He also writes regularly for Urban Land Magazine, Citiwire, Planning Commissioners Journal, and other periodicals.

He serves on several advisory boards and commissions, including the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Preservation Maryland, the Governor's Institute for Community Design, the Doris Duke Charitable Fund, and the Orton Family Foundation.
