AGENCY MISSION	<p>Winthrop University provides personalized and challenging undergraduate, graduate, and continuing professional education programs of national caliber within a context dedicated to public service to the nation and to the State of South Carolina. Winthrop's longtime commitment to be among the very best institutions of its kind in the nation continually guides the mission of the university.</p> <p>Building on its 19th century origins as a distinctive women’s college, the Winthrop University of the 21st century is achieving national stature as a competitive and distinctive, co-educational, public, residential comprehensive, values-oriented institution. The values of service, excellence, diversity, community, and leadership provide the foundation for Winthrop’s continuing development and shape Winthrop’s continuing success.</p> <p>Winthrop enrolls an achievement-oriented, culturally diverse and socially responsible student body between 6,500 and 7,000 students. The University recruits South Carolina’s most able students as well as highly qualified students from beyond the state whose presence adds diversity and enrichment to the campus and the state. Winthrop prides itself on being an institution of choice for groups traditionally under-represented on many college campuses.</p> <p>Winthrop is located in a traditional setting of exceptional beauty, and provides a contemporary, collaborative, and supportive environment that fosters engaged student learning and development. Winthrop has a diverse and able faculty and professional staff of national caliber and supports their work as effective teachers, scholars, researchers, practitioners, and creative artists. Through this talented group, Winthrop students acquire and develop knowledge, skills, capabilities and values that enrich their lives and prepare them to meet the needs and challenges of the contemporary world, including the ability to communicate effectively, appreciate diversity, work collaboratively, synthesize knowledge, solve complex problems and adapt to change. Ongoing assessment of programs and services ensures both that all academic programs challenge students at their highest level of ability and that the library, instructional technology and other academic service areas support courses of study that are consonant with best practices. As a result, Winthrop graduates are eminently well prepared to enter the most competitive graduate or professional schools as well as to be leaders in their chosen professions and in their communities.</p>

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AGENCY’S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Winthrop University offers quality and access while promoting individual achievement and the greater good, recognizing that higher education serves three primary, interrelated purposes:

- To fuel the economic engines of South Carolina and of the nation through workforce development and entrepreneurship;
- To prepare individuals for democratic citizenship and social responsibility through exposure to the liberal arts, diverse people and experiences, and challenges that develop higher levels of intellectual, ethical, and moral reasoning; and
- To promote professional success and social mobility by recognizing the fundamental connection between quality of education and equality of opportunity.

Winthrop University engages in continuous, institution-wide, research-based planning and evaluation that includes senior and mid-level leadership in academic, administrative, and student support service units. Winthrop’s annual planning cycle is synchronized with South Carolina’s Fiscal Year, July 1 through June 30.

Winthrop’s 2019-20 State Accountability Report provides an overview of performance and achievements related to meeting institutional goals, complying with state and federal regulations, fulfilling regional accreditation standards ([SACSCOC](#)), and supporting South Carolina’s Statewide Enterprise Strategic Objectives, specifically Objective #1 – Education, Training, and Human Development. Examples of the University’s 2019-20 achievements span all campus divisions and are contextualized by the five goals of the [Winthrop Plan](#), the institution’s strategic plan.

Goal 1: Support inclusive excellence by expanding our impact on students and our communities through enrollment growth and increases in retention and graduation rates. (Supports South Carolina Statewide Enterprise Strategic *Objective #1 – Education, Training, and Human Development* and *Objective #4 – Public Infrastructure and Economic Development*.)

- Winthrop achieved its best overall [U.S. News & World Report’s](#) Best Colleges ranking in 25 years. The University moved from a ranking of 25th to 17th among southern public and private regional universities, retained the ranking of 8th among Southern public universities, and rose from a ranking of 17th to 8th among best colleges for veterans.
- For the second-straight year, Winthrop was included in [Money Magazine’s](#), “Best Colleges for Your Money 2019.” Educational quality is one of the three categories considered for inclusion in the value ratings.
- The Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education (NASPA) recognized Winthrop as a [First-gen Forward Institution](#) for its commitment to improving experiences and advancing outcomes of first-generation college students. Approximately, one-third of Winthrop students identify as first-generation.

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- Student enrollment remained stable overall with continued growth in several graduate programmatic areas, including online offerings.
- The three-year average first-year student retention rate is 74%, with the 2013 cohort’s six-year graduation rate (63.7%) showing a 7.4 percentage point increase over the previous year’s cohort.
- [Education Trust’s national report](#), “A Look at Black Student Success: Identifying Top- and Bottom-Performing Institutions,” listed Winthrop University as #2 in top-performing institutions for graduating black students. Winthrop’s black student average six-year graduation rate of 58.5% is higher than the average graduation rate of the institution’s white students (57.6%).

Goal 2: Continually enhance the quality of the Winthrop experience for all students by promoting a culture of innovation, with an emphasis on global and community engagement. (Supports South Carolina Statewide Enterprise Strategic *Objective #1 – Education, Training, and Human Development.*)

- Winthrop University earned a Gold Seal for the [All in Democracy Challenge](#) with a 40.1% student voter turnout in the mid-term elections, and was recognized among the [Top 80 in the Student Voting category](#) of the 2019 Washington Monthly College Rankings, one of only three South Carolina institutions earning this distinction. The institution was designated in 2017 and 2019 as a Voter Friendly Campus by the Campus Vote Project and NASPA-Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education.
- The Richard W. Riley [College of Education](#) was reaccredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP), meeting all initial and advanced standards with no areas for improvement cited. The [College of Business Administration](#) was reaccredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business International (AACSB), demonstrating a focus on excellence in all areas, including teaching, research, curriculum development, and student learning. Winthrop’s [Macfeat Early Childhood Laboratory School](#) was reaccredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), receiving commendation for the high-quality learning experience and care provided to students.
- Winthrop received approval to offer three new undergraduate [degrees](#) (BA data science, BS applied software development, BS educational studies) and to expand the MAT in Teaching Programs in four areas (early childhood education, elementary education, middle-level education, special education). Each degree is timely and necessary to fit the needs and demands of the current job market.
- The Richard W. Riley College of Education was awarded a \$3.8 million [Teacher Quality Partnership federal grant](#) for teacher recruitment and retention efforts in three South Carolina School Districts. The Network for Sustained Educational Residencies that Value Equity (NetSERVE) grant will establish a teacher residency program to prepare individuals who hold a bachelor’s degree to become teachers through the graduate Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program.
- Winthrop University was approved by the Certified Planner Board of Standards (CFP) to provide a [registered certificate program](#) in financial planning. A CFP Board-Registered Program meets specific criteria for educating students who wish to fulfill the education component of obtaining CFP certification.

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Goal 3: Attract and retain high quality and diverse faculty, staff, and administrators. (Supports South Carolina Statewide Enterprise Strategic *Objective #1 – Education, Training, and Human Development.*)

- Dr. George Hynd was appointed by the Winthrop University Board of Trustees to serve as [Interim President](#). He will serve the institution through June 30, 2022.
- Dr. Jamie Cooper was selected as [Vice Provost for Student Success and Dean of University College](#). He will lead initiatives and coordinate operations focused on increasing retention and graduation rates, as well as oversee University College, which houses academic success programs.
- Kaetrena Kendrick, a Winthrop alumna, was selected as the [Dean of Dacus Library and Pettus Archives](#). Kendrick was named the 2019 Association of College and Research Librarians’ Academic/Research Librarian of the Year.
- Eva Roberts was named [chair of the Department of Design](#). She brings more than twenty years of design education experience to Winthrop.
- Dr. Jack DeRochi, Dean of the Graduate School, was elected to serve as the [President of the Conference of Southern Graduate Schools](#), an organization comprised of more than 200 graduate schools. Jeff Bellantoni, Dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts, was appointed as a [board member](#) for both the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) and the Innovative Center for Design Excellence (ICDE).
- Michelle Hare, Director of the Office of Financial Aid, earned the prestigious designation of [Certified Financial Aid Administrator \(CFAA\)](#) from the CFFA Commission, the independent certifying body of the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA). Hare is one of 126 professionals nationwide having earned this designation, and one of three in South Carolina.
- Winthrop holds the top spot among the 10 state four-year universities by [meeting its affirmative action goals](#) for recruiting, retaining, and promoting minorities and women. The university increased from a baseline of 14% to 21% in its minority hiring.

Goal 4: Provide facilities, technology, and programs that support Winthrop students and the overall Winthrop experience. (Supports South Carolina Statewide Enterprise Strategic *Objective #4 – Public Infrastructure and Economic Development.*)

- Extensive repairs and replacements to the roofs of campus buildings, many of which are recognized by the National Register of Historic Places, continued to progress in 2019-20.
- Updates to the Campus Master Plan are underway with a completion date set in 2020.
- [Instructional technology](#) upgrades were made to 38 classrooms, including updated computers, projectors, interactive collaboration tools, and WiFi, which met the strategic target set.
- In response to [COVID-19](#), the institution moved to remote online instruction for a portion of the spring semester (i.e., after spring break). The Office of Online Learning created a resource page for students and a continuity of instruction website for faculty. [Computing and Information Technology](#) supported

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faculty’s technology needs in the transition, developing a Working Remotely FAQ webpage and supporting VPN access.

- The [College of Visual and Performing Arts faculty](#) creatively responded to remote instruction to support their students’ academic endeavors. From dance internet platforms that recorded student performances and using university-rented musical instruments to [online showcases and exhibitions](#) for design and fine arts students, technology was used to assure a quality academic experience in the face of COVID-19.
- Winthrop joined the [Folding@home Project](#), a project supported by Washington University to use computers throughout the world to find drug pathways to kill the COVID-19 virus. The university is allowing its academic computer labs and esports computers to be accessed remotely as part of the Folding@home Project.

Goal 5: Ensure financial stability and sustainability. (Supports South Carolina Statewide Enterprise Strategic *Objective #1 – Education, Training, and Human Development.*)

- The amount of scholarship and grant dollars provided to students from the University and Foundation continues to grow and exceeds the University’s 2025 strategic plan goal.
- Total endowment assets reached \$59 million in fiscal year 2019, up \$3.4 million from fiscal year 2018. [Donors](#) gave over \$6.5 million in 2019, marking the second-highest amount ever raised in fundraising history.
- The institutional debt ratio continues on a positive downward trend, dropping from 0.45 (FY18) to 0.41 (FY19).
- Alumni giving rates increased from 3.2% (FY18) to 5.1% (FY19).
- As a result of the COVID-19 financial impact, Winthrop [discontinued the sports of men’s and women’s tennis](#), joining more than 148 other programs across all divisions and classifications of intercollegiate athletics.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

A failure of Winthrop University to accomplish its mission and goals could **negatively impact the student educational experience and potentially weaken the pool of qualified candidates who support the workforce of the State of South Carolina.** Given that 90% of Winthrop undergraduates are from South Carolina and approximately 41% of Winthrop undergraduates are eligible for federal Pell grants, a diminished educational experience would negatively impact South Carolina’s historically underserved populations. These are the very citizens the State of South Carolina identifies as needing the most support to advance their education in order to compete for employment opportunities that provide a living wage.

The University employs mitigating strategies focused on enhancing operational efficiency, managing costs, sustaining effectiveness, emphasizing forward-thinking, and remaining current with education trends. These strategies are supported by the following efforts:

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- The development (2015-16) and implementation (2016-17) of the [Winthrop Plan](#), which serves as a blueprint for the university through 2025, outlines the five goals and initiatives that Winthrop will achieve to **drive enrollment, retention, student success, diversity and fundraising** in order to become a **national model for a student-centered university experience**.
- Winthrop University remains compliant with standards of the institution’s regional accrediting body, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). In July 2017, [SACSCOC](#) approved the University’s Fifth-Year Interim Report and the Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) Impact Report, with no request for additional reporting. Accreditation by SACSCOC signifies that the institution has a mission appropriate to higher education; has resources, programs, and services sufficient to accomplish and sustain its mission; maintains clearly specified educational objectives that are consistent with its mission and appropriate to the degrees offered; and assesses its achievement of stated objectives. The institution is currently developing the Compliance Certification Report and the QEP as requirements for the Decennial Review Class of 2022.
- Winthrop University retains [program-specific accreditation](#) with 22 accrediting bodies, thus ensuring the quality of its educational programs. The institution has traditionally sought and received national accreditation for degree programs that maintain programmatic accreditation standards.

Supportive actions by the State that could help to mitigate a negative impact on the student educational experience include:


- Restore the proportion of state appropriations to Winthrop University to pre-2008 recession levels. This action would enable Winthrop to minimize fiscal impact upon students relative to tuition, fees, room, and board, thereby supporting Winthrop’s goals to increase access, degree attainment, and inclusive excellence in learning experiences for all students.
- Fully fund salary increases for state employees. Cost of living increases that are mandated by the General Assembly, but not fully funded create significant challenges in balancing the institution’s budget. The increased budgetary strain on the University has the potential to impact the quality of the student educational experience.
- Reduce institutional labor costs by eliminating reporting obligations that involve redundancy across state agencies.
