Brief description of the Training or Program and its relevant content:

The Symposium will align Charleston County for a more resilient and sustainable future. Attendees will meet local changemakers and discover opportunities to collaborate through dialogue sessions and networking. The sessions will discuss alignment of climate action planning across jurisdictions and levels of government (city/county/region/state), as well as the countywide Hazard Risk and Vulnerability Assessment which includes strategies to advance resilient policies and operation improvements across the county. A moderated panel of elected officials will take place over lunch. Elected's will discuss a shared vision and goals for increasing resilience across the county, and the collaboration necessary to do this work. Afternoon sessions will include lightning round presentations of topics including: food access, connectivity/active transportation, energy efficiency, heat risk reduction, drainage infrastructure improvements, and economic resilience planning. Finally, local government and nonprofit organizations will split into two groups and discuss opportunities for future convening and collaboration on shared resilience and sustainability goals. There will be a ~20 posters on display throughout the day and 15 vendors tabling.

- **Role:** Project Manager **Goal:** Evaluate the effectiveness of the Risk MAP program to implement risk reduction activities. Evaluated ten (10) Oregon Counties that have had various levels of involvement with the Risk MAP program.
- Outcome: The team developed an evaluation report based on a statewide survey, interviews, focus groups, and content analysis of natural hazard mitigation plans over time. Recommendations for program improvement were offered to FEMA representatives and workshopped with practitioners and academics at our team organized and facilitated research symposium. "The Effects of Enhanced Information Utilization in Collaborative Hazard Mitigation Planning" was published in the Journal of the American Planning Association. (April 2022)
