Dear Members of the General Assembly:

This letter is to inform you that the number of children directly served by South Carolina First Steps last fiscal year was 57,435 – a 55% increase over the previous year. This is a tremendous accomplishment, which would not have been possible without your continued support.

Pursuant to S.C. Code Section 1-1-820, First Steps submitted a FY22 Agency Accountability Report on September 15, 2022, which contained a different number. Upon further review, we found that data for one program implemented in six counties were misreported to us, which has now been corrected. In the interest of transparency, we wanted to provide you with a revised FY22 Agency Accountability Report, which you will find enclosed. We have also provided this revised FY22 Agency Accountability Report to the Executive Budget and the Governor's Offices.

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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

South Carolina First Steps: Working Together So Every Child Reaches Their Highest Potential South Carolina First Steps is the state's only dedicated, comprehensive early childhood initiative focused on getting children ready for success in school and life. As both a state agency and a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, First Steps works with families, early educators, and partners statewide to support children from birth through age five to close the gap on student's preparedness for success in school. Since the beginning, we have taken a holistic approach to accomplishing our mission, offering services that improve children's health, strengthen families, expand access to quality early care and education, and help transition rising kindergartners into school.

To have the greatest impact on young children requires collaboration across public agencies, community-based entities, and the private sector at both the local and state level. First Steps local partnership boards include a cross section of key early childhood stakeholders who assess local early childhood needs and provide services to young children and their families. First Steps 4K is a partnership between the South Carolina First Steps and private and faith-based child care centers, charter schools and private schools. At the state level, First Steps operates the Early Childhood Advisory Council, the statutorily authorized structure for coordinating all of South Carolina's public investments in early childhood services, ensuring efficient use of federal, state and local funds, and building a cohesive system that ensures young children are healthy and safe, ready for school, and supported by engaged families and communities. Our trustees serve concurrently as ECAC members and our staff coordinates their collaborative efforts.

In FY22, South Carolina First Steps directly served 57,435 children birth through age five with programs that improve children's health, strengthen families, expand access to quality child care, increase participation in four-year-old kindergarten, and help transition rising kindergartners into school. The agency's work with child care teachers, early educators, and child care providers impacted an additional 50,000+ children whose teachers and caregivers participated in First Steps teacher training and child care quality enhancement programs.

Like recent fiscal years, First Steps experienced another year of significant programmatic growth, serving 55% more children directly than last fiscal year. During FY22, First Steps...

- Served 57,435 children directly through our local partnerships and First Steps 4K (+55% over FY21)
- Enrolled 3,433 students in in-person, full-day 4K in 312 classrooms within private, non-profit, and faith-based First Steps 4K providers through the 180th day of school (+29% over FY21)
- Served 4,513 children in high-intensity programs through our local partnerships, which includes evidence-based home visiting and early care and education programs (+30% over FY21)
- Supported 1,415 rising kindergartners in their transition to school through the Countdown to Kindergarten program in summer 2021(+262% over FY21)
- Hosted over 4,461 hours of professional development for child care providers through on-site technical assistance via local partnerships (+116% over FY21)

Established New Programs and Initiatives

- Received \$14.7 million over three years from the SC Department of Education through the Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding to...
 - Assist underserved students with school transition to kindergarten and Child Early Reading and Development Education Program (CERDEP) classes
 - o Recruit and retain South Carolina First Steps CERDEP teachers

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- Provide summer and afterschool learning opportunities that leverage literacy with preschoolaged children throughout the state to accelerate learning
- Support parents in actively engaging in their child's education through evidence-based parenting programs, included but not limited to Parents as Teachers (PAT) and Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY)
- Screen and identify early childhood health and development concerns early, provide support to parents to ensure optimal maternal and child health, and make referrals through Healthy Steps and PASOs
- Secured \$3 million in recurring General Funds to expand First Steps programs, the single largest increase to the local partnerships in the history of First Steps with support from Governor McMaster and bi-partisan legislative support from the General Assembly.
- Awarded \$282,731 in competitive early childhood innovation grants to seven local First Steps partnerships
 - Anderson County First Steps (\$11,374): to implement the Ready Rosie Active Family Engagement System in partnership with four Anderson County school districts (Anderson School Districts One, Two, Three, and Four).
 - Berkeley, Charleston, and Dorchester County First Steps (\$198,000 over two years): to support the Tri-County Pyramid Play Collaborative, a multi-faceted initiative that integrates the principles of the evidence-based Pyramid Model for supporting children's healthy development into programs and services for young children and their caregivers.
 - Cherokee County First Steps (\$19,00 over two years): to implement the Reach Out Project, a
 county-wide community education and outreach initiative to provide Cherokee County
 families with the information they need to access available programs and services that
 support their child's development and family well-being.
 - Chesterfield County First Steps (\$39,357 over two years): to establish a three-year-old classroom at Compass Point, a child development center operated by Chesterfield County First Steps on the campus of Northeastern Technical College that currently serves as a First Steps 4K center.
 - Colleton County First Steps (\$15,000 over two years): to create Bags for Babes, an outreach program to provide every Colleton County family with a child under 3 with information about developmental milestones and local services, as well as an age-appropriate book for the child to keep.
- Launched Connected Families in seven counties (Berkeley, Charleston, Colleton, Lexington, Richland, Pickens, and York) through a collaborative philanthropic investment of \$3.8 million over three years from the Duke Endowment and Doris Duke Charitable Foundation. Through Connected Families, Department of Social Services case workers refer families to a local First Steps, where they can participate in Parents as Teachers, an evidence-based home visitation program. Families who need additional support may receive Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-Up (ABC) services. ABC is an in-home mental health intervention that is proven to increase parent sensitivity and promote positive parent-child interactions.
- Developed and launched Countdown to 4K. Modeled after the popular and successful Countdown
 to Kindergarten program, it pairs the child's soon-to-be 4K teacher or teaching assistant with the
 child and parent for one-on-one sessions the summer before school starts. The Countdown
 teachers follow a curriculum and model activities to promote learning at home, provide high-quality
 learning materials, and perhaps most importantly create relationships for strong home-school
 connections.
- Developed and launched Catch-up to Kindergarten as a response to schools that told us that several students were entering kindergarten in turmoil due to the strains and isolation of the pandemic. Not only were they significantly lacking in learning skills, many were in emotional

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distress and needed additional support. The Countdown model was implemented in Fall 2021, after the start of school to bolster the children and parents during these difficult times.

Conceptualized, developed, and implemented First Steps 4K + Siblings, an interagency, nationally-recognized innovation which braids state and federal funds and in this inaugural year resulted in 1,723 children being able to access this additional support for their and their siblings' enrollment in a high-quality child care program.

Expanded the Reach of our Existing Programs

- Implemented the first year of statewide expansion of First Steps 4K successfully with 4,159 students served through day 220 (highest number ever) and expanded geographic accessibility and reach of the program.
- Expanded 4K in Underserved Communities through four grants totaling \$100,000
 - C.A.R.E. Academy, Charleston (\$20,000): to contribute towards remodeling construction of a building with a classroom to meet licensing requirements serving a class of ten four-yearolds.
 - New Generation Daycare and Learning Center, LLC, Greenville (\$30,000): to contribute towards construction of a building with a classroom to meet licensing requirements serving a class of twenty four-year-olds.
 - Plymouth Childcare Development Center, Charleston (\$20,000): to contribute towards construction of a bathroom to meet licensing requirements to serve a class of twenty fouryear-olds.
 - This is My Child, Middle Tyger Community Center, Lyman (\$30,000): to contribute towards remodeling construction of a building with a classroom to meet licensing requirements serving a class of ten four-year-olds.
- Supported the opening of a 4K classroom at the Bethlehem Center in Spartanburg in November 2021. In 2020, First Steps awarded \$300,000 in state funds to The Bethlehem Center based on the community's plans to renovate an underutilized, city-owned building and establish a First Steps 4K program serving 18 children from the Highland community and surrounding areas.
- Granted \$17,664,476 to our network of 46 local First Steps partnerships. A combination of state, federal and private dollars, the funds will directly impact more than 30,000 children and will expand parenting programs, increase the quality of child care, support positive transitions between early childhood and elementary school and improve the health of South Carolina's youngest citizens.
 - \$14,435,228 in state funding to all 46 local First Steps partnerships.
 - \$3,229,248 in federal, state, and private funds in targeted and competitive grant funding to help 44 counties expand and add new programs that successfully prepare children for school.
- Had a successful second year of the First Steps AmeriCorps national service program. Highlights include:
 - o 35 AmeriCorps members recruited, of which 27 (77%) completed their term of service
 - 20 sites participated in First Steps AmeriCorps, of which 18 (90%) were First Steps Local Partnerships
 - 17,782 hours were served by AmeriCorps members, of which 16,839.5 (95%) were direct service hours.
 - \$76,242 in Segal Education Awards were provided to members after completing their service term, which are used to pay student loan debt or upcoming tuition costs.
 - 90 volunteers supported the statewide MLK Week of Service project, where 198 First Steps 4K centers received a reading of the same book, 'Different' by Michael Buxton, and 3,600 copies of the book were distributed to First Steps 4K students.

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- o 110 families were recruited for participation in Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters, of which 66 (60%) families completed the program of at least 26 lessons.
- o 337 families received a referral, screening, or attended a meeting facilitated by Family and Community Engagement members.
- o 3,196 promotional materials were provided to families to promote school readiness, like the South Carolina, Profile of a Ready Kindergartner.

Increased Competence and Confidence of Early Care and Education Workforce

- Taught over 1,000 teachers of four-year-olds across the state at the virtual, two-day Palmetto Pre-K Jamboree with the theme, "Rooted in Nature: Inspiring Curiosity"
- Trained and oriented 248 total First Steps 4K directors, of which 105 (42%) were new, and 411 total First Steps 4K teachers, of which 125 (30%) were new, in a series of one to two day trainings in our First Steps 4K Academies in preparation for the 2021-22 school year.

Released the State's First Comprehensive Birth through Five Strategic Plan

- Developed South Carolina's inaugural Birth through Five Plan (2022-2027) over almost three years gathering voices from thousands of families, service providers, and leaders from a variety of sectors.
- Released the plan at a February 2022 press conference at the State House with Governor McMaster, Lieutenant Governor Evette, and all agency directors who serve on the ECAC and whose agencies participate in the Interagency Collaboration Committee.
 - Included four goal areas
 - South Carolina's youngest children are healthy and safe. 6 objectives with 17 strategies
 - South Carolina's youngest children are actively supported by their families and communities. - 4 objectives with 12 strategies
 - South Carolina's children arrive at school ready to reach their highest potential. 4 objectives with 17 strategies
 - South Carolina's early childhood system is aligned, coordinated, and family-centered.
 - 5 objectives with 16 strategies
 - Included seven "key measures of progress"

Increased Reach and Collaborative Relationships with State and National Partners

- Spoke as panelists on national stages
 - Martha Strickland, State Director of First Steps 4K, spoke at a national webinar presented by the Hunt Institute titled, "Supporting Children and Families through a Mixed-Delivery Pre-K System". Other speakers included: Dr. Barbara Cooper (Secretary, Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education); Dr. W. Steven Barnett (Senior Co-Director, National Institute for Early Education Research); Dr. GG Weisenfeld (Senior Early Childhood Education Policy Specialist, National Institute for Early Education Research)
 - Georgia Mjartan, Executive Director of First Steps and the Early Childhood Advisory Council, spoke as a panelist for the Hunt Institute's virtual "2021 Big Wins for Little Kids". Other speakers included: Stephen Blanford (Director, Washington Children's Alliance); Dr. Barbara Cooper (Secretary, Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education); Bill Jaeger (Vice President of Early Childhood and Policy Initiatives, Colorado Children's Campaign); Chris Jones (Director of North Dakota Department of Human Services); Ted Lempert (President, Children Now); Representative Tana Senn (Chair of Children, Youth, and Families Committee,

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- Washington State Legislature); Stephanie Spencer (Executive Director, Urban Baby Beginnings)
- Rachal Hatton-Moore, Two-Generation Coordinator of the Early Childhood Advisory Council, served on a four state panel at the Education Commission of the States Kindergarten Transition Policy Symposium in Denver, CO to highlight the development of the SC Pre-K to K Transition Plan: Family Engagement, which is aligned with the SC Birth-Five Plan.
- Director Mjartan and Rachal Hatton-Moore highlighted the work of FirstFive SC on the nationally-distributed Preschool Development Grant Policy Matters Podcast
- Added to the Joint Citizens and Legislative Committee on Children as an ex-officio agency member.
- Supported the House Legislative Oversight process for the Department of Commerce by testifying before the Economic Development, Transportation, and National Resources and the Education and Cultural Subcommittees as members of the education to workforce pipeline.
- Visited our counterpart agency that we were initially modeled after, the North Carolina Partnership for Children, and have started working on collaborative initiatives.
- Received continued support from the Alliance for Early Success to partially fund a government affairs liaison position and to connect us with technical assistance from national experts.
- Communicated to internal and external stakeholders about South Carolina First Steps' strategic
 plan including mission, values and priorities. A national group funded by the federal Administration
 for Children and Families (Office of Child Care) sought permission from First Steps to use South
 Carolina First Steps' strategic plan as an example in the "Systems Building Resource Guide"
 published by the national Child Care State Capacity Building Center, which provides support and
 technical assistance to state child care administrators.
- Secured support from the Education Commission of the States to develop a PalmettoPreK
 Transition Plan to engage families in successfully supporting their child's transition from early
 childhood to Kindergarten.

Enhanced the Public's Awareness of and Ability to Access our Programs

- Developed and launched First Five SC, the state's single portal into publicly-funded early childhood programs and services across 10 state agencies and more than 60 different programs and services for young children (local, state, and federally funded). In the four and a half months since launch (February 17 June 30, 2022), the site had 26,626 unique visitors and 69,003 page views. 2514 unique families completed the eligibility screener and of those who completed the screener, 83% were eligible for at least one program.
- Continued to lead the development, marketing, and interagency collaborative work driving the
 success of PalmettoPreK.org, South Carolina's single portal into all publicly-funded PreK programs
 for 3 and 4 year-olds. In FY2022, this included adding dozens of additional school districts (EIA and
 CERDEP funded) to the portal with targeted efforts to secure their participation. The site, which
 launched in February 2020, has now generated 114,923 unique visitors, 17,409 total leads, with
 14,619 people children being eligible for at least one program, an 84% eligibility rate.
- Earned state and national media attention with at least 26 pieces of earned media, including television spots and newspaper articles.
- Deepened our partnership with SC ETV by collaborating on the *Countdown to Kindergarten* interstitial series, delivering messages to early learning families via Bright by Text, and producing an early learning focused episode of *Carolina Classrooms* called "First Five SC".
- Launched a tiered approach to this year's Countdown to Kindergarten, including:
 - Public Awareness. The #COUNTDOWNSC social media campaign directs families and communities to countdownsc.org, where they can find useful information to help prepare

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- children for kindergarten. The new website includes tips and resources, a school directory, and calendar of local Countdown to Kindergarten events.
- Community Events. Across the state, communities hosted celebrations and learning opportunities for rising kindergartners and their families. SC First Steps partnered with 19 organizations to offer free events at locations including children's museums, libraries, parks, schools, and community centers.
- Family Engagement. SC First Steps coordinates with local First Steps nonprofits and schools to provide one-on-one support for children who may be at-risk for academic challenges. The program connects 4K and 5K teachers with their incoming students and families during the summer before school, with five sessions in the home and a final visit in the kindergarten classroom. Specialized support is available for dual-language learners and children with disabilities. In 2022, approximately 400 teachers are expected to participate, serving up to 2500 children.
- Held the annual South Carolina Summit on Early Childhood with the theme, "From the Start: Prenatal
 to Three". Highlights of the two-day, online event include:
 - 465 attendees
 - o 22 presentation
 - 14 exhibitors
 - o 1,890 chat messages
 - 1 Champion for Children, Debbie Robertson, who after over two decades of service to young children in South Carolina retired in July 2021 from First Steps
- Developed and successfully executed our inaugural fundraising event, "A Night to Celebrate
 Community" in Spring 2022, which attracted individual and corporate donations to fund local early
 childhood community needs. The event exceeded its goal of raising \$70,000, generating a net
 sufficient to fund each county partnership with an additional unrestricted grant award of over
 \$1,000.

Centered Family and Client Voice

- Measured the impact of First Steps 4K's intervention on parents' ability to return to work and / or school through direct participant surveying, results of which were so positive (70% can now work) that the Governor shared this data in his 2022 State of the State address.
- Continued establishing a culture of listening to and valuing "client voice" through the implementation of "Your Voice Matters," a surveying / continuous feedback loop process involving clients participating in First Steps local partnership programs and First Steps 4K programs. To date, 10 feedback loops have been completed on First Steps 4K, Parents as Teachers, Child Care Quality Enhancement, and Quality Counts with 2,368 individual survey responses from clients ranging from teachers and childcare directors to families. One-time grant funding from national funder Listen4Good ended on June 30, 2022, but the agency is committed to continuing these feedback loops and has developed a strong, ongoing partnership with Listen4Good that extends beyond the grant period.
- Put families at the center of our work, prioritizing their feedback and input in design, development, and continuous quality improvement. This included successfully completing 10 feedback loops of surveying with clients involved in First Steps programs (local partnership and 4K program) and conceptualizing, obtained funding for, and establishing South Carolina's inaugural Family Voice Council, a leadership body created to provide a formal avenue for engagement, input, and feedback from participants and beneficiaries of public programs to the leadership of agencies responsible for administering those programs for children birth through five and their families. During this first full year of existence, the Family Voice Council consisted of 21 members from across the state and

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provided feedback and input on a variety of initiatives and state efforts including First5SC.org and South Carolina's first interagency plan to ensure optimal engagement of families during the pivotal transition from early childhood into Kindergarten.

Improved our Accountability and Transparency

- Completed an all-team survey and meaning making focus groups with an external facilitator to understand the agency climate and culture. From the 56 respondents, we learned:
 - 53% highly recommended First Steps as a place to work to family and friends (20% increase from last year)
 - Over 90% of respondents agreed that First Steps is:
 - Family-friendly
 - A positive influence on professional growth
 - Encouraging the voices of families
 - Providing adequate feedback to employees
 - Providing fair and equitable compensation
 - About 50% of respondents agreed that First Steps:
 - Keeps them informed about important news and activities
 - Affirms diversity, equity, and inclusion
- Commissioned the Institute for Families in Society at the University of South Carolina to evaluate the reach and impact of our largest investment through local partnership state formula funding, Parents as Teachers (FY17-19). The study found:
 - 2,602 children from 2,150 families from 34 counties were served during the time period of interest
 - o 85% of children were below the age of three at enrollment
 - 3.4 risk factors for early school failure were present per family on average
 - o 61,969 total home visits were conducted for an average of 2.3 per family per month
 - Average parenting quality (+30%) and interactive reading (+9%) scores increased from the first assessment to the final assessment
 - Program participation was significantly related to school and well-child visit attendance rates
 - PAT program students were present for a significantly higher percentage of school days than their like-peers. On average, PAT students missed less than 6% of school days.
 - Children of PAT families who were enrolled in Medicaid attended the recommended number of well-child visits at a significantly higher rate than their like-peers. On average, PAT children met approximately half the recommended visits, while non-PAT children met only one-third.
- Secured the services of the Institute for Families in Society at the University of South Carolina to
 evaluate our local partnership's child care technical assistance programs, which includes intensive,
 on-site coaching and child care training from FY19-21. The results of this evaluation will be
 provided to the SC General Assembly by November 1, 2022.
- Continued and improved upon regional meetings between local partnership board members and state board members after a successful first year. These meetings have provided helpful opportunities for connection, learning, and input. The 2022 sessions have also had an added component of soliciting feedback on reauthorization and the current legislation governing and defining First Steps.
- Concluded year one of development for the First Steps' Knowledge, Information, and Teaming System, a program and case management system for 4K and local partnerships, with AnLar.

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- Proceeded on the development of the South Carolina Early Childhood Integrated Data System (SC ECIDS). As the governing body for SC ECIDS, in FY22, the ECAC:
 - Adopted key questions that focus on the state's early childhood landscape providing distinct, unduplicated counts of children that are eligible and enrolled in early childhood programs, and how existing programs support children's future success.
 - Adopted the Data Governance Charter to ensure that current and future early childhood integrated data initiatives follow a consistent framework, which outlines the scope of the SC ECIDS, roles and responsibilities of the ECAC, the Data Governance Work Groups, and individual members of the Work Groups, and the authority within the governing structure.

Grew our Team

- Increased our team from 52 to 68 full-time equivalents and leveraged other workforce and
 associated human capital contributions. Including all position types, there were 101 team members
 on June 30, 2022 out of 119 total positions, constituting a 15% vacancy rate. This included: 60 of
 68 FTE's; 27 out of 37 AmeriCorps positions; 2 out of 2 full-time, temporary, grant-funded positions,
 4 out of 4 full time, time-limited positions; 1 full-time, temporary employee; and 7 interns.
- Welcomed an inaugural Government Affairs Liaison, Kaitlyn Richards. Prior to joining First Steps, Kaitlyn was most recently working as a legal clerk in the Pennsylvania State Senate.
- Onboarded three new Board members
 - Michelle Gough Fry, J.D., Ph.D., LL.M, State Director of the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, by virtue of her position
 - Jacque Curtin, COO/CFO at the South Carolina Association of Certified Public Accountants, as a member of the business community
 - o Representative Paula Calhoon, as a member of the House of Representatives
- Wished farewell to Representative Rita Allison as a Board member. After over a decade of service on the Board, Representative Allison delegated her seat to Representative Calhoon.


Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

Should First Steps fail to meet its goals and objectives, South Carolina's young children will be less prepared for success in school and life. But it doesn't end there. The evidence-based strategies delivered by the initiative are documented by research to help reduce the occurrence of costly negative outcomes, including child abuse and neglect, poor health, special education placements, academic remediation, unemployment, incarceration and more. In this sense, the work of SC First Steps is not only advancing the long-term success and prosperity of its clients, but reducing substantial taxpayer burdens associated with a host of undesirable outcomes.

In order to promote success and mitigate against these negative outcomes, First Steps requires the ongoing support of its public and private partners, Governor McMaster, and the SC General Assembly.

To mitigate against this failure and better ensure the success of the First Steps initiative, policy makers might consider expanding the resources made available to local First Steps Partnerships – allowing for the expansion of evidence-based early childhood interventions proven to impact the long-term success and prosperity of their participants.
