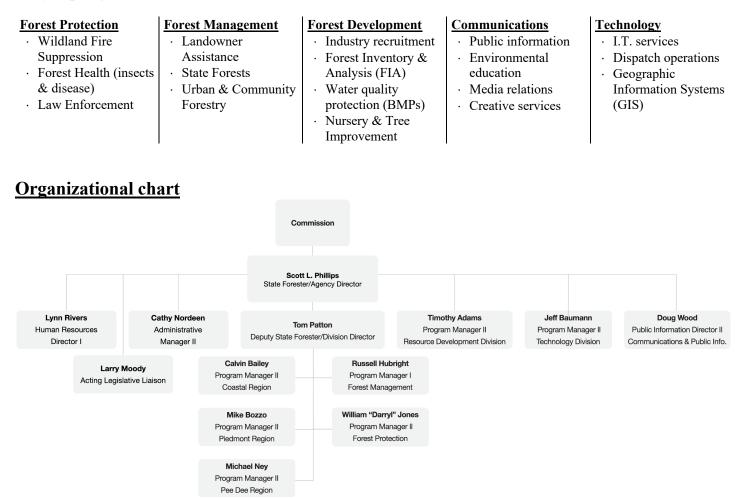
Agency overview

History and mission

<u>HISTORY</u>: The SC Forestry Commission was created in 1927 with its general duties defined in State Code 48-23-90. In summary, the Code requires the agency to make an annual report to the General Assembly on "forest conditions … including recommendations to the public as to reforestation. … to prevent, control and extinguish fires, including the enforcement of … laws pertaining to the protection of the forests and woodlands … … give such advice, assistance and cooperation to private owners of land and promote … appreciation by the public of the advantages of forestry and the benefits … … cooperate with the federal government in the distribution of funds allotted to the State for forestry …"

MISSION: Our mission is to protect, promote and enhance South Carolina's forests for the benefit of all.

Performance update: executive summary of FY19-20 Accountability Report

The South Carolina Forestry Commission was established in 1927 to protect, manage, develop and raise awareness about the forest resources of the state. In fulfilling those charges, the agency occupies a unique space in state government, first as an emergency response organization, but also as an economic development institution, a highly rated customer service agency and a champion for natural resource conservation. Our work continues to effectively support the responsible and sustainable growth of the state's woodlands, the industries that use them and the way of life their bounty supports.

Accomplishments

As documented in the agency's FY20 Accountability Report, the Forestry Commission's accomplishments are numerous and varied, with progress in each of our five primary goals as identified in the agency's Strategic Plan. As you review these achievements it is important to note the General Assembly's funding of our Benefits & Retention budget request in FY20, which enabled the implementation of a new pay plan that is having a positive impact, reducing turnover and increasing production.

Goal 1: Develop the Forest Resource

- FIA plot production was 102% of the target for FY20. This is an 11% improvement from FY19, and accuracy scores remain very high (>96%).
- Completed the analysis of and published a report on the economic contribution of forestry to SC's economy for reference year 2018. The results indicated that forestry continues to be one of the strongest sectors of SC's economy, contributing \$21.2 billion to the state's economy annually while providing more than 98,000 jobs and \$4.9 billion in labor income.
- Approximately \$522 million in capital investment projects announced in FY20. Announced projects will create 385 new jobs. The largest announcement was in York County where New Indy plans to invest \$240 million to convert the facility to ultra-lightweight, virgin kraft linerboard.

Goal 2: Protect the Forest Resource

- The agency purchased 12 safer enclosed-cab dozers, toward the 160 target.
- Participated in an audit and inventory of the Federal Excess Personal Property Program and Firefighter Property Program by the USDA Forest Service. The audit produced no significant adverse findings and reflects well on the Forestry Commission effort to work with fire departments around the state to help fill equipment needs through these two programs. More than 2,500 items valued at over \$52 million are in use statewide.
- The agency's Type 2 Incident Management Team (IMT) continues to support an increasing role assisting with allhazard emergency response efforts. During FY20 the IMT deployed to Charleston in response to Hurricane Dorian, to Richland County in support of the Seeking Nevaeh Mission, and to four different sites around the state to assist the Department of Social Services with logistical planning for a COVID-19 mission focused on getting supplies for childcare facilities to facilitate reopening.

Goal 3: Manage the Forest Resource

- The agency assisted 2,542 landowners during FY20. This is a 26% increase from FY19. Customer satisfaction for forest management assistance remains high at 97%.
- The State Forest system generated nearly \$3.8 million in total revenue (\$566,406 net revenue) from the sale of forest products and paid nearly \$918,000 to counties in which they operate. The agency operates its State Forests 100% from revenue generated by the management of these properties, using no state-appropriated funds to support their operation. The agency's ability to operate the State Forests without state funding, while providing 25% of its gross proceeds to the counties in which they are located, illustrates the productive capacity of actively managed forests and the good stewardship of this agency. Since 2010, the SCFC has paid more than \$8.3 million to schools in the counties in which the State Forests are located.
- The Urban and Community Forestry Program's outreach served an estimated 2.8 million citizens. A significant project completed by this program was the Conservation Development Guide, which is a best management practices tool that illustrates how to develop for commercial and residential use while maximizing forest connectivity.

Goal 4: Raise Awareness about the Forest Resource

- Agency staff conducted forestry education programs reaching nearly 4,400 participants during FY20. This is 27% below the target. Shortfall is due to a drastic reduction of outreach activities because of COVID-19.
- The SCFC made significant strides this year in ramping up efforts to shed a positive light on forestry in SC. Produced a combination of 13 radio and TV public service announcements that aired on 110 radio stations and 37 TV outlets across the state from March to June.

Goal 5: Prepare to Meet Future Demands

- During FY20 the agency revised the agency's Strategic Plan and Forest Action Plan in a way that truly integrates these documents, aligns agency actions and drives the Forestry Commission towards our vision. The agency will transition to this new plan during FY21.
- Agency efforts to address compensation issues in recent years have greatly improved recruitment and retention efforts. The new pay plan for frontline firefighters, which has reduced turnover rates for these positions, resulted in less than 4% turnover in FY20. The agency's overall turnover rate for FY20 is 8%.

Challenges

The challenges noted in the agency's Accountability Report provide the basis for, and are in fact directly linked to, our current budget requests for FY2021-22.

- 21% of the agency's frontline firefighting bulldozers exceed the 15-year safe service life, and 37% frontline firefighting bulldozers are the less safe open-cab models. Act 273's \$1.8 million annual funding and the current \$1 million recurring state funding is insufficient to fill a \$3.8 million annual need for firefighting equipment.
- Inadequate IT staffing and operating funds to implement State Information Security initiatives, reduce risks and meet agency operational requirements.
- Inadequate FTEs for much-needed workforce/succession planning and implementation. 43% of the agency's workforce is eligible to retire within 5 years, and 29% are currently beyond the eligibility to retire.
- Limited capacity in critical program areas is causing firefighters and foresters to cover greater territory, increasing response time, fire size and wildfire damage risk while reducing landowner assistance, wildfire prevention and outreach.
- Difficultly recruiting new firefighters (bulldozer operators) is impacting our ability to respond to wildfires. Currently 8% of frontline firefighter positions are vacant, with the average position being vacant nearly 9 months. Four of these positions have been vacant for more than a year.
- Average wildfire response time, 37.75 minutes in FY20, exceeded the 35-minute target due to firefighter vacancies and the resulting larger coverage areas.
- While the agency assisted 2,542 landowners during FY20, this is 24% below historical metrics. Current capacity does not allow the agency to provide technical assistance and outreach to family forest owners as we did historically or to the level that we feel is appropriate given current forest conditions and trends.
- Understaffing in the Communications & Public Information Division creates the lack of specialization needed for a more robust integrated marketing communications program, which also leads to missed opportunities for public relations and outreach.

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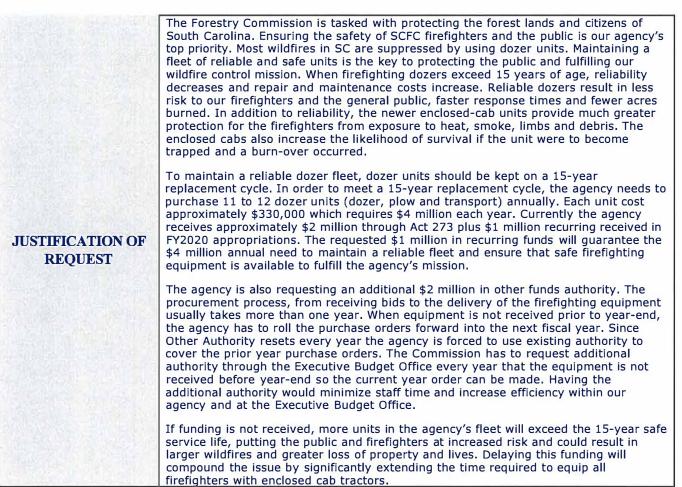

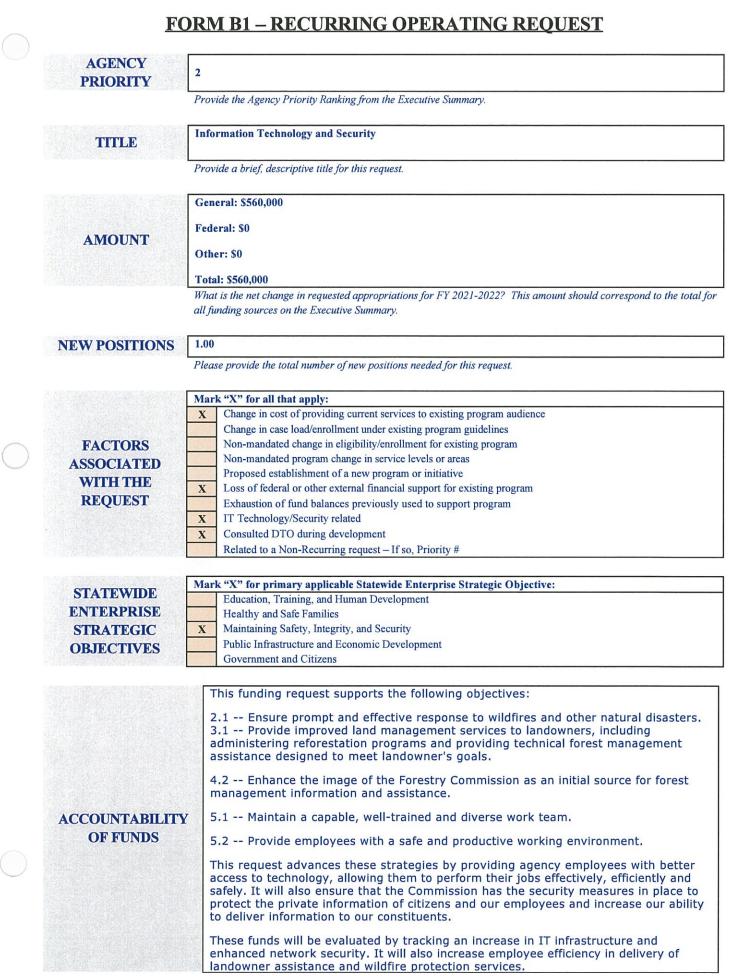

RECIPIENTS OF FUNDS

Funds will go towards salary and fringe for 1 new FTE and the shifting from other to state for 2 FTEs as well as state contract holders for IT hardware and software.

What individuals or entities would receive these funds (contractors, vendors, grantees, individual beneficiaries, etc.)? How would these funds be allocated – using an existing formula, through a competitive process, based upon predetermined eligibility criteria?

The Information Technology Division supports all of the mission-critical functions of the agency including wildland firefighting. The funding of this request will provide positions and equipment that will better serve the public and our employees; and adopt standards and guidelines developed by the Department of Administration. The 2020-2021 Appropriation Act Section 93.9 (and previous years' Budget Provisos) mandates that state agencies adopt and implement cyber security policies and reporting of information technology and security plans of the Department of Administration's Division of Technology.

At the direction of the Board of Commissioners we have been strategically reviewing our agency's staffing needs. During this review we identified 6 vacant and unfunded FTEs that could be better leveraged to meet the agency's most critical needs. We are requesting to shift 2 of these FTEs from other to state and \$190,000 salary and fringe to support a much needed Privacy Liaison and IT Technician position. We request to add one new FTE and \$80,000 salary and fringe to support a GIS Analyst position.

IT Technician III (\$95,000): Prior to 2008, the agency had 4 FTEs associated with enduser, network infrastructure, application and hardware support. Agency currently has just 2 FTEs supporting nearly 400 employees. This state funded position is needed to support the significant increase in demand for field technology and mobile devices, increased cybersecurity threats, and growing federal and state mandates for data protection.

Privacy Liaison (\$95,000): State of South Carolina - Human Resources Division InfoSec/Privacy Workforce Professional Development Handbook, Appendix 8.1 Data Classification Roles and Responsibilities provides guidelines to help agencies adopt an information security and privacy framework for personnel. Based on the criteria provided in Appendix 8.1, Forestry Commission falls under Tier 3 due to having restricted data from the Department of Homeland Security, Department of Defense, and other agencies/organizations for use in its wildfire dispatch system and used by the State's only Type 2 Incident Management Team; and personally identifiable information (PII data) of landowners. The reference chart suggests Tier 3 agencies have a minimum of 2 FTEs to cover all the information security and privacy roles. Currently the Forestry Commission doesn't have a single FTE dedicated to performing these roles. This state funded position is needed to support state and federal privacy compliance requirements and controls.

GIS Analyst (\$80,000): Visualizing data geographically in a GIS application can greatly improve understanding, decision-making, efficiency, and communications. Technology now allows this information to be available to decision makers, other agencies and organizations, and the general public. This new position will assist the agency in updating GIS applications used in fire dispatch, forest management, fire protection and other areas; and improve capability and context to analyze data in near real time.

Smartphones for suppression unit operators (\$90,000): New, recurring State funding is needed to cover cellular plans, apps and security software (i.e. mobile device management) for 160 suppression unit operators.

Electronic mail system upgrade (\$50,000): Migration of agency's On-Premise email system to a system hosted by DTO or an approved "Emerging Technology Tier" service to comply with Department of Administration's Electronic Email Standards.

Laptop, desktop, and server upgrades (\$150,000): Forestry has continued to request recurring funds for orderly replacement, upgrade, annual maintenance and licensing fees of information technology equipment and software. This budget request covers systematic replacement of >=5 years old computers and servers. Agency is currently using Federal grants to cover the majority of these costs. Some item costs are somewhat high because Forestry Commission purchases high-end machines due to

the length of time their machines are in service; need for faster processors and more RAM for GIS software; need for larger hard drive storage for GIS data and aerial imagery; and more ruggedized laptops. The agency is primarily a Dell environment but will look at other state contract vendors when considering ruggedized laptops for specific field positions that need that type of device.

If funds are not received the agency will continue to operate dated equipment, which will impact the effectiveness and efficiency of our employees' work. In addition, the agency will be exposed to increased risk of security breaches.

The Commission does not have the state funds to fill two requested positions (IT Technician III and Privacy Liaison) or the FTE and state funds to fill the third (GIS Analyst).

The use of these funds will be evaluated by demonstrating a decrease in wildfire response times, and increase in the number of landowners assisted, improved forest management customer satisfaction levels and enhanced ability of the agency to prepare our workforce for future demands.

Funds will go towards the salary, fringe and operating for 10 new FTEs and 4 FTEs shifted from Other to State.

What individuals or entities would receive these funds (contractors, vendors, grantees, individual beneficiaries, etc.)? How would these funds be allocated – using an existing formula, through a competitive process, based upon predetermined eligibility criteria?

The Forestry Commission's mission is to protect, enhance and nurture the forest lands of South Carolina. The agency accomplishes this mission primarily through our Forest Protection and Forest Management operations. Limited capacity in these critical program areas has resulted in firefighters and foresters covering greater territory, increasing response time, fire size and wildfire damage risk, while reducing landowner assistance, wildfire prevention and outreach activities. Also, with this request the agency has the unique opportunity to fill four critical positions through the transfer of existing unfunded FTEs.

We are requesting funding in our Forest Protection division for a fire support position (\$105,000) to provide forward-looking fire weather outlooks and fire intelligence information and operating (\$425,000) to support our Forest Protection programs. Having a dedicated fire support position would allow the Forestry Commission to provide accurate fire weather and fire intelligence to agency firefighters and cooperating fire agencies which would result in increased public and firefighter safety. The operational funds will allow the Commission to strengthen our wildland fire program and our partnerships with the US Forest Service, SC National Guard, and other agencies that provide wildland fire support. We are also requesting an additional .25 federal FTE to increase a federally funded fire support position from part time to full time.

We are also requesting two FTEs transferred from Other to State (\$120,000) for shift supervisor positions for nighttime dispatch shifts and an additional \$50,000 for salary and fringe to promote six daytime dispatchers to shift supervisor positions. Currently we only have three supervisory employees for our three dispatch centers (one in each center) which does not provide adequate supervisory coverage for full shifts or on weekends and holidays. We need to create shift supervisor positions to provide a clear chain of command at all times while also addressing succession planning needs and career path development. In addition to the salary and fringe we are requesting \$175,000 in operating to cover annual maintenance costs at our dispatch centers that cannot be covered due to reductions in federal funding. This request will benefit the landowners of South Carolina and Forestry Commission personnel by having our dispatch centers adequately staffed and managed 24 hours a day/7 days a week.

In addition to the Forest Protection funding request, we are requesting funding for eight FTEs, seven new and one shifted, (\$760,000) and operating to support these positions (\$300,000) in our Forest Management division. These FTEs will improve supplemental firefighting capacity and increase landowner assistance while also providing much-needed training and supervisory experience for succession planning efforts. These positions will benefit the landowners of South Carolina by providing additional supervisory positions for fire response, increasing timber supply, improving forest health, ensuring soil and water quality and reducing wildfire risk which increases forestry's economic impact.

We are requesting two new FTEs and \$200,000 to hire two full-time pilots. These positions will provide necessary aerial support/detection information to firefighters on the ground regarding fuels, fire behavior and values at risk during wildfire suppression which will increase public and firefighter safety while also improving the efficacy of the agency's fire suppression efforts. We currently only have two full-time pilots to support the agency's 24/7 firefighting mission across the whole state. The

addition of two full-time pilots will provide much better coverage.

We are requesting \$125,000 and to shift one FTE from other to state to fund a General Counsel position. The agency currently has no legal staff and must rely on private attorneys for legal matters involving landowner, human resources, regulatory and legislative issues. This position would also assist with contractual, strategic planning and accountability issues related to the agency.

If funds are not received the effectiveness of wildfire prevention efforts will be reduced, leading to more damage to homes and forest resources. The agency will also lack the capacity to provide needed technical assistance to forest landowners, causing a reduction in active forest management that will lead to less healthy and productive forests, which will in turn increase wildfire risks.

The amounts of this request were calculated by using the average salary and fringe benefits of like positions within the agency and operating costs associated with those positions related to forest protection and management efforts.

With the exception of the four requested transfers, the Forestry Commission does not have the vacant positions to fulfill this request, as they are obligated to other areas within the agency.

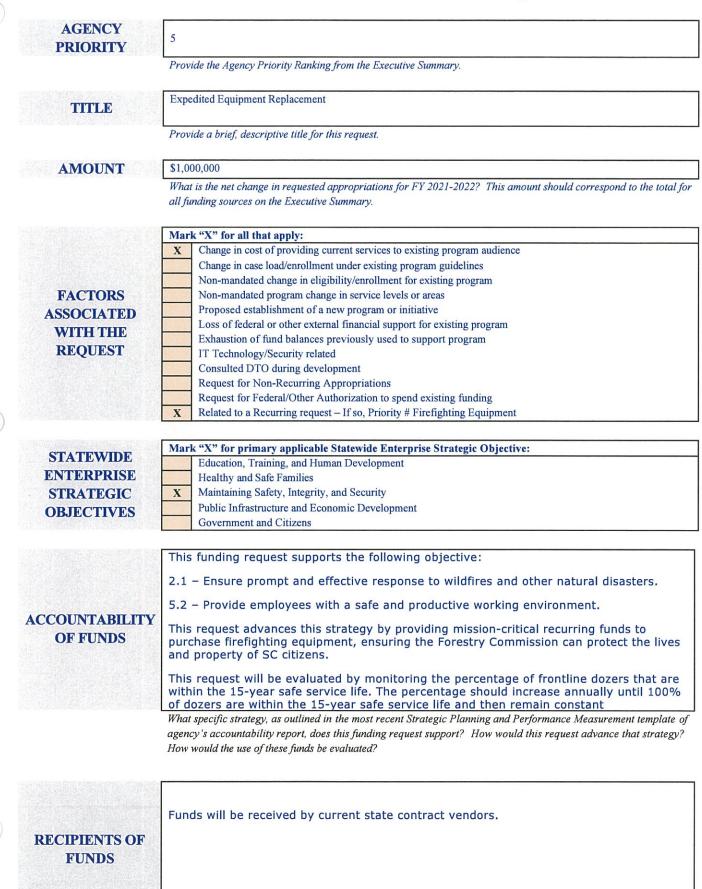

A core function of the Forestry Commission is to promote the advantages of forestry and the benefits of active forest management. The agency has done a great job in recent years promoting the economic benefits of forestry and establishing the forestry sector as a pillar of SC's economy. As our state's population becomes more urbanized, we must strengthen our message on the environmental benefits of working forests and the role strong markets and family forest owners play in keeping our forests healthy. Currently we have a very small (3 FTEs), but talented, group of employees working in the Communication and Public Information Division but we need additional capacity to tell our story. Understaffing in this area creates the lack of specialization needed for a more robust integrated marketing communication program, which also leads to missed opportunities for public relations and outreach. JUSTIFICATION OF REQUEST We are requesting one FTE (\$75,000) and \$25,000 in operating funds to increase communications and outreach capacity that will allow the Commission to better promote the advantages of forestry and the benefits of active forest management to landowners and the public. If the funding is not received the Commission will continue to have an insufficient level of communications support during wildfire suppression/emergency operations. The agency will also continue to miss opportunities to promote the benefits of forestry to the general public, media and agency partners. The Forestry Commission does not have the vacant positions to fulfill this request, as they are obligated to other areas within the agency. The SCFC does not currently receive any grant funds or any other sources of income that can be used to fund this position. The Forestry Commission is tasked with protecting the forest lands and citizens of South Carolina. Ensuring the safety of SCFC firefighters and the public is our agency's top priority. Most wildfires in SC are suppressed by using dozer units. Maintaining a fleet of reliable and safe units is the key to protecting the public and fulfilling our wildfire control mission. When firefighting dozers exceed 15 years of age, reliability decreases and repair and maintenance costs increase. Reliable dozers result in less risk to our firefighters and the general public, faster response times and fewer acres burned. In addition to reliability, the newer enclosed-cab units provide much greater protection for the firefighters from exposure to heat, smoke, limbs and debris. The enclosed cabs also increase the likelihood of survival if the unit were to become trapped and a burn over occurred.

JUSTIFICATION OF REQUEST

To maintain a reliable dozer fleet, dozer units should be kept on a 15-year replacement cycle. In order to meet a 15-year replacement cycle, the agency needs to purchase 11 to 12 dozer units (dozer, plow and transport) annually. Each unit cost approximately \$330,000 which requires \$4 million each year. Currently the agency receives approximately \$2 million through Act 273 plus \$1 million recurring received in FY2020 appropriations. At present, 58 of our 160 dozers still have open cabs. Of the 58 open-cab units, 34 of those exceed the 15-year service life. The Commission is requesting \$1 million to expedite the replacement of these open-cab dozers.

If funding is not received, more of the agency's fleet will exceed the 15-year safe service life, putting the public and firefighters at increased risk of injury and death. It could also result in larger wildfires and greater loss of property.

The Forestry Commission's mission is to protect, promote, enhance and nurture the forest lands of South Carolina. To achieve this mission, agency employees provide numerous services to the citizens of South Carolina and to the forest lands themselves. Forestry Commission personnel provide a service to not only protect the forest lands and surrounding communities from wildfires, but they also provide outreach services to landowners who enable forestry to be a top industry and economic driver in South Carolina.

In order to accommodate a 3% budget reduction, the Forestry Commission will have to eliminate 16 FTEs. These FTEs directly serve the citizens of South Carolina. By eliminating these positions, services that are currently provided will be significantly reduced. This will be a negative effect on the economic value that the forest industry provides to the state and will further reduce the Commission's ability to protect the forest resource, homes, other structures and lives.

The agency will use vacant positions if available at the time of the cut. However, if positions are not vacant, the agency will use other methods to reduce state operating funds. Such methods will include a combination of elimination of at-will employees, temporary employees, furlough of current employees and/or a reduction in operating expenditures.

AGENCY COST SAVINGS PLANS The agency evaluates operations throughout the year to ensure we are operating efficiently and effectively. In FY2018 the agency entered into a 10 year public-private partnership with Arborgen at the Commission's Taylor Nursery. The partnership allows the agency to continue to provide state-of-the-art seedlings to forest landowners for tree planting in the future while mitigating agency budget shortfalls associated with the operation of the nursery. As a result of this agreement, we continue to see savings of approximately \$200,000 annually in salary/fringe and operating costs associated with nursery operations. The agency has repurposed the salary and fringe funds to assist with our recruitment and retention efforts. The operating funds saved are being used to bolster our Tree Improvement program to ensure SC landowners have access to the best available genetics that will be critical to maintaining and improving the productivity and health of our forests in the future.

Increasing the number of certified acres in South Carolina is desirable because it allows our forest industry to better compete in global markets allowing for the retention and growth of these important businesses and ensuring strong local markets for forest products. The SC Forestry Commission is in the process of testing and implementing a statewide Landscape Management Plan with the American Forest Foundation (AFF), SC Tree Farm

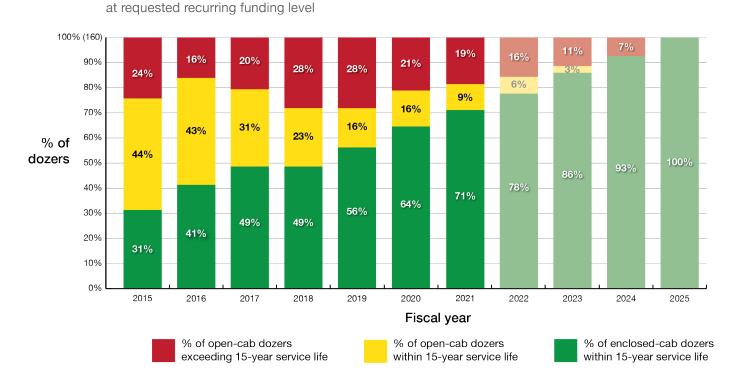

SAFEYSIOBH INADEQUATE EQUIPMENT FUNDING EXPOSES RISK

Thanks to help from the General Assembly the Commission has made significant progress since 2012 putting firefighters in safer enclosed-cab bulldozers. Open-cab bulldozers need to be replaced with safer, enclosed environmental cabs as quickly as possible. Replacement reduces the risk of injuries and deaths to firefighters and the public, and provides better property protection. With the requested recurring funding the agency can reach that goal in 2025.

To maintain a reliable dozer fleet, dozer units should be kept on a 15-year replacement cycle. In order to meet a 15-year replacement cycle, the agency needs to purchase 11 to 12 dozer units (dozer, plow and transport) annually. Each unit cost approximately \$318,000, which requires \$3.8 million each year. Currently the agency receives approximately \$1.8 million through Act 273 plus \$1 million recurring received in FY2020 appropriations. The requested \$1 million in recurring funds will guarantee the \$3.8 million annual need to maintain a reliable fleet and ensure that safe firefighting equipment is available to fulfill the agency's mission.
