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With passage of Act 200 of 2014 and Act 281 of 2016, the state suspended the rating system for school districts and schools due to changes in the assessments used to measure student academic achievement in English language arts and mathematics. For the first time since 2014, school report cards will be published in November of 2018 with schools receiving an overall rating of Excellent, Good, Average, Below Average or Unsatisfactory based on a 100-point scale. and on academic performance in school year 2017-18.

Between 2015 and 2018, the EOC relied upon the reading results of NAEP (National Assessment of Educational Progress) and high school graduation rates to monitor the state's educational system. The following chart highlights the urgency and concern that the EOC has with the current trends in educational performance in our state. If the on-time graduation rate continues to increase by 2 percent annually, South Carolina will likely achieve its goal of having an on-time graduation rate of 88.3% by 2020. However, will students have the world class knowledge and skills as defined in the *Profile of the South Carolina Graduate* to be successful in the 21st century economy?

Based on 2017 NAEP, ACT and state assessment results, not all students will graduate with the world class knowledge or skills to be prepared for the jobs of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Furthermore, the achievement gaps will not be eliminated but instead will increase between 2009 and 2020.

**2017 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)** results showed a significant decrease in performance for 4<sup>th</sup> graders in both reading and math. South Carolina's 4<sup>th</sup> grade reading performance, as measured from 2015 to 2017, was the second largest decline in the nation. For South Carolina's 8<sup>th</sup> grade students, performance was flat from 2015 to 2017. While the 2017 NAEP scores may constitute an outlier, trends over time document that reading achievement has not improved over the past twenty years despite large investments of time and resources in the areas of language, reading, and literacy.

Over three-fourths (77%) of the **2017 Graduating Class in South Carolina** aspired to postsecondary education, as reported by the ACT. All seniors who graduated from public high schools in South Carolina in 2017 had taken the ACT as juniors. The concerning news is:

- Fifteen percent (15%) of students in South Carolina met all four college readiness benchmarks on the ACT, as compared to 27% in the nation.
- The 2017 South Carolina graduating class had a composite score of 18.7 on the ACT, compared to the national average of 21.0.
- Six percent (6%) of African American students met three or more college readiness benchmarks in English, reading, math and science as compared to 36% of White students and 17% of Hispanic students in South Carolina.

2017 State Assessment Results showed declines in student achievement across grade levels and content areas from the prior school year.

While the EOC has not experienced any internal or external factors that hamper the agency's performance, there are factors impacting the K-12 public education system.

**Kindergarten Readiness Assessment -** For the first time in over a decade, kindergarten students in South Carolina were assessed in the fall of 2017 to determine if they were "ready" for kindergarten. Across four areas (early literacy, mathematical thinking, physical development and social development), the statewide results show that a readiness gap exists when students enter kindergarten.

- Statewide, 36% of kindergarten students were "ready to learn."
- About 44% percent of White children were "ready to learn" compared to 27% of African American children and 22% of Hispanic children.

**Teacher Turnover Rates** – The number of individuals entering education – the pipeline into teaching – is down and the number of teachers leaving, especially within the first five years of their career – the leaks in the pipeline – is increasing. Research documents, that teachers are the school-related factor that have the most impact on student performance. A teacher is

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estimated to have two to three times the impact of any other school factor, including services, facilities, and even leadership.

- Over the past seven years, applicants to the SC Teacher Loan Program are down
   40%:
- In 2016-17 **1,684** students completed a SC teacher education program. Just four years ago, this number was **2,447**, a decline of 30%.
- 21% of newly hired teachers in 2017-18 were graduates from a SC teacher education program, a decline of 25% over past five years.
- 4,900 teachers left positions during or at end of the previous school year and are no longer teaching in 2017-18. Of these 4,900, 35% had 5 or fewer years of classroom experience, and 12% had only one year or less.
- At the start of the 2017-18 school year, there were 550 vacant teaching positions, a **16%** increase over the prior school year.

## RISK ASSESSMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES

The Lumina Foundation has documented that by the year 2025, 60% of working-aged Americans (ages 25-64) should have a postsecondary degree or industry certificate because two-thirds of all jobs created will require some form of postsecondary education. The 2018 data document 42% of the working-age adults in South Carolina have a postsecondary degree or industry credential, ranking South Carolina 41st in the nation in 2018, down one spot from 2017. As in other states, South Carolina's attainment rates across racial and ethnic groups reveal large disparities.

If students do not graduate college- and career-ready, then the workforce needs of the state will not be met by South Carolina residents.

To help resolve this issue, the state must consider:


- (1) Strategic planning between early childhood education, K-12 and higher education that align with the workforce needs of today and the future. The EOC would recommend that the state consider an approach employed by Tennessee, SCORE, State Collaborative on Reforming Education.
- (2) Strategic plan to improve the recruitment and retention of quality teachers. There is a disconnect between the state's rigorous math, English language arts, and science standards and student performance on the state end-of-year assessments as well as on national assessments. Besides parental engagement, the one factor that most directly affects student achievement is the quality of teaching in the classroom. The state needs

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- a strategic plan to have and keep effective, high quality teachers in every classroom, but especially in schools with low-academic achievement; and
- (3) Improving English language arts, mathematics and science achievement in the State. These are the critical skills that students need for the STEM jobs. The programs and initiatives currently provided are not meeting the needs of all students.
