Representative Smith, I am a homeowner residing My home is situated on the tributary of Clouter creek, a navigable deep water channel used by the community and local residents of the charleston community. Located at the mouth of the entrance to this tributary sit two abandoned barges with one protruding into the channel and causing not only a navigation hazard but has caused a disruption in the natural flow resulting in a large build up of mud and silt threatening to cut off water access. Already, at low tide due to the location of the abandoned steel barge the channel is impassable due to the mud banks increased formation. During full moons and spring tides the area becomes fully submerged and as a result have resulted in at least one accident I am aware of where someone inadvertently struck the object.
