AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The University of South Carolina Union publishes the approved mission statement at <u>http://uscunion.sc.edu/about/mission.html</u>. *In fall 2013, the campus created an abbreviated mission statement: The University of South Carolina Union is dedicated to providing a high-quality, competitive higher education that will enable students to thrive in a global, diverse, and constantly changing environment. By providing a varied curriculum, grounded in the Liberal Arts, USC Union emphasizes a close working relationship among students, faculty, staff, and the community that promotes self-reliance, freedom of thought and expression, productive citizenship, and critical thinking.*

USC Union Goal 1: Increase Enrollment and Retention

Student enrollment, in terms of headcount, increased in 2016-2017 from 569 in fall 2015 to 839 in fall 2016. This represented the highest enrollment at USC Union up to that point in time, with further increases in enrollment projected for the upcoming 2017-2018 academic year, bolstered by partnerships like the Pacer Pathway program with USC Aiken and dual enrollment offerings, as well as new athletic programs.

In efforts to build on that momentum and further increase enrollment heading into the fall 2017 semester, we have further supported the Pacer Pathway program, added two new dual enrollment locations, and enhanced our marketing efforts to recruit more new full-time freshmen on campus in Union and at Laurens, including students who have interacted with us already via dual enrollment courses.

We also have attracted a number of new students by elevating our recently reinstated Baseball team to the level of junior college athletics, along with our new Softball team. Both have joined the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) for the upcoming 2017-2018 academic year. Additionally, we began recruiting for men's and women's soccer, which will be club sports in 2017-2018, but will subsequently join NJCAA as well. Union and Laurens counties have also implemented a scholarship program for new freshmen having graduated from county high schools, which will allow many of those students to attend our campuses tuition free. All of these changes have been featured in enhanced marketing efforts in the surrounding area, including radio and newspaper ads, and ads on digital billboards as far out as in Spartanburg, which have all been received positively. As we attract more new full-time students from out of county, developers have also put plans into motion to construct new student housing around town, including a group of townhomes to be built directly across the street from campus.

As we move forward, we look forward to the possibility of partnering with USC Aiken on a BSN program on our Union campus, which will significantly enhance our recruiting efforts of full-time freshmen on campus as well. We also look forward to adding additional sports teams in the coming years, as well as encouraging more student housing opportunities to assist in recruiting students from out of county and out of state, which has already begun to happen with our new student athletes in particular. Taken together, enrollment is looking to once again increase to a new record high in Fall 2017, with current preliminary headcount already at 915.

While the fall 2015 to fall 2016 retention rate of first-time full-time degree-seeking freshmen was still at 26%, we anticipate a substantial increase in that number moving from 2016 to 2017 and beyond, for a variety of reasons. The newly renovated Student Academic Success Center is a major component of those plans, as it saw quite a bit of student traffic during its first year in operation, offering live tutoring and the opportunity for students to utilize the new BrainFuse online tutoring options with technical assistance from Center staff. The Success Center also helps retain students by actively hosting a variety of workshops and events for students, including academic and career workshops. The Center saw so much traffic in its first year that its footprint is

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expanding out into the adjoining space for the upcoming 2017-2018 school year. Retention will also benefit from additional training of academic advisors, our new dedicated Disability Services director, multiple sports teams, and the potential arrival of a BSN program to Union in partnership with USC Aiken. Not only will this help in retaining on-campus full-time freshmen into their sophomore year, but it will also help in retaining dual enrollment students from their junior/senior year of high school, into conversion to a full-time freshmen on campus after graduating high school. With a record number of new full-time freshmen on campus already for the 2017-2018 academic year, there will be a larger pool of students to continue on with us into their sophomore year in fall 2018, compared to a previous decline in new freshmen on campus. Finally, the success of the Pacer Pathway program with USC Aiken will additionally result in an increase in the number of Associates degrees that we grant, as those students fulfill requirements for our Associates degree in route to admission as full-time upperclassmen at USC Aiken.

USC Union Goal 2: Expand Academic Offerings

An adjunct faculty member during the 2016-2017 academic year will be full-time temporary for the upcoming 2017-2018 year to help provide more natural science courses to accommodate the growing student body on campus, including courses in Biology, Marine Science, and Neuroscience. New permanent full-time faculty searches in the coming 2017-2018 year will likely include nursing, natural science, fine arts, and/or economics faculty. New course offerings have been made available by faculty as well, including some who were awarded course development grants from Palmetto College for the conversion of courses into online formats. During the 2016-2017 year, two faculty successfully applied for tenure and promotion to Associate Professor. New course offerings have also been made available through the hiring of some new adjunct faculty, teaching classes that have not been available in person on the Union campus in a number of years (if ever), including ARTS 103/104/210/310, CRJU 311/426, EDPY 401, MGMT 406, HSPM 412, and PEDU 105.

As detailed in the most recent campus Blueprint, USC Union faculty reported producing 4 books, 3 peerreviewed academic journal articles, 1 international conference presentation, 4 national conference presentations, 3 regional conference presentations, and 4 internal research grants during the FY 2016-2017. Support of their scholarly work will continue to be available from Palmetto College and from the Union campus. The Union campus in particular will continue to support faculty travel to present their work, and will continue attempts to fund the recently instituted Research and Productive Scholarship fund to locally support faculty scholarly activity over the summer months.

USC Union Goal 3: Enhance Educational Experience

Full-time faculty at USC Union carry a normal teaching load of 12 contact hours per semester, with the opportunity for a course reduction to pursue scholarship over the academic year. In both domains, teaching and scholarship, faculty receive significant support from the campus and Palmetto College. A variety of teaching workshops, webinars, and trainings are made available to faculty throughout the year, in large part by the Center for Teaching Excellence in Columbia. Multiple grants are made available through Palmetto College for online course development. Faculty scholarship is supported by a healthy travel budget provided by the Union campus, allowing faculty to present their work at conferences all over the country. The recently instituted addition to the research grants already available from Columbia and Palmetto College, USC Union will initiate a local Research and Productive Scholarship grant program for our faculty awarded a total of \$26,323 to faculty who applied during spring 2017 for summer support. In supporting faculty in these ways, it helps to enhance the students' experiences in the classroom.

USC Union also supports USC's Graduation with Leadership Distinction (GLD) pathways. We have had five students earn this distinction over the past three years (1 in spring 2015, 1 in spring 2016, and 3 in spring 2017),

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and continue to work with more students on pursuing that goal. GLD helps enhance students' educational experience by getting them to connect what they're learning in the classroom with meaningful experiences they're having outside of the classroom.

Finally, we also look to enhance students' educational experiences through increasing activities sponsored by the Success Center and the Student Government Association, as well as the Men and Women on a Mission and African American Association student organizations. Additionally, we supported the travel of six of our USC Union students on a Study Abroad trip during Summer 2017, which included stops in London, Paris, and Amsterdam.

USC Union Goal 4: Strengthen Infrastructure and Campus Resources

In 2016-2017, projects started/completed included:

- Construction of Student Center Courtyard (completed);
- Gazebo renovation (completed);
- Central Building and Main Building parking lot sealing, striping, and handicap additions (completed);
- Main Building replacement of balcony posts and railings (completed);
- Central Building carpeting for admissions area (completed);
- Central Building entryway tile repairs (completed);
- Central Building replacement of damaged fascia boards (completed);
- Main Building interior plaster repairs and painting (completed);
- Main Building exterior wood repairs and painting (completed);

In 2017-2018, projects to be started/continued include:

- Construction of Patrons Park (projected completion date June 2018);
- Central Building window replacements (partially completed; full completion expected by June 2018);
- Central Building HVAC upgrades and retrofits (projected completion date unknown);
- Central Building Roof Replacement (projected completion date June 2018);
- Main Building Landscaping (projected completion date unknown).

USC Union Goal 5: Strengthen Community Ties

The campus hosts a wide variety of community events and activities each year. This includes annual events like the Upcountry Literary Festival, the National Chemistry Day activities, Miss USC Union pageant, and walk for Alzheimers awareness. Moving forward, we will continue to be accessible to the community, including participating in events like the Uniquely Union Festival, hosting local political debates, youth sports, and art showcases.

We are also connected to the community through internships that our students take on as part of work-study assignments or as part of internships in fulfillment of degree requirements.

As our sports teams become more established they will also surely find new ways to engage with the community, as they play their home games at venues in town.


USC Union Goal 5: Planning

USC Union, in cooperation with Palmetto College, will engage in an all-units and functions planning effort to assess what is working and what needs strengthening. This review of USC Union's role within Palmetto College, and the structure and function of all of Palmetto College, positions USC Union to optimally encourage higher education in the counties of Chester, Cherokee, Fairfield, Laurens, Union, and York, including for individuals who are geographically bound within their home county and are not able to regularly commute to a physical campus.

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A note about data availability

Please note that for some performance measures, reports previously generated by the CHE were not available for FY16-17 actual values. The University of South Carolina transitioned student educational records to Banner, a comprehensive, fully integrated, graphical user-interfaced Student Information System. In that transition, there has been something of a data gap, whereby numbers previously generated one way are now being calculated in slightly different ways, for example, or in other cases where enrollment numbers are finalized at different points in the fiscal year now than they have been in previous years. As a result, in this transitional period, some data are not fully comparative. In other cases, reports are simply not available at the time of the submission of this Accountability Report, as is the case for example of the CHE report "Graduation Rates and Success Rates of First-time, Full-time Degree-Seeking Undergraduates for the 2-year Institutions." In performance measures affected by this data gap, Data Source and Availability notes the best source available for actual numbers. For accountability and strategic planning going forward, the new student information systems will result in improved access to information and more accurate reporting.
