## JUDGE PINCUS - EXAMINATION BY MS. MCIVER:

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- Q. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Judge Pincus, this is going back to what we talked about last time you were here. And it goes back to the issue of parental alienation and how that is addressed or dealt with. And I'm curious how that type of therapy is reconciled with the statute addressing the best interests of the child, and specifically I'm talking about South Carolina Code § 63-15-30, which provides: "In determining the best interests of the child, the court must consider the child's reasonable preference for custody. The court shall place weight upon the preference based on the child's age, experience, maturity, judgment, and ability to express a preference." Generally if you are considering a case where there may be an issue of parental alienation, how would you reconcile that with the particular statute?
- A. I'll try to address the major components of the

to refresh my memory on the list. As far as preference of the children, whenever that is brought to the court's attention, it's -- it is looked at, but it also depends on the age of the children and whether there is a guardian to speak on their behalf or not. So we do consider the preference of the children. Generally I do, and -- and -- because of the statute, but it doesn't necessarily mean I always hear the preference.

Now if I do hear the preference through testimony or evidence that comes in, I weigh it based on the circumstances of the case and the age of the children --

Q. Yes.

- Q. Sure. Is there an age where the children's preference is weighed more heavily?
  - A. There is. I believe our law's still currently at 16 you can give greater weight to the preference, and there are cases that vary from very young or -- or 11 year olds, 12 year olds, teens.
