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11	TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE STATE'S PUBLIC
12	HEALTH RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 VIRUS, INCLUDING
13	VACCINATIONS.
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15	Whereas, the COVID 19 virus has caused untold damage on South
16	Carolina's citizens and its economy and vaccinating South
17	Carolinians is of the utmost importance to returning the State and its
18	citizens to their everyday lives; and

20	Whereas, there are now multiple versions of a highly effective
21	vaccination available to combat COVID 19; and
22 23	Whomas the state must and account a posist with the development and
23 24	Whereas, the state must endeavor to assist with the development and success of the vaccine delivery infrastructure that will help South
24 25	Carolina make full use of its federal allocation of vaccines and
25 26	maximize the number of inoculations delivered. Now, therefore,
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28	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South
29	Carolina:
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31	SECTION 1. (A) From the Contingency Reserve Fund, there is
32	appropriated:
33	(1) \$63,000,000 to the Department of Health and
34	Environmental Control (DHEC); and
35	(2) \$45,000,000 to the Medical University of South Carolina
36	(MUSC).
37 38	(B) From the funds appropriated in this section, DHEC and MUSC shall, in consultation, cooperation, and collaboration with
38 39	the South Carolina Hospital Association, Federally Qualified Heath
40	Centers, and other appropriate entities and associations: (1) expand
40 41	statewide vaccination capacity; and (2) continue to administer the
42	statewide COVID-19 testing plan. Such funds must be used in a

1 manner that most effectively and efficiently uses the resources 2 available for vaccinations from hospitals and other COVID-19 3 vaccination providers, enrolled and activated by DHEC, across the 4 state. The use of these funds includes costs related to COVID-19, 5 but are not limited to, vaccination, continued testing and contact 6 tracing, personal protective equipment and medical supplies, 7 personnel costs, education and marketing campaigns, quarantine, 8 transportation and storage, mobile health units including the 9 purchase, upfitting, staffing, and operations thereof, general operations, technology, and staff support. 10 (C) The funds expended for statewide vaccinations must be 11 12 used expeditiously to contract with entities set forth in this item that are administering COVID-19 vaccines to the public. Eligible costs 13 14 include, but are not limited to, those vaccination costs associated 15 with staffing, security, traffic control, storage, transportation, 16 mobile health units, and technology that have not been reimbursed 17 by an insurer's administration fee. (D) Additionally, from the funds appropriated in this section, 18 19 DHEC, in coordination with MUSC, the South Carolina Hospital 20 Association, the South Carolina Center for Rural and Primary Healthcare, and other relevant stakeholders, shall implement a plan 21 22 to reach rural and under-served populations who are eligible to be 23 vaccinated. 24 25 SECTION 2. (A) The Executive Budget Office shall establish the 26 COVID-19 Vaccine Reserve account to be maintained by the 27 Executive Budget Office and administered as set forth in this 28 section. 29 (B) From the Contingency Reserve Fund, there is appropriated 30 \$100,000,000 to the COVID-19 Vaccine Reserve account. The Executive Budget Office only may release funds in the account upon 31 receipt of a letter signed by the Director of DHEC affirming the 32

recipient is a COVID-19 vaccination provider enrolled and activated
 by DHEC, that DHEC has determined that the request will assist the

35 State in its effort to achieve statewide vaccination, and that the 36 enrolled and activated provider has the vaccine implementation 37 capacity to justify the request.

38 (C)(1) From the funds appropriated in this section, the Executive
39 Budget Office shall allocate up to \$75,000,000 to hospitals to pay
40 for the costs of administering the COVID-19 vaccine.

41 (2) From the funds appropriated in this section, the Executive42 Budget Office shall allocate up to \$25,000,000 to other COVID-19

vaccination providers that are enrolled and activated by DHEC, to
 pay for the costs of administering the COVID-19 vaccine.

3 (3) For purposes of this section, eligible costs of 4 administering the COVID-19 vaccine include, but are not limited to, 5 those vaccination costs associated with staffing, security, traffic 6 control, storage, transportation, mobile health units including the 7 purchase, upfitting, staffing, and operations thereof, and technology 8 that have not been reimbursed by an insurer's administration fee.

9 (D) In approving expenses, DHEC must give priority to hospitals 10 and other COVID-19 vaccine providers that are enrolled and 11 activated by DHEC that can prove or have proven a high demand 12 for the vaccine and the ability to administer the vaccine in high 13 quantities.

14 (E) On the first day of each month, the Executive Budget Office 15 shall provide a detailed accounting of the expenditure of all funds 16 appropriated pursuant to this section. The report shall be transmitted 17 to the Governor, the General Assembly, and made available on the 18 website of the recipient. Additionally, any recipient must provide an 19 accounting of the expenditures to DHEC and DHEC must post the 20 accounting on its website.

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SECTION 3. (A)(1) Where appropriate and feasible, hospitals,
 medical providers, and other stakeholders receiving distributions
 pursuant to this joint resolution also shall seek reimbursement from
 an individual's public or private health insurer.

(B) If federal funds are received by this State that are designated
for the purposes set forth in this joint resolution, then such funds
must be used before any of the funds appropriated in this joint
resolution are expended.

30 (C) If hospitals, medical providers, and other stakeholders receive 31 distributions pursuant to this joint resolution for their efforts in 32 meeting the objectives of this joint resolution, also receive 33 reimbursements from insurers or federal funds for the same 34 purposes, then the distributions pursuant to this joint resolution must 35 be remitted back to the agency or fund that distributed the funds up 36 to the amount of reimbursed costs and federal funds received.

(D) The provisions of this joint resolution shall apply to theextent permitted by federal law.

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40 SECTION 4. A. Notwithstanding any professional scope of 41 practice or unauthorized practice of law provision in this State, the 42 following individuals have the authority to administer pre-measured 43 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine:

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1 (1) unlicensed personnel with current certification by the 2 certifying boards of the American Association of Medical Assistants 3 (AAMA), the National Center for Competency Testing (NCCT), 4 National Association for Health Professionals (NAHP), the National 5 Certification Medical Association (NCMA), National Healthcare 6 Association (NHA), American Medical Technologists (AMT), or 7 any other certifying body approved by the South Carolina Board of Medical Examiners, and documented training in intermuscular 8 9 injections; and who administer the vaccine at a site in which a Physician, Physician Assistant, Advanced Practice Registered 10 11 Nurse, and/or a Registered Nurse licensed in good standing in South 12 Carolina and capable of appropriate evaluation and response to medical emergencies, including resuscitation and treatment of 13 14 anaphylaxis, is present;

15 (2) students of an accredited medical school, physician 16 assistant school or program, or a nursing school or program with 17 appropriate instruction and documented training in intramuscular injections and who administer the vaccine at a site in which a 18 Physician, Physician Assistant, Advanced Practice Registered 19 20 Nurse, and/or a Registered Nurse licensed in good standing in South Carolina and capable of appropriate evaluation and response to 21 22 medical emergencies, including resuscitation and treatment of 23 anaphylaxis, is present;

24 (3) Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses who 25 have retired, become inactive, or whose licenses have lapsed within 26 the last five years, provided their licenses were in good standing at 27 the time of retirement/inactivation/lapse; and who submit the 28 appropriate documentation to the Board of Nursing to confirm 29 licensure within the last five years and that such license was in good 30 standing at the time of retirement/inactivation/lapse; and who 31 administer the vaccine at a site in which a Physician, Physician 32 Assistant, Advanced Practice Registered Nurse, and/or a Registered 33 Nurse licensed in good standing in South Carolina and capable of 34 appropriate evaluation and response to medical emergencies, 35 including resuscitation and treatment of anaphylaxis, is present;

(4) Physicians and Physician Assistants who have retired, 36 37 become inactive, or whose licenses have lapsed within the last five 38 years, provided their licenses were in good standing at the time of 39 retirement/inactivation/lapse; and who submit the appropriate 40 documentation to the Board of Medical Examiners to confirm 41 licensure within the last five years and that such license was in good 42 standing at the time of retirement/inactivation/lapse; and who 43 administer the vaccine at a site in which a Physician, Physician

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1 Assistant, Advanced Practice Registered Nurse, and/or a Registered 2 Nurse licensed in good standing in South Carolina and capable of 3 appropriate evaluation and response to medical emergencies, 4 including resuscitation and treatment of anaphylaxis, is present; and 5 (5) dentists licensed in good standing by the South Carolina 6 State Board of Dentistry who have successfully completed the 7 following COVID-19 training programs available through the 8 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: 9 (1) "COVID-19 Vaccine Training: General Overview of Immunization Best Practices for Healthcare Providers"; 10 (2) "What Every Clinician Should Know about COVID-19 11 12 Vaccines Safety"; (3) "What Clinicians Need to Know About the 13 Pfizer-BioTech and Moderna COVID-19 Vaccines"; and 14 15 (4) "Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine: What 16 Healthcare Professionals Need to Know; and who administer the 17 vaccine at a site dedicated to the administration of the COVID-19 vaccine, which does not include the office in which the dentist 18 typically practices dentistry, in which a Physician, Physician 19 20 Assistant, Advanced Practice Registered Nurse, and/or a Registered Nurse licensed in good standing in South Carolina and capable of 21 22 appropriate evaluation and response to medical emergencies, 23 including resuscitation and treatment of anaphylaxis, is present. 24 (B) Notwithstanding any professional scope of practice or 25 unauthorized practice provision this State, in South 26 Carolina-licensed Advanced Practice Registered Nurses, Physician 27 Assistants, and Registered Nurses in good standing may delegate 28 COVID-19 vaccine dose administration to any individual 29 authorized by South Carolina law to administer vaccines or 30 identified in this section as authorized to administer COVID-19 31 vaccine. 32 33 This section terminates and is no longer effective when South B. Carolina is no longer under a declared public health emergency 34 35 concerning COVID-19. 36 SECTION 5. This joint resolution takes effect upon approval by
