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Agency overview

History and mission

<u>HISTORY:</u> The SC Forestry Commission was created in 1927 with its general duties defined in State Code 48-23-90. In summary, the Code requires the agency to make an annual report to the General Assembly on "forest conditions ... including recommendations to the public as to reforestation. ... to prevent, control and extinguish fires, including the enforcement of ... laws pertaining to the protection of the forests and woodlands give such advice, assistance and cooperation to private owners of land and promote ... appreciation by the public of the advantages of forestry and the benefits cooperate with the federal government in the distribution of funds allotted to the State for forestry ..."

<u>MISSION:</u> Our mission is to protect, promote, enhance and nurture the woodlands of South Carolina, and to educate the public about forestry issues, in a manner consistent with achieving the greatest good for its citizens.

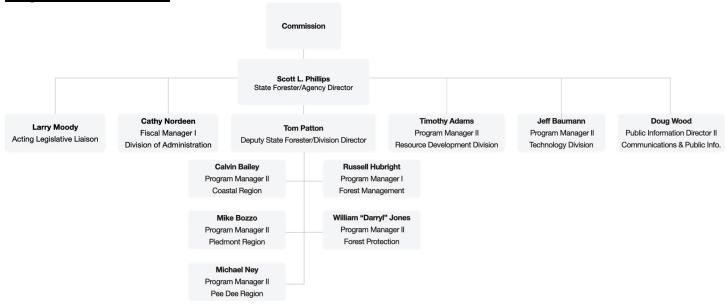

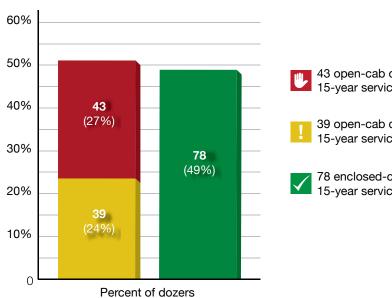

INADEQUATE EQUIPMENT FUNDING EXPOSES RISK

Open-cab bulldozers need to be replaced with safer, enclosed environmental cabs as quickly as possible. Replacement reduces the risk of injuries and deaths to firefighters and the public, and provides better property protection. With current dedicated funding, however, the agency will not be able to realize that goal until the year 2033.

SCFC Firefighting Dozers, by Service Life Category (FY2017-18)



43 open-cab dozers exceeding 15-year service life

39 open-cab dozers within 15-year service life

78 enclosed-cab dozers within 15-year service life

Thanks to help from the General Assembly the Commmission has made significant progress since 2012 putting firefighters in safer enclosedcab bulldozers. However, the number of dozers not meeting the 15-year safe service life is increasing faster than we can replace them with current

In FY2017-18 the number of dozer units exceeding the safe service life increased by 34% (11 units). And even though we are purchasing 12 units this year, the number of dozer units exceeding the safe service life will increase by another 9% (4 units) during the current fiscal year.

Current funding will not allow the Forestry Commission to replace all dozer units until FY2032-33, nor will the agency ever achieve a 15-year replacement cycle.

The General Assembly can fix that this year by allocating recurring funding of \$2 million. With this investment, all frontline dozers will be replaced by FY2025-26, and the agency can maintain the 15-year safe replacement cycle.
