Our mission is to provide quality individualized vocational rehabilitation services, independent living services and prevention-of-blindness services to blind and visually impaired consumers, leading to competitive employment and social and economic independence.


# Agency Overview South Carolina Commission for the Blind

We offer **specialized and personalized services** that lead to employment and/or social and economic independence **for individuals age 3 and up who are blind or have vision loss**.

- Employment: In our Vocational Rehabilitation program, which includes a residential component, we help eligible consumers find, maintain, or regain employment. We provide counseling and guidance, educational opportunities, vocational training, and assistive technology to prepare them for career opportunities.
  - Our Business Enterprise Program helps qualified individuals become entrepreneurs and operate their own vending or food service business.


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- Independence: We help consumers remain independent within their homes and communities:
  - Children's Services assists children ages 3 to 12, ensuring they have assistive technology available at home and with building confidence and self-sufficiency from an early age.
  - Older Blind Services assists those 55 and older in remaining independent by providing specialized training and low vision devices.
- Prevention: We provide financial assistance for sight-saving surgeries for individuals who don't have insurance, who are underinsured, or who otherwise could not afford it. Education on blindness prevention and eye safety is also provided around the state.



# Challenges Lack of Legal Support

#### Contracts and agreements

- Agreements (more than 50, totaling over \$40 million) with vendors or other agencies
- Compliance with complex federal and state laws and regulations

#### Personnel issues

- Employment law
- Disciplinary, grievance, termination
- Program support
  - Understanding and interpretation of federal and state laws and regulations
  - Policies and procedures

# Challenges Lack of Legal Support

Agency consulted with multiple outside attorneys for legal needs

- Resulted in delays providing services and responses to legal issues:
  - Time required to find appropriate counsel
  - Outside counsel must research the agency plus complex state and federal laws and regulations concerning programs and services offered by the agency

To mitigate these challenges and risks to the agency:

Agency hired an attorney utilizing limited available earmarked funds and a temporary FTE adjustment

# Recurring Budget Request Agency Attorney

- Add one (1) FTE plus operating funds
- Provide timely legal advice/support to agency
- Ensure compliance with complex state and federal laws and regulations
- Provide guidance on regulations, policies and procedures
- Assist with contract development and employment law and personnel matters

87,329 (1 FTE) + 39,298 (fringes) + 22,549 (operating) = 149,176

# Proviso Request

- I: Reallotment Funds Allow SCCB to utilize Vocational Rehabilitation funds that may be received after the initial grant period
- II: Deferred Maintenance Create account with Treasurer's Office to store funds until needed for deferred maintenance, capital projects, ordinary repairs and maintenance
- III: Remodeling Transfer unused funds allocated for canceled remodeling project to current capital improvement projects

# Carryforward

- ▶ \$63,226.45 Regular carryforward
- ▶ \$30,000.00 Capital project carryforward
- We plan to spend carryforward towards the state portion of:
  - Capital projects (ex: Columbia Complex renovations).
