AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The last three years have presented us with an unprecedented set of challenges in public education. Yet, we see progress and cause for hope as we navigate the changes to the education landscape. The most recent release of test score results from the 2021-22 school year shows that South Carolina students are on the road to recovery, having rebounded to pre-pandemic levels in English Language Arts. While pre-pandemic levels of achievement are far from the destination of proficiency for all students, the recovery in a critical area is noteworthy.

Achievement and growth scores in math are concerning. Over 40 percent of eighth graders scored *Does Not Meet* on the mathematics portion of SC READY, indicating that they are two grade levels behind their peers meeting standard. Students of color and students who live in homes that lack financial resources fare even worse. We acknowledge that many students and families are struggling; equipping schools to make informed decisions will assist in continuous improvement and lead to better student outcomes. The children are our inspiration to do the work we do – we believe in their potential, and we want every child to have the opportunity to succeed. Our goal is to provide an environment where there are no barriers to any child's success and opportunities exist for every student to achieve college and career success.


