## **AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**

Elections are the foundation that supports and protects every citizen's freedoms. The South Carolina State Election Commission (SEC) exists to protect those freedoms by ensuring the security and integrity of our election infrastructure. Our mission is to ensure every eligible citizen has the opportunity to register to vote and participate in fair and impartial elections with the assurance that every vote will count.

Conducting elections is a technologically and legally complex profession, subject to exceptional scrutiny by voters, candidates, media, the legal community, activists, and voter advocacy groups. This requires everyone involved in the elections process, whether at the municipal, county, or state level, to possess a wide variety of core competencies including technological, logistical and management skills, as well as a high level of election experience and expertise.

While state and local election officials share in the responsibility of conducting elections, the SEC, as the chief election agency in the state, is responsible for overseeing the overall voter registration and election process. Specifically, the agency is tasked with:

- Maintaining the statewide voter registration system
- Supporting the statewide voting system
- Supervising 46 county boards of voter registration and elections
- Performing audits and post-election analyses of county boards of registration and elections
- Assisting with county operations if a county election office fails to comply with state and federal law or SEC policies and procedures; or if a county is unable to certify election results in a timely manner
- Conducting a training and certification program for local election officials
- Conducting candidate filing and providing a candidate tracking system

Everything we do as an agency – our programs and projects – emanates from these responsibilities. The primary goal is to provide the highest level and quality of service possible within these mandates.

### **MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS**

#### Continued Operations and the Conduct of Elections in the COVID-19 Pandemic

The SEC worked from the outset of the pandemic following rules and guidelines from State Human Resources, the Department of Health and Environmental Control and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to ensure continuity of operations while protecting the health and safety of agency employees, county election officials, poll workers and voters. This included educating employees on COVID-19, providing employees the resources necessary to work from home, and taking measures to help ensure the safety of employees working in the SEC office. While some employees were initially able to work from home, the office remained open; and by August, all employees were working in the office preparing for the 2020 General Election.

The SEC worked to overcome unique challenges for the conduct of elections created by the pandemic. South Carolina elections require voters to gather in large numbers at polling places – something public safety and health officials encourage people not to do during a pandemic. The SEC took numerous steps to help protect the right to vote and the health and safety of voters and poll managers.

- Raised awareness with the S.C. General Assembly and the Governor's Office of the unique challenges associated with conducting an election in a pandemic and provided options to help mitigate those challenges.
- Implemented temporary measures taken by the General Assembly to expand absentee voting opportunities for voters.
- Provided counties with:
  - o Online COVID-19 poll manager training
  - Poll manager supplies to aid in applying social distancing principles and cleaning common surfaces in polling places.
  - Masks, face shields and gloves for poll managers.
  - o Sneeze guards for polling place check-in stations.
  - Hand sanitizer for voters and poll managers.
  - o Cotton swabs for making selections on touchscreens.
  - Additional ballot-marking devices and scanners to help facilitate social distancing and process increase in absentee-by-mail ballots.
  - o Ballot-marking device carts to help facilitate social-distancing in the curbside voting process.
- Assisted counties with poll manager recruitment.
- Sent postcards to voters whose polling places had changed due to the pandemic.
- Educated voters on their voting options and encouraged voters to wear a face mask, bring their own pen for signing the poll list, and to practice social distancing at the polling place.

#### 2020 General Election

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, extraordinary efforts by voters, poll managers and election officials led to a successful Statewide General Election on November 3, 2020. State and county election officials along with our valuable agency partners worked tirelessly under unprecedented circumstances to adjust to new voting laws and enact plans to provide safe and accessible registration and voting opportunities for every citizen.

Following a poll manager shortage in the June 2020 Statewide Primaries, the SEC actively campaigned to help county election officials recruit new managers. As a result, more than 20,000 South Carolinians volunteered to serve as poll managers in the 2020 General Election. Amidst a pandemic, these new and experienced managers, attended training, wore personal protective equipment, applied social distancing, and kept polling places operating in a safe and efficient manner.

The statewide, paper-based voting system was used for the first time in a general election adding an additional layer of security to the election process. Every voter voted a paper ballot, and hand count audits of those paper ballots verified the accuracy of ballot scanners. New electronic poll books were implemented for first use in a statewide election, which among other benefits, all but eliminated the possibility of poll manager errors leading to voters receiving incorrect ballots.

County boards of voter registration and elections opened more in-person absentee locations than ever before. In-person absentee voting rates more than doubled, and absentee by mail rates tripled over previous record years. As a result, for the first time ever, a majority of voters cast their ballots

prior to election day. Overall, more voters than ever before voted in the 2020 General Election. Voters were able to vote quickly and efficiently, and election officials were able to count votes and report totals in a timely manner. Pandemic-related procedures and the expansion of absentee voting were successful in protecting voters and election officials. The tireless and unprecedented efforts of the SEC, county election officials, and poll managers resulted in the best general election in history under the worst circumstances.

### **Election Security**

Protection of South Carolina's critical election infrastructure remained a top priority during FY2021. Elections face numerous threats from a wide variety of actors with various motives. The agency is committed to taking all reasonable measures to further enhance the state's election security posture. Major achievements in this fiscal year include:

- The new, statewide paper-based voting system used for the first time in a statewide general election. The system provides another layer of security by having a paper record of every voter's voted ballot that can be used for audits. Hand count audits of paper ballots verified scanners were tabulating accurately. At the end of FY2021, the SEC was developing additional audit programs.
- The SEC took steps to combat the spread of misinformation, disinformation and malinformation (MDM) harmful to the election process. The SEC works to establish its communication channels as trusted sources of election information, to educate the public on using only trusted sources, to disseminate accurate and timely information to the public, and to take actions to counter the spread of specific MDM.
- Agency website moved to .gov domain. This change will help maintain the public's trust in the information and services provided through the site.
- The SEC worked to continue expansion of county network sensors on county networks. In partnership with the State Law Enforcement Division (SLED), the SEC works to deploy network sensors on county networks throughout the state.

The SEC continues working with a broad-based team of federal, state, and private cybersecurity, law enforcement and intelligence professionals to ensure the agency takes every prudent measure to enhance the security and resilience of the state election infrastructure. These partnerships provide a multitude of resources and services including:

- Network scanning and monitoring
- Cyber and physical risk and vulnerability assessments
- Remediation
- Information sharing
- Response support
- Security training
- Advice on strengthening our security posture

The SEC continues to improve its security posture by adding layers of security to address changes in the environment and the emergence of new technologies and threats. Taking all reasonable measures to bolster the security and resilience of the state's election infrastructure will remain a top priority for the agency.

#### **Voter Education and Outreach**

The SEC continued to reach out and educate voters on all aspects of voter registration and elections, including COVID-19-related information. In FY2021, the agency continued its award-winning "No Excuse SC" voter education initiative. The campaign asks, "What's your excuse, South Carolina?" and drives home the answer – there is no good excuse not to register and vote because both are easy to do. The campaign's objectives are to:

- Encourage voter registration
- Inspire voter turnout
- Recruit poll managers
- Prepare voters for election day
- Establish the SEC as a trusted source of election information

The agency uses a microsite (NoExcuseSC.gov) as a hub for online voter services and information. When citizens arrive at NoExcuseSC.com they can quickly find the service or information they are looking for, and when they click a link, they go directly to the applicable page of the agency's main site, scVOTES.gov. Overall, the goal of the SEC's voter education initiatives is to help ensure voters are informed about the requirements, processes, procedures, and deadlines associated with voter registration and voting in South Carolina. Communication channels include educational brochures, posters, videos, outreach at public events, a voter education website (scVOTES.gov), social media messaging, and a statewide traditional media campaign.

## **KEY OPPORTUNITIES & CHALLENGES**

### **Election Security**

One of the agency's top priorities is working to ensure all reasonable measures are taken to improve and protect the security and resilience of the state's election infrastructure. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security designated election systems as critical infrastructure in January 2017. The SEC has applied considerable resources to hardening both the state's voting and voter registration systems by applying

testing, assessments, and technological and human resources. The development of an unprecedented security partnership of state, federal and private security professionals as well as state and federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies was launched to improve protection of the state's election infrastructure during this period.

The most substantial and challenging threat in 2020 was the spread of misinformation, disinformation and malinformation (MDM) about the administration of elections.

- Misinformation is false, but not created or shared with the intention of causing harm.
- Disinformation is deliberately created to mislead, harm, or manipulate a person, social group, organization, or country.
- Malinformation is based on fact, but used out of context to mislead, harm, or manipulate.

Whether intentional or not, the spread of MDM threatens to disrupt the public's trust in elections and impact the ability of individual voters to effectively exercise the franchise. The SEC works to combat the spread of MDM in various ways.

- Promotes election officials as the trusted source of information
- Drives voters directly to SEC information channels
- Ensures voters are getting accurate election information
- Openly communicates plans, procedures, and processes
- Avoids actions that would unintentionally amplify or spread disinformation
- Educates voters to rely on trusted sources and to not share unverified information

Our elections continue to face threats that challenge the agency's cyber and physical security initiatives. The SEC has been proactive through partnerships with federal, state, private, and local entities. However, the need to adapt to the every-evolving security environment along with the need to train local election officials and harden local infrastructure is a major challenge that the agency continues to address. Implementation of new auditing programs, deployment of county network scanners, security training, assessments, testing, and remediation are all ongoing security challenges facing the SEC moving into FY2022.

## **Long Term Impact of Emergency COVID Funding**

### Additional Voting Equipment

COVID funds were used to purchase additional ballot-marking devices and scanners for county boards of voter registration and elections. The additional equipment helped counties open additional in-person absentee voting sites, apply social distancing at polling places, and process record-breaking absentee by mail ballots. This additional equipment will continue to benefit the state in the future in the same ways as well as helping reduce potential lines at polling places, helping account for growth, and ensuring counties have back-up equipment that can be deployed to address election day issues.

#### Statewide Electronic Poll Books

COVID funds were used to purchase a statewide, uniform electronic poll book system (EPB) for county boards of voter registration elections. This helped reduce contact in the polling place to prevent the spread of COVD-19. The state and county boards will continue to benefit from the EPB in various ways:

• Ensures voters receive correct ballot

- Simplifies check-in process for voters and poll managers
- Reduces lines
- Reducing the time and resources necessary to process voter participation data
- Improves accuracy and security of the voter registration list

## **Additional Auditing Programs**

At the end of FY2021, the SEC received approval for FY2022 funding to establish new voting system audit programs. The SEC plans to add an independent results verification process in which every ballot cast in all statewide elections will be re-tabulated using a third-party system to verify voting system results. In addition to third-party verification, we also plan to establish some level of risk-limiting audits (RLAs). An RLA uses a statistically significant, random sample of voted ballots to manually examine for evidence that the originally reported outcome is correct. We believe these additional audits will provide voters and election officials even greater confidence in the integrity of our elections.

## **Election Legislation**

To improve voter registration and elections in South Carolina, the SEC recommends the General Assembly consider legislative changes to address the following issues.

- <u>Uniform Voter Registration Deadline</u> Voter registration deadlines currently vary depending on the method of registration. This is confusing to voters and to election officials and voter advocates. Amendments to various sections of the S.C. Code of Laws are needed to establish a uniform deadline for all methods of voter registration.
- <u>Early Voting</u> Early voting will improve the election experience for every South Carolinian by
  making voting more convenient and by reducing wait times at polling places on election day. In
  addition, early voting would greatly reduce the time necessary to process paper absentee ballots.
- <u>Uniform Rules for Municipal Elections</u> Establishing uniform municipal election dates, candidate
  filing and certification deadlines, and protest deadlines would greatly benefit voters, candidates,
  and election officials.
- Voting System-Related Legislation Seventeen years have passed since elections have been conducted using paper ballots. The paper-based voting systems of today differ greatly from those of the past. Various updates are needed to make the operation of the state's modern paper-based voting system more efficient.
- <u>Update Referendum Laws</u> Statutory changes could help alleviate concerns regarding the
  requirement that the full text of extremely long referendum questions appear on general election
  ballots. In addition, current laws require antiquated language in referendum questions that is
  inconsistent with current voting methods.

## **RISK ASSESSMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES**

The most negative impact on the public would be an event that causes the loss of public confidence in the election process. The election process is comprised of various laws, policies, procedures, people, places, and systems. The election systems most critical to the Agency are the statewide voter registration system and the statewide voting system. A failure or compromise of either of these systems would have the potential to cause a statewide failure to register voters and conduct fair and accurate elections.

The SEC works with federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies, other S.C. state agencies, and private security vendors daily to manage, monitor, and secure South Carolina's election infrastructure. These efforts include identifying ways to increase the security of all agency networks, public facing websites, and both the voter registration and voting system used in our state.

The SEC does not have the capabilities or resources to protect the State's election infrastructure alone. The nature and level of outside help would depend on the type of threat or vulnerability. The agencies listed below would be called upon to assist in identifying and addressing security threats and vulnerabilities which have the potential to impact the Agency's ability to conduct voter registration and elections.

Following are five risks in the election process that can be mitigated by action of the General Assembly:

- 1) While the SEC has limited supervisory authority over county boards of registration and election through SC Code of Laws §7-3-20 (C) (1-2) and §7-3-25, uniformity remains a challenge. There are several examples of ongoing challenges that pose risks to the conduction of elections uniformly across the state:
  - Per §7-5-10, county board members are appointed by the governor on the recommendation of each county delegation. The boards, in turn, appoint a director for their county office. County offices are funded by county appropriations, hired according to county human resources policies and procedures, operate in county office space using county office equipment, and are entirely county departments. While the offices are county offices and the staff are county staff, many county administrations (including county council members) believe and have stated publicly that county election offices are state offices. There are several county attorneys that refuse to give legal advice to, or represent, county election board members for the same misunderstanding, despite SEC guidance on the issue—which is that county offices are county departments.
  - While the voting system and electronic poll book systems are uniformly used across the state, county election offices often use various other vendors and services without the SEC's knowledge or consent, therefore weakening the state's election critical infrastructure. In one instance, prior to the 2020 general election, a county ordered an envelope opener and sorter that came with signature verification software. The SEC notified the county that state law currently does not allow for signature verification of absentee ballot envelopes. A federal lawsuit on the matter reenforced the SEC's interpretation of state law but revealed that counties are not conducting election processes uniformly.


Legislation filed by members of the General Assembly last fiscal year sent a clear message that uniformity in elections is a priority and the SEC agrees. The SEC welcomes any legislation that would allow the agency to ensure all county election offices are getting the support they need to succeed and the oversight necessary to guarantee elections are being conducted uniformly across the state.

- 2) Long lines at polling places create a barrier and impact a voter's ability to vote. The SEC will continue working with the General Assembly to strengthen the election process by reducing wait times at polling places. Absentee-by-mail and absentee-in-person voting are critical to removing this barrier. Due to temporary voting measures passed by the General Assembly prior to the 2020 primary and general elections, this was not an issue in 2020. However, this will be an issue in 2022.
- 3) The current voting system produces a paper record of every ballot. The use of paper ballots has impacted election officials' ability to process absentee ballots in a timely manner, as election officials are required to challenge each in-person absentee ballot and open and tabulate absentee by mail ballots by 9am on election day. By law, this process cannot begin until 9:00 a.m. on election day.

Absentee voting has increased exponentially over the past 15 years. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, 27% of absentee voters voted by mail. In the 2020 Statewide Primaries, 66% voted by mail. In the 2020 General Election, 53% of votes cast were absentee. For several years, the SEC has been reporting a steadily increasing trend towards absentee voting; now, absentee voting is the clear voting method for the vast majority of S.C. voters. This means that election officials will be using a modern voting system designed for in-person voting, but following antiquated absentee voting laws, all while processing more paper ballots than ever before.

The General Assembly attempted to mitigate these problems by passing S.635. First, this legislation requires in-person absentee ballots to be challenged at the time they are cast, instead of until 9:00 a.m. on election day when the ballot envelope opening process begins. Second, the law also allows absentee ballots to be opened and processed beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the day before an election. However, this legislation was passed before COVID-19 became a pandemic in this state and both provisions sunset at the end of 2021. The General Assembly could alleviate these issues by making these temporary changes permanent law.
