5	(2) a State Superintendent of Education and State Board of
6	Education that engage students in designing policies and programs
7	that improve educational outcomes for all children;
8	(3) an education tailored to students' individual needs which
9	prepares them to be college ready, career ready, and civic ready for
10	life beyond high school. To attain this education, students should:
11	(a) be afforded school districts that are financially stable and
12	academically responsible to the educational needs of all students;
13	(b) be governed by school boards that are focused on serving
14	the educational needs of students by acting ethically and hiring
15	dedicated and qualified superintendents and other district staff;
16	(c) be led by superintendents who recruit and retain excellent
17	principals and who ensure that school faculty and staff receive high

A majority present, 7 8 either in person or by written proxy, of the members of the county legislative delegations from a given circuit shall constitute a quorum 9 10 for the purpose of electing a member, but no person shall may be declared elected who shall fail to receive a majority vote of all the 11 members of the county legislative delegations from the circuit. The 12 joint county legislative delegations of each circuit shall must be 13 organized by the election of a chairman and a secretary and such 14 15 joint legislative delegations shall, subject to the provisions herein, 16 adopt such rules as they deem consider proper to govern the election. Any absentee may vote by written proxy. When the 17 18 election is completed, the chairman and secretary of the joint county 19 legislative delegations of each circuit shall immediately transmit the 20 name of the person elected to the Secretary of State who shall 21 forthwith issue to such person, after he has taken the usual oath of 22 office, a certificate of election as a member of the State Board of 23 Education. The Governor shall thereupon issue a commission to 24 such person and pending such issuance the certificate of election 25 shall must be a sufficient warrant to such person to perform all of 26 the duties and functions of his office.

27 (3) Any vacancy shall <u>must</u> be filled in the same manner as 28 the original appointment for the unexpired portion of the term.

29 (4) Representation of a given judicial circuit on the State 30 Board of Education shall must be rotated among the counties of the circuit, except by unanimous consent of all members of the county 31 legislative delegations from the circuit. A member having served two consecutive terms 37 may be eligible for reappointment one year after the expiration of 38 his second term. (H) The committee may elect other officers from among its 39 40 members as necessary. 41 (I) A quorum for transacting business shall consist of a majority 42 of the membership as constituted at the time of a meeting. 43 (J) A vacancy on the committee does not impair the right of the

(D) Beginning in the 2020-2021 School Year, the Department of 10 11 Education shall: 12 (1) employ one full-time employee whose sole responsibility is to coordinate and lead the South Carolina Computer Science 13 14 Education Initiative, provided the employee must have prior work 15 experience in the computer science or information technology 16 industry; 17 (2) support K-12 academic and computer science teachers in 18 designing interdisciplinary, project-based instruction and 19 assignments that engage students in applying literacy, math, and 20 computational thinking skills to solve problems; 21 (3) design career pathways that connect students to 22 postsecondary programs, degrees, or postsecondary credentials in 23 high demand career fields including, but not limited to, 24 cybersecurity, information systems, informatics, computer 25 engineering, and software development as identified by the 26 Department of Commerce; 27 (4) offer professional development and teacher endorsements 28 to new teachers who will teach computer science and complete a 29 two-to four-week, full-day summer institute that consists of thirty 30 hours of instruction conducted over ten consecutive weekdays; 31 (5) provide information and materials which identify 32 emerging career opportunities in computer science and related fields 33 to parents, students, teachers, and guidance counselors; and 34 (6) assist districts in developing partnerships with business, 35 industry, higher education, and communities to provide afterschool 36 and extracurricular activities that engage students in computer 37 science. (E) The State Board of Education shall promulgate regulations 38 39 to create certification pathways for computer science teachers. The 40 Department of Education shall develop criteria for postsecondary 41 computer science teacher preparation programs. 42 (F) Recognizing that successful implementation of computer 43 science education requires effective instruction, the Department of 44 Education shall develop guidelines for use by school districts and
