The Dickerson Children's Advocacy Center will launch a school and community support program to increase the capacity of schools and community supporting partners to mitigate barriers to social-emotional learning and decrease mental health crises in the school districts of the 11th Judicial Circuit (Lexington, Edgefield, McCormick and Saluda). The program will launch a mental health multidisciplinary response to rapidly identify trauma-based crises in students, develop courses of action for care and treatment, as well as provide training, instruction and prevention activities to school mental wellness teams, resource officers, nurses and students in and out-of-school time.

The disruption, stress and isolation of the pandemic resulted in a spike in behavioral and mental health issues among our youth. Now that students are back in school, educators report seeing a variety of problems, from depression and anxiety to fighting and violent behavior. Students are dealing with losing family members or parental job loss. Teachers are experiencing similar issues, often lacking the time to manage distressed parents and students, many of whom are catching up after a year of learning loss.

Let's look carefully at the mental health crisis facing South Carolina's children as reported in the 2022 Kids Count Data that proved anxiety and depression increased by an unfathomable 55.4% in children ages 3 to 17 from 2016-2020 – it more than doubled BEFORE the pandemic erupted into a mental health tsunami against our school-aged youth.

Dickerson Children's Advocacy Center is poised to bridge the gap to this rising mental health crisis in our youth by providing transformative training, instruction, prevention and expertise to teachers, counselors, mental health teams, resource officers, nurses, and students. With an established memorandum of agreement with Lexington School District One and permission from other schools to provide these critical interventions and resources, there is no other nonprofit agency in Lexington County better poised to launch this effort than Dickerson CAC.

Last year, Dickerson CAC received a one-time, non-recurring appropriation in state general funds from the Department of Social Services for \$250,000 to provide critical resources to care for and protect child abuse victims who are more likely to be failed by the investigative, assessment, and treatment process by implementing Project C.A.R.E. (Collaborate, Access, Resources, Empower).
