AGENCY’S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

In Fiscal Year 2021-2022 (FY 21-22), the ORS continued to serve the public interest of consumers across all programmatic areas and in its caseload before the Public Service Commission of South Carolina (PSC). The ORS also assumed new responsibilities, such as the expansion of broadband infrastructure in South Carolina. This narrative covers selected highlights from FY 21-22 as well as risk and mitigation strategies for the future.

Notable Cases and Savings for Consumers

Dominion Energy SC Rate Case Settlement. 2020-125-E

Dominion Energy South Carolina, Inc. (DESC), ORS, the South Carolina Department of Consumer Affairs (the Consumer Advocate), and intervenors entered into a comprehensive settlement agreement regarding DESC’s application to adjust its rates for electric service.

The settlement agreement was the result of lengthy and complicated negotiations between the parties during a six-month pause in the hearing on the application. The ORS requested the pause during the COVID-19 pandemic after the hearing began in January 2021. The Commission granted the requested pause with the consent of the other parties.

All intervenors to the case entered into the agreement with the exception of CMC Steel South Carolina, which indicated it did not oppose the agreement. Intervenors who signed the agreement included the Consumer Advocate, AARP, Frank Knapp, Jr., the United States Department of Defense and all other federal executive agencies, Sierra Club, the South Carolina Coastal Conservation League, the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy, the South Carolina Energy Users Committee, and Walmart, Inc.

In its application to increase rates, DESC sought approval to increase the average residential customer’s bill by \$9.68. The settlement amount represents an approximate 82 percent decrease from the initial request. The agreement raised the average residential customer’s bill by only approximately \$1.81 (an approximate 1.46% increase).

Other benefits to consumers in the settlement agreement included, but were not limited to:

- A fixed Basic Facility Charge that remains under \$10 for residential customers under Rate 8. The fee currently is \$9, and the settlement amount is \$9.50;
- DESC agreed not to file for another general rate case before July 1, 2023, such that new rates will not be effective prior to January 1, 2024, except where necessary, due to unforeseen extraordinary economic or financial conditions which may include, but not be limited to, changes in tax rates;
- DESC agreed to double the annual commitment to \$1.5 million to Energy Share in 2021 and 2022, \$500,000 of which will be used to support small general service customers. This annual commitment will be funded by Dominion Energy Shareholders and therefore the Company will not seek recovery from customers;
- DESC committed to give up to \$15 million from Dominion Energy Shareholders to be used to give many customers with arrearages a clean slate and \$15 million from Dominion Energy Shareholders to fund a combination of energy-efficiency upgrades and critical health and safety repairs that may be required in order for a home to receive energy efficiency upgrades; and
- A stakeholder process to examine an electricity affordability program for DESC’s low-income customers and address the need for legislation to implement such a program.

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Originally, DESC sought an overall revenue increase of \$178 million and a return on equity of 10.25 percent. The settlement agreement allowed for a net increase of \$35.6 million and a 9.5 percent return on equity. The \$35.6 million net increase was achieved, in part, through a rider accelerating the return to customers of \$99.5 million in unprotected property-related Excess Deferred Income Tax as a result of the Tax Cuts Jobs Act passed in 2018. The rider will remain in place until the full balance is depleted, regardless of any change to the federal tax rate that may occur in the future or any general rate proceeding filed by DESC.

A great deal of work and persistence went into pulling together this compromise, and it is the opinion of the ORS that a fully litigated case would certainly have been appealed to the South Carolina Supreme Court. With this compromise, all customer classes received a small increase — but one much lower than originally requested.

Savings to consumers resulting from this settlement are **\$136,400,000**.

Rate Stabilization Act (RSA) Annual Reviews. The ORS filed its reports with the PSC on September 1, 2021 for both the Piedmont Natural Gas (PNG) 2021 RSA and the DESC 2021 RSA; both reports covered the 12-month period ending March 31, 2021.

- Piedmont Natural Gas RSA. 2021-007-G

Piedmont Natural Gas’s (PNG) calculation of an increase in revenue requirement totaled \$20,605,507. The ORS reached a settlement with PNG resulting in an annual savings to ratepayers of **\$9,840,523**.

- DESC RSA. 2021-006-G

Dominion Energy South Carolina’s (DESC) calculation of an increase in revenue requirement totaled \$8,773,989. The ORS recommended, and the Commission approved, an increase of \$6,992,923, resulting in an annual savings to ratepayers of **\$1,781,066**.

Palmetto Wastewater Reclamation Rate Case. 2021-153-S

Palmetto Wastewater Reclamation (PWR), a subsidiary of SouthWest Water Company, filed an application to increase its rates by approximately 13.7% with the PSC in June 2021. The average residential consumer’s monthly bill would have increased by \$5.20 per month if approved.

The case was heard by the PSC on November 10, 2021. A partial settlement in this case resulted in savings to consumers of **\$362,503**.

Kiawah Island Utility Rate Case. 2021-324-WS

On May 31, 2022, the Public Service Commission entered an order approving in part and denying in part Kiawah Island Utility, Inc.’s (KIU) rate increase application. The Commission’s order adopted the comprehensive settlement agreement entered by the Town of Kiawah Island, KIU, and the ORS. The Department of Consumer Affairs, while not a signatory, did not oppose approval of the settlement. KIU originally requested an increase to its annual revenue requirement of approximately \$1.36 million, or 14.1%. Under the Commission’s order adopting the settlement, KIU was authorized an annual revenue requirement increase of approximately \$615,000, or 6.4%, and sewer customers will not see any increase to their rates. KIU also agreed not to file another rate increase application that would result in new rates becoming effective sooner than 24 months from the date of the Commission’s order, to conduct a lead-lag study to determine more accurately the cash working capital component of KIU’s

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rates, and to file its next rate case using the return on rate base rather than operating margin method. Savings to customers from this case are **\$740,997**.

Consumer Services

The Consumer Services Department is the agency’s first line of contact with consumers. Consumer Services supports consumers to arrange installment payments, extensions to payment due dates, manageable security deposits, and access to community financial assistance resources. In FY 21-22, staff members worked with consumers to recover funds due to erroneous charges, refunds of deposits, unauthorized charges, incorrect rates being charged, disputes about charges, and service-quality issues. As part of its consumer education outreach, Consumer Services distributed **39,380** copies of publications and promotional materials.

In FY 21-22, Consumer Services fielded **1,269** complaints and inquiries from consumers and recovered **\$275,929** on their behalf (approximately \$127,000 of which are annually recurring recoveries). Two large recoveries for consumers included:

- Consumer Services investigated a complaint from a commercial customer of Duke Energy. As a result, the customer was refunded **\$24,200** due to a billing error.
- Consumer Services investigated an electric service reliability issue in Duke Energy’s service territory based on numerous complaints related to internal equipment damage from electric surges. After Consumer Services issued data requests to Duke Energy related to service reliability, the Company paid over **\$68,000** in customer damage claims.

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Broadband

The expansion of internet in South Carolina is gaining much traction through the South Carolina Broadband Office (SCBBO). Its official opening on July 1, 2021, as a department of the ORS was the culmination of a year of intense and innovative work by many at the ORS, along with partnering agencies, broadband providers, and communities across the state.

The fundamental goal of the SCBBO is to expand broadband access in South Carolina, and the program made great strides in its inaugural year. The following are highlights of expansion successes thus far:

- In July 2021, the SCBBO received \$10 million (CARES II) of state money for broadband infrastructure projects to help ensure completion of projects approved for funding in 2020 (CARES) that could not be constructed by the tight deadline of December 18, 2020. These projects are now complete, and the SCBBO invested \$7,873,283. The 17 projects, from 8 Internet Service Providers (ISP), resulted in 6,116 locations having access to service.
- By the end of July, 2021, the SCBBO issued Notices to Proceed for the \$30 million Rural Broadband Grant Program (RBGP) funded by the SC Department of Commerce (SCDOC). As of June 30, 2022, with the combined effort of 17 ISPs, based on their data, these projects are 54% complete based on location totals, and broadband construction is underway or completed in 18 counties. The SCBBO is pleased to report that 1,245.9 miles of fiber have been constructed, and 9,164 homes now have internet service available. Many of these projects are currently scheduled for completion on October 31, 2022.
- Different from other grant programs, the SCBBO created a pilot Last Mile Grant Program to address the problem of “donut holes” that exist in served areas. The SCBBO’s “I Need Internet” survey uncovered thousands of residents that need help; the SCBBO issued Notices to Proceed in June 2022 that will connect 567 homes by December 31, 2022. Since inception of the “I Need Internet” survey, approximately 530 households have been able to receive service without any additional aid in construction costs to consumers or financial support from the State.
- In January 2021, the SCBBO partnered with the SC Department of Education (SCDOE) on a SpaceX Starlink pilot program to reach 20 of the most remote rural homes with students and/or staff. SCDOE paid for the hardware and 12 months of service, and the SCBBO covered the cost of professional installation. All homes were live by June 29, 2022, and impressively the average download/upload speed of these residents is 120.5 Mbps / 10.0 Mbps.

SC Equipment Distribution Program

The South Carolina Equipment Distribution Program (SCEDP), housed within the ORS, helps consumers who are deaf or have hearing or speech challenges by providing them with specialized telephone equipment. The program received and reviewed **592** applications; approved **506** applications; and conducted installations for **55** SCEDP clients, which included training on how to use the specialized telephone equipment.

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In FY 21-22, SCEDP’s outreach included distribution of over **26,000** copies of publications and printed materials statewide. In addition, SCEDP staff gave presentations around the state to speech-language pathologists, medical professionals, and other organizations serving citizens who may have a hearing or speech challenge. These presentations raise awareness among those who serve clients that may qualify for SCEDP services. Additional presentations at senior centers and senior expos reach the target population directly. Over **35** presentations and exhibits were made in FY 21-22.

Energy Office

The ORS Energy Office advances South Carolina’s energy strategy and policy through education and outreach.

Energy Efficiency Roadmap. In the prior fiscal year (FY 20-21), the Energy Office completed its Energy Efficiency Roadmap initiative. This initiative launched in October 2019 to review and assess energy efficiency recommendations from the 2016 Energy Plan that had not yet been implemented as well as to identify new opportunities and develop next steps.

Since the release of the Energy Efficiency Roadmap Report last fiscal year, the Energy Office has continued to conduct stakeholder engagement pertaining to certain recommendations. In particular, the Energy Office has established and coordinated separate working groups focused on green banks and home energy labeling.

Green Bank Working Group. Launched in February 2021, the Green Bank Working Group focused on gathering additional information to further assess the feasibility of establishing a green bank in South Carolina. A green bank is a funding mechanism that can fund projects to deploy clean energy and accelerate energy efficiency.

This working group concluded its stakeholder-engagement activities in March 2022. In collaboration with the Carolina Integrated Sciences and Assessments program at the University of South Carolina, the next step will be the release of a green bank market feasibility study. These steps follow the green bank establishment process as outlined by the Coalition for Green Capital. At the time of this writing, the feasibility study is expected to be released by the end of summer 2022.

Energy Labeling Working Group. In 2021, the Energy Office continued research into home energy labeling programs across the country. After this information-gathering process, a Home Energy Labeling Working Group was established in May 2022. In the coming fiscal year, monthly working-group meetings will be held to discuss topics such as the design of the energy label, administration of the labeling program, training and educational needs, and the eventual establishment of a pilot program.

Electric Vehicle Stakeholder Initiative. In FY 21-22, the Energy Office continued to work on an Electric Vehicle (EV) Stakeholder Initiative that was launched in November 2020. The purpose of this initiative was to facilitate a broad, collaborative statewide discussion among more than 300 stakeholders and to develop a set of recommendations summarized in a final report that:

- Examines the legislative and regulatory environment surrounding EVs and EV charging station access and adoption;
- Identifies challenges and opportunities for EVs and EV charging stations; and
- Develops recommendations surrounding EV penetration and EV charging stations in SC.

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In October 2021, the Energy Office concluded this initiative and presented the resulting draft recommendations. At the time of this writing, the final report is pending release. It will be submitted to the Joint Committee on the Electrification of Transportation, a legislative committee established by the passage of Act 46 in 2021.

Financial Support. The Energy Office administers federal financial assistance to support public and private entities investing in energy-saving programs. In FY 21-22, the Energy Office saved the public over **\$20 million** through a variety of energy initiatives.

Loan/Grant Programs. The Energy Office promotes energy efficiency, renewable energy, and clean transportation among public and private entities and nonprofits through three low-interest loan/grant programs: ConserFund, mini-grants, and the Energy Efficiency Revolving Loan (EERL) program. The Energy Office provided financial support in a variety of ways:

- Awarded one ConserFund loan in the amount of \$291,242 (Note: Due to a loan amendment, this amount was reduced from \$319,067 reported to the US Department of Energy)
- Completed four ConserFund loans resulting in projected lifetime savings to borrowers of over \$2.9 million
- Provided public entities and nonprofits with eight mini-grants totaling \$65,732 to spur innovation and save over \$362,000 over the useful life of projects
- Retrofitted 57 buildings comprising 664,323 square feet

Safety

Pipeline Safety. Pipeline Safety received its 2020 annual scores from the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration. For the program evaluation, which looks at the effectiveness of the ORS Pipeline Safety program to conduct inspections and enforcement, the ORS received a **99 out of 100** (approximately 99%). The one-point deduction was because the ORS does not issue civil penalties. On the progress report, the agency received a **48 out of 50** (96%) because the civil penalty amounts in South Carolina statutes do not match the federal level of civil penalty amounts.

Through its damage-prevention initiative, ORS Pipeline Safety makes educating third-party contractors on safe-digging practices a top priority. In addition, ORS Pipeline Safety is a leader in the SC Pipeline Emergency Response Initiative (SC PERI) that trains firefighters to respond to natural gas-related incidents. These efforts will continue in FY 22-23.

ESF 12 Emergency Response. In emergency preparedness, South Carolina was fortunate not to face many significant weather events in FY 21-22. In January 2022, consecutive weekends of winter weather caused outages across the state. ESF 12 coordinated with all utilities – including investor-owned electric utilities, electric cooperatives, Santee Cooper, and municipalities – as well as the Governor’s Office, SC counties, ESF 2, and many of the utility partners.

When not in activation mode, ESF 12 members train and prepare for emergencies through participation in multiple readiness-training exercises.

Gas Buddy Partnership for Emergency Activations. The Colonial Pipeline incident in late FY 20-21 served as a stark reminder of the impact cybersecurity can have on the nation’s fuel supply. During this incident, it became apparent that having up-to-date information on the petroleum market is essential. At the beginning of FY 21-22, the ORS and Gas Buddy created an innovative contractual agreement whereby Gas Buddy provides the ORS daily update meetings during emergency activations. When not

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in emergency-activation mode, Gas Buddy meets monthly with the ORS and provides updates on the market.

Administration

Budget. The ORS regularly and carefully monitors expenditures to ensure resources are managed to accomplish the agency’s mission, goals, and objectives.

FY 21-22 ORS Budget. The ORS budget for FY22 was \$15.4 million. The Statewide Broadband Office budget was \$3 million. The Santee Cooper Oversight budget was \$2 million. The combined budget under management was \$20.4 million.

Calendar Year 2021 USF (Universal Service Fund) Financial Statement Audit. The ORS is administrator of the SC Universal Service Fund (USF), which provides monetary support for telecommunications services in South Carolina. The objective of the audit is to express an independent opinion as to whether the financial statements of the USF are fairly presented.

The Auditor completed the field work, and a draft copy of the report is under review; the ORS expects the official report to be issued in late August 2022. The draft opinion is an “unqualified opinion,” which is a clean opinion.

Broadband Grant Funding. Funding was \$10 million of CARES Act II (Proviso 73.6) and \$30 million in the Rural Broadband Grant Program. The SC Broadband Office is currently preparing for the upcoming \$400 million resulting from passage in May 2022 of HB 4408.

Agency Staffing. ORS executive leadership continues to make organizational changes that better position the ORS for the future. Since May of 2019, several pieces of legislation passed that created new responsibilities for the ORS. The ORS has strategically hired new staff, as well as promoted from within the agency, to ensure that the agency can excel in carrying out all its responsibilities.

As the workload at the ORS increases, there is a need to work both harder and smarter. Because of new initiatives over the past few fiscal years, many staff members’ positions were successfully retooled to accommodate the agency’s needs.

Implementation of Technology

Much of the ORS’ most innovative technology advancements in FY 21-22 were related to the SCBBO’s efforts in mapping. Broadband mapping is vital for the efficient deployment of broadband resources. The SCBBO has developed extraordinary mapping capabilities and, since July 2021, has remapped South Carolina three times — July 2021, September 2021, and March 2022.

In July 2021, the SCBBO launched SCDigitalDrive (www.scdigitaldrive.org), the complete broadband map repository for the State of South Carolina, which is being heavily used by a wide variety of stakeholders. It now houses 235 maps and statistics slides — for all 46 counties and statewide — and features multiple interactive applications for real-time queries of the mapping data.

In addition to maps, SCDigitalDrive is home to the SCBBO’s innovative “I Need Internet” survey. This document allows the ORS to directly engage with consumers to capture their need for Internet at home. By completing the survey, a resident gives the SCBBO complete details of their situation, and an

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accurate “dot” can then be placed on the broadband maps. When a collection of dots appears within a supposedly served area, the SCBBO can make corrections and make them available for funding.

Looking Ahead

On the horizon for FY 22-23 is the arrival of major programmatic funding in the SC Broadband Office and the SC Energy Office. On May 13, 2022, Governor McMaster enacted HB 4408 that allocated \$400 million to the SCBBO of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Fiscal Recovery Fund (SFRF \$214,234,345) and the Capital Projects Fund (CPF \$185,765,655). The SCBBO initiated the High Priority ARPA Grant program and opened the application window on June 30, 2022. Enacted in November 2021, the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) authorized \$1.2 trillion for transportation and infrastructure spending. The IIJA includes billions of dollars of funding opportunities to modernize the grid, build needed electric transmission, enhance energy system resilience, expand electric vehicle charging infrastructure, and advance building energy efficiency, smart manufacturing, carbon capture and utilization, renewables, and other innovative initiatives.

The Energy Office anticipates receiving an estimated \$11 million over the next five federal fiscal years 2022-2026 — which equate to State of South Carolina fiscal years 2022-2023 to 2026-2027 — from the IIJA. This amount is in addition to annual State Energy Program (SEP) formula funding of approximately \$850,000. The Energy Office estimates it will receive a total of approximately \$5.7 million in the upcoming fiscal year (SC fiscal year 2022-2023).

In addition, the ORS will continue to implement several recent laws and regulations including S. 1045, Act 90, Act 56, the Broadband Accessibility Act, the SC Energy Freedom Act (Act 62), and consumer-protection regulations on solar leasing.

Another area of significant concern that the ORS is monitoring is the ongoing fuel shortage. Increases in coal, natural gas, and commodity transportation costs began in the third quarter of 2021. These costs are forecasted to remain at increased levels in 2022 and to continue to remain at these prices. In the context of rising fuel prices, annual fuel review cases remain a vital aspect of ORS’ annual proceedings. On August 8, 2022, Dominion Energy SC filed for a mid-period fuel adjustment due to the rising cost of commodities such as coal and natural gas.

Risk and Mitigation Strategies

If the ORS does not fulfill its mission of representing the public interest in utility regulation, the adverse consequences for consumers could be 1) paying high, inequitable rates that are beyond what is adequate for utilities to maintain service reliability or 2) paying rates that are too low for utilities to sustain reliable service to customers.

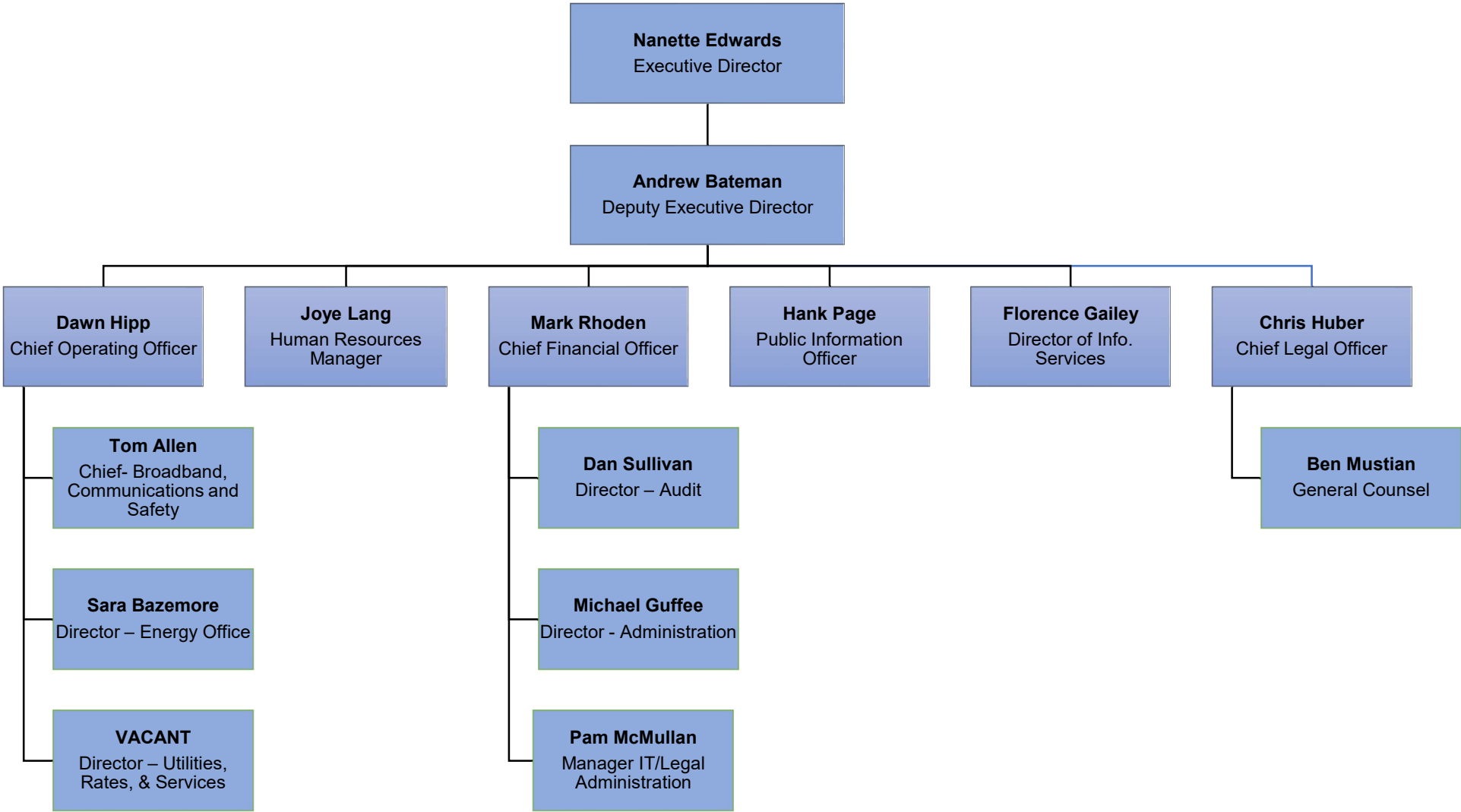
