The Consortium is a nationally certified Sea Grant College Program under the auspices of the National Sea Grant College Program, NOAA, U.S. Department of Commerce. STRATEGIC AND IMPLEMENTATION PLANNING

The S.C. Sea Grant Consortium is currently operating under an updated (2020) FY2018-23 Strategic Plan titled “The Changing face of South Carolina: Building a resilient Future.”

<https://www.scseagrant.org/strategic-plan/> The agency’s strategic plan has specific performance measures and target metrics for its three strategic administrative and management areas, which include (1) Planning, Program Management, and Overall Performance, (2) Connecting with Users, and (3) Human Resources. In addition, the Consortium has outlined specific vision statements, goals, objectives, strategies, performance measures and metrics for each of the agency’s five strategic programmatic focus areas: (1) Healthy Coastal Ecosystems, (2) Sustainable Coastal Development and Economy, (3) Weather and Climate Resilience, (4) Sustainable Fisheries and Aquaculture, and (5) Scientific Literacy and Workforce Development. The Consortium employs a number of stakeholder mechanisms to ensure that program efforts are relevant and timely, including a 25-member Program Advisory Board and six program-specific advisory committees.

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PERFORMANCE MEASURES AND METRICS

The Consortium’s current Strategic Plan includes several dozen performance measures and metrics which are tracked on an annual basis. The Consortium’s FY21-22 State Accountability Report is focused on the goals and objectives, and the resultant outputs and outcomes, which make up its three strategic administrative and management areas. Updates on these metrics are presented to the Consortium Board of Directors (at its Board meeting), the State of South Carolina (through the agency’s State Accountability Report), and the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program (through formal reporting) on an annual basis.

IMPACTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Despite the pandemic we reported to the NOAA Sea Grant College Program 107 impacts and accomplishments, 72 products, 79 trainings and \$2,562,737 in economic benefits for the state between February 1, 2021-January 31, 2022, our federal reporting period. <https://www.scseagrant.org/performance-and-accountability/> These span five themes:

- Healthy coastal ecosystems
- Sustainable coastal development and economy
- Weather and climate resilience
- Sustainable fisheries and aquaculture
- Scientific literacy and workforce development

INFORMATION DELIVERY

The Consortium has become a primary source of information for coastal and marine information and assistance. This occurs through the interactions of Extension staff with coastal constituents, through communications such as *Coastal Heritage* magazine and through the Consortium’s website (www.scseagrant.org). During FY21-22, the Consortium website received 90,041 page views from 46,420 unique visitors. The Consortium’s communications and education specialists produce award-winning and relevant products and services including a South Carolina Notable State Document award for *Assessing South Carolina’s Ocean Economy*. <https://www.scseagrant.org/assessing-south-carolinas-ocean-economy/> The Consortium continued its successful e-news brief called *CoastalScience@Work* to keep key state leaders and decision-makers aware of Consortium programs, activities, and impacts.

AGENCY STAFFING

The Consortium holds 19 state FTE positions. In addition, the Consortium currently has three temporary grant positions (time-limited) and three current vacant positions in process at the time of this reporting submission.

BUDGET SITUATION AND FUTURE

The Consortium continues to foster efficiencies in its staffing. The agency has brought in young talent and fresh thinking to fill key staff vacancies and newly created positions, the new staff have complemented the remaining veteran staff, and the Consortium is providing more formal graduate student internship experiences to assist its administrative and professional staff with programming and projects.

This year the agency was successful in receiving additional recurring funding of \$136,930 to increase internal capacity for improved communication with our stakeholders and accountability reporting as well as capacity to manage grants and external funding sources. Due to a very successful national review, the Consortium was able to secure a federal merit increase of \$173,619 in February 2022 that will provide for increased agency capacities in capacity to provide technical assistance, information, and guidance to stakeholders and constituents on the physical processes and dynamics of the South Carolina (and southeastern U.S.) coastal region, and changes thereto, as influenced by natural phenomena, climate and weather, and anthropogenic effects. Agency leadership recognizes that the state budget will be limited by resource availability, and thus discussions about means by which Consortium support can be sustained, increased, and diversified will continue with the Consortium’s Board of Directors, Program Advisory Board, and the S.C. General Assembly.

EXTRAMURAL FUNDING AND THE STATE BUDGET

The Consortium continues to demonstrate its ability to secure competitive extramural funding for its programs, which tempers its need to approach the S.C. General Assembly for state funding. At the federal level, the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program received a FY2021-21 appropriation of \$88 million, \$1

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million more than its FY20 appropriation. Of that amount, Congress directed Sea Grant to allocate \$13 million to aquaculture research and outreach. The Consortium has been successful in obtaining additional competitive grant funding from the National Sea Grant Office during this period to support workshops and programmatic activities.

The Consortium increased its extramural support by almost 76% during FY2021-22; from a modest \$2.5 million in FY2020-21 to \$4.4 million over the past twelve months. Additionally, the agency continues those successes into the first three months of the current FY2022-23, such as the receipt of a \$411,148 grant to create a southeast regional research program focused on the influence of climate change on contaminants of concern, and expects another substantial return-on-investment to our State Appropriations for the remainder of the year pending decisions at the federal level.

RETURN-ON-INVESTMENT

The Consortium benefited from additional state recurring funds over the past five years which enables it to meet both the administrative and programmatic needs of the agency, and thus address the growing needs of its diverse constituencies. Over the last 10 years, the Consortium has secured almost \$24 million in non-state competitive funding from a state investment of 6.5 million; a **366% return** on the state’s investment. Over the last five years, the Consortium’s annual Return-on-Investment is as follows:

RISK ASSESSMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES

The Consortium is constantly engaged in short-term and long-term analyses of its programs, activities, and accountability measures. The accomplishments and the capacities that the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program brings to the states has been an important factor in continued federal funding and increased service to our businesses, communities, and residents. The agency is building awareness and partnerships among state and national leaders to serve the Consortium’s numerous, extremely diverse, and supportive cast of stakeholders, constituents, and communities, including the state’s General Assembly and our U.S. Congressional delegation, with whom we partner, serve, and depend on. It is with this support that the National Sea Grant College Program and the Consortium survive financial challenges, and sustain positive outcomes.

What the state would lose with the Consortium’s demise would be what the National Sea Grant Site Visit team stated: the Consortium is recognized as an intellectual leader within the State; is nimble, flexible, adaptable, and relevant; is recognized as an honest broker of information and assistance for coastal and ocean issues; and recognized for its non-advocacy. The state and its citizens would also lose a significant return on its investment, both in financial and societal terms.


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
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
