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
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#### **AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**


#### Key Takeaways from Student Performance in the 2024-25 School Year

- Although performance has improved since 2024, student performance in math continues to be a concern. Particularly troubling are the results for Pupils in Poverty (PIP) and students of color.
- Performance on all End-of-Course assessments improved from 2024 to 2025;
   however, in 2024-25, over half of students scored a "D" or an "F" on the Biology I and US History and the Constitution assessments.
- Students taking SC READY English Language Arts (ELA) in SY 2024-25 took an
  assessment that was based on new ELA standards; therefore, making
  comparisons to previous years are not advisable. It is encouraging that 59.6% of
  students statewide scored Meets or Exceeds Expectations on the ELA SC READY.
- The statewide graduation rate for 2025 is currently embargoed for release on October 14, 2025. School Report Cards for the 2024-25 school year are also embargoed until 10/14/2025. Budget presentations will be reflective of more current data.


#### SC READY MATH 2025: Grade 3





## SC READY 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Math, SY 24-25


