

Step One


- Start with what you already know
- Look for clues at home
- Talk to other family members: parents, grandparents, aunts/uncles, cousins
- Record any information you learn: names, dates, locations
- Focusing on one family line is fine
- Don't skip generations
- Stay organized as you go

Recording your information

- Stay consistent with dates, names, places
- Include maiden name for women
- Don't abbreviate names
- Include nicknames, if you know them
- Town, County, State, Country



Recording your information

- Citations allow you and others to locate your sources again.
- Citations allow us to determine the thoroughness of our research.
- Citations reveal the quality and reliability of our sources.
- Citations allow us and others to recreate how we reached a conclusion.
- Lack of citations is an obvious sign of poor research and possibly unreliable genealogy. How do we know where the information came from and how accurate the information is?


Recording your information

- Books: record the title, author, publishing data, page number, date read and location of book.
- Websites: record the url or website address, author or creator, name of the collection or document, the date you viewed the website.

Genealogy Research cycle

- 1. Create a focused research question. What do you want to discover, what is your goal? "When was my grandmother born?"
- 2. Determine a research strategy. What sources would answer my question? Do they exist? Where do I access them?
- 3. Locate and gather those sources.
- 4. Evaluate the source. How reliable is the information? Does it provide the evidence to answer your question? Do I need to locate additional sources?



Memory can fail you

Clear communication and thoughtful preparation of your goals for each interview will heighten your chances of success,

- Make clear preliminary arrangements with the people you will interview
- Ascertain who else is likely to want to participate
- Do not dismiss other people's input too quickly

AT THE INTERVIEW

- Come to the interview with a list of questions that allow you to keep the interview on track
- Research time periods you will be discussing.
- ourtimelines.com is resource
- Take notes during the interview. As well as recording or filming (with permission). Make sure all equipment is working. You can provide a document for interviewee to granting permission to use what is shared.
- Avoid questions that can be answered yes or no.

AT THE INTEVIEW (CONT'D)

- Tell me what you liked about....
- Tell me about what you experienced...
- Do not provide information or conclusions- can you share what conclusions you have drawn from this experience
- Do not rush your interview. 1-2 hours and schedule another session
- repeat the interviews last words. Ask a question based on interviewee's last words

INTERVIEW (cont'd)

- remain silent after the interviewee has spoken.
 Risk awkwardness for revelation. Silence on your part may give the interviewee time to word their thoughts in deeper response. Give them time to synthesize, analyze and share.
- Do you have anything else you want to add to what I have asked.
- Plan enough time to be with your subject. Elders move at a slower and many need another interview.

ACTION

- List the missing information you need
- Who are the people who might provide this information.
- Plan ahead and set up interviews. Ask the interviewee to bring list of memory joggers
- In what ways could others contribute to the success of the interview. Identify them and invite them

AT THE INTERVIEW

- Make a list of questions to ask during the interview.
- If you are recording, make sure all equipment is working. Make sure you have ample memory for a long interview
- Review you list of questions. Practice reading each one and re-word if necessary to be open ended questions.

Churches – Records held by churches include parish and membership registers, organizational minutes, and directories. If there is a cemetery located on the church property, records of those burials as well as gravestones are good resources.

Libraries – In addition to local histories, many libraries have genealogical information compiled by local residents. Most libraries also have access to online resources not generally available to the public.

Local school system – If you know the schools your family members attended, those schools may have copies of yearbooks and other records.

Historic and genealogical societies – These organizations were founded in order to preserve the history of a particular area. Usually one or the other – or both – will have information you are searching for. If not, they may be able to help you locate additional information.



Getting Started

The best way to start your personal history search is to establish a base by asking yourself two questions:

- 1. What do I want to know?
- 2. What do I already know?

If you want to know family members living in 1886, you'll have to start listing the family members you already know: mother, father, grandparents, great-grandparents, and so on. If that's all you want to know, then you've been successful.

But let's say you want to know more – Where did they live? Where are they buried? Where did they work? Where did they go to church? What did they look like?

At this point, the third question arises:

3. Where can I find more information?

While not all-inclusive, this guide was designed to help you find the resources to explore your own personal history. Because everyone has a history – they just need help finding it.
