoD program that develops and promotes supportive work environments for Service Members in the Reserve Components through outreach, recognition, and educational opportunities that increase awareness of applicable laws. It also provides assistance in resolving conflicts between the Service Members and their employers. ESGR works to create a culture in which all State employers value their employee's military service resulting in less stress on Service Members and their families.

Year to date, ESGR volunteers have ESGR volunteers influenced 601 employers and 3,702 Service Members serving in the Reserve Components in SC. 91 Patriot Awards, and 14 "Above and Beyond" Awards and 3 "Pro Patria" Awards were presented to employers. Additionally, 2 SC Employers receive the 2021 Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom Award, which is the highest recognition given by the U.S. Government to employers for their support of their employees who serve in the Guard and Reserve. SC ESGR Ombudsmen mediated 22 formal cases and handled 43 informal USERRA inquiries. Committee members logged 1,971 volunteer hours across the State.

Funeral Honor Team

The SC National Guard Funeral Honors teams conducted 2,847 Honor Guard missions for Military Funerals. Many of these funerals were in support of Service Members from all branches of the Armed Forces and other Service Components were unable to perform ceremonies due to COVID restrictions. During FY 20-21, the SCNG Funeral Honors team turned down no funeral request for any Veteran who deserved such honors.

South Carolina Military Museum

During FY20-21, despite the challenge resulting from COVID-19, the South Carolina Military Museum continued its mission to preserve the legacy of the Palmetto State's military history, build community partnerships, and improve the visitor experience. The Museum continued to enhance its collection of military artifacts through the cultivation of new donors and by maintaining relationships with past donors.

The year began with the Museum staff returning to work on-site following COVID-19 constraints. On 1 October, the Museum opened an exhibition commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the Victory over Japan to end WWII. The exhibition highlighted South Carolina veterans who served in the Pacific as well as stories relating to inclusion in the military. On 6 December, for the third consecutive year, the Museum partnered with the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve and the Blue Knights Motor Cycle Clue (Police) to host the state's largest Toys for Tots charity drive.

Starting in November 2020, the Museum initiated an ambitious facility improvement plan which continued to June 2021. This work included a substantial expansion of the Artillery Hall exhibition space, renovation of a large multipurpose room, installation of updated security and fire alarm systems, and significant upgrades to climate control systems. During this renovation process, the Museum gift shop and Gallery I were closed to the public. A new collaboration was initiated with SCETV in an effort to develop K-12 STEM programming for teachers and students. In April, the Museum returned to normal operating hours and Museum Volunteers were welcomed back to work in May. Museum staff continued to be involved in community events and organizations including Army Heritage Month at ARCENT, the American Legion, and the South Carolina Model Show. Museum staff were featured on the *Our American Stories* program in May.

South Carolina Youth ChalleNGe Academy

The South Carolina Youth ChalleNGe Academy is a community-based, quasi-military structured educational program that operates the Youth Challenge and Job Challenge Programs. The mission of SC Youth ChalleNGe Academy is to empower and prepare youth to develop personal, academic and career success through education, mentoring, and training.

The Youth ChalleNGe Program service youth throughout South Carolina ages 16-18 years old (age 15 only if turning 16 within the cycle). The Program has two cycles per year (January and July) and can currently accept up

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to 150 youth per cycle. During FY 20-21 (during the pandemic), Youth ChalleNGe graduated 86 cadets who earned 64 GEDs. Since its inception in 1998, the Program has graduated 4,886 cadets with 1,790 earning their GED.

The Job ChalleNGe Program is a follow-on program for selected Youth ChalleNGe Program graduates to provide hands-on job skills training through college trade courses. The Program normally has two cycles per year (January and July) but added a trial third cycle during the summer to provide an additional opportunity for graduated cadets. Job ChalleNGe currently partners with Midlands Technical College and is building additional partnerships under a DoD/NGB grant. Despite the challenges of COVID-19, during FY 20-21, the Program graduated 32 cadets. Since its inception in January 2016, 11 classes and 247 graduates have completed the Program.

STARBASE Swamp Fox

STARBASE Swamp Fox, located at McEntire Joint National Guard Base in Eastover, SC, is a Department of Defense (DoD)-sponsored Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) program for 5th grade students. Designed to augment, enhance and reinforce a number of the State's educational math and science standards, the program uses a child-friendly, hands-on/minds-on approach, and serves as a catalyst for encouraging students in STEM subjects and future career options. Its mission attempts to raise the interest and improve the knowledge and skills of students (focusing on at-risk youth) by exposing them to an exciting, dynamic, technological environment and the positive role models found in the SC Army and Air National Guard. In school year 2020-2021, the Program experienced numerous challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The DoD issued a waiver which allowed the program to be taught on the campuses of the participating schools instead of the standard mandated attendance at McEntire Joint National Guard Base. In spite of the multiple instruction platforms that students endured this past school year, STARBASE Swamp Fox provided in-person instruction with 1,078 students at 16 schools from 8 school districts. STARBASE is 100% federally funded and since its inception in 2003, it has provided STEM enrichment educational classes for 16,601 SC elementary level students.

South Carolina Army National Guard

The SCARNG's mission is to generate mission ready units able to fulfill both its Federal and State missions; specifically its three main competencies are emergency preparedness/homeland defense, quality Soldier and Family support systems, and innovative technological application. The SCARNG's goal is to ensure relevance through the adaptation of its force structure to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

Approximately 5% of the SCARNG deployed worldwide in five different countries to include Kuwait, Egypt, Jordan, Germany and Colombia. The SCARNG was also involved in various Continental United States (CONUS)-based missions such as civil disturbance support in the State and National Capital Region, and operations on the South West Border. The 263rd Army Air and Missile Defense Command and 678th Air Defense Artillery Brigade continued to support the National Capital Region.

The SCARNG continued COVID-19 response operations, with over 650 Service Members mobilized to support this response. Guardsmen assisted Agency partners in all 46 counties in providing testing site support for over 314,000 residents, conducted inmate medical screenings at 20 South Carolina Department of Corrections (SCDC) institutions, and prepared over 2000,000 inmate meals at four SCDC institutions. Guardsmen transported and distributed PPE to all counties, assisted 15 food banks statewide in distributing groceries and household products, supported DHEC with administrative assistance, and sanitized over 60 facilities.

The SCARNG assisted seven hospitals, six long-term care facilities and three alternate care sites with patient screening, treatment and administrative support. Service Members administered COVID-19 vaccines to 4,346 active Guardsmen, Retirees and dependents, and 116,283 vaccines to civilians at COVID-19 vaccination sites across the State. This support included mass vaccination sites at Darlington Raceway, Myrtle Beach, Gamecock Park in Columbia, and a Federal CVC Site in Columbia. Other tasks performed by Guardsmen included PPE decontamination support, traffic control support, temporary hospital design and construction, school lunch support, school bus transportation and vaccine storage.

In January 2021, the SCARNG deployed 671 Soldiers to Washington, DC in support the Presidential Inauguration. This marked the second deployment of the SCARNG to the National Capitol Region, as the State sent over 400 Guardsmen in response to civil unrest in June 2020. In January 2021, the SCARNG deployed 150 Soldiers on State Active Duty (SAD), along with Airmen, to support local authorities during a civil disturbance in

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Columbia and Charleston. Four months later, in May 2021, the SCARNG again deployed 110 Soldiers to support local authorities during a potential civil disturbance in Charleston.

The SCNG Governor's Counterdrug Task Force provided support to local, State and Federal law enforcement agencies during the past year. Case support analysts assisted in the seizure of \$22,440,029.48 in drugs, \$2,599,466.00 in currency and 106 firearms, resulting in 330 arrests by law enforcement. Drug Demand Reduction Outreach (DDRO) supported 23 events totaling 36.5 hours. The Counterdrug Task Force provided training support to 79 Law Enforcement Agencies (LEA), saving those agencies approximately \$50,000.00.

The SCARNG continues to work closely with the SC Forestry Commission to increase capability and capacity for conducting Aerial Wildfire Fighting operations. In May 2021, Aviation elements of the SCARNG and the SC Forestry Commission conducted a multi-day aerial firefighting exercise to ensure South Carolina is prepared in the event of a forest fire within the borders of South Carolina.

The 43rd Civil Support Team (CST) provides Defense Support to Civil Authorities (DSCA) support in the event of an incident involving or potentially involving Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) and Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear assistance to Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies throughout the State. The 43rd CST provided Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE) support to local, State and Federal agencies in the form of 40 response missions encompassing 2,831 hazard sweeps, 38 planned missions and 2 WMD responses.

The South Carolina Helicopter Aquatic Rescue Team (SC HART) operates as a collaborative effort between the State Urban Search and Rescue Task Force (SC-TF1), SCEMD and SCARNG aviation units based at McEntire JNGB. Its capabilities include land and water-based hoist operations with military aircrews and civilian rescue technicians. SC-HART responds to requests for helicopter rescue capabilities on a nationwide basis. SC-HART trained to respond to swift water, open water, confined area, urban structure and mountain condition search and rescue for both ambulatory and non-ambulatory emergencies. During FY 20-21, SC HART joined with the SC Forestry Commission to conduct a multi-day aerial firefighting exercise to ensure South Carolina is prepared in the event of a forest fire within the borders of the State. On 3 July 2020, SC HART performed an aerial extraction of an injured hiker near Table Rock Park in Pickens County.

South Carolina Air National Guard

The 169th Fighter Wing operates from the 2,400+ acre McEntire Joint National Guard Base (JNGB) in Eastover which has been the home of the SCANG since its founding in 1946. From July 2020 to June 2021, the SCANG honed its warfighting skills in support of Combatant Commanders by deploying 12 F-16s and approximately 360 Airmen to Southwest Asia. Additionally, the 169th Fighter Wing supported the USAF's premier warfighting exercise Red Flag in early February. The Wing continues to support our State Partner, the Republic of Colombia, with interactions in Colombia and supporting operations in the U.S. During the past year the Wing deployed members to South America, the Pacific theater, and Europe.

In support of its State mission, McEntire JNGB and the 169th Fighter Wing played a critical role in the response to the COVID-19 emergency. McEntire was a logistical hub for the reception, sorting and delivery of emergency medical supplies throughout the State. Medical Airmen deployed to prisons, hospitals and testing sites throughout the state to assist the citizens of South Carolina. SCANG medical personnel trained with counterparts from across the country during a health exercise in Missouri.

The 169th Fighter Wing is the U.S. Air Force's premier fighter wing and provides Combatant Commanders with world-class combat capability to meet the nation's needs for contingency and general war requirements. The Wing's Federal mission is accomplished by employing conventional munitions in the Destruction/Suppression of Enemy Air Defenses (DEAD/SEAD). The 169th Fighter Wing provides continual support of the Aerospace Control Alert Mission, defending east coast air space in support of North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD). Additionally, the Wing provides the Governor with defense assistance to the State's homeland security office, and disaster preparation and response support for DSCA activities.

South Carolina State Guard

Under MG McCarty's leadership, the SC State Guard provided assets in support to civil authorities during FY 2020-2021. These assets included general support personnel, land/water search and rescue (SAR), law enforcement support, medical support, civil engineering teams, chaplain support, and judge advocate general (JAG) support. The SCSG provided additional personnel to support the South Carolina Joint Operations Center

in coordinating and tracking COVID 19 response missions. SCSG personnel set up tents, provided traffic control at local COVID-19 testing sites, and distributed food & water in support of six COVID-19 missions in Berkeley, Charleston, Horry, and Richland Counties. SCSG JAGs provided a free-wills clinic for South Carolina National Guardsmen and First Responders. The SCSG Honors Unit conducted 19 Honor Guard missions for military funerals and five Honor Guard missions for Veterans' events.


Cyber Initiatives

The SCARNG leveraged its cybersecurity capabilities through multiple state and federal cybersecurity initiatives. Through collaborative training and exercises, the SCARNG built relationships, trust and synergies in improving cybersecurity practices and resiliency across South Carolina and with supporting agencies. SCARNG cyber teams provided direct support to two cyber incidents within the State, and support to seven State/local government offices and one military installation.

- The SCARNG partnered with the U.S. Army Cyber Institute at West Point, SC Ports Authority and City of Charleston as part of exercise Jack Voltaic 3.0 (JV3.0). JV3.0 fosters collaboration between DoD, Federal, State, local governments and corporate partners to better understand dependencies and interdependencies of a wide-spread cyber-attack in a large urban area in order to build a repeatable cyber security framework. In addition, JV3.0 exercises the authorities and capabilities of deploying the National Guard to defend the Nation by leveraging military cyber capabilities in domestic response to cyber incidents. As an extension of JV3.0, the SCARNG participated in the exercise Jack Pandemus which explored a scenario based on disruptions to gas pipelines, electrical power generation and healthcare delivery caused by cyber incidents, and measured incident response during ongoing pandemic response.
- The SCARNG participated in the planning and will participate in the DHS-hosted SC Elections Table Top Exercise. Additionally the SCARNG is ready to support cyber incident response actions as required.
- The SCARNG partnered with new organizations to assist in the development of future projects. Due to Active
 Duty Cyber Protection Teams being deployed, the SCARNG advised the 3rd Infantry Division's key
 leadership on methods to incorporate cybersecurity planning and scenarios within larger exercises. The
 SCARNG also provided requirements input for a Department of Energy Electronic Warfare Range for use
 during joint exercises between Federal and State Agencies.

State Partnership Program between the Republic of Colombia and South Carolina

Under MG McCarty's leadership, the SPP provided a unique opportunity for South Carolinians to collaborate with, learn from, and mentor partners from the Republic of Colombia. Since 2012, SPP has offered numerous opportunities for SCNG members to work together with Colombian Service Members to strengthen a wide array of processes, systems, techniques, tactics and procedures. Despite COVID and extended periods of Colombian unrest, SPP executed a dozen security cooperation engagements over the past year, including the historic embed of a Colombian Army platoon with 1-118 Infantry for its Joint Readiness Training Center rotation. The SPP consistently yields significant returns on investment from a readiness standpoint and continuously deepens relationships with the Columbian Military.
