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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Values

- We believe in a climate built on trust, integrity and selfless service; therefore, we will empower agile and adaptive leaders to create a transparent environment of dignity and respect through the fostering of cohesive teams, shared understanding and bold action.
- We believe we have a sacred obligation to uphold the reputation of those who came before us, therefore, we will build a culture that embodies the ideals of our military service and the values of our South Carolina roots to deploy, defend, and serve those who are unwilling or unable.
- We believe innovation and partnerships are key to building agile and adaptive forces, therefore, we will encourage and empower all levels of our workforce to improve the processes entrusted to them.

Goals

The guiding principles of the S.C. Military Department are to promote a cohesive, disciplined and resilient organizational culture, where our people are trained, knowledgeable, and mentor each other in a positive, supportive environment; maintain trained and ready forces for the defense of our country and emergency support of our communities by investing in innovative individual and collective training opportunities and world-class facilities; and strengthen and leverage current relationships while identifying opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships to maximize future competitiveness. The Agency continued to meet these objectives in FY 24-25, both in terms of overall-mission readiness and service to the citizens of South Carolina. The Agency also continued working toward the achievement of the organization's strategic goals:

1. Promote a cohesive, disciplined, and resilient organizational culture, where our people are trained, knowledgeable, and mentor each other in a positive, supportive environment.
2. Maintain trained and ready forces for the defense of our country and emergency support of our communities by investing in innovative individual and collective training opportunities and world-class facilities.
3. Strengthen and leverage current relationships while identifying opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships to maximize future competitiveness.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

The most significant negative impacts on the State of South Carolina and the public would occur if the Office of the Adjutant General failed in its responsibilities for the provision of emergency coordination and support. The main concerns are the ability to execute early or timely alerts and warnings, and the risk of complex disasters either exceeding or exhausting the Agency's and State's resources or capabilities.

In the area of alerts and warnings, the Agency is dependent upon State and Federal agencies, counties, and external organizations to provide timely information and alerts to the State for dissemination and decision-making. Short/no-notice events (e.g., earthquakes, train wrecks, chemical spills, etc.) could initially result in a slower, less coordinated response. In addition, delays or reluctance in decision-making at the local, county, State or Federal levels would negatively impact the Agency's (and State's) ability to provide timely, effective response and support. The Agency continues to mitigate this by utilizing multiple strategies to include State-level exercises and drills incorporating exercising alert and warning systems, as well as incorporating county and State agencies and leadership into the decision-making aspects of the exercises. The SC Emergency Management Division (SCEMD) continues to exercise and validate their communications and alert and warning systems with the counties, State and Federal agencies. SCEMD continues to expand the use of the SC Emergency Manager Mobile App and established social media channels to message, inform, and provide the public with the latest emergency information and to assist in their emergency preparations. Additionally, after action improvements following each disaster declaration enable the Agency (and State) to improve alert and warning capabilities.

The State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) is the State's coordination center for response and initial recovery actions for disasters or multi-county events, and for coordinating National Guard support after all other avenues have been exhausted. In the event of an extremely large or complex event, there is the potential for resource requirements or length of response actions to exhaust both SEOC and National Guard personnel and resources, or to require resources exceeding the Agency's ability or availability. The Agency utilizes multiple, established, and well exercised strategies to mitigate this challenge. The Federal Emergency Management

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Agency (FEMA) can provide access to Federal resources once the State has exhausted its resources. In addition, through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC), the States can receive or provide state-to-state assistance.

In response to these areas, the Agency recommends the Legislature take action in three areas:

- Ensure the State Emergency Management Program is adequately funded. There is a potential for needing additional State fiscal support for emergency management programs in the event of a decrease in Federal funding. Federal Emergency Management Performance Grants (EMPG) currently fund almost 50% of SCEMD's budget. SCEMD passes at least ½ of the EMPG Program grant funds ranging from \$53,307 to \$104,740 annually to counties as grant allocations. Unfortunately, FEMA reduced grant funding by nearly 10% in 2024 which reduced available funding by \$563,100. These reductions will likely weaken the ability of SCEMD and counties to respond effectively, limit operational mobility, and scale back critical preparedness efforts such as training, exercises and public awareness initiatives. Recent disasters have underscored the importance of maintaining a strong and resilient State and local emergency management system.
- Be prepared to provide financial assistance to counties and State agencies. Events which do not meet the threshold for a Federal declaration have the potential to result in significant physical and financial impacts on county and local governments', and State Agencies' budgets. Furthermore, FEMA has indicated that the Federal government is moving toward reducing disaster funding and Federal matching for future events. Neither the counties nor State agencies are positioned to absorb the increased costs.
- Promote and support county emergency management agency and State agency participation in State-level drills and exercises in order to exercise communications and decision-making systems, and increase and reinforce familiarity with emergency management systems and processes.

Agency Personnel Strength

As of 30 June 2025, the Agency employed 464 State employees. The SC National Guard (SCNG) was at 102.0% of authorized strength with 10,807 Service Members of which the SC Army National Guard (SCARNG) was authorized 9,234 Soldiers with 9,439 assigned (102.2%), and the SC Air National Guard (SCANG) was authorized 1,357 Airmen with 1,368 assigned (100.8%). In addition, the SC State Guard had 346 volunteer members.

South Carolina Emergency Management Division

SCEMD served as the State Coordinating entity for response and recovery activities while preparing for the next emergency or disaster. Work continues to assist and process eligible reimbursements under the Stafford Act in support of on-going recovery operations from the 2015 Historic Flood, 2016 Hurricane Matthew, 2017 Hurricane Irma, 2018 Hurricane Florence, 2019 Hurricane Dorian, the 2020 February Severe Weather and April Tornadoes, 2020–2021 COVID-19 Pandemic, 2022 Hurricane Ian, 2023 Tropical Storm Idalia, 2024 Tropical Storm Debby and Hurricane Helene, 2024 Edisto River Flooding, and the 2025 Covington Drive and Table Rock Wildfires.

• Tropical Storm/Hurricane Response

In 2024, the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) responded to one tropical storm and one hurricane.

Tropical Storm Debby - On July 30, 2024, SCEMD began monitoring the tropical disturbance that would eventually become Tropical Storm (TS) Debby. On August 2, SCEMD began providing detailed analysis to county and SERT partners. On August 3, the system was upgraded to Tropical Depression 4 before becoming TS Debby later that evening. On August 4, county and State Agencies began coordinating their efforts throughout the State, the Governor declared a State of Emergency, and the SEOC was activated to Operating Condition 2 (OPCON 2). TS Debby impacted the State beginning August 5 with strong winds and heavy rains causing damage to more than 230 homes in three counties. Damage assessments resulted in a Federal Disaster Declaration for Public Assistance (PA) for 14 counties and a Small Business Administration (SBA) declaration for low-interest loans to survivors and businesses in two counties.

Hurricane Helene - Helene became a tropical storm on September 24, 2024. The Governor declared a State of Emergency on September 25, and the SEOC was elevated to OPCON 1 the following day. When Helene moved into South Carolina as a tropical storm on September 26, it caused widespread impacts including 21 confirmed tornadoes, flooding, downed trees and major road closures. At its peak, there were over 1.4 million power outages and 912 state roads were closed. The Hurricane caused 49

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deaths, destroyed 381 homes, and damaged nearly 5,000 homes across 29 counties. The State received an expedited Disaster Declaration which was eventually expanded to provide Federal Survivor Assistance in 28 counties and the Catawba Nation, and public sector response, debris and infrastructure repair reimbursements in 34 counties and the Catawba Nation. SCEMD supported Disaster Recovery Center operations and coordinated with FEMA, the SBA and other Federal partners to implement recovery programs. SCEMD supported activities of the State Recover Task force and guided development of a Hurricane Helene Post-Disaster Housing Strategy and a Hurricane Helene Recovery Support Strategy.

- **Edisto River Flooding**

In early November 2024, rainfall in Orangeburg County resulted in severe flooding and damage. Over 12-15 inches of rain in 12 hours led to the Edisto River cresting at a historic 15.34 feet, causing flash flooding, overtopping or failure of 10 dams and the closure of 167 roads. Major routes, including U.S. Highway 178, suffered significant damage, with 56 roads still impassable in early December. The floods resulted in two deaths, damaged 53 homes and impacted 20 commercial properties. Infrastructure was heavily affected, including water main breaks, roads, and flooding of the Edisto Memorial Gardens. The Governor declared a State of Emergency and later secured Federal aid for public infrastructure, though assistance for individuals was limited to low-interest loans.

- **Wildfires**

Two major wildfires impacted the State in March of 2025, the Covington Drive Fire in Horry County and the Table Rock Complex Fire in Pickens and Greenville Counties. The Covington Drive Fire burned over 2,000 acres and prompted evacuations in the Carolina Forest community. The State requested and received EMAC aviation support from Georgia to augment the SC National Guard aviation efforts fighting the fire in Horry County. The SC Forestry Commission declared the fire as controlled on June 4, making it the longest wildfire on record in the State at 95 days. Meanwhile, the Table Rock Complex, consisting of the Table Rock and Persimmon Ridge fires, consumed more than 15,000 acres near Table Rock State Park and eventually spread into North Carolina. Both fires were fueled by dry weather, low humidity and strong winds, creating dangerous conditions that led to statewide burn bans. The Table Rock Complex fire was the costliest for firefighting resources in State history. Each fire was awarded a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA to reimburse eligible response costs.

- **COVID-19**

SCEMD continued to coordinate with eligible applicants to administer FEMA's PA program with cost estimates for emergency protective measures at \$917 million. SCEMD Recovery staff coordinated with subrecipients and FEMA to close approximately 200 COVID-19 PA projects in 2025 in advance of a FEMA closeout deadline for the majority of non-hospital projects. Work continues on obligation, reimbursement, and closeout of remaining PA projects under the grant for COVID-19.

- **Additional 2024-2025 SCEMD Highlights**

- Monitored tropical cyclone activity to include 18 named storms in the Atlantic Basin during the 2024 Hurricane Season, and provided updates to the State Leadership, counties and State Agencies.
- SCEMD coordinated with counties, Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD), and partners to support recovery efforts from several hazard incidents that caused localized damage but did not meet the criteria for a Federal Disaster Declaration under the Stafford Act, including a January 2024 tornado in Bamberg and an April 2024 severe hail and windstorm in Rock Hill. These events resulted in SBA declarations to provide low-interest loans to residents and businesses with damage.
- Tropical Storm Debby, Hurricane Helene, and the November Edisto River flooding received Federal Disaster Declarations. SCEMD had staff working out of a Joint Field Office (JFO) with FEMA to implement recovery assistance programs from November 2024 into fall 2025. Recovery costs for Hurricane Helene were higher than those for disasters in South Carolina since Hurricane Hugo.
- Since 2014, SCEMD has processed \$1.6B in eligible PA reimbursements and almost \$64M in pre- and post-disaster Hazard Mitigation Grant Projects. In the past year, SCEMD's Mitigation staff worked with State and local agencies to receive Federal grants awards for 24 Hazard Mitigation Projects across multiple grants totaling \$15.3M in Federal share. Mitigation staff worked with eligible entities toward submitting Mitigation Grant applications for funds available because of the 2024 Federally declared events. PA staff worked with eligible State and local agencies and non-profit

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organizations to receive new FEMA obligations of \$68.8M in Federal share for 228 PA projects (for disasters from the 2015 Flood through the November 2024 Edisto Flood).

- Mitigation team members supported development and Federal approval of two county/local Hazard Mitigation Plans, which led to a brief period of all 46 counties having approved local Hazard Mitigation Plans (plans expire on a rolling five-year basis).
- SCEMD continued to implement the SC Safeguarding Tomorrow Revolving Loan Fund (SCSTRLF), which was primarily funded through a Federal capitalization grant. The SCSTRLF will provide low-interest loans to local governments to support Hazard Mitigation Projects or to cover the non-Federal cost share for mitigation projects funded through other Federal grant programs.
- Conducted planning workshops with State, local, Federal tribal and non-governmental agencies to enhance planning and support for the SC Emergency Operations Plan and updated 10 other comprehensive plans and annexes.
- Along with partner State Agencies, affected counties and the SERT, coordinated and conducted FEMA evaluated Radiological Emergency Preparedness (REP) exercises with V.C. Summer Nuclear Station and Robinson Nuclear Plant with more than 200 participants. The SC Operational Radiological Emergency Response Plan (SCORERP) was reviewed and updated as well as all 12 REP county plans.
- Coordinated and presented 280 training events for more than 6,200 personnel. Developed, coordinated, and/or participated in 60 exercises involving more than 3,800 participants.
- Coordinated SC's participation in Earthquake Awareness Week and the "Great Southeast Shakeout," reaching over 326,000 participants and driving a strong social media campaign to promote earthquake preparedness.

State and Agency Response to Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) Requests

During FY24-25, the State of South Carolina provided support to two other states through a total of 12 EMAC missions in support of three events.

- Florida, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 20, 2024, the SC Department of Transportation (SCDOT) deployed a total of 94 personnel to Florida in support of debris movement and management. SCDOT personnel completed their mission and re-deployed to SC on October 27, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On September 29, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed and maintained on standby status 8 personnel and 2 CH-47 helicopters to North Carolina in support of response operations. SCNG personnel and equipment completed their mission on November 15, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On September 29, 2024, the SC National Guard and SC Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation deployed 32 personnel and 2 UH-72 helicopters to North Carolina in support of search and rescue operations. SCNG personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on October 12, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 2, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed 12 personnel and 1 UH-60 helicopter to North Carolina for general support of response operations. SCNG personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on October 16, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 6, 2024, the SC Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation (LLR) deployed a 45 personnel, Urban Search and Rescue team to North Carolina to support search and rescue operations. LLR personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on October 18, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 6, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed 8 personnel and equipment to North Carolina for Air Traffic Control support. SCNG personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on October 14, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 6, 2024, York County deployed one communications technician to North Carolina to support response operations. York County's technician completed the mission and returned to SC on October 12, 2024.
- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 9, 2024, the SC Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) deployed a 2-person dive team to North Carolina in support of recovery operations. SCDNR personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on October 11, 2024.

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- North Carolina, Tropical Storm Helene – On October 14, 2024, the SC Department of Mental Health (SCDMH) deployed 8 personnel to North Carolina to support behavioral health challenges during ongoing response and recovery operations. SCDMH personnel and equipment completed their mission and returned to SC on November 12, 2024.
- Florida, Hurricane Milton – On October 9, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed a total of 61 personnel and equipment to Florida in support of Command & Control of military operations during response operations. SCNG personnel completed their mission and re-deployed to the State on October 18, 2024.
- Florida, Hurricane Milton – On October 8, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed a Transportation company to Florida in support of logistics during response operations. SCNG personnel completed their mission and re-deployed to SC on October 17, 2024.
- Florida, Hurricane Milton – On October 10, 2024, the SC National Guard deployed a total of 9 personnel and one UH-60 Helicopter to Florida in support of search and rescue operations. SCNG personnel completed their mission and re-deployed to SC on October 11, 2024.

Additionally, SCEMD coordinated 32 EMAC missions from other states to support SC during disaster responses in FY25.

Construction and Facilities Management

The Construction and Facilities Maintenance Office (CFMO) manages 3.5M square feet of buildings, over 16,000 acres of training land, and the McCrady Training Center fire department, with a combined State and Federal budget of over \$120M for operations and major Military Construction (MILCON).

During FY 2024-2025, the CFMO awarded \$13M in construction contracts for renovations to the Wellford and Hartsville Readiness Centers. Designs were awarded for renovations to the Clemson and Seneca Readiness Centers at a cost of \$1.7M with projected construction in FY 26. Additionally, pre-design contracts were awarded for renovations to the Orangeburg and Manning Readiness Centers. The CFMO continues to add female restrooms and showers to existing Readiness Centers to meet the requirements of the SCARNG. The Agency completed female restroom additions at Eastover, Marion, and Varnville Readiness Centers at a shared State and Federal cost of \$1.2M. Design contracts were awarded to continue the addition of female restrooms at Georgetown and Mullins Readiness Centers at a shared cost of \$80K. The replacement of World War II era barracks continued at Clarks Hill and McCrady Training Centers using Federal funds. During the Fiscal Year, two barracks were completed and the design of an additional three were started at a cost of \$5M. The renovation to the Olympia Armory (State Guard) was completed using State funding at a cost of \$4M. The CFMO's efforts resulted in more efficient and sustainable facility operations and enabled the Agency to provide necessary services to Soldiers and their families, while also supporting the local community.

The CFMO began construction of a new Readiness Center on the USC-Aiken campus. This \$20M project broke ground during the FY and has an estimated completion date in FY27. Additionally, the CFMO has solicited bids for the Multi-Purpose Machine Gun Range located on Ft. Jackson for construction in Federal FY26

The CFMO utilizes the National Guard Bureau's (NGB) "Builder" program to assess facilities, identify and project maintenance needs, and prioritize sustainability projects. The CFMO requested Federal Energy funds from NGB to add generator power to coastal and Battalion/Brigade Headquarters facilities. During FY25, the Marion and Beaufort Readiness Centers were completed at a cost of \$650K. The McCrady Fire Station, McCrady water well system, and Varnville Field Maintenance Shop were approved for construction at a cost of \$600K. These projects will increase sustainability of facilities and the level of support provided to Defense Support of Civilian Authorities (DSCA) requirements.

The SCARNG has a physical presence in 40 of the State's 46 counties. These locations include 62 Readiness Centers, 9 Field Maintenance Shops, 2 Army Aviation Support Facilities, a Combined Support Maintenance Shop, a Unit Training Equipment Site, a Major Training Center (McCrady) with one sub-training site (Clarks Hill), one Close-In Training Area at the Savannah River Site, the SCNG Headquarters Complex, and the Olympia Armory.

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Service Member and Family Care (SMFC)

Service Member and Family Care's (SMFC) mission is to posture, promote and provide regionally accessible programs that support Comprehensive Fitness Dimensions and Employment to reduce stressors for Service Members, Veterans and their families, enabling them to thrive personally and professionally.

Employment Services Program

Since October 2011, the Program provided training, connected with employers, and supported the State's Service Members and their families. Through case management and strategic outreach, the Program provides resources and direct support to assist in the successful transition into long-term civilian careers for the State's Service Members, Veterans and Military Families.

- Employment Services - Resume writing, interview skills, job fairs and hiring events, job search and direct placement services, workforce development, higher education and industry-specific training, connections to other relevant programs and veteran service providers.
- Employer Outreach - Job fairs and hiring announcements/events, military-specific training for HR staff and hiring managers, direct referrals based on employer qualifications, opportunities to connect with military job seekers through general HR, and industry-specific training and workshops.
- Operation Palmetto Employment - SC's Military Employment Initiative, supported by the Office of the Governor, serves military job seekers and family members from all branches.
- Outcomes:
 - 479 Service Members, Veterans and family members were placed into new jobs.
 - Conducted 234 briefings to units, supported 263 career fairs, and completed 502 resume reviews.
 - The unemployment rate for SCNG Service Members continues to be less than 2%.
 - By networking with over 1,450 business and community partners, the Program assisted in reducing the unemployment rate of the State's Veteran population by 1.9% in June 2025, ending June 2025 with a 2.6% State unemployment rate for veterans.

Resilience, Risk Reduction, and Suicide Prevention Program

The Resilience, Risk Reduction, and Suicide Prevention Program integrates, educates, and promotes resiliency by synchronizing Soldier, Airman and Family care systems and services to posture and promote consistent Resilience, Suicide Prevention, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response, and Substance Abuse Programs for Service Members and their Families, while maintaining a capability to quickly respond to emergent care needs.

- The Resilience, Risk Reduction Program achieved an 85% fill rate for Master Resiliency Trainer (MRT) positions, significantly enhancing the program's reach and effectiveness across the force. The MRT Coordinator led a successful Level I MRT Refresher Course to ensure that certified trainers remained current on best practices, tools, and techniques in fostering resilience and mental readiness among Soldiers. This effort supported SCARNG's ongoing commitment to holistic Soldier wellness and operational resilience. The Suicide Prevention Program aims to become certified facilitators for LivingWorks safe TALK, offering training to Guard members and the community. They have also certified 74 Suicide Intervention Officers to serve at the unit level through workshops using LivingWorks Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training and Ask, Care, Escort-Suicide Intervention. The SPP has shown a presence in various events across the State, including American Foundation for Suicide Prevention walks and mental health advocacy conferences.
- The Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) Program remained steadfast in its mission to provide comprehensive care and unwavering support to Soldiers. The program continued to adapt to evolving requirements, including the potential reduction and elimination of collateral duty victim advocate roles. In response, the SAPR team proactively credentialed four new Victim Advocates and successfully re-credentialed 27 existing Advocates, ensuring continuity in advocacy and survivor support services. To maintain compliance with DoD requirements and uphold professional standards, the SAPR Program hosted multiple refresher training courses and specialized events to support the completion of required Continuing Education Units. Notably, the SCNG SAPR Office was selected to augment the District of Columbia Army National Guard during the 60th Presidential Inauguration. Three Victim Advocates were deployed to the National Capital Region for two weeks to provide

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critical SAPR support to joint military personnel, exemplifying the professionalism and operational readiness of the program.

- The Army Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) demonstrated commitment to prevention, education, and early intervention. The program successfully executed a comprehensive outreach campaign, delivering over 25 substance abuse prevention briefings across the State, reaching more than 3,000 Soldiers and civilian personnel. ASAP collaborated with unit leadership to increase awareness and reduce stigma surrounding help-seeking behavior. Through partnerships with behavioral health and medical providers, the program streamlined referral pathways and improved access to care for those in need. In alignment with the Army's prevention framework, ASAP also coordinated and hosted quarterly training events focused on suicide prevention trends on substance use, risk mitigation strategies, and commander responsibilities, further enhancing readiness and unit cohesion.

Behavioral Health Program

The Behavioral Health Program provides counseling, assessment and referrals in supporting the mental health needs of SCNG Service Members, families, and veterans/retirees. Behavior Health Specialists provided assessments, counseling, crises management, and case management for Service Members and their families who are experiencing life stressors or psychological health challenges. During the past year, the Behavioral Health Program reached over 1,950 Service Members, family members and retirees. This total included 5,930 clinical consultations, 932 outside referrals, and 12,943 information and referral consultations. Additionally, Behavioral Health Specialists provided 1,128 counseling/case management sessions, made 28,146 outreach efforts and one Duty to Warn cases. The Behavior health Program has also worked with the Chaplain Corp and SLED to develop a responsive and active Peer Support Program for the SCNG.

Family Programs

The Family Programs Office currently offers four programs which include Soldier & Family Readiness Specialist (SFRS), Child and Youth Services (CYS) Programs, Personal Financial Counselor (PFC) Program, and the Military One Source (MOS) Program. The Family Programs team continued to provide resources, referrals, engagement and support and work with Soldiers and Families in various aspects of the deployment cycle. All programs also supported Month of Military Child, Military Spouse Appreciation and Month of Military Family.

- The SFRS Team works with Soldiers and Families to provide Resource and Referral, Deployment Support and help navigate military and civilian systems and resources. FY25 brought a reduction from 14 to 12 SFRS team members; however the Program reorganized and continued uninterrupted support. The Team closed 407 non-medical cases and attended drill weekends, family days, community partner meetings and client visits totaling 576 events. The SFRS Team partnered with 1,205 community and military resources referring Service Members, Families and Veterans to housing, food, TRICARE, legal, employment, scholarships, financial, deployment support and other care services. During FY25, the Soldier Family Readiness Group (SFRG) program saw an increase to 13 new appointed and trained volunteers. During FY25, Statutory and Gratuitous volunteers logged 1,162 hours, an increase of 446 hours FY24. This year 119 command staff were trained to implement, promote, and supervise the unit Soldier Family Readiness Group program over the course of the year. Furthermore, Family Programs planned, coordinated, and directed Military Spouse Appreciation Month, Month of Military Family, Month of the Military Child, Holiday Cheer events, and the TAG retirement and Change of Command ceremonies. The SFRS Team also supported Soldiers, Veterans and Communities during statewide patriotic events, deployment departure and welcome home ceremonies. The SFRS Team conducted dependent outreach supporting 10 deployed units with over 500 Service Members deployed in support of CONUS and OCONUS missions. During Hurricane Helene, the SFRS Teams deployed Family Program services to affected communities.
- The CYS Program celebrated the 31 years of hosting the SC National Guard Youth Camp at Camp Bob Cooper with 126 youth in June 2025. The Program hosted, attended and supported National Guard Month of the Military Child across South Carolina. CYS planned, coordinated, and supervised "Soldier for a Day" for 134 dependents children, a sleepover at the Myrtle Beach's Aquarium "PJ's and Penguins" for 30 children, the "Little Hero's Salute" at Spartanburg, and annual events such as deer and turkey hunts. The Program supported Yellow Ribbon events spreading awareness of resources available to parents and promoting ways to build resiliency and leadership in youth. The

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CYS hosted the Teen Leadership Retreat at Camp Hannon in June serving 36 youth, and participated in the SC Statehouse Month of the Military Child Proclamation with Governor McMaster. Four teens attended the National Teen Symposium in February.

- The PFC Program provided budget/financial planning assistance, including money management techniques, credit score improvement, retirement and estate planning, savings and investing, student loan/tuition assistance, consumer awareness, and pre- and post-deployment financial planning for Service Members and families. Financial counselors conducted 279 counseling sessions, provided 127 information and referral cases, led 34 briefings, and instructed 2 Common Military Training events. The Program, although 5-months-old, had an increasing presence to National Guard units. In addition to supporting the SCNG, the counselors established a community partnership with the Ft. Jackson Army Community Services Office and the Shaw AFB Family Support Center to enhance the reserve component financial counseling program.

Health and Wellness Program

The Health and Wellness (H&W) Program provided no-cost wellness options for Service Members, Retirees, and Family Members. The program focused on Soldiers who failed the Army Combat Fitness Test or the Army Body Composition Program, but also provided fitness programs, nutritional guidance, and overall wellness assistance to any Soldier, Family Member, Veteran or Retiree that inquired about our services.

The H&W program's services included developing individual and unit fitness programs to improve overall health & wellness, mitigate injuries and increase readiness. Under a Lead Coach, seven regionally aligned Health and Wellness Coaches assisted in reducing by 359 the number of flagged Soldiers. Additionally, the Coaches conducted 77 Unit Briefings, 564 Group Training Sessions, and 466 Individual Training Sessions. The Coaches connected with 32 Community Partners and attended 35 Community Meetings.

The Health and Wellness team offered free access to the TrainHeroic App which allowed the coaches to stay virtually connected with Soldiers, Retirees, and Family Members, and provided workouts they could perform on their own. Currently 1,509 clients are enrolled in the Health and Wellness program and maintain connection with them through in-person visits, social media, email, phone calls, texts, and the TrainHeroic App messaging system. The coaches are also connected with the Holistic Health and Fitness (H2F) System which encompasses the five pillars of Physical, Nutrition, Spiritual, Mental and Sleep to improve overall health. The Program resulted in an increase in available Soldiers, more resilient, ready and responsible Service Members, and a higher readiness posture for the SCARNG.

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR)

ESGR is a DoD program that develops and promotes supportive work environments for Service Members in the Reserve Components through outreach, recognition, and educational opportunities that increase awareness of applicable employment laws. The Program aids in resolving conflicts between the Service Members and their employers. ESGR works to create a culture in which all employers value their employee's military service resulting in less stress on Service Members and their families.

ESGR volunteers influenced 2,154 employers and 10,423 Service Members serving in the Reserve Components in SC. 97 Employers were presented with Patriot Awards. Seven employers received "Above and Beyond" Awards, one received 3 "Seven Seals" Awards, four employers received the "Pro Patria" Award, and 172 employers signed Statements of Support. ESGR Ombudsmen mediated five formal cases and handled 17 informal USERRA inquiries. Committee members logged 1,350 volunteer hours.

Military Funeral Honors

From July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025, the SC National Guard Funeral Honors teams conducted 2,187 Military Funerals. These funerals were in support of Service Members from all branches of the Armed Forces and other Service Components.

South Carolina Military Museum

During FY25 the SC Military Museum continued its mission to preserve the legacy of the Palmetto State's military history, build community partnerships, and improve the visitor experience.

The Museum's visitor numbers were just under 14,000 and the K-12 education program reached over 2,500 students. The Museum's new Education Curator developed new programs and streamlined the Museum's educational resources, including digital content, free downloadable lesson plans, and material for the Museum's second year of summer camps. Visits to schools throughout the region continued, as did K-12 field trips, tours

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and homeschool programs which were offered at no cost to teachers and with content that addressed SC curriculum standards. The Museum's internal social media marketing plan saw over 76,500 users reached, and the subscriber rate to the Museum's eNewsletter stands at 1,453 individuals. The Museum's Curator of Exhibits assumed a leadership role with the SC Federation of Museums and was an active part of the revitalization of the organization. Staff members attended relevant regional and national conferences, including the Association of Science and Technology, the Maritime History Symposium at the SC Department of Archives and History, the SC Federation of Museums, and the National Guard Association of South Carolina. In addition, the Museum was awarded a Handumy Jean Tahan Internship through the Southeastern Museums Conference, which funded an 8-week internship during the spring.

The Museum pursued an ambitious exhibition schedule involving original research and a commitment to quality fabrication and relevant interpretive content. Two new, temporary exhibits opened in FY25. "That Others May Live: South Carolina Aquatic Rescue" and "War Songs: South Carolina's Military Music" were featured in Gallery III, the Museum's space for rotating exhibits. The curatorial staff re-conceptualized the World War I, World War II, and Air Power corridors, covering a wide range of topics and featuring specific narratives about SC veterans. A major initiative to develop a multilingual virtual tour started in the spring, and the Museum anticipates launching the application in early FY26. This feature will offer interpretive content in Spanish, German and Mandarin. Phase II of the project will provide access to our visitors with visual impairments.

Two major public programs were held in the spring of 2025. In April, the Museum hosted the War Songs Festival, a music event featuring a wide variety of musicians with a focus on Revolutionary War-era music. The public event was funded in part by grants from the SC Arts Commission and the SC250 Commission. In June, the Museum held an Army Field Day to celebrate the 250th Anniversary of the U.S. Army.

The Museum's "Within the Line of Sight" Lunch & Learn program continued with several notable speakers throughout the fall with a focus on the Civil Rights Movement. This free public program was funded in part by a grant from Humanities South Carolina. In September, the Museum partnered with SCMD's Survivor Outreach Services to host over 30 family members for a Gold Star Mother's and Family's Day Reception. The Museum formed a new partnership with the Experience Columbia Visitor Center to provide marketing content at their physical location in The Vista. A productive year for grant awards, the Museum closed out the FY with the notification of a Richland County H-Tax Grant to fund the placement of billboards in the region during FY26.

The Museum participated in a variety of community-based events, including the Archaeology Society's Fall Field Day (Cayce), Liberty Live! (Camden), Unity Day (SCMD), and events at Historic Columbia, the City of Blythewood, and the SC State Museum. In December 2024, the Museum partnered with the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve and the Blue Knights Law Enforcement Motorcycle Club for the 7th consecutive year to host the State's largest "Toys for Tots" charity drive, with over 800 riders participating in the event. Finally, the Museum begins FY26 with finalized plans in place for a major exterior renovation that will create an improved visitor experience and outdoor space for K-12 lessons, workshops and public engagement.

South Carolina Youth ChalleNGe Academy

The SC Youth ChalleNGe Academy (SCYCA) is a community-based, quasi-military structured educational program that operates the Youth Challenge and Job Challenge Programs. SCYCA's mission is to empower and prepare youth to develop personal, academic and career success through education, mentoring and training.

The Youth ChalleNGe Program serves youths aged 16-18 and offers two cycles annually in January and July, with the capacity to accommodate up to 150 youths per cycle. During the 22-week residential program, cadets complete a minimum of 40 community service hours and receive various recognitions, training, certifications and licenses to include Honor Society, Public Speaking, Servsafe certification. During this past year, the Youth ChalleNGe Program successfully graduated 130 cadets from the program with 58 earning their GED, 26 participating in Credit Recovery and returning to public high school, and 4 who earned a High School diploma. Since its establishment in 1998, the Program has graduated 5,241 cadets, 1,968 of whom earned their GED.

After graduation from the Youth ChalleNGe Program, cadets are offered the opportunity to attend the Job ChalleNGe Program which provides hands-on job skills training through trade courses beginning in January and August each year. The Program partners with Midlands Technical College and Southeastern Esthetics Institute to offer the associates a wide range of job market opportunities from trade skills to college credit hours. During this past Year, the Job ChalleNGe Program graduated 63 associates who earned certifications from Midlands Tech in Welding, HVAC, Information Technology or Medical Administrative Assistance. In addition, two associates

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received their certifications from Southeastern Esthetics Institute. Since its launch in 2016, the Program has graduated 401 associates who have completed college credit hours or skills training.

In early 2025, the National Guard Bureau made the decision to regionalize the offering of the Job Challenge Program, and chose Georgia as the host state for the Southeastern Job Challenge Program. While as of 30 June, the Job Challenge Program will no longer be available at the SC Youth Challenge Academy, graduates of the SC Youth Challenge Program will be offered the opportunity to apply for the Regional Job Challenge Program which will be located at Ft. Stewart, GA.

STARBASE Swamp Fox

Established in 2003, DoD STARBASE Swamp Fox is a unique educational program funded by the Department of Defense (DoD). Its mission is to ignite a passion for learning in youth through immersive experiences in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Design, and Math (STEAM). With hands-on, original instruction delivered by a dedicated DoD STARBASE Swamp Fox team, students engage in cutting-edge STEAM learning using state-of-the-art technology in an innovative environment. The Program is recognized as a model for high-quality educational practices and is in high demand across local schools and districts.

Based at the 169th Fighter Wing of the SC Air National Guard, DoD STARBASE Swamp Fox operates as a single-classroom program offering 5-day, 25-hour standards-aligned STEAM sessions for local schools. This location enhances the learning experience, providing students with real-world exposure to advanced concepts and applications. The program also benefits from strong community and military involvement. Volunteers from the SC Air National Guard and various STEAM-related industries play active roles supporting rocket launches, hosting base tours, serving as guest speakers, and showcasing how STEAM is applied in real-world careers.

In the 2024–2025 school year, DoD STARBASE Swamp Fox served approximately 592 fifth-grade students onsite and reached thousands more through outreach initiatives. The program also offered two separate weeks of summer camp, serving 30 to 50 rising 5th–8th grade students. Looking ahead, DoD STARBASE Swamp Fox is poised to host nearly 1,000 students during the 2025–2026 school year, continuing its mission to prepare and inspire the next generation of STEAM leaders.

South Carolina Army National Guard

The SC Army National Guard (SCARNG) mission is to generate mission-ready units able to fulfill both its Federal and State missions. Specifically, its three main competencies are emergency preparedness/homeland defense, quality Soldier and Family support systems, and innovative technological application. The SCARNG's goal is to ensure relevance through the adaptation of its force structure to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

Approximately 4% of the SCARNG was engaged worldwide, including Poland and Syria. The SCARNG's focus of deployments over the last year centered on supporting United States European Command in Poznan, Poland. The 51st Military Police (MP) Battalion deployed as the Task Force lead with elements from around the United States to support the European Defense Initiative through NATO. Additionally, Battery B, 2-263rd Air Defense Artillery (ADA) Battalion was sent to Syria to provide Air Defense capabilities for the United States Central Command area of operations. B/2-263 ADA was the first Air Defense unit from SC to see combat in recent history. In total, 140 SC Soldiers supported US operations in Poland and Syria.

Additionally, the SCARNG supported ongoing operations at the US's Southwest Border by sending 250 Soldiers from the 132rd MP Company and the 1055th Transportation Company, and provided 39 Soldiers for Air Defense support to the National Capital Region's Operation Vigilant Shield.

The SCARNG was also involved in various Continental US based missions, such as supporting the III Armored Corps WARFIGHTER Exercise at Fort Hood, TX, and the 4th Infantry Divisions WARFIGHTER at Fort Carson, CO. Additionally, SCARNG provided multiple units to support the 34th Infantry Brigade Combat Team's Joint Readiness Training Exercise at Ft. Polk, LA, the 30th Armored Brigade Combat Team's Combat Readiness Exercise at Ft. Stewart, GA, and Observer Controller/Trainer duties at the National Training Center, Ft. Irwin, CA and the Joint Readiness Training Center, Ft. Polk, LA,

On 3 August 2024, the SCARNG activated a Transportation Company for EMAC support to the State of Florida's response to Tropical Storm Debby.

During this same period, on 4 August, the Governor declared a State of Emergency for Tropical Storm Debby and, beginning 5 August, nearly 500 Soldiers were brought on to State Active Duty. These Servicemembers

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conducted response support missions in Berkley, Charleston, Dorchester, Georgetown, Marion and Orangeburg counties.

On 27 September, the SCARNG activated over 1,000 Soldiers to assist with the Hurricane Helene response efforts throughout South Carolina but focusing mostly on the upstate and Midland's areas. Hurricane Helene response efforts include support operations in Aiken, Anderson, Cherokee, Edgefield, Fairfield, Greenville, Greenwood, Laurens, Lexington, Newberry, Oconee, Pickens, Richland, Saluda, Spartanburg, Union and York counties. Florida, Michigan, Mississippi, New York and Virginia provided National Guard EMAC Engineering assets support to SC's efforts.

During this same period, the SCARNG provided four EMAC missions consisting of UH-73, UH-60 and CH-47 Helicopters to assist the State of North Carolina in their response to Hurricane Helene in western North Carolina.

On 8 October, the SCARNG activated approximately 100 Soldiers to respond to an EMAC request to support the State of Florida's Hurricane Milton response. The request included a Transportation Company with High Water Vehicle assets, a UH-60 equipped SC-HART team, and a team from the 263rd ADA to serve as a higher headquarters for the Battalions operating in the area.

On 7 March 2025, the SCARNG activated 9 Soldiers, two UH 60 helicopters and one CH47 helicopter to carry out aerial firefighting missions in support of the State's response to the Covington Road Fire. Mission total included 1,255,900 gallons of water dropped, 1,170 water drop missions conducted, and 145.5 flight hours flown.

On 25 March the SCARNG Guard activated 19 Soldiers, two UH 60 helicopters and one CH47 helicopter to carry out aerial firefighting missions in support of the state's response to Table Rock and Persimmon Ridge Fires. Mission totals included 845,733 gallons of water dropped, 642 water drop missions conducted, and 107.9 flight hours flown.

The 43rd Weapons of Mass Destruction Civil Support Team (WMD-CST) executed a total of 86 Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive (CBRNE) support missions across the State, demonstrating its critical role in interagency cooperation and homeland defense. These missions included high-visibility events such as support for visits by the President and Vice President, Martin Luther King Jr. Day parades, NCAA football games at Clemson University, University of South Carolina and Coastal Carolina University, as well as stadium security sweeps. The team also supported large-scale events including two major country music festivals, the RBC Heritage PGA tournament, NASCAR events and regional marathons. Additional missions included Gate Strike operations at coastal ports, HAMMERHEAD coastal Weapons of Mass Destruction security missions, and Multi-Agency Security Forces Operations. These operations reflect the CST's proactive presence in enhancing public safety and readiness. In addition to these planned missions, the 43rd WMD-CST responded to two unplanned incidents involving unknown hazards both of which were resolved with no reportable findings, further underscoring the team's rapid response capability and commitment to protecting the public from CBRNE threats.

South Carolina Air National Guard

The SC Air National Guard (SCANG) trains and operates out of the 2,400+ acre McEntire Joint National Guard Base (JNGB) in Eastover, SC which has been the home of the SCANG since its founding in 1946.

The 169th Fighter Wing is the SCANG's primary formation. The 169th Fighter Wing is the U.S. Air Force's premier fighter wing and provides Combatant Commanders with world-class combat capability to meet the nation's needs for contingency and general war requirements. The Wing's Federal mission is accomplished by employing conventional munitions in the Destruction/Suppression of Enemy Air Defenses (DEAD/SEAD). The 169th Fighter Wing provides continual support of the Aerospace Control Alert Mission, defending east coast air space in support of North American Aerospace Defense Command. Additionally, the Wing provides the Governor with defense assistance to the State's homeland security office, and disaster preparation and response support for Defense Support to Civilian Authorities (DSCA) activities. The Wing continues to support SC's State Partner, the Republic of Colombia, with interactions in Colombia and supporting operations in the U.S.

This year the Wing operated from McEntire JNGB and supported Operation NOBLE EAGLE. 260 Wing personnel supported Presidential support missions across the United States. In addition, SCANG personnel deployed across the Pacific Theater of operations in support of two multi-national exercises. The Wing also hosted Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps teams from around the State for the "Top Gun" Drill Meet competition which welcomed over 300 cadets to McEntire JNGB.

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The SCANG continues to update and modernize its facilities. The SCANG is currently executing \$68M in construction projects on McEntire JNGB with an additional \$14M in projects in the contracting process. Construction continues on taxiways and ramps around the Base to ensure it meets the criteria for future missions and aircraft such as the F35. Additional construction is taking place for a new simulator building to assist in training to meet emerging threats. Plans for the next 10 years plans include over \$170M in upgrades to McEntire JNGB facilities.

South Carolina State Guard

During FY 2024-2025, the SC State Guard (SCSG) assisted with the response to Hurricane Helene and the Pickens County Wildfires. The SCSG also provided ancillary security assistance for the Cooper River Bridge Run in Mt. Pleasant and Charleston. SCSG held a Leaders Call with leaders from all levels of the organization to include the Adjutant General and Deputy Adjutant General. This meeting was conducted to assist with unity of purpose, organizational direction, and information dissemination. Additionally, the SCSG participated in Wreaths Across America events at the Fort Jackson, Beaufort and Florence National Cemeteries.

Cyber Initiatives

In FY25, significant progress was made across multiple cyber initiatives. Soldiers participated in the Cyber Fortress Exercise in Virginia. Additionally, SCARNG Cyber elements participated in the Southern Lightning/Silent Swarm exercise where they worked with emerging Electromagnetic Spectrum Operations capabilities on Unmanned Systems, assessed system baselines, and facilitated interoperability between various technology initiatives, including exploration of defensive and offensive test plans utilizing obfuscation technology.

Recently a groundbreaking ceremony was held for the Cyber Integration Center at the University of South Carolina-Aiken. SCNG cyber initiatives in the Aiken/Augusta area were included in the Governor's SC Cyber Ecosystem Strategy. Initial planning is underway with the Savannah River National Laboratory for an Industrial Control Systems/Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition training range, and the SCNG is collaborating with SRNL on the Grid Enhanced Cyber Operations project to bolster grid security.

Finally, the SCNG is working with Naval Information Warfare Center Atlantic, the Cyber Center of Excellence, Savannah River Site, and Camp Shelby on the initial build-out of the Eastern Regional Range Complex, a live, virtual, constructive training range.

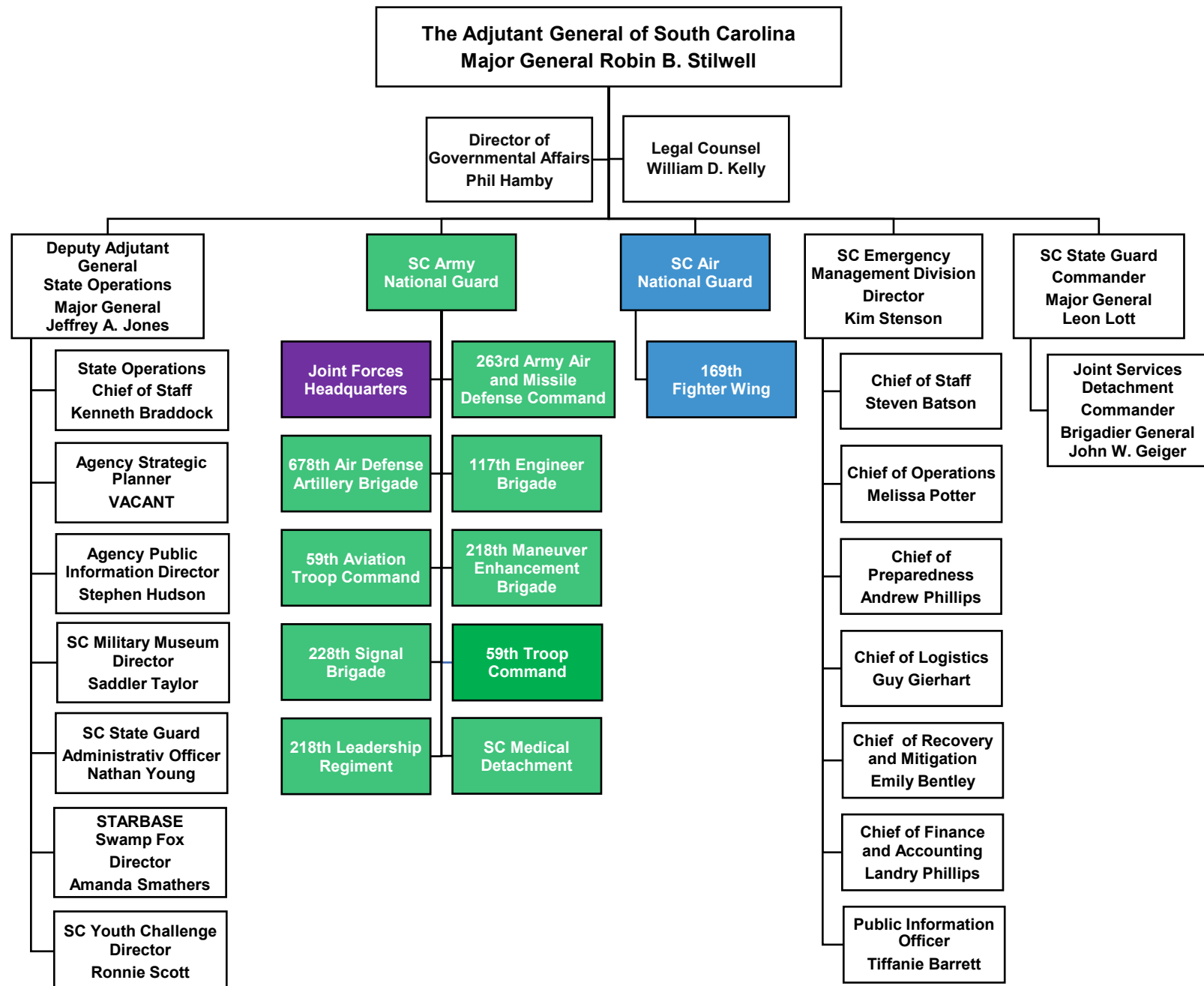
State Partnership Program between the Republic of Colombia and South Carolina

In FY25, the SCNG celebrates the 13th anniversary of its State Partnership Program (SPP) with the Republic of Colombia. The program continues to foster unique opportunities for collaboration, learning, mentorship and integration between South Carolinians and their Colombian counterparts, executing as many as 50 mutually beneficial engagements each year.

Building on and extending its strong foundation, the partnership achieved several significant milestones in FY25. Events included participation in exercises Southern Defender and Relampago de los Andes and Colombia's participation in the SCARNG's Best Warrior Competition. These and dozens more engagements promoted interoperability, continuous learning and camaraderie among our military forces. In-person Subject Matter Expert Exchanges and assessments conducted over the past year focused on critical areas like engineering, ground vehicle and rotary-wing aircraft maintenance, humanitarian assistance and disaster response, explosive ordinance identification and detonation, cyber security and more.

The SPP is a low-cost/high-impact program that consistently delivers meaningful returns on investment, enhancing readiness for both partners and steadily deepening the security cooperation relationship between the SCNG and the Colombian Military.
