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Background

- The state sets academic standards for health education
- These standards are reviewed and adopted on a cyclical schedule every seven years – this is in accordance with other academic areas
- The standards are developed and reviewed by educators from around the state and then subsequently presented to the State Board of Education
- The 2017 South Carolina Academic Standards for Health and Safety Education were Approved on August 8, 2017,

Standards

- The standards provide the scope and sequence for age appropriate comprehensive health education.
- The SC Standards are based on the National Health Education Standards.
- The standards age-appropriately address alcohol, tobacco and other drugs (ATOD) in grades K-12.

Drilling Down


- All curriculum is developed at the local level
- Chapter 32 of Title 59 explicitly designates the role of implementation of the comprehensive health education program to local districts noting topics that shall be covered in K-12

Kindergarten through Second Grade

In grades K-2, students should be able to define and identify the difference between drugs and medicine while being able to demonstrate ways to say no to drugs and to discourage others from using drugs. Students should be able to identify adults in the home, school, and community who can answer questions related to drugs, and they should be able to identify adults from whom they can receive medicine.

Third through Fifth Grade

Students in grades 3-5 should be able to identify ways drugs can harm a person's physical, mental, and social health as well as his or her ability to make decisions. Students at this grade level should understand the importance of refusal skills and be able to describe the harmful effects of drug abuse on an individual, on the individual's friends and family, and on society in general.
