


The South Carolina Historical Society, established in 1855, is the state's oldest historical institution, dedicated to preserving and promoting the history of South Carolina.



MUSEUM


The South Carolina Historical Society Museum, located in the Historic Fireproof Building in downtown Charleston, showcases the state's history through engaging exhibits and artifacts.

Tourism and Local Community



Quarterly FREE Family Days


In 2024 the South Carolina

architect.


The **\$5 tour** provides visitors with a deeper understanding of the building's innovative design, historical significance, and architectural features.


The tour highlights how architecture reflects the cultural and historical shifts of the time, connecting visitors to the broader narrative of South Carolina's past.


Architecture Tours

However, the funds from these activities currently do not cover the full cost of operating the museum.








FY25-26 FUNDING REQUEST

The South Carolina Historical Society is seeking \$458,000 in state funding to continue offering dollar admission, expand its signature architecture tours of the historic Robert Mills building, and provide free admission once a quarter on Family Days, which feature additional educational activities designed for pre-K through middle school students.

Additionally, these funds will allow us to strengthen marketing and promotional initiatives, ensuring that South Carolina's history reaches a broader audience both within the state and beyond.



This milestone offers a unique opportunity to connect the state's history to the national narrative, highlighting the enduring relevance of our shared past for future generations.






Taking SC History On the Road
