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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

SOUTH CAROLINA STATE UNIVERSITY

Founded in 1896, South Carolina State University is the only public historically black college in the State of South Carolina. A senior land-grant comprehensive institution located in Orangeburg, South Carolina, the University is committed to providing affordable and accessible baccalaureate, master's, educational specialists, and doctoral degrees to the citizens of South Carolina and beyond. We offer programs in nuclear engineering, speech pathology and audiology, business, science, mathematics, education, and agribusiness, among others.

The University has maintained its reputation of educating and graduating leaders who make indelible marks on society. The highly skilled and socially aware graduates are prepared to work and live productively in the global society. Through technology and traditional methods of teaching and learning, research and service, the University enhances the quality of life of citizens and contributes to the economic development of the state and nation.

FY 2022 became a "Renaissance" year for SC State University. Under new leadership of the 13th President Alex Conyers, SC State began to set the pace for what would become a resurgence of the institution. Fall 2021, we welcomed one of the largest freshman classes with 1,115 first time students, an 57.33% increase over the previous year. The total headcount was 2,679 which was an 11.58% increase over the previous year, exceeding the 10% goal.

The Nuclear Engineering Program was selected as part of a consortium of 16 universities by the Department of Energy's (DOE) National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA). The consortium is tasked with educating the next generation of nuclear forensic scientists and conducting new research in the field of nuclear security and non-proliferation. The objective is to produce 135 graduates.

As SC State continues to grow, we want all of our programs to generate the same acclaim as our premier nuclear engineering. This year, we conducted a review of academic programs and curriculum. We want to provide cutting-edge, innovative academic programs that meet the workforce needs of South Carolina and beyond. Implementation of recommendations are underway.

SC State has had longstanding issues with buildings in disrepair. During 2022- 2023, the campus facilities priority became evident. The funding request from the state was heavily laden with funds for campus facilities. SC State's focus is on having a safe and comfortable

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environment for our students to live and learn. In FY 2023, we were allocated \$33M for maintenance, expansion, and replacement of campus facilities, \$20M for expansion of the Student Center, and \$10M for Truth Hall residence. The allocation provided tremendous support to complete projects that were outstanding.

We continued to work through the Master Plan with consultants. The Master Plan is critical to the future of the campus. As we continue to grow, it is important to strategically plan the road map to accommodate our rapid growth. Our goal is to ensure that we are good stewards of all funding by aligning the project costs with an effective plan. In addition, we welcomed Information Technology consultants to the campus to access the current and future technology needs. An assessment was completed, and we are implementing the recommendations that address the needs for our students, faculty, staff, parents, alumni, and the greater community. We have seen a positive uptick in campus operations due to the technology upgrades. We were able to replace 700 telephones and replaced an outdated phone system, which has had a tremendous impact on operations and customer service.


SC celebrated 75 years of exceptional military excellence of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC). Since its inception, the ROTC program has exceeded expectations. The students who graduated from the ROTC program as officers have made tremendous impact on the United States military and our nation. The Bulldog Battalion has produced well over 2,000 officers and twenty-two general officers, a feat that has international impact and recognition. The University's flagship program is noted for the substantial number of African Americans who have contributed to our nation's defense.

Overall, 2022 – 2023 has been a great year for SC State University. We look forward to even greater success during the 2023 – 2024 year.



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
