Established in 2017 at USC School of Medicine

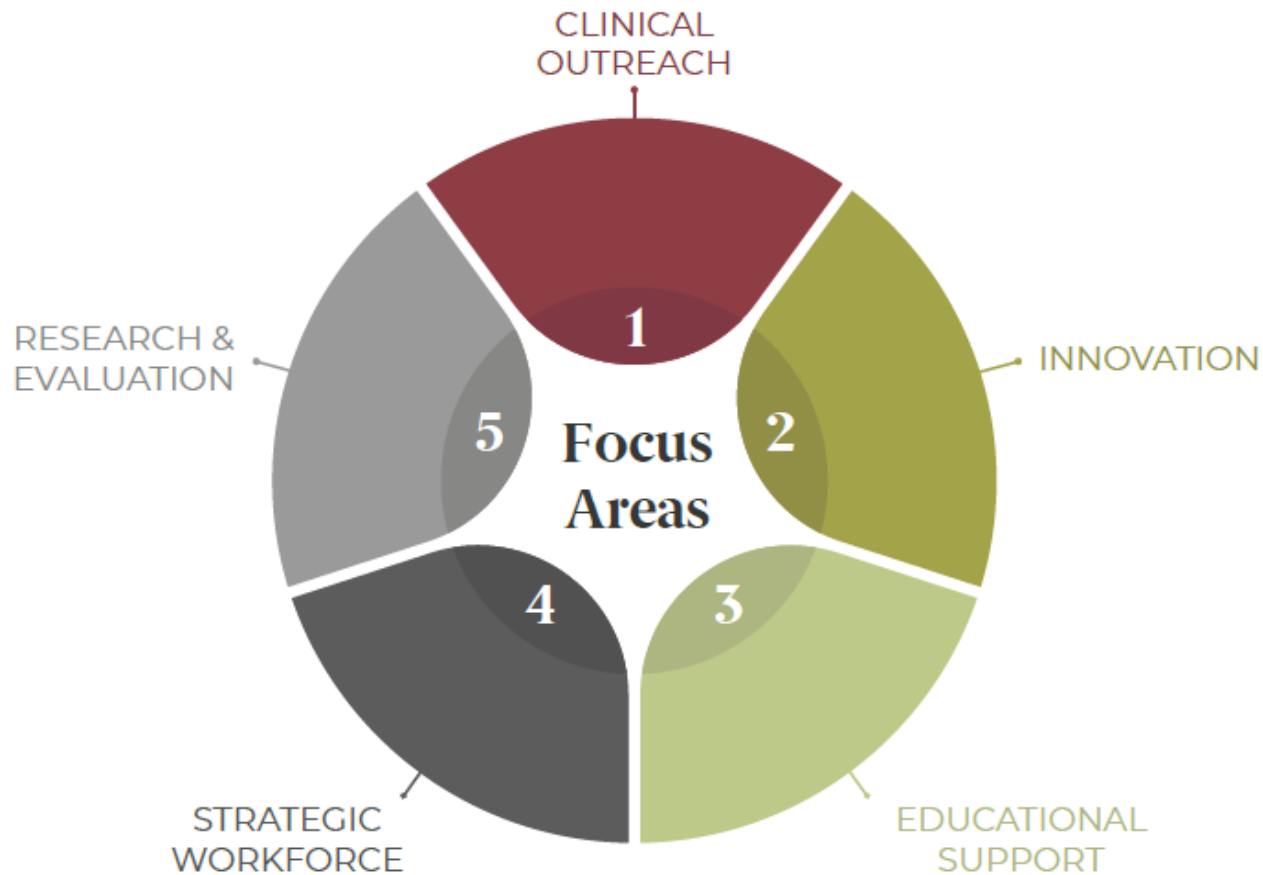
- Mission

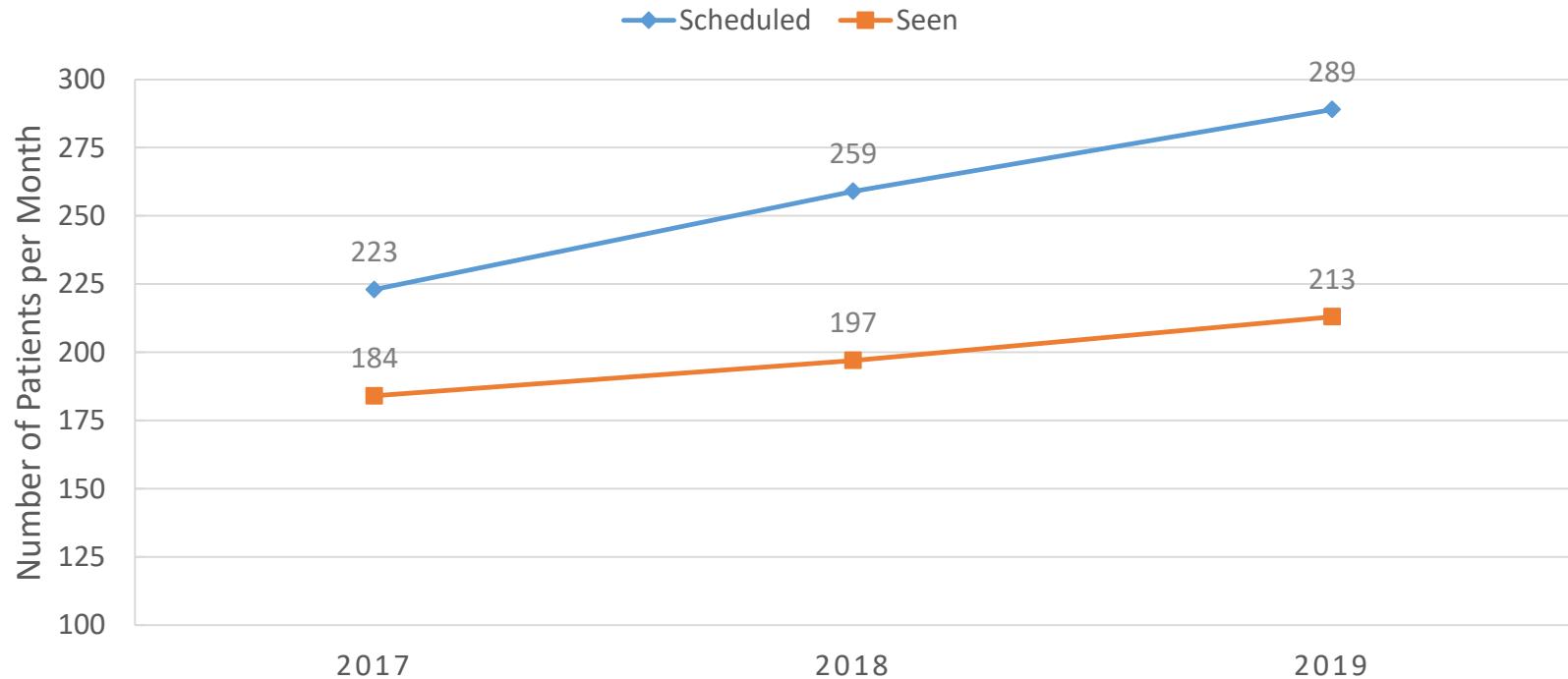
Clinical services delivered to rural communities through “boots on the ground” subspecialists and primary care providers

Consistent Growth

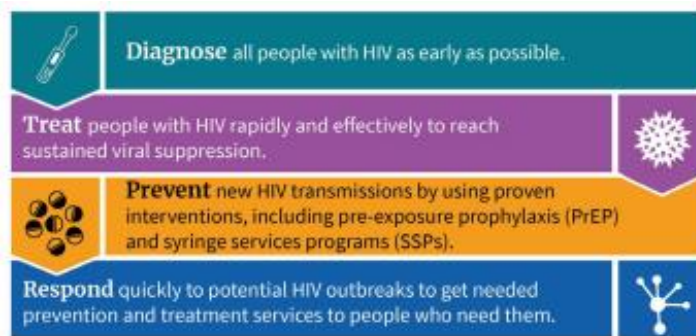
Average Number of Patients Scheduled and Seen per Month by Year



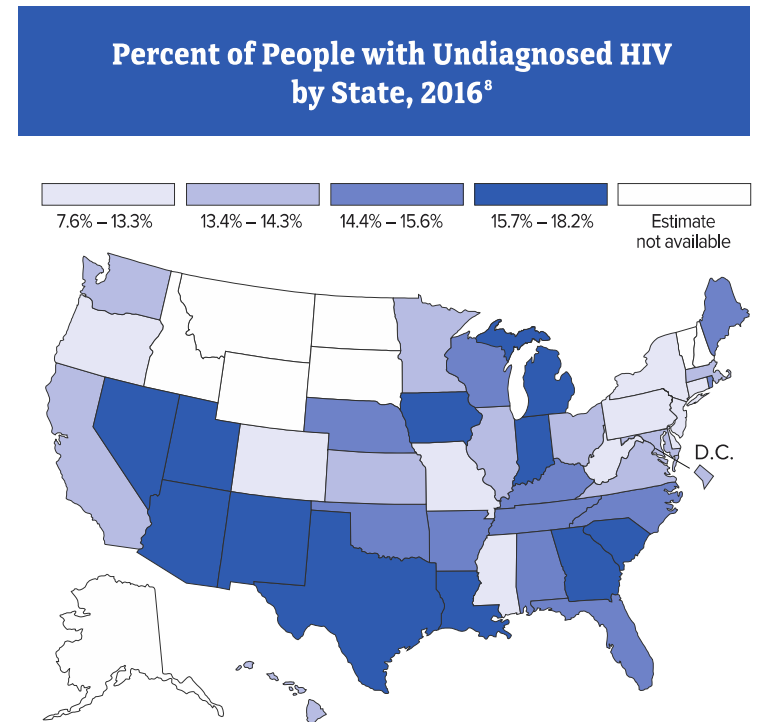
Key Expansion Targets
