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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

SC State PSA addresses quality of life opportunities for all residents in South Carolina with a special emphasis on underserved communities through an organized research and extension system. The funding provides stakeholders with outreach programs and services to assist with quality of life opportunities. The focus of the funding assists limited resource citizens across the State of South Carolina in enhancing or changing their lifestyles. The limited resource citizens the SC State PSA helps are mostly underserved and under-resourced individuals. By underserved and under-resourced, we referenced residents living in rural, urban and suburban communities who have been traditionally overlooked or not served because of issues, such as transportation, knowledge of or access to programs, lack of education, access to resources, equipment or money to invest in various resource opportunities.

The SC State PSA funding reflected accomplishments and results performed through individual and collective activities that focused on the triad mission of research, teaching and extension/outreach. The SC State Research and Extension programs focused on critical issues dealing with agricultural and natural resources; family life, health and nutrition; youth development; agribusiness and community development; food safety and security; education; and technology. The programmatic thrust looks at the needs identified by stakeholders as the emerging issues impacting their communities. The PSA funding allowed agents and researchers to explore and administer self-sustaining and economically enriching programs and activities to the citizens of South Carolina. Agents/Researchers were able to engage in workshops, hands-on demonstrations, field experiences, laboratory experiments, case studies and data collection. Without the SC State PSA funding, program delivery and outreach to South Carolinians would have been limited or non-existent. The goals and objectives of the agency would not have been met.

Throughout the reporting period of July 2019 – June 2020, the SC State Research and Extension Program delivered programs and services in the areas of Sustainable Agriculture Production for (non-food) horticulture crops, Natural Resources Management, Food Safety, Agribusiness and Community Development, 4-H Youth Development and Families, Nutrition and Childhood Obesity, Sustainable Energy, and Global Food Security and Hunger. The PSA funds assisted with a total of 26 research projects for the reporting period. Four of the research projects ended during July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020. Four research projects requested and received extensions because of mitigating circumstances were unable to meet their original completion date. Also, 3 final bulletins were written and submitted for publication. One research final bulletin is still being prepared for submission and publication. With the 4 research projects ending, 9 new projects came aboard. Of the 26 research projects, 16 of them had an outreach component to their investigations.

To highlight some of the research conducted, one researcher focused on noise exposure to the hearing health of farmers and farm workers. According to the National Institute of Deafness and other communication disorder (NIDCD), more than 30 million Americans (all ages) are exposed to hazardous sound (noise) levels on a regular basis, without using hearing protection devices (HPD). The research on assessment of hearing loss and high blood pressure changes the attitude and behavior of farmers regarding the active use of hearing protection devices. The research is ongoing.

In the area of Natural Resources Management, researchers looked at the contamination of soils and groundwater by Uranium (U). It is a global problem of great concern. The human health hazards presented by exposure to Uranium are great significance (with kidney and bone being high-risk targets). The research aims to remove and/or stabilize non-radioactive U (and heavy metals) utilizing a unique

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combination of specific microbial activities from novel bacteria isolated from U-contaminated soils and sediments. The research is ongoing, and the goal is to apply findings into the field of Natural Resources Management.

The critical issue in Food Safety was the ozone treatment as an alternative for conventional fumigation to manage stored product insects project. It focused on evaluating ozone (O3) as an alternative control option for the management of stored product insect pests, which are known to cause millions of dollars of loss to stored products such as grain-based products, and dried fruit and nuts.

An examination of marketing capabilities of small farmers who engage in agritourism activities as a supplemental or primary means of earnings and seeks to provide research-based measures to improve the marketing viability of such farms was explored in the area of Agribusiness and Community Development. Research identified current and potential small farm agritourism practitioners and the marketing challenge they face in developing and communicating agritourism experiences and resources. Through the research, the agency is interested and committed to connecting and transferring laboratory findings into the outreach services.

Moreover, based on the South Carolina test results of the 2015 – 2016 academic year, most test takers (grades 3 – 8) did not meet state established reading expectations in Orangeburg County Schools, according to the SC State Department of Education. The influences of music instruction on reading and music achievement in grades PreK-5 aimed to test the influences of two discrete courses (Music Instruction on Reading and Music Appreciation) linked by agriculture literacy outcomes involving food, health, and lifestyle in the area of 4-H Youth Development and Families.

Nutrition and Childhood Obesity research examined obesity as a serious medical condition that affects large populations in the United States and focused on evidence in South Carolina. In South Carolina, and specifically Orangeburg County, obesity rates are quite high. In 2013 South Carolina children age 2-17 were classified as overweight (14.9%) and obese (16.7%), according to South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC). There were various issues related to obesity, and one of them was *obesity prevention*, which is the focus of the research. An achievement motivation boosting procedure for the cortex was designed, which took advantage of the possibility of a subject to use brain signals to control movement of a physical devices. The method is known in science as brain-computer interface. It is a non-invasive method and is often considered as a computer+robot game of interest for children.

Sustainable Energy research is underway to reuse post-consumed plastics for solvent extraction of resins and other reprocessing. The project centers on saving energy by recovering resin and reutilizing post-consumed plastics (PCPs) and waste plastics. It has been estimated that the availability of PCPs increases yearly by over 2%, and it is slightly higher than the rate of resins production.

Nationally, there are more than 42 million households dealing with food insecurity and 13 million are children. Global Food Security and Hunger is a critical issue the 1890 researchers are investigating. There have been many programs developed and strategies aimed at reducing food insecurity. SC State proposed a school-based program to address food insecurity of public-school students that reside in rural areas (Orangeburg and Calhoun counties). Researchers examined the relationship of school-based programs and their effect on nutrition and behavior, as well as, developed initiatives that would enhance participation in food programs an access to food to address food insecurity. The researchers are in the process of preparing the final bulletin for publication, which will provide more detailed results.

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SC State PSA sponsored programs and services logged over 26,247 direct contact hours and 35,872 indirect contact hours in public service activities. A total of 5,019 participants completed educational workshops. Approximately 1,366 different public service activities and programs were offered across the state. By utilizing the Integrated Crop Management (ICM) practices, 864 acres of farmland were improved. A total of 1,624 families and caregivers received information of adopting healthy life-style habits. There were 49 partnerships established with after-school programs, faith-based organizations, school districts and other agencies.

In the focus area of Sustainable Animal Production Systems, small scale livestock producers were interested in improving their farm operations management. To help gain knowledge to increase acreage and forage use workshops were held. Three producers received Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) funds; 1 producer's animals increased from 30 to 40, which was a 33% increase.

Sustainable Agriculture Production for (non-food) Horticulture Crops outreach work was conducted. Access to fresh vegetables was a problem for many communities in the Midlands Region, as many do not have local grocery stores. Micro-irrigation provides a necessary tool for farmers to produce a reliable supply of vegetables and ensures the success of other high value crops, such as industrial hemp. Farmers who installed micro-irrigation increased transplant survival by at least 80%, increasing fall greens profits by \$1,662.00 and saving an estimated \$78,000 worth of industrial hemp.

Minority land loss is a serious issue in the Low Country of South Carolina. An outreach project was developed to address the decline of small/minority farms and landownership. Two hundred and thirty-five participants gained knowledge and increased skills in the Natural Resources Management area.

Food Safety is a very important issue in the world today. PSA funds were used to assist the Healthy Lifestyles Project in the Low Country, which helped 47% of the participants adopt handwashing and safe food handling practices.

The Citizenship Program, which falls under the Agribusiness and Community Development planned program, builds on existing efforts of engaging individuals, civic, and community leaders to improve the economic, environmental, political, and social conditions of their community. The goal was to empower individuals, businesses and organizations to improve their community and give a voice to traditionally underrepresented and underserved community members. Eight hundred sixty-five youth participated in the program, with 305 completing their project series of lessons.

With 4-H Youth Development and Families, Strategies in Math and Reading using Technology (SMART) was designed to assist 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students academically. SMART focused on preparing youth for the upcoming school year in reading and math standards using technology. There was a 100% improvement in math and reading comprehension.

In the Nutrition and Childhood Obesity area, the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) continues to educate the public. As more and more people learn the benefits of eating more fruits and vegetables, they in turn become healthier. Of the 398 program participants, 80% of them stated they gained knowledge about eating healthy foods. The agency will focus on service area counties with greater evidence of obesity, hypertension, and diabetes.

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EFNEP agents worked tirelessly with parents and youth to encourage them to eat healthy and understand food insecurity. Two hundred fifty-four participants were involved in a taste testing exercise, after the EFNEP sessions. As a result of the sessions, 99% of the youth gained knowledge and were able to choose healthier foods, while 97% of adults improved their diet quality.

For SC State PSA to be able to accomplish its mission and share its vision, it will require people and agencies working together. If outside help is needed to mitigate stumbling blocks or bumps that would deter the success of a project, the administration is amenable to contacting the necessary officials to bring things to fruition. For example, there may be a need for local and/or state approval to conduct business, letters of support may be required, assistance with moving facility acquisitions may be necessary, or making sure paperwork deadlines are met in a timely manner. The General Assembly can assist in resolving the issues before they develop into a crisis.

The Public Service Activities funding ensures compliance with the terms and conditions of the USDA/NIFA Cooperative Agreement. The agreement provides federal formula funds each year to research and extension. The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (H. R. 2646) requires a 100% non-federal match annually. If the required annual non-federal match as stipulated in the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (H. R. 2646) is not met, the SC State PSA would lose the federal formula funds, which would be redistributed to the states that met the federal match requirement. The matching fund requirements may be found in the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 under Section 7212-Matching Funds Requirement for Research and Extension Activities of 1890 Institutions.

In August 2019, the administrative leadership at SC State Research and Extension changed. The new administrator approached the organization with a renewed vision and innovative ideas to enhance the tripart mission of research, teaching and outreach. The Executive Director unveiled a 100-day plan of operation. Teams were formed, planning sessions were held and the need to restructure and hire employees was instituted. A SWOT (Strengths, Weakness, Opportunities, Threats) Analysis was conducted with staff and administration. The SWOT Analysis is a strategic tool to help an organization identify and evaluate the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats of a project, program, product, plan or business decision. An "All Hands-on Meeting" was held with faculty and staff. Every employee in the organization was asked to participate in the work session. A new organizational chart was distributed. Employees were fitted within the new structure and a dynamic new leadership team was constituted. The new structure incorporated regions instead of the old cluster areas. The SC State Program would now serve 31 counties, which make-up seven regions. The seven regions will include the Upstate Region (Anderson, Pickens, Greenville and Spartanburg Counties); Piedmont Region (Abbeville, Edgefield, Greenwood, McCormick and Saluda Counties); Low Country Region (Allendale, Colleton, Hampton, Beaufort and Jasper Counties); Pee Dee Region (Dillon, Marlboro, Marion, Florence and Horry Counties); Midlands Region (Bamberg, Calhoun, Orangeburg and Barnwell Counties; Santee-Wateree Region (Clarendon, Sumter, Williamsburg and Lee Counties) and Coastal Region (Charleston, Dorchester, Berkeley and Georgetown Counties). With the newly developed seven regional offices, the SC State PSA target audience base will be expanded.

As the year progressed, the restructuring changes continued to be implemented for the administration to carry out the desires of moving the organization forward and striving for excellence. With the 2019-2020 State Accountability Report, a revised organizational chart has been incorporated into the report. The

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chart outlines the first three levels of the chain of command. Employees continue to be hired to fill vacant positions to meet the obligations of the new focus. Plans for some facilities will be closed and/or moved to new locations.

During FY 2019-2020, the Administrative Support Staff were restructured as well as the Fiscal Affairs and Grant Management Unit. The restructuring provided the organization with a comprehensive and uniform method of preparing, processing, distributing and filing all internal and external documents and reports in a more professional and timely manner. Additional units of hierarchy were included in the organizational structure. The three new units consist of Human Resources and Staff Development, Strategic Planning, Evaluation and External Affairs and Marketing and Communications. A Chief Financial Officer (CFO) was hired to manage the Fiscal Affairs and Grant Management Unit. As the restructuring process continues, staff will be trained and cross-trained on the new procedures and job responsibilities. Upon completion, it is anticipated the organization will operate at a higher level of effectiveness and efficiency, regardless of where the personnel are stationed or the unit they are assigned. Staff members will be able to fill-in for absence co-workers and continue to represent the organization in a professional manner to complete the assigned work. In an imperfect world, the organization is striving for excellence.

The organizational objectives have been tweaked or changed to reflect the new strategies of the agency. The agency is developing a new strategic plan that will underpin the organization operations and services. The overall objectives are as follows: 1. Enhance the public image of 1890 Research and Extension as a premier resource for information and community education through innovative cutting-edge relevant research, delivery of significant programs and services. 2. Attract and retain high-quality, passionate employees through consistent and effective on-boarding, professional development, mentorship, promotion and retention by ensuring staff has the support they need to do their best work and take their skills to the next level. 3. Expand and increase the reach of research inquiry and extension programs to underserved and emerging audiences to all 46 counties in South Carolina, the southeast region and internationally. 4. Acquire, build and upgrade existing facilities to provide the highest quality spaces for the important work of researchers, agents and students as we prepare 1890 for the next century of success. 5. Integration of digital technology as an essential tool for the dissemination of research findings and delivery of extension educational programming to provide a sustainable model to fulfill the organization's mission. 6. Identify and secure public and private resources as well as revenue generating opportunities to support the successful implementation and support of core research, outreach, new initiatives and create a financial buffer to reduce major impacts of future cuts or economy downturns. 7. Demonstrates accountability of public funds; and 8. Uphold a culture of integrity, excellence, stewardship, and accountability in pursuit of 1890 SMART & FAST goals and economic viability. The acronym SMART represents Specific Measurable Achievable Realistic Time bound, while FAST stands for Frequent Ambitious Specific Transparent.


Factors that may or may not impact the internal and external performance of the organization include: (1) The submission of an approved NIFA Plan of Work (POW) Accomplishments and Results Report as well as an Annual POW Plan; (2) An official and professional electronic reporting system is needed to collect and interpret data of program activities. Discussions will be encouraged to implement a reporting system. Challenges continue to be encountered as it relates to finding the appropriate system for the agency and purchasing tools for training and maintenance requirements of the system; (3) Strengthening program development; (4) The availability of faculty release time to conduct research; (5) Preparing the Mobile Technology Center (MTC) for use and expanding the technology focus to travel across the state assisting

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regions with programs; (6) Expanding the professional development training for Research and Extension staff; (7) Emphasizing the land grant tradition of public service; (8) Assisting academic areas in developing new and innovative programs/activities; (9) Developing Smart Farms as a resource for farmers; (10) During 2019 – 2020, work continued to be done on the three new 1890 facilities construction projects. To date, occupancy has occurred in two of the three buildings. A groundbreaking ceremony for the third facilities project took place on August 28, 2019. The third building, which is located in Charleston, SC is nearing completion. The success of the 1890 Facilities Projects is dependent on a fluid and consistent partnership between USDA/NIFA, 1890 Research and Extension, SC State's Finance Division and the SC Department of Administration. If there is an issue with any member of the partnership, the total project could be delayed or rejected by the approving agency or agencies. The inability to hire individuals with the proven, demonstrated skills necessary to secure external funds would interfere with the 1890 Program's ability to achieve its external funding goal; (11) Enhancing an opportunity to strengthen and develop more collaborations and partnerships across the state with various entities; and (12) Purchasing new facilities to accommodate the increase of staff and expand programs and activities across the state.


