Our audits are conducted in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards as set forth by the Comptroller General of the United States.

#### **ORG CHART & FTEs**

We have 20 funded FTE positions of the 26 authorized positions.

#### **REQUESTS**

Our audits are generated from three sources — legislative, mandated, and two oversight committees.

#### COUNCIL

We are governed by a Council of five public members elected by the General Assembly in a Joint Session for six-year terms. Council also includes four ex officio members or their designees.

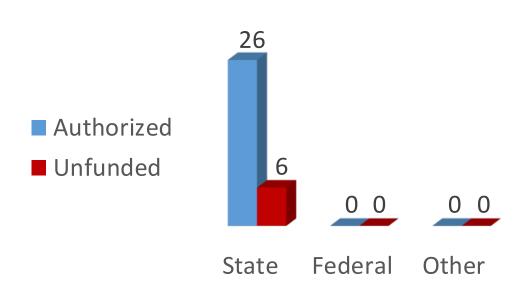

## A LIMITED REVIEW OF THE S.C. DEPARTMENT OF JUVENILE JUSTICE AND FOLLOW UP TO OUR JANUARY 2017 AUDIT (APRIL 2021)

We conducted an audit of the S.C. Department of Juvenile Justice in January 2017 and started a follow-up review of that audit in 2019.

In September 2019, we received an audit request from the General Assembly asking us to review areas not originally covered in our 2017 audit and to give the status of all 74 recommendations made in that audit.

In March 2020, we surveyed all 1,206 DJJ employees to obtain their views on job satisfaction, security, education and medical services for juveniles, and other safety issues.

We had a 61% response rate. We included the results of this survey in Appendix A of the report and we also included various responses to our open-ended questions throughout the report.

## S.C. DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES: A LIMITED REVIEW OF THE SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM AND CHILD AND ADULT CARE FOOD PROGRAM (AUGUST 2021)

Members of the S.C. General Assembly requested that we conduct an audit of the S.C. Department of Social Services' (DSS) Division of Economic Services.

#### **Objectives**

- Determine if DSS is effectively using program data to identify potential misuse of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits.
- Review the staffing, retention, initial training, performance improvement strategies, and salaries of economic services workers, and DSS' organizational structure for economic services to determine the effect on the agency's ability to administer food assistance services.
- Review the consistency, timeliness, and effectiveness of DSS' investigation and appeal processes
  regarding alleged misuse of benefits and adverse decisions on eligibility and claims in the
  administration of food assistance programs.
- Determine the efficiency and effectiveness of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) monitoring and reimbursement processes and DSS' compliance with laws and agency policies.

#### **STATUTORY**

#### REVIEW OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL DISTRICT (JUNE 2021)

Members of the S.C. General Assembly requested that we conduct an audit of the S.C. Public Charter School District (District).

#### **OBJECTIVES REVIEWED**

- South Carolina's state laws and regulations regarding charter schools to determine if the District's role could be better defined.
- The relationship between the District and its charter schools.
- The relationship between the District and the S.C. Department of Education.
- The District's evaluations of charter schools.
- The District's administrative fee policy.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The S.C. General Assembly passed legislation in 1996 allowing public charter schools to operate in the state and created the District in 2006.

The District began operating in 2008 and now sponsors 33 charter schools serving more than 20,000 students. The District is responsible for monitoring the academic and financial performance of its charter schools and also acts as a local education agency. The District's superintendent is supervised by a board of trustees who are appointed by the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President of the Senate.
