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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

SLED continues to fulfill its mission of providing quality manpower and technical assistance to all law enforcement agencies in South Carolina to ensure that every citizen in the State of South Carolina is afforded an equal level of law enforcement service. SLED also continues its efforts to protect the safety, integrity, and security of all citizens in South Carolina as well as South Carolina's public resources, infrastructure, and data. SLED has continued its effort to fully realize SLED's vision of being the premier law enforcement agency in the State of South Carolina and to effectively and efficiently perform the numerous statutory roles and responsibilities provided in South Carolina law.

SLED successfully completed its year 1 CALEA (Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies) web-based re-accreditation review. Additionally, in December 2024 SLED was re-accredited with the South Carolina Law Enforcement Accreditation (SCLEA) program.

Investigative Services Department

SLED's regional agents handle major crimes investigations throughout the state, including officer involved shootings and in-custody death investigations, official misconduct and public corruption cases, criminal sexual conduct cases, financial fraud and theft investigations, homicide and other death investigations. In 2024, SLED investigated 41 of the 45 officer-involved shooting cases in South Carolina. In addition, SLED's regional investigators also conduct the majority of the major crimes investigations for many small jurisdictions around the state that simply do not have the necessary resources or expertise. SLED's regional agents and supervisors continue to collaborate and coordinate with South Carolina's various police chiefs, sheriffs, coroners, federal law enforcement agencies, and prosecutors to maintain strong working relationships throughout South Carolina's criminal justice community.

In 2024, the **Low Country Region** opened 193 investigations. In comparison to the past five years, the Low Country Region opened an average of 143.9 investigations per year. Of the 193 investigations opened, 114 were violent crimes (i.e., Murder, CSC, OIS, etc.), 48 were non-violent (i.e., Breach of Trust, Embezzlement, Larceny, Official Misconduct, etc.) and 31 were Administrative (i.e., Evidence Inventory, Background Investigation, etc.). Of the 114 violent crime investigations, 31 were death investigations, of which 16 were homicides. Of the 16 homicide investigations, SLED was the lead investigative entity on 10 of the incidents. The Low Country Region also conducted 11 Criminal Sexual Conduct (CSC) (Adult & Minor) investigations and conducted 12 Officer

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Involved Shooting (OIS) Investigations.

In 2024, the **Midlands Region** saw a slight decrease of approximately 3.7 percent in assigned cases; opening and investigating 179 cases. By year-end, of the 179 cases opened, 91 were closed/completed; 8 were under review by a solicitor or the South Carolina Attorney General's Office; 25 were awaiting court; and one was placed in suspended status. As a result of these ongoing investigations, 52 arrests were made with 132 warrants served. Of the 33 types of cases worked by the Midlands Region in 2024, the following ten case types made up approximately 70 percent of the total cases worked: Official Misconduct- 15 cases (8.37 %), Administrative/Other- 12 cases (6.7%), Background Investigations - 14 cases (7.82%), Assault and/or Battery- 7 cases (3.9%), CSC - 14 cases (7.82%), Fraud- 13 cases (7.26%), Death Investigation - 8 cases (4.46%), OIS - 2 cases (1.11%), Inmate Death - 8 cases (4.46%), and Attempted Murder-8 cases (4.46%).

In 2024, the SLED **Piedmont Region** received 175 requests for investigative assistance. A brief snapshot of cases that our agents worked in 2024 were as follows: 19 OIS investigations, 25 death investigations, 19 assault and battery (number included domestic violence cases and child abuse cases associated with assault and batteries), 17 CSC cases, 2 fraud cases, and 22 official misconduct/use of force cases. In 2024, 29 arrests were made by agents in the Piedmont Region. Of those arrests, 6 were government officials, law enforcement and detention center officers.

In 2024, The **Pee Dee Region** initiated 144 investigations. Of note, the Pee Dee Region initiated 24 Death investigations (murder or suspicious), 18 Inmate or In-custody death investigations, 6 OIS investigations, 10 CSC investigations, 28 Official Misconduct and/or LE Use of Force investigations, 7 Assault and/or Attempted Murder investigations, 5 Domestic Violence investigations, 11 Fraud and/or Forgery investigations, 2 investigations related to Threats towards Public Officials, 2 Missing Person investigations, and 3 Background investigations for potential candidates for SLED employment. Investigative requests were assigned to Agents based on the complexity of the investigation, the agent's current caseload, the agent's knowledge of the type of investigation, geographical location, and/or any potential conflicts. During 2024, Pee Dee Regional agents arrested 25 individuals related to 102 arrest warrants on those individuals. The Pee Dee Region responded to and investigated 6 officer-involved shootings in 2024. There were 28 Official Misconduct, and 5 law enforcement Use of Force investigations initiated. In 2024 Pee Dee regional agents charged 11 law enforcement officers or correctional officers with Misconduct in Office.

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The Behavioral Sciences Unit conducts threat assessments and analyses of individuals who convey threatening or inappropriate communications by determining the level of risk/threat of individuals and providing interventions to lower the risk of harm. This unit also provides investigative analysis to identify responsible parties or unknown perpetrators based on crime analysis, forensic psychology, and behavioral science. In 2024 the Behavioral Science Unit received 249 requests for assistance, down from 316 in 2023. Of those, 195 requests were for threat assessment.

The Polygraph Unit administers the Polygraph Examiners Act and is the statewide regulator for all polygraph examiners in South Carolina. This unit also conducts polygraphs to assist with criminal investigations around the state and conducts pre-employment polygraphs for SLED and others. In addition, this unit created and oversees the State Polygraph Information Network, a database through which law enforcement agencies can share background information about potential employees. In 2024 there were 299 scheduled tests, and 205 tests conducted. There are currently 103 licensed polygraph examiners, including 3 intern examiners in South Carolina.

The SLED Special Victim's Unit (SVU) is comprised of the Department of Child Fatalities (DCF), Forensic Art Unit (FAU), Vulnerable Adults Investigations Unit (VAIU), and Forensic Interviewers. SVU Agents conduct Forensic Interviews for local law enforcement agencies, Department of Social Services, and SLED at Children's Advocacy Centers across the state, in compliance with the South Carolina Child Abuse Response Protocol. In 2024, SVU Forensic Interviewers interviewed 135 children who were suspected victims of abuse or neglect, or witnesses to violence.

The VAIU investigates fatalities and allegations of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of vulnerable adults in facilities operated by the Department of Mental Health or the Disabilities and Special Needs Board. A Vulnerable Adult Hotline is operated 24/7 and receives intakes from state and local care facilities involving vulnerable adult fatalities, neglect, abuse, and exploitation. These reports are investigated by the VAIU Agents or referred to the proper investigating authority. In 2024, the VAIU Hotline received 821 vulnerable adult intakes, and the VAIU investigated 172 cases.

The DCF investigates all deaths of children (under the age of 18) that are the result of violence, in any suspicious

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or unusual manner, or when the death is unexpected or unexplained. The unit is part of the Child Death Investigation Task Force in each county and conducts trainings on child death investigations for task force members. In 2024, the DCF investigated 328 child deaths and 25 child abuse and neglect cases (non-fatalities).

The FAU provides Forensic Art services, which include composite sketches, facial reconstructions, postmortem images, facial image comparisons, age progressions, age regressions, facial comparisons, crime scene diagrams, security diagrams, court room exhibits, and various other graphics projects. In 2024, the FAU opened 89 cases: 14 composite sketches, 68 graphics projects, two age progression projects, and five facial reconstruction projects.

The State Grand Jury Unit conducts investigations into public corruption, white collar crime, insurance fraud, and securities fraud throughout the state. The State Grand Jury Unit has opened and investigated 152 cases of insurance fraud as well as an additional 12 non-grand jury cases involving Public Corruption. Additional cases handled included election fraud, public corruption, Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), Fraud and bank fraud. The SGJ continued to work on multiple cases of Public Corruption. Both units made a total of 85 arrests in 2024. There were 35 convictions for Insurance Fraud and 1 civil Memorandum of Understandings. There were 9 Public Corruption convictions.

SLED's Training Unit oversees all training at SLED. This unit provides annual in-service and specialized training to all sworn agents, and coordinates training for SLED non-sworn employees. SLED continues to focus on improving SLED's overall investigative work product with enhanced training on interviews and interrogations and collaboration on report writing. During 2024, the Training Unit was additionally responsible for training and preparing new agents for the Basic Academy at the SCCJA to include a four-week classroom preparation, defensive tactics familiarization, driving familiarization, and firearms training. In 2024, SLED Training delivered 33,333 hours of training. Additionally, the SLED training unit oversees canine training for all division canines in five disciplines, utility, arson, explosives, narcotics, and human remains detection. In 2024 the SLED training unit certified four canines for the division, and six canines for other agencies around the state of South Carolina. Additionally, 63 recertifications were completed for other dog teams within the state. In 2024, the SLED training unit was tasked with creating and implementing the free CWP class program from the constitutional carry legislation within every county of South Carolina. SLED oversees and manages over 90 classes per month in every county of the state, which includes 68 contracted instructors that conduct the classes.

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The Vehicle Crimes Unit investigates driver's license fraud, identification fraud, and title violation cases from SCDMV. This unit also aids local law enforcement on stolen vehicle investigations, chop shop investigations, and vehicle or vehicle part inspections at junkyards, scrap metal processing facilities, salvage yards, repair shops, public garages, and car lots. In 2024, the Vehicle Crimes Unit investigated 577 cases, closed 461 cases, and issued 67 tickets, 61 assisted arrests, and made 74 arrests. Vehicle Crimes Agents assisted local agencies resulting in a record-high caseload and a record number of auto theft recoveries and vehicle identifications with a value of \$10.16 million down from \$10.63 million in 2023.

The Law Enforcement Victim Advocate Unit consists of two LEVAs who provide support and advocacy for victims with the goal of reducing traumatization, reducing reoccurrences of revictimization, maximize case results for prosecution, while honoring and protecting state and federal rights of crime victims. During 2024, the LEVA Unit served 413 victims in 187 cases. Investigations Administration maintains the public reporting hotline telephone and email address for receiving reports of possible election fraud or other violations of the election laws while promptly reviewing all reported violations and taking appropriate action. Agents work closely with the SC Election Commission to investigate election fraud allegations.

Counter Terrorism

In the last fiscal year, the SLED Arson Investigations Unit received 168 requests for investigative assistance, of which Agents responded to 160 of those requests. Of the 160 responses, 66 cases were classified as "Incendiary." Of the 66 incendiary cases, 25 were cleared with an arrest. The national average clearance rate for Arson cases varies between 15-24%. In the last year, the SLED Arson Investigations Unit clearance rate, by arrest, was 38% which was significantly higher than the national. Last year, 32 arrests were made, involving the following charges: Arson 1st, Arson 2nd, Arson 3rd, Accessory to Murder, Attempted Murder, Breaking in to Motor Vehicle, Burglary 2nd, Conspiracy, Desecration of Human Remains, Domestic Violence High & Aggravated, Murder, Ill Treatment of Animals, Negligently Allowing Fire to Spread to Lands/Property of another, Possession of a Weapon during a Violent Crime, Trespassing, and Willfully Burning Lands of Another.

The SLED Aviation Unit continued its effort to provide aerial assistance with locating missing persons, fugitive searches, narcotics operations, surveillance operations, natural disaster response, crime suppression, and a variety of tactical and SWAT operations. In FY 24/25 SLED Aviation flew 488 missions totaling 730 flight hours. In FY

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24/25, SLED pilots decreased flight hours by 8% compared to FY 23/24; but flight missions increased by 10% from the previous fiscal year. The SLED Aviation Unit received the new Bell 412 heavy lift helicopter in December of 2023 and certified in aerial water delivery in December of 2024.

The Bloodhound Tracking and Canine Team is a specialized tactical unit that uses bloodhound-mix tracking dogs to assist federal, state, and local partners in locating wanted and missing individuals. This unit also provides apprehension canines to support SWAT operations, fugitive apprehension operations, and searches. In FY 24/25, the Bloodhound and Canine Tracking Team obtained a Human Remains Detection (HRD) dog which should be certified in December of 2025. The unit also promotes public relations as SLED's bloodhounds are well-known and beloved. In FY 24/25 the Bloodhound Tracking and Canine Team received 327 calls for service that led to 196 arrests. Of the 327 calls for service, 238 were for fugitives, 14 for a bush bond/fleeing subject, 23 for missing persons, four warrant roundups, two article searches, eight for crime suppression, and multiple other missions.

The Bomb Squad provides subject matter expertise to all law enforcement agencies in South Carolina and other major events occurring outside of South Carolina. The Bomb Squad conducts protective sweeps for events and potential targets as well as responds to SWAT calls, bomb threats, and ordinance disposal requests. In addition, then Bomb Squad provides and participates in explosive and/or hazardous materials-related training for bomb technicians and community partners at the federal, state, and local levels. In FY 24-25, the Bomb Squad responded to 241 calls for service or special assignments. Calls for service were generated in 36 of the 46 counties (78%).

The Counterterrorism Dive Unit (CDU) protects South Carolina's maritime infrastructure through explosive, radiological, and hazardous device detection sweeps, and the mitigation of incidents related to such. In addition, the CDU supports federal, state, and local partners in the Port of Charleston and other maritime environments. The CDU is comprised of both divers and support personnel. Support duties include boat operators (Coxswains), medics, underwater robot (ROV) pilots, and counter unmanned aerial system (cUAS) operators. During FY 24-25, the CDU was awarded \$450,000 through the 2024 Port Security Grant Program which allowed the CDU to purchase night vision goggles, pay for ongoing CDU training (for SLED CDU personnel and SeaHawk IOC agency dive teams), and mobile radios for CDU's SeaHawk IOC partners. During FY 24-25, the CDU conducted 61 missions.

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The Protective Services and Emergency Management Unit (PS/EM) utilizes SLED personnel from the entire agency to staff various events throughout South Carolina. The PS/EM Unit planned and coordinated coverage of 179 events during Fiscal Year 2024-2025 (FY 24-25), utilizing 2,514 agents who worked a combined 39,632 hours. During FY 24-25, PS/EM received 43 requests for law enforcement assistance, at sporting events, by the University of South Carolina, Clemson University, South Carolina State University, Coastal Carolina University, Benedict College, Denmark Tech, Charleston City PD, Town of Mt. Pleasant PD, and the Darlington County Sheriff's Office. The more notable requests for assistance included football games, basketball games, the Cooper River Bridge Run, and NASCAR races. In total, 514 SLED Agents worked a combined 5,878 hours for these specific requests. During FY 24-25, the PS/EM planned and provided law enforcement protective measures for Bike Week and Carolina County Music Festival (CCMF) in Myrtle Beach. SLED provided 112 agents for Bike Week.

The agents worked 4,623 hours and SLED's pilots flew 9.1 hours. For the Carolina Country Music Festival, 39 SLED Agents worked a total of 1,613 hours and SLED's pilots flew a total of 9.1 hours. The PS/EM Unit planned and provided law enforcement protective measures for three (3) special event requests by the South Carolina Department of Public Safety (DPS), Bureau of Protective Services (BPS), and the Statehouse/Mansion Complex. SLED staffed the special event requests using 66 agents, who worked a total of 467 hours. These requests included providing protective measures during the Governor's Inauguration, King Day at the Dome, Governor's Carol lighting, Governor's Open House, and Menorah Lighting Ceremony. In FY 24-25, there were 14 requests for assistance with rallies and protests around the state. SLED provided 113 agents, who worked a combined 727 hours. BPS requested SLED's assistance with providing protective measures at the SC State House in anticipation of protests as the SC House of Representatives and SC Senate as they held special sessions to discuss controversial TORT Reform and DEI legislation. There were additional protests, held at the State House, which were part of a national movement to protest policies and decisions made by President Donald Trump's Administration. SLED also assisted Oconee County Sheriff's Office with the Carolina Red Line Tour Protest, in front of Senator Lindsey Graham's home. During FY 24-25, PS/EM planned and executed 19 armed escorts of special nuclear material throughout the State, using 44 agents who worked a total of 227 hours. In FY 24-25, PS/EM received 16 crime suppression requests from various counties and municipal agencies. Most of the crime suppressions took place in the Pee Dee, Low Country, and Midlands areas. This was accomplished in conjunction with DNR, PPP, and SCHP. SLED utilized 288 agents, who worked 1,986 hours.

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During FY 24-25, PS/EM planned, coordinated, and responded to four (4) natural disasters (Tropical Storm Debby, November Historic Floods in Orangeburg County, Hurricane Helene, and Winter Storm Enzo). Emergency Support Function 13 (ESF-13), which provides law enforcement support during emergencies and/or disasters to ensure protection of lives and property, was activated to coordinate the state law enforcement response for each of these natural disasters. Hurricane Helene impacted the entire state of South Carolina. Hurricane Helene caused severe damage and power outages across the entire state with the most severe damage occurring in the Southern and Western Regions of South Carolina. These activations and deployments utilized 379 personnel, who worked a combined 10,372 hours. In FY 24-25, PS/EM coordinated law enforcement support for 13 requests for assistance from municipal and county law enforcement agencies. These requests involved 26 operational periods utilizing 166 agents, expending 2,223 personnel hours.

Due to staffing shortages, the Blackville Police Department, Bamberg Police Department and Marlboro County Sheriff's Office requested assistance with answering calls for service. PS/EM planned and coordinated with DNR, PPP, SCHP, to help staff shifts at each of these agencies. SLED's SWAT Team also assisted the Myrtle Beach Police Department with law enforcement support during select peak tourist weekends. During FY 24-25, PS/EM provided law enforcement support to three incidents that occurred within South Carolina. SLED assisted Lee County Sheriff's Office with a manhunt, which resulted in the death of a Lee County Sheriff's Office K-9. The subject was tracked by SLED's Tracking Team and Aviation Unit and found deceased from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. The PS/EM Unit also responded to and assisted with the law enforcement response for a missing hiker in Table Rock State Park and the wildfires which occurred several weeks later in Table Rock and Persimmon Ridge in the Upstate. SLED's Aviation Unit also played a vital role in the fire suppression for the Upstate fires. For FY 24-25, PS/EM planned and provided law enforcement protective measures for 19 federal requests for dignitary protection details throughout the state. SLED worked 38 details using 370 agents, who worked 7,003 hours. The requests involved assisting with providing protection to POTUS, VPOTUS, Former POTUS Trump, Senator Scott, and Congressman Jim Clyburn.

The SeaHawk Interagency Operations Center (IOC) is the coordinating body of government agencies focused on the safety, security, and prosperity of the South Carolina maritime domain. SeaHawk utilizes a systematic approach to facilitate information sharing; conducts a thorough analysis of risks and threats; plans for emergent, potential, and upcoming incidents; and coordinates operation between federal, state, and local partners. From July 1, 2024, to June 30, 2025, the SeaHawk IOC assisted with 1,444 requests. The SeaHawk IOC also planned and

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coordinated 12 Multi-Agency Strike Force Operations (MASFO's), 58 Homeland Security Multi-Agency land and maritime patrols and 2 multi-Agency operations on the waterways surrounding the port. In April 2025, the SeaHawk IOC was awarded the 2025 Maritime Domain Awareness Excellence Award by the National Fusion Center Association.

SLED's Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team provides tactical expertise and specialized response capabilities throughout South Carolina. The SWAT Team's primary focus is rapid response, utilizing tactical solutions, and mitigating casualties through specialized training, equipment, and tactics. This unit responds to barricaded subjects/hostage situations, assists with high-risk warrant service operations, and supports response capabilities for crime suppression and events throughout the State. During FY 24/25, the SWAT Team received 188 requests for assistance that led to 80 arrests. Of the 188 requests, 84 were for security details, 67 for high-risk warrants, 11 for tactical support, six for aerial overwatch, ten for barricaded subjects, one for hostage rescue, one for riots/civil unrest, one for an active shooter, and seven for Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD).

The WMD Team supports our federal, state, and local partners in responses to chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosive (CBRNE) related events in South Carolina. The WMD Team responded to seven calls for service during FY 24/25.

Forensic Services Laboratory

Since 1994, the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) has accredited the SLED Lab. Accreditation is maintained through annual internal and periodic external assessments. The laboratory was initially accredited under the Legacy Program with reaccreditation granted in 1999, 2004, and 2009. As ASCLD/LAB transitioned to the ISO/IEC:17025 based program, the laboratory underwent assessment and obtained ASCLD/LAB-International Accreditation on September 19, 2014. SLED's Forensic Services Laboratory has continued compliance with ANAB/ISO/IEC:17025 and FBI/QAS accreditation standards with reaccreditation in 2019 and 2023.

On May 19, 2020, Governor Henry McMaster signed Act 134 (H.3309) into law requiring SLED to "create and operate a statewide sexual assault kit tracking system." SLED formed a Task Force of stakeholders across the state in July 2020 and held virtual meetings in September and November. The final Statement of Award was effective on July 26, 2022, to InVita Healthcare Technologies for the Track-Kit™ software system.

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Implementation of Track-Kit™ began in December 2023 in the Pee Dee Region of South Carolina and by February 20, 2024, Track-Kit™ was live in all regions of South Carolina. Track-Kit™ refresher training webinars will be hosted in August and September of this year, including two Advocate training sessions to provide Advocates with an overview of the Survivor Portal so they can most effectively assist Survivors. Semi-annual reports are provided to the Governor and Senate/House Judiciary Committees with the most recent being July 31, 2025.

The SLED Computer Crime Center (SC3C) encompasses the preservation, processing, and analysis of evidence in an analog or digital format and is responsible for providing expertise to local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies in the scientific examination, repair (if possible), analysis and/or evaluation of electronically stored information contained on a wide variety of data storage devices. This unit also supports the South Carolina Critical Infrastructure Cybersecurity (SC CIC) Program.

The SLED Crime Scene Department is responsible for aiding local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies in the investigation of crime scenes and providing assistance in Bloodstain Pattern Analysis/Crime Scene Reconstruction, and Advanced Digital Photography. This unit responded to 282 crime scene requests in FY 2025 with a total response to 324 scenes, autopsies, and follow-ups.

The DNA Casework Department performs scientific analyses on biological evidence such as blood, semen, and saliva. Technicians and analysts evaluate available information to understand the nature of the case and what forensic questions need to be addressed. Items of evidence submitted for DNA analysis are then examined to locate and identify probative biological samples. This department assists with ensuring that compliance with Track-Kit™ is met by all stakeholders involved in the collection and submission of Sexual Assault Kits. In October 2024, the DNA Casework Department began outsourcing Sexual Assault Kits to assist with backlog reduction.

The DNA Database Department manages the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS) which is a nationwide database containing the DNA profiles of criminal offenders, crime scene evidence, missing persons and their relatives. SLED is the state repository for offender DNA specimens required per statute. DNA Database also processes DNA expungement requests in accordance with S.C. Code Ann. § 23-3-660. New Quality Assurance Standards issued by the FBI for laboratories and partner agencies using Rapid DNA analysis were effective July

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1, 2025. Once the FBI approves Rapid systems for use on forensic samples, SLED will begin validation of Rapid DNA instruments for this purpose.

The Evidence Control Department is responsible for the acceptance and storage of all evidence submitted to the Forensic Services Laboratory. Over 25,000 assignments are received annually by the Evidence Control Department. There are currently 122,866 items of evidence stored in the Evidence Room. In this section, Forensic Technicians receive evidence and enter corresponding case information into the Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS). In this past fiscal year, SLED received 71,839 items of evidence, resulting in 26,012 assignments. Lab personnel completed a total of 32,037 assignments consisting of 98,563 items of evidence.

The Firearms Department examines firearms to test their operability, compliance with various statutory regulations (ex. capability for full auto fire, barrel length, and/or overall length), and examines and microscopically compares fired ammunition components (projectiles, cartridge cases, shotshells, etc.). Additionally, the Department performs serial number restoration; examines tools and microscopically compares tool marks; destroys firearms, knives, metal tools, etc. for various agencies in South Carolina; and operates the Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS) database. In FY 2024, 6,385 cases were entered into the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) through the Entry by Appointment Program resulting in 9,958 correlations and 2,691 investigative leads between cases. This year, SLED's NIBIN program has consistently ranked in the top five each month on entries and in the top 15 for leads for all programs in the United States. In May 2025, the Firearms Department reached a total of 12,000 NIBIN leads.

The Forensic Technology Department administers the iLAB system, a web-based system for pre-logging cases for submission to the laboratory. Additionally, the department administers the Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) for Forensic Services.

The Implied Consent Department regulates the breath testing program for South Carolina. The department certifies, inspects, repairs, and maintains the DataMaster DMT Program. In the previous budget, SLED was appropriated over \$2.5 million to complete mandatory upgrades on all 152 DataMaster DMT breath testing instruments at 109 statewide sites. In the FY23 budget, SLED was appropriated an additional \$2,078,890 to complete the IRSA Video upgrades. These upgrades are required approximately every ten years. Video upgrades

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were completed in FY25 and upgrades to breath testing devices will begin in Fall 2025. The department will coordinate with the SC Criminal Justice Academy to train law enforcement officers on the use of the new instrumentation.

Alcohol, Narcotics, and VICE Department

The Narcotics Unit focuses on criminal activity related to narcotics, but it also encompasses specialized teams in illegal dog fighting enterprises and illegal immigration crimes. In 2024 narcotics agents opened 658 new narcotics cases, resulting in the removal of \$39,047,865.80 worth of illicit drugs from the streets of South Carolina. Specifically, they seized 227.7 pounds of Cocaine, 183 pounds of Meth/Ice, 28 pounds of Fentanyl, 20.3 pounds of Heroin, 2.5 pounds of MDMA, 0.64 pounds grams of Crack, 305.4 pounds of THC and 2,497 pounds of marijuana. They also seized 150 rolled marijuana cigars and THC products and 6 pounds of Psilocybin (mushrooms), 292 pieces, and another 201 bars. Additionally, they seized 539 prescriptions pills: including Oxycodone, Roxicodone, Alprazolam, and other prescription pills. SLED narcotics agents seized real property of \$1,385,879.15 in currency, 47 firearms, 7 vehicles, and 10 drones. They served 751 arrest warrants with 183 arrests and 209 assisted arrests. On May 21, 2024, one agent was recognized as State Finalist at the annual Governor’s Law Enforcement Officer Award Ceremony. The nomination was based on her outstanding investigative work on several State Grand Jury investigations including “Triple Crown” and “Yard Work.”

Every year SLED hosts two pill takebacks to provide secure disposal for unused pills with the goal of curbing diversion. In 2024, SLED removed 5,334 pounds of unwanted pills across the entire state of South Carolina. In January 2024, SLED received 2,878 pounds of discarded pills from 20 law enforcement agencies and in July, we received 2,456 pounds of pills from 19 law enforcement agencies spanning the entire state and reaching every region of SC.

The Dogfighting Unit began when the General Assembly funded a new agent position solely to focus on dog fighting in South Carolina in 2022. SLED subsequently received new dogfighting agent positions in the last two fiscal years (2024 and 2025) and currently this team has one Lieutenant and four special agents. In September of 2023 the Dogfighting Unit came to fruition with SLED and 2024 was the first full year this unit operated. In 2024, the unit recovered 231 dogs, of which 205 were rescued, 23 were deceased, and 2 were euthanized. In 2024 the unit was the lead agency on 8 cases and assisted on 10 more. They charged 63 suspects for a total of 141 charges as follows; 23 animal related charges, 52 firearms related charges, 32 drug related charges, 21 child

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welfare related charges, 9 conspiracy related charges and 4 other types of charges. This unit's activity was present in all regions of the state, and dogs were recovered from 11 counties: including, Aiken, Anderson, Berkeley, Chester, Colleton, Charleston Darlington, Lancaster, Lee, Richland, and Spartanburg. Of note in 2024, on December 16, 2024, members of the Dogfighting Unit executed three search warrants in Colleton County as part of an ongoing investigation. During the execution of these warrants, 29 dogs were seized (27 rescued, 2 deceased), as well one stolen handgun and several ounces of marijuana. All dogs were subsequently turned over to the ASPCA who were on scene. The ASPCA then transported the dogs to their facility in Ohio. The owners of the dogs signed them over to SLED and Colleton County Animal Control. As a result of the investigation, 4 subjects were arrested on 14 separate warrants to include Dogfighting, Ill Treatment of Animals and Possession of a Stolen Firearm.

The Illegal Immigration Enforcement Unit consists of 5 special agents. Two of the five agents assigned to this unit are Task Force Officers with Homeland Security Investigations. Three of the five agents assigned to this unit are Spanish speakers. IEU agents continue to assist other units at SLED (Human Trafficking/Narcotics/Investigative Services/Polygraph) with ongoing investigations involving foreign nationals. They also continue to be called upon daily by local agencies to assist with foreign nationals who are encountered in criminal investigations, whether victim or offender as well as for translation. In 2024, this unit opened 67 cases. They issued 4 summons, 77 warrants, arrested 31 suspects, and assisted in the arrest of 238 suspects and assisted law enforcement across the state 536 times. IEU team members also taught 4 classes which were attended by 63 law enforcement personnel. It is noteworthy to highlight that the Immigration Enforcement Unit initiated a State Grand Jury Investigation in 2024, that encompasses numerous counties within the state. IEU agents also participated in a weeklong operation in 2024, known as "Rolling Thunder" in the upstate. It is noted that during this operation, IEU agents identified and arrested a subject from North Carolina that was wanted for multiple homicides. IEU agents also assisted in the seizure of multi-kilo quantities of cocaine.

The Alcohol, Tobacco and Lottery/Gambling unit is comprised of five teams. The first four teams are regional enforcement of alcohol, tobacco, and lottery/gambling laws and the fifth team is specialized in enforcing licensing compliance across the state. The Alcohol Enforcement Unit conducts alcohol inspections and underage compliance checks throughout South Carolina. In 2024, SLED conducted 25,841 alcohol license inspections that resulted in 855 administrative violations. SLED alcohol agents conducted 9,483 underage compliance checks that resulted in 629 illegal buys, a 6.6% failure rate by retailers. The unit issued 817 criminal citations

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for a range of alcohol violations in 2024. This unit also opened 31 gambling investigations throughout South Carolina including the seizure of 142 illegal gambling devices and \$58,025.23. The Lottery Investigations team investigates allegations of criminal violations involving the South Carolina Educational Lottery, including theft and fraud. Lottery agents opened 238 cases in 2024.

With the passing and implementation of the Omnibus Tobacco Enforcement Act of 2023, Alcohol Enforcement Agents began adding five tobacco UCIs monthly in September 2023. This resulted in 1,628 underage compliance checks with 197 of the underage informants being able to purchase tobacco, a 12.1% failure rate by retailers. As a result, 139 tickets were issued and 268 violations.

The Special Operations and Investigations unit is comprised of three specialized teams. The first team specializes in Narcotics Interdiction and serves across all regions in South Carolina. The second team in this unit is the Human Trafficking Team. Their mission is to aid and work collaboratively on investigations related to human trafficking with multidisciplinary team partners across South Carolina. They also provide training to law enforcement partners across the state regarding human trafficking and other special victim crimes and provide technical expertise for operations conducted to combat human trafficking.

The Narcotics Interdiction Team consists of one Lieutenant and five agents and four certified narcotics detection dogs. This group continued to conduct daily interdiction operations throughout the state at various FedEx, UPS, and United States Postal Service locations as well as various airports located throughout South Carolina. The group also continued to work closely with local jurisdictions throughout the state to interrupt the flow of illegal narcotics into their communities and arrest the recipients of illegal narcotic shipments. Agents were responsible for the seizure of over 2,158 pounds of marijuana valued at approximately \$6.5 million. This team also seized 118.9 pounds of methamphetamine, 78.8 pounds of THC, 8.5 pounds of fentanyl, 32.9 pounds of cocaine and 0.22 pounds of crack as well as prescription pills, mushrooms and mushroom bars, rolled marijuana cigars and THC vape cartridges, with an approximate removal of over \$21 million worth of illicit drugs. This team also coordinates the Marijuana Eradication Program and seized 93 marijuana plants in 2024.

The Human Trafficking Unit investigates human trafficking crimes and sex and labor-related businesses. This unit also partners with other local, state, and federal agencies to investigate and prosecute these cases. This unit coordinates databases for human trafficking information and intelligence. SLED currently chairs the Law

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Enforcement Subcommittee of the State Human Trafficking Task Force and participates in other task forces designed to bring a multidisciplinary approach to these cases focusing not only on the enforcement of the law, but also on the care and recovery of the victims of human trafficking. Since this unit's inception, their case load has continuously grown. In 2024, SLED Human Trafficking agents processed 294 tips and aid to 9 adult victims and 26 juvenile victims. They completed 5 investigations and opened 23 cases. They made 11 arrests and 23 assisted arrests. They recovered 6 juvenile victims and assisted in the recovery of 4 more juvenile victims. Additionally, this unit assisted law enforcement 59 times, served 19 arrest warrants and issued 2 summons tickets. They taught 14 Human Trafficking education classes to law enforcement and 8 to non-law enforcement, with 474 and 373 attendees, respectively. They were active in Aiken, Charleston, Dorchester, Horry, Lancaster, Lexington, and Richland counties.

CJIS

The Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) unit collects and analyzes fingerprints, palm prints, and mugshots collected at booking to assist with reliable identification of individuals. This unit also provides criminal history record information for criminal and non-criminal justice purposes and performs fingerprint-based background checks for employment and licensing purposes. Our new AFIS will allow law enforcement agencies to submit iris and photo tattoos for the first time.

The Computerized Criminal History (CCH) & Expungement unit oversees South Carolina's criminal records database that provides criminal history records worldwide for South Carolina. Over the past year, the CCH and Expungement Units have implemented digital modification forms to better assist local law enforcement agencies as well as streamlining the expungement process by digitalizing them as they are sent by the courts. CCH has also begun an auditing program partnered with our AFIS Unit to assist agencies with fingerprint submission issues. These audits are targeted at finding error rates on dispositions not attached due to the lack of prints as well as prints being rejected due to the quality of the prints. This initiative has taken a center roll for CCH's trainers as it is a vital effort to better assist in making sure officers and citizens' safety is at the forefront of our mission. As of March of 2025, CCH has successfully implemented and redeveloped the new Computerized Criminal History Repository for the state of South Carolina.

The Noncriminal Justice Information Services (NCJIS) Unit contains an agency coordinator (AC) side and an authorized recipient (AR) side. The AC works with criminal justice agencies (CJA) and vendor/contractor companies to ensure compliance with the FBI CJIS Security Policy in the appropriate vetting and training of vendor/contractor personnel who have unescorted access to unencrypted criminal justice information (CJI). In FY

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2025, the AC assisted 91 CJAs with the vetting of 962 vendor/contractor personnel and 23 vendor/contractor companies with the vetting of 768 company personnel. Internally, the AC assisted 8 SLED units with the vetting of 195 vendor/contractor personnel providing services to SLED. There are 17 AR agencies in South Carolina with 38 separate authorities. The AR auditor/trainer assisted in bringing on 2 new authorities in FY 2025. In addition to providing training to and conducting audits of these AR agencies, the AR auditor/trainer assists in the appropriate vetting and training of AR agency personnel with access to CHRI. In FY 2025, the AR auditor/trainer assisted 14 agencies with the vetting of 357 agency personnel.

The NCIC unit oversees policies and procedures regarding usage of the FBI's National Crime Information Center (NCIC). This unit also audits use of and entry into the NCIC files, an electronic clearinghouse of crime data used by law enforcement to perform their duties, including apprehending fugitives, locating missing or lost persons, and recovering stolen property. The NCIC Unit audits over 450 criminal justice agencies in a three-year cycle. As of June 2025, South Carolina has 55,362 active Wanted Person records, 1,072 active Missing Person records, 7,911 active Protection Order records, and 1,022 active Violent Person records in the NCIC system.

The Public Dissemination unit provides name-based criminal history background checks to the public. This unit also reviews, logs and processes applications for concealed weapon permits and security guard and private investigator licenses. In addition, this unit provides guidance, support, and troubleshooting to the public for background checks conducted online through the SLED CATCH (Citizens' Access to Criminal History) system. In April 2025, Public Dissemination launched the new SLED CATCH platform which was updated to align with the CCH redevelopment. The new SLED CATCH platform allows the public, schools districts, and charitable organizations quicker access to requested CATCH reports and reduces the number of false positives and false negatives.

The Sex Offender Registry (SOR) Unit operates and maintains South Carolina's centralized sex offender registry. The unit provides training, technical assistance, and policy guidance to local law enforcement agencies on state and federal sex offender registration laws. Additionally, the unit supports the public, out-of-state law enforcement, and other authorized entities in accessing and understanding registry information. In 2024, the SOR Unit continued to strengthen collaboration with its law enforcement partners across the state. A major initiative included the creation of the SOR Regional Representatives Program, in which each SOR personnel liaison at the Sheriff's Offices selected a representative from one of four designated regions of the state. These representatives meet regularly with the SLED SOR Unit to advise on operational challenges and assist in making strategic decisions affecting statewide SOR functions. The unit also enhanced its training and outreach efforts in 2024,

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conducting by completing four Quarterly Information Sessions (two in person, two virtual), providing policy updates, system guidance, and open discussion forums for agency partners as well as multiple in-person training sessions for new and existing SOR personnel at both state and local agencies, focused on registry operations, documentation, and compliance. Additionally, through grant funding, the SOR Unit procured and distributed Topaz signature tablets to all 46 Sheriff's Offices statewide, modernizing the registration process by enabling digital documentation and reducing reliance on paper forms.

The South Carolina Information Exchange (SCIEEx) is a centralized, statewide repository of law enforcement records, including incident reports, citations, and case files, replicated from local agencies' Records Management Systems (RMS). SCIEEx supports cross-jurisdictional investigations, background checks, intelligence development, and crime trend analysis by making these records accessible to authorized users. Additionally, SCIEEx facilitates federal data sharing by replicating records to the FBI's National Data Exchange (N-DEx) and the Naval Criminal Investigative Service's Law Enforcement Information Exchange (LInX). Despite its critical function, SCIEEx continued to face operational challenges in 2024, including inconsistent data replication across agencies, deficiencies in search capabilities, and vendor support concerns. To address these longstanding issues, SLED CJIS initiated a comprehensive, multi-phase modernization strategy aimed at improving system reliability, data quality, user experience, and participation.

The South Carolina Incident-Based Reporting System (SCIBRS) is responsible for the collection, auditing, and oversight of detailed incident reports submitted by law enforcement agencies across the state. In 2024, SCIBRS achieved a 91% participation rate, representing consistent engagement from law enforcement agencies in submitting monthly incident-based crime data to SLED. This data supports crime trend analysis, federal compliance, and the publication of the *Crime in South Carolina* annual report. SCIBRS also oversees South Carolina's participation in the FBI's National Use of Force Data Collection (UoF), the Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection (LESDC), and the Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) programs. In 2024, Use of Force reporting participation increased to 85%, up from 40% in 2023, surpassing the agency's 75% goal and reflecting significant progress in statewide data reporting compliance. In total, the unit delivered 80 training sessions statewide, including: 39 Point of Contact Trainings (virtual via Microsoft Teams), 37 Manual and Coding Courses (in person at local agencies), and 4 Quarterly Information Sessions (virtual).

SLED's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Unit provides analytical and spatial support to law enforcement operations across the state, leveraging data visualizations, dashboards, and mapping applications to enhance situational awareness, resource allocation, and strategic decision-making. The unit plays a critical role in

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empowering intelligence-led policing through the integration of SCIBRS, 911 CAD, and supplemental data sources. Notable accomplishments in 2024 included developing a detailed search grid map to assist in a missing person investigation in Hilton Head, creating interactive maps and data visualizations for Chester County 911 CAD data, with focused analyses on shootings and overdose incidents, supporting the Aviation Unit with custom maps for five schools in Lexington and Richland Counties to assist in critical incident preparedness, and for six apartment complexes in Richland County to support crime suppression operations by providing pilots with enhanced visuals of large buildings, and maintaining key datasets to provide up-to-date Officer-Involved Shooting statistics to Executive Command. These dashboards were integrated into a newly developed Executive Site, designed to give the Chief and Assistant Chief real-time access to critical statistics on homicides, monthly crime trends, and child fatalities investigated by the Special Victims Unit.

Fusion Center

The SLED Fusion Center (SLED FC) utilizes the expertise and resources of governmental and private sector security and intelligence professionals to provide intelligence-specific and analytically-driven products to law enforcement personnel, first responders, citizens, businesses, and critical infrastructure in South Carolina. The goal of this effort is to maximize the ability to detect, prevent, apprehend, and respond to criminal and terrorist activity.

The Fusion Center generates and publishes the Fusion Center Bulletin to ensure that all law enforcement agencies as well as other criminal justice, private sector critical infrastructure, and public safety entities are aware of current issues and threats. This unit is comprised of the Threat Analysis Cell (TAC), the Criminal Analysis Team (CAT), the State Surveillance and Intelligence (SSI) unit, the Administration Unit, the Missing Person Information Center (MPIC) and SLED's Operations Desk (OD) unit.

The TAC provides analytical support to investigative efforts regarding various threats received both in the state and nationwide and ensures that information and intelligence is shared with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies. This unit also performs threat assessments on high profile events throughout the state and evaluates Suspicious Activity Reports for forwarding to the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force or SLED's Behavioral Science Unit as needed. In FY 2025 the TAC issued 859 advisories/assessments.

The CAT provides information and intelligence to federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies throughout the country to assist with fugitive apprehension, locating missing/endangered persons, and case development. In FY25, the CAT processed over **12,067** requests for federal, state, and local agencies.

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SSI provides trained agents capable of gathering information and intelligence in order to apprehend fugitives, locate missing/endangered persons, and assist local and state law enforcement. SSI agents are assigned to various joint federal and state task forces. In FY25 SLED Fusion SSI agents worked 1,575 cases resulting in 648 arrests across South Carolina almost all of whom were charged with serious or violent offenses.

The Administration Unit manages criminal intelligence databases (including GangNet) and provides intelligence and information to investigators. This unit also oversees the Joint Terrorism Task Force, JTTF where SLED agents partner with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and other law enforcement to protect the nation from terrorism.

The Missing Persons Information Center (MPIC) oversees the Amber Alert, Blue Alert, and the Endangered Person Notification System. In FY25, Fusion agents issued three Endangered Person Alerts, two Amber Alerts, and one Blue Alert (the first one issued in South Carolina). The Fusion Center assisted in 410 Missing Person Information Center cases in FY25.

SLED OD serves as SLED's dispatch ensuring that all operational units have radio communication at all times. This unit also enters warrants, stolen articles, and other pertinent law enforcement information into NCIC on behalf of SLED, Department of Environmental Services, Department of Public Health, the Attorney General's Office, the Department of Revenue, and the Department of Social Services. In addition, this unit assists with the creation of photo line-ups for law enforcement agencies.

Homeland Security

SLED Office of Homeland Security (OHS) manages over 300 (up from 140 last year) Homeland Security subgrants to law enforcement, fire, EMS, EOCs, emergency management agencies, as well as to churches, schools, governments, citizens' organizations, and other entities; the total value of open grants administered is approximately \$100 million. In addition, this unit provides statewide Emergency Responder badging/credentialing coordination and oversight for over 44,000 first responders.

The SLED OHS also operates the South Carolina Active Shooter/Active Threat Training Program in South Carolina. This effort provides Active Shooter/Active Threat training to civilians, dispatchers, and law enforcement officers; as well as provides Active Shooter/Active Threat Instructor certifications to law enforcement, fire, and EMS personnel. To date, this program has trained more than 190,000 students in South Carolina and many other states. In addition, this unit provides Rescue Task Force training to first responders,

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Bleeding Control and Basic Reunification training. This unit also coordinates Active Shooter Guidelines training for South Carolina schools, including children, faculty, and staff. SLED has established a partnership with the South Carolina Department of Education to provide additional training opportunities and certifications to South Carolina schools. SLED's Active Shooter and Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack Prevention Program continues to be a worldwide leader, providing subject matter expertise and consultation to training partners in Texas, North Carolina, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Utah, and many others.

In the FY 2023 budget, SLED received nearly \$3.6 million to establish a Center for School Safety and Targeted Violence in Gilbert, SC. In FY 2024, SLED received over \$7 million in additional funds for the Center. Daily operations and training at the Center is managed with the assistance of six additional sworn personnel that were also funded in the budget. The Center will work in coordination with the SLED Behavioral Science Unit (BSU) to assess children who have been identified as potential risks prior to committing an offense. Our Active Shooter Program has been recognized as not only outstanding in the State but has been recognized as outstanding nationwide. The unit has provided active shooter & complex coordinated terrorist attack mitigation, response, and recovery training to citizens and responders in South Carolina and in 19 other states and has trained students from all 50 states and from 9 other countries--now totaling over 193,500 trained for a total of more than a half a million training hours (approximately 521,532 hours total). The Center for School Safety is currently undergoing renovations and has been made available as a no-cost training space for educators, first responders, and many other groups. To date, the Center has hosted more than 117 events, serving more than 2,500 students from more than 200 agencies across the nation.

SLED's OHS conducts site security assistance visits for South Carolina Critical Infrastructure/Key Resources (CI/KR), state agencies, election offices, businesses, and religious institutions at risk. It also serves as South Carolina's state representative to the four Regional Homeland Security Advisory Councils in the state. In 2024, this unit completed the State Preparedness Report (SPR), and the Threat & Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA). Ongoing efforts are being made to update South Carolina's Homeland Security Strategy to continue to address all 32 Homeland Security capabilities and threats from active shooters, pandemics, earthquakes, WMD attacks, etc.

SLED OHS also coordinates South Carolina's Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD)/Counterterrorism (CT) Training and Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD)/Counterterrorism (CT) Exercise Program. This includes

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coordinating the exercises of the Regional Response Teams (RRTs) and providing after-action reviews and evaluations of the participating teams.

The SLED OHS also provides funding for and the key technical support/manning for the Statewide Radiological/Nuclear Detection Program. The State of South Carolina has established and is continuing to work with the Operations Support Directorate in the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Unit under the Department of Homeland Security. Approximately seventy (70) organizations across South Carolina are members of the program including: Federal Partners – FBI, DOE/RAP3, U.S. Marine Corps (Parris Island and Air Station Beaufort); State Partners – DPS (SCHP & STP), 43rd CST, DES (DHEC), DNR, SC Ports Authority, SCEMD; Local Partners – Charleston FD, North Charleston FD, Dorchester County SO, Easley PD, etc.; Universities – Clemson, University of South Carolina, Coastal Carolina, Anderson University, and Francis Marion University; Colleges – Benedict; Airports – GSP, CAE, CHS, MYB. Program funded equipment has been distributed to approximately twenty-six (26) of these partner agencies. This program facilitates multiple activities to include calibration of sensors statewide and using them to ensure large- and small-scale events are safe from potential radiological threats. Some of the larger events included: Clemson, University of South Carolina, Coastal Carolina, and Benedict home football games (Screening approximately 1.4 million people); Rivals in Red – Premier League Soccer (Screening approximately 77,000 people); Cooper River Bridge Run (Screening approximately 40,000 people); Carolina Country Music Festival (Screening approximately 35,000 people); Darlington NASCAR Races Spring race (screening approximately 40,000 people); Summer race (screening approximately 40,000 people); Rock the Country Music Festival (Screening approximately 45,000 people); and the Riverfront Revival Festival (Screening approximately 30,000 people). Note: 10's of thousands of vehicles were also scanned for radioactivity.

The Training Point of Contact (TPOC) for South Carolina is a member of SLED's Office of Homeland Security and is responsible for processing (vetting, approving/denying) training requests from South Carolina First Responders who desire attendance at Counterterrorism and Homeland Security training courses funded by the US Department of Homeland Security (US DHS). During FY 24-25, the TPOC approved over 1,150 requests for training.

Regulatory Services

The Community Relations Unit promotes SLED and SLED services to the community, including at career fairs and recruitment events. This unit facilitates the exchange of information and concerns related to police activities between law enforcement and the community. Over the last year SLED's Community Relations agents have

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worked alongside investigators to provide assistance with cases of strong community interest to ensure peaceful dialogue in the community. SLED currently has 4 Community Relations agents (1 per region). Community Relations Agents completed 222 after actions reports.

The South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program (SCLEAP) is a partnership between SLED, SCDPS, SCDPPPS, SCDNR and the SC Adjutant General that provides critical incident stress management and chaplaincy services to officers and staff of member agencies as well as all requesting local law enforcement agencies and departments in South Carolina. SCLEAP employees are full-time professional staff who, along with a statewide cadre of volunteer chaplains who provide 24-hour/7-day per week statewide service for all law enforcement agencies and departments in South Carolina. This unit receives an average of 25 requests for service each month as well as hosting multiple Post-Critical Incident Seminars (PCIS) and Traumatic Loss Seminars. The General Assembly recognizing the amazing work that SCLEAP was doing allocated additional funding in the FY 2022 budget to expand their work and scope. This additional funding has had an incredible impact over the past two years.

The National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) unit coordinates and cooperates with the FBI, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), state, and local law enforcement agencies related to NICS information and firearm prohibitions. This unit works to implement the FIX NICS Act and South Carolina's state implementation plan. NICS is a national, name-based system utilized by federal firearm licensees to check available records on individuals who may be prohibited from owning, purchasing, or possessing firearms in accordance with federal or state law. This unit works with the probate courts and other law enforcement agencies to ensure all information provided to NICS is current and accurate. Currently residing in NICS in 2025 are 4,129 felony conviction entries, 7,214 under indictment, 6,538 controlled substance entries, 128,939 mental adjudications and 5,349 state prohibitors. In addition, 18 protection orders, and 8 MCDVs, bringing the total of all entries in NICS to 152,195.

This unit provides regulatory oversight for private investigation businesses, contract security businesses, proprietary security business licenses, and registration certificates related to such. In 2025, SLED issued 474 Private Security Company licenses, 5,490-armed security officer registrations, 15,009 unarmed security officer registrations, 446 private investigation business licenses, 606 private investigators registrations, and 364 temporary security officer registrations.

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The unit also regulates and oversees the South Carolina State Constable Program. SLED currently has 882 active Group I constables which are certified law enforcement officers that are employed by government agencies and have a job-related need for law enforcement authority. 50 Group II constables which consist of individuals who have served as sworn law enforcement officers in the state of South Carolina and honorably retired in that capacity. And, in addition, 163 Group III constables who provide auxiliary law enforcement assistance services to local law enforcement agencies in a voluntary capacity.

Furthermore, this unit manages and regulates the South Carolina Concealed Weapon Permit (CWP) program to ensure compliance with all state and federal laws. This unit oversees CWP instructor training and qualifications to ensure that South Carolina’s CWP program remains the “Gold Standard”. Currently, we have maintained over 736,038 SC CWP files in our database coupled with applicant files that have been digitally scanned in or received from applicants using the online application system. In 2025, SLED CWP entered 64,104 South Carolina CWP credentials and issued 56,908 in addition to 1,551 revoked permits and 1,465 CWP denials.

In 2023 the General Assembly passed “Bond Reform” which gave regulatory authority over electronic monitoring companies and devices to SLED. SLED developed an application process, review and approval process of companies and devices and began approving companies during this period. SLED currently has 23 approved electronic monitoring companies, 6 of which are law enforcement agencies.

South Carolina Critical Infrastructure Cybersecurity Program

The South Carolina Critical Infrastructure Cybersecurity Program’s (SC CIC) mission is to serve local government and critical infrastructure/key resources (CIKR) by enhancing the cybersecurity posture throughout the State of South Carolina. These efforts enhance and strengthen information technology and criminal justice information systems to improve services and to increase security.

In FY 2025, SC CIC actively responded to 77 significant cyber incidents impacting critical infrastructure in South Carolina, with accounts compromised making up more than half. There was nearly a 100% increase in the number of significant cyber incident responses from the previous year. The significant increase in account compromises this year supports SC CIC’s choice to put resources into both the Active Directory assessment and Phishing & Security Awareness services as these have the best chance of protecting the state from this trending

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threat.

Through providing phishing campaign services, 9202 simulated phishing emails were sent out to participating organizations resulting in an average of 46.98% of users opening the email, 7.59% clicking on links and 10.1% entering credentials into fake login portals. These statistics represent a decline from 2023 in both users opening the email, as well as users clicking on malicious links.

The Governance, Risk and Compliance (GRC) Unit has created a robust training curriculum to help educate the CJIS user community on the modernization of the FBI CJIS Security Policy. GRC team members continue to attend workshops and hold various certifications to stay educated on cybersecurity practices to best assist the criminal and non-criminal justice agencies the SLED GRC Unit is responsible for auditing on a triennial basis.

Challenges:

SLED's primary challenge is the need for additional manpower and resources to meet the ever-expanding need for SLED's services throughout the state of South Carolina. In addition, violent crime continues to be a major challenge in South Carolina. In the current budget, SLED received additional sworn personnel in an attempt to meet the increased demand.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies:

The safety, integrity, and security of statewide public resources, infrastructure, data, and citizens in South Carolina would be adversely affected if SLED were not provided the necessary manpower and resources to meet the ever-growing law enforcement and public safety needs in South Carolina.

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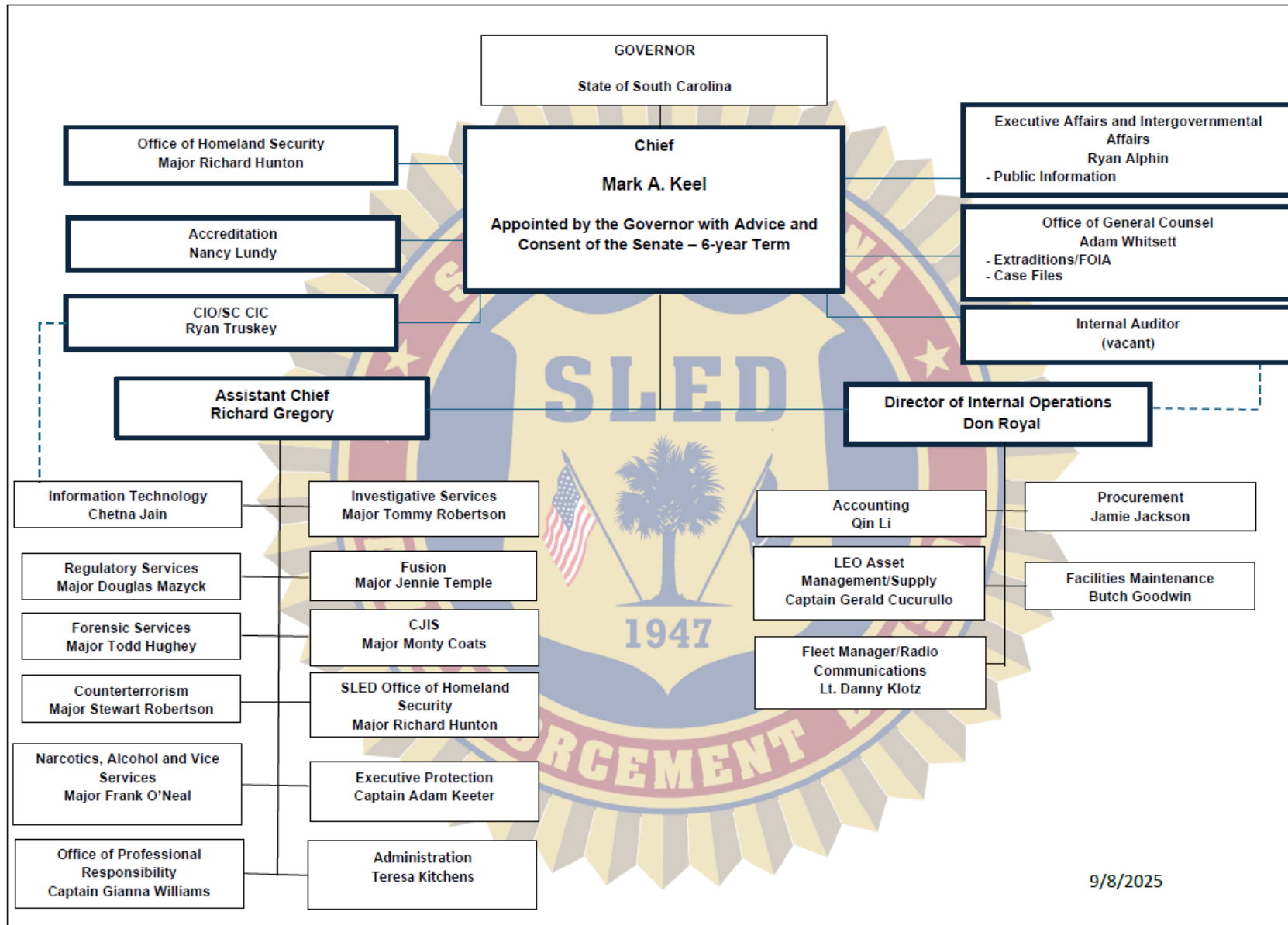
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AGENCY ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

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<p>The SeaHawk Inter-Agency Operational Center (IOC) was moved under the Counterterrorism Division at SLED during FY24/25. The SeaHawk IOC was reorganized and restructured which included reestablishing the SeaHawk Executive Steering Committee (ESC) which included adding additional vital partnerships from several federal, state and local public safety agencies. Leadership was able to collaborate with the SeaHawk IOC Executive Steering Committee to bring them together and create an updated Charter ensuring the continued coordination amongst the maritime domain partners. These actions were imperative to the continued maritime security of the harbor, waterways, and ports within South Carolina. Since that restructuring, numerous operations, investigations, and proactive enforcement efforts among all of the public safety partners have led to the increased security and enhanced operational capabilities within the Port of Charleston and the Inland Ports of Greer and Dillon . <p>South Carolina's Blue Alert Program was signed into law by Governor Nikki Haley on February 27, 2012 (S.C. Code Ann. § 23-3-1400) following the tragic death of two Aiken Public Safety officers in two separate incidents. The purpose of the program is to broadcast critical information to the public as quickly as possible to assist in the apprehension of an offender(s) who allegedly killed, seriously injured, or abducted a law enforcement officer and poses a significant risk to the public and other law enforcement officers. Prior to September 19, 2024, there was not an incident in South Carolina that met the established Blue Alert criteria.</p> <p>On September 19, 2024, around 11:00pm, a McBee police officer performed a traffic stop on a truck. At some point during the stop, the driver of the truck exited and began firing upon the McBee police officer. He circled the officer's car, continuing to fire, and at the conclusion fired over 60 rounds at/ into the McBee police officer's vehicle. (Luckily, the police officer survived). The suspect then fled the scene. The SLED Fusion Center was contacted in the early morning hours the following day to assist in determining the identification of the suspect and the location of the vehicle. Once the identification of the suspect and vehicle were determined, the SLED Fusion Center issued South Carolina's first ever Blue Alert warning the public and seeking their assistance in locating the suspect. Using Fusion Center resources, the suspect's vehicle was located and two SLED Fusion Center agents, a Lee County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy, and a Department of Natural Resources officer who were in the area began to mobilize. As these law enforcement officers were approaching the area, the vehicle was spotted, and they began to follow it. After a short distance, the vehicle sped off and visual site was lost as it rounded a curve. As law enforcement came back into view of the vehicle, they noticed it was canted in the middle of the road, and the suspect began firing. The SLED agents, the Lee County Chief Deputy, and the DNR officer began taking on fire. Several dozen rounds were fired by the suspect and the law enforcement officers. When visual site of the suspect was lost due to smoke, law enforcement was able to retreat to a safe distance and began calling in resources to secure the perimeter. Shortly thereafter, the suspect was located deceased in an adjacent field. Our agents, along with Lee County and DNR officers, went towards the gun fire exhibiting bravery, courage, and the duty to serve. Luckily, they survived.</p> <p>This was a very significant event for the Fusion Center as it was our first Blue Alert, and our agents were involved in a very dynamic, very dangerous situation.</p>	September	September	Ensure investigations are initiated in a timely manner (<48 hours)

<p>On March 26, 2025, the Dogfighting Unit, led by case agent Tammara Frost, executed a search warrant at 1080 Goodson Rd in Sumter. As a result, 27 dogs were rescued from a terrible environment where they had been chained and had no food or water. The dogs were removed from the scene by K2 Solutions and transported to their facility in North Carolina for care and assessment. This week, we received notice that one of the dogs had been selected by “K9s on the Front Line” to begin training to become a service dog. K9s on the Front Line was founded in 2016 and provides service dogs to combat veterans and first responders. <p>In the FY 2023 budget, SLED received nearly \$3.6 million to establish a Center for School Safety and Targeted Violence in Gilbert, SC. In FY 2024, SLED received over \$7 million of additional funds for the Center. These funds are currently being used to renovate the former Gilbert, SC Elementary School for use as the Center. The Center is currently being used as a training venue, even while renovations are taking place. During FY 24-25, PS/EM planned, coordinated, and responded to four (4) natural disasters (Tropical Storm Debby, November Historic Floods in Orangeburg County, Hurricane Helene, and Winter Storm Enzo). Emergency Support Function 13 (ESF-13), which provides law enforcement support during emergencies and/or disasters to ensure protection of lives and property, was activated to coordinate the state law enforcement response for each of these natural disasters. Hurricane Helene impacted the entire state of South Carolina. Hurricane Helene caused severe damage and power outages across the entire state with the most severe damage occurring in the Southern and Western Regions of South Carolina. These activations and deployments utilized 379 personnel, who worked a combined 10,372 hours. The SLED Drug Analysis Department has been able to make a significant impact on the department case backlog. The department backlog reached an all-time high in December of 2023 with 22,843 assignments. As of June 2025, the backlog had been reduced to 16,445 assignments. The SLED Firearms Department operates the Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS) for the purpose of searching stored images of cartridge cases to identify investigative leads between cases. Due to the high demand for DNA analysis, and to reduce the number of cases awaiting analysis, the SLED Forensics Services Laboratory has the opportunity to outsource untested cases currently at SLED to private vendor laboratories.
