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## AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The mission of the South Carolina Office of Resilience is to lessen the impact of disasters on the communities and citizens of South Carolina by **planning and coordinating statewide resilience, long-term disaster recovery, and hazard mitigation**. Guided by the Disaster Relief and Resilience Act, and in coordination with federal, state, and local governmental agencies, stakeholders, and nongovernmental entities, the office achieves this mission through the following programs. SCOR utilizes a combination of federal and state funds to implement these programs.

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## FY24-25 Updates and Successes

### Major Impacting Event: Hurricane Helene

This year, SCOR's operations were significantly impacted by Hurricane Helene. Following landfall in Florida on September 26th as Category 4 hurricane, the strongest on record for the Big Bend region of Florida, Helene's center remained at hurricane strength as far inland as Macon Georgia, spreading hurricane force wind gusts well into South Carolina on September 27. The rain preceding Hurricane Helene's arrival, with northern South Carolina and further into the midlands like Orangeburg seeing 10+ inches of rain, set the stage for extreme flooding and extensive tree damage as the storms persistent wind field moving into the Appalachian Mountains. Wind gusts reached around 70 miles per hour across the state, with South Carolina experiencing the largest power outage among all states as a result. As the storm moved north, conditions resulted in more than 8 to 24 inches of rainfall in parts of the upstate, leading to historic flooding in some areas and rivers such as the Saluda and Congaree to crest at major flood stage or above. The unmet needs assessment, part of SCOR's Action Plan for the CDBG-DR program (described below), identified housing unmet needs of \$1,747,703,226 (81%), infrastructure unmet need of \$192,811,945 (9%), and economic unmet need of \$224,707,732 (10%). FEMA received over 447,000 registrations for Individual Assistance, more than double, and approaching triple, the number of applicants for the last 3 major storms combined – the 2015 Flood, Hurricane Matthew in 2016, and Hurricane Florence in 2018. Despite the size and need, the federal funds allocated to South Carolina for long-term recovery from the HUD CDBG-DR program is a smaller fraction of the unmet need than was allocated following previous events. For this reason, SCOR is utilizing a multi-strategy approach to address unmet needs: with a robust disaster case management team (funded by a \$22M FEMA grant), utilizing federal and state allocated funds to repair and replace homes for low-to-moderate income citizens, coordinating with voluntary organizations to repair homes and provide citizens with resources to meet a variety of unmet needs, and developing a mitigation program to lessen the impact of future disasters in areas impacted by Helene. These efforts are described below along with other programmatic updates.

### Resilience Planning and Coordination

#### *Implementation of the Statewide Resilience Plan*

Just before the end of FY22-23, SCOR released the state's first Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan (Resilience Plan). The plan identified statewide risks and vulnerabilities and included recommendations to serve as a framework to guide state investment in flood mitigation projects and the adoption of programs and policies to protect the people and property of South Carolina from the damage and destruction of extreme weather events. Since its release, by efforts of both SCOR and statewide partners, there has been significant progress in implementing many of the recommendations outlined in the plan. An update [document](#) outlining implementation efforts was released in September 2024. This year, SCOR organized implementation of the plan into four overarching lines of effort based on 4 key recommendations that will facilitate the implementation of many other plan recommendations. These lines of efforts are listed and included in their own section below: (1) data collection and coordination, (2) watershed planning and coordination, (3) land conservation, and (4) identifying and maximizing funding (grants).

#### *Data Collection and Coordination*

This recommendation of the Resilience Plan focuses on SCOR's coordination with all levels of government to catalog existing resilience related data, identify data gaps, and provide access to data for planning, design, and decision-making. Achievements this year include the completion of a data coordination study with SAS, aimed at enhancing the state's ability to use data to derive meaningful and actionable insights. SCOR is currently coordinating with other state agencies to begin implementation of the recommendations.

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SCOR continues to refine and share the Resilience Atlas, a hub for resilience-related data from SCOR and other sources. SCOR also continues to make the First Street flood data used in the Statewide Resilience Plan available to any level of government within South Carolina. First Street data is widely accepted, current and future looking model that utilizes reputable data input sources and agencies. First Street data is used across sectors such as government, insurance, finance, and the private sector. Finally, SCOR is partnering with Clemson University to deploy Bridge Box water level sensors to better understand flooding issues and improve data for planning, forecasting, and flood frequency estimation. Progress is ongoing to acquire the following data sets: NOAA C-Cap Regional Land Cover Data (higher resolution land cover data), NOAA 3DEP LiDAR update, NOAA Atlas 14 rainfall inundation duration frequency curves, and low tide imagery.

#### *Watershed Planning and Coordination*

Through watershed coordination, SCOR is providing technical planning assistance to communities to identify risks and vulnerabilities, develop actionable solutions, coordinate solutions across the watershed to reduce negative upstream and downstream impacts, and connect communities to regional, state, and federal resources. It is the intention of the Watershed Planning program to build a pipeline for the implementation of resilience projects, programs, and policies at the local level by identifying needs and connecting communities to information and resources to meet their planning and resilience implementation needs. Efforts this year include the development of the Watershed-Based Resilience Planning Program through the hiring of watershed coordinators to work directly with communities in specific watersheds. All watersheds are now covered by a coordinator. These coordinators have started traveling the state and meeting with communities to introduce SCOR and its programs, hear about community concerns and needs related to hazard resilience, and begin connecting communities with needed information and resources to address those needs. A cornerstone of this program is a Resilience 101 training that introduces local government staff and elected officials to the concept of resilience and strategies for communities to increase their resilience. The coordinators also share data like First Street – a forward-looking hazard data set can be critical for local government planning, programs, and decision making by contextualizing current and future risk and vulnerabilities with local priorities.

#### *Maintain Natural Flood Protection Through Conservation*

The Resilience Plan identified areas across the State for conservation that reduce flood impacts to citizens and communities. Utilizing the \$200M added the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund, and \$6 M Revolving Fund. SCOR has worked this year with conservation partners to conserve properties that provide natural flood protection while also achieving many other benefits for the State. Efforts in this fiscal year include \$27,400,000 Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund approved by JBRC and \$5,000,000 Revolving fund approved by SFAA to be used to conserve 10,405 acres currently protect by Land Trust partners while state agencies work through DOA approval process and complete Federal Grant process. In addition, state and county agencies closed on 3 tracts totaling 2,129 acres that previous FY SCOR funding protected with land trusts. Key Partners in these land conservation projects include: SC Conservation Bank, SC Department of Natural Resources, SC Forestry Commission, SC Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism, Coastal Carolina University, Francis Marion University, land trusts and non-profits, and private foundations.

In June, SCOR joined the Spartanburg Area Conservancy (SPACE) and Spartanburg County Parks Department, along with local officials, state agencies, community leaders, and nature enthusiasts, today celebrated the grand opening of the Glendale Nature Park. SCOR contributed funding to this project. Together with adjacent protected properties, the park is part of a contiguous 1,200 acres corridor of conserved land. SCOR noted that protecting large connected landscapes, especially along rivers, is essential to community and ecosystem resilience.

#### *Identify and Maximize All Available Funding Sources for Resilience Activities*



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SCOR continually works with partners to identify funding sources for resilience activities. SCOR seeks to apply for, manage, and coordinate to seek grants and other sources of funding to enable the implementation of recommendations in the Resilience Plan and other relevant resilience activities. This fiscal year, SCOR led or participated in the following grants. Please note that the EPA Solar for All Grant was recently terminated by EPA.

- EPA Palmetto Air Quality Collaborative (\$3M): A 4-year planning initiative to develop measures to reduce emissions, support economic development, conservation, and community engagement. Following completion of the Priority Climate Action Plan in early 2024, this year, the second deliverable to EPA, the Clean Air Strategies for South Carolina is being developed through outreach and input with sector-based Action Teams, a public input survey, and community outreach.
- EPA Solar for All (\$124,440,000): This grant was terminated by EPA in early FY 2025-2026. However, prior efforts in this fiscal year included development of non-regulatory programs and concepts to expand solar programs, provide resilient power supply, diversify the power grid, and reduce citizen energy costs.
- NFWF Resilient Coastal Communities Collaborative Program (\$896,175): Pilot of watershed-based resilience planning in the Salkehatchie River Basin, in coordination with SC Sea Grant Consortium and SC Beach Advocates. This fiscal year, communities of focus were selected, and risk and vulnerability assessments began to be developed in coordination with a contractor and through community engagement throughout the basin.
- NOAA Living Shorelines Project (\$6.2M, \$240,000 direct to SCOR): SCOR is working with the lead, The Nature Conservancy to implement the Community Assistance Program and hosting the application on the SCOR website, as well as participating in developing other project deliverables including Coastal Resilience Implementation Plans.
- Atlantic Conservation Coalition (\$421M, \$50M to SCOR): This project is a partnership between 4 states and The Nature Conservancy for land conservation. SCOR is receiving \$50M to conserve natural working lands that increase flood resilience and sequester carbon, and coordination with The Nature Conservancy on an additional share of the total grant funds that will also benefit South Carolina.

### Mitigation

Mitigation focuses on activities that increase resilience to future disasters and reduce or eliminate long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage to and loss of property, and suffering and hardship. Under mitigation, there are four major mitigation activities: infrastructure, buyouts, plans and studies, and matching funds. The USS Yorktown remediation project is an additional mitigation program overseen by this department. The mitigation department is responsible for the deployment of projects funded with CDBG-MIT, CDBG-DR, and ARPA, as well as mitigation projects funded by the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund.

The HUD CDBG-MIT Mitigation program utilizes US Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant – Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) funds for mitigation activities in 17 counties most impacted and distressed (MID) in previous disasters. The CDBG-MIT program has 4 program areas: Infrastructure, Plans and Studies, Buyouts, and Funds Match. South Carolina will spend a minimum of 50% of program funds on activities that benefit the low-to-moderate income (LMI) population. The CDBG-MIT program must be completed no later than May 2032. There are currently 27 stormwater projects, 6 voluntary buyout projects, 22 plans & studies projects, and 8 funds match project in this program. Of note this year, projects in Isle of Palms (41<sup>st</sup> Avenue) and Georgetown County (Mingo Pond) reached final completion.

This year, SCOR made significant progress on many of the 17 stormwater infrastructure projects as part of its ARPA-funded Stormwater Infrastructure Program. This included many public meetings to ensure citizens are informed and involved in the projects as they progress and moved through permitting and into construction. We also start construction on our first projects under this program in North Myrtle Beach, Surfside Beach, Greenville County, City of Columbia, and Barberry Woods (Charleston).

*HUD CDBG-DR Mitigation Set-Aside (Hurricane Helene)*

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As previously mentioned, SCOR is administering a Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery program, a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development allocated to South Carolina following Hurricane Helene. \$19.6 million of this grant is set aside for mitigation projects which will focus funding on reducing potential riverine and surface flood impacts in the six U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)- defined “most impacted and distressed” (MID) areas. State agencies and cities, towns, counties, and councils of government in the following MID counties may apply for mitigation funds: Aiken, Anderson, Greenville, Greenwood, Laurens, & Spartanburg. Mitigation activities are defined as those that increase resilience and reduce or eliminate the long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage to and loss of property, and suffering and hardship, by lessening the impact of future disasters. The CDBG-DR Mitigation set aside has 4 programs, similar to the CBDG-MIT program listed above: infrastructure, voluntary buyouts, matching funds, and plans & studies. Applications for this program opened September 1, 2025, but much planning occurred in the prior fiscal year following the announcement of HUD’s allocation in January 2025. The CDBG-DR Action Plan outlines how the mitigation set aside will be spent. The Action Plan was approved by HUD in early August after public review and town halls in May and June 2025.

1. **Infrastructure:** SCOR will provide funding to units of general local governments in the HUD identified MID areas for the development and implementation of stormwater infrastructure projects mitigate future flood damage associated with riverine and surface flooding.
2. **Voluntary Buyouts:** SCOR will provide funding to units of local governments in the HUD-identified MID areas for voluntary buyouts of residential property.
3. **Matching Funds:** SCOR has designated funds to match federally funded mitigation grant programs to include the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) Program, and any other FEMA federal grant opportunities that focus on flood reduction.
4. **Plans and Studies:** SCOR will provide funding to units of general local governments (UGLGs) located in the HUD-defined MID areas and state agencies for the development or updating of hazard mitigation plans and the development of flood reduction studies to identify potential projects that could be funded through the infrastructure and/or voluntary buyout programs and for the design of infrastructure projects.

### Disaster Recovery

#### *Construction Completed in Hurricane Florence CDBG-DR Program*

In October 2024, SCOR completed construction in the Hurricane Florence program, having repaired or replaced 488 homes. its required HUD reporting to effectively conclude this grant program. This disaster recovery program is funded with a \$72 million US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant for Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR), as well as \$7.3 million in additional leverage funds from the South Carolina State Housing Finance and Development Authority. Of the completed homes, 394 (80%) were in Dillon, Horry and Marion, which were identified as the Most Impacted and Distressed Counties by HUD. Chesterfield, Darlington Florence, Georgetown, and Marlboro Counties were also served. Additionally, over 99% of the homeowners served earned 80% or less of the area median income.

This milestone continues SCOR’s historical trend of completing work on or ahead of schedule to the benefit of homeowners and ahead of HUD’s 6-year timeline. In the 2015 Severe Storm Program, a total of 1,829 homes were completed, concluding construction in September 2021. The 2016 Hurricane Matthew Program saw the successful completion of 1,142 homes in December 2022. Construction completion in the Hurricane Florence program brings the total homes repaired or replaced by SCOR to 3,459. Successful management of these grants has led to many other jurisdictions reaching out to SCOR to share lessons learned. This includes the following states and local governments: Alabama, California, City of Columbia (SC), Florida, Georgia, Lee County (FL),

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Lexington County (SC), North Carolina, Richland County (SC), Virgin Islands, Volusia County (FL), Maui County (HI), Sarasota (FL).

#### *Action Planning and Development of the 2024 Hurricane Helene HUD CDBG-DR Housing Program*

In January HUD announced that South Carolina would receive a \$150M allocation of Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery Funds. SCOR’s Action Plan was approved by HUD right at the end of the fiscal year, but the Disaster Recovery Department spent much time between HUD’s allocation announcement in January and the end of the year developing an unmet needs assessment and outlining the way in which these funds will be used. The plan identified \$2.1B in unmet needs, with \$1.7B in housing unmet needs alone. Based on this assessment, eligible activities under the approved plan include single-family home rehabilitation, replacement and reconstruction, affordable rental housing rehabilitation, voluntary buyouts, and mitigation projects to lessen the impact of future disasters. The following counties are included in the CDBG-DR housing program: Aiken, Anderson, Greenville, Greenwood, Laurens, Spartanburg, Abbeville, Cherokee, Edgefield, McCormick, Oconee, Orangeburg, Pickens, Saluda and Union. Eligible applicants include: (1) low to moderate income homeowners whose primary residence were impacted by Helene and (2) rental property owners whose homes were impacted. The program focuses on low to moderate income citizens, with those who earn 30% or less of the Area Median Income for their county prioritized higher. SCOR conducted 6 town hall events, far exceeding HUD requirements of 2 town halls, to introduce the program and get feedback on the proposed Action Plan.

#### *Development and Implementation of the Rapid Rebuild State Funded Disaster Recovery Program*

After past hurricane disasters (2015, 2016, 2018) there were not state funds available to begin long-term housing recovery efforts. Typically, it could take one to two years to receive a CDBG-DR allocation from HUD. Utilizing funding in the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund, SCOR has set up the Rapid Rebuild program to start housing recovery efforts more quickly supplement the always limited federal funds to assist citizens whose homes were destroyed. Efforts this fiscal year include task order contracts for general contracting services and the identification of eligible cases. Construction is set to begin in fall 2025.

#### *Disaster Case Management*

Disaster Case Management (DCM) is a partnership between a disaster case manager and a citizen impacted by a disaster to address survivor’s unmet needs by connecting them to recovery resources. Due to the proactive development of a Disaster Recovery Reserve Corps made up of pre-trained Disaster Case Managers, SCOR was able to quickly place case managers on the ground at recovery event such as Farm and Forest Recovery Days, the Governor’s Team SC County Days, and at FEMA’s disaster recovery center quickly after the storm in late 2024. In these locations, case managers were able to connect impacted survivors with a variety of resources to meet their disaster caused unmet needs and help with things such as FEMA appeals. By January 2025, the team had conducted intake for over 800 impacted citizens in person and over the phone and referred over 1,800 citizens to resources. In early 2024, the team began conducting broader mobile intake events throughout impacted counties following the approval of a \$22.2M FEMA Disaster Case Management Program grant, which will fund case management activities for the next two years. With this large grant, this fiscal year, SCOR also began work to establish four regional disaster case management offices in Central, Columbia, Aiken, and Spartanburg. By the end of June 2025, over 30 individual mobile intake events had been held, and over 5,000 contacts made.



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## Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

### Agency Sustainability

To effectively plan and coordinate statewide resilience, long-term disaster recovery, and hazard mitigation efforts, SCOR requires a reliable and recurring funding stream. The increasing risks from natural hazards and the growing exposure of South Carolina's expanding population to these threats make this funding essential. The Disaster Relief and Resilience Act established the South Carolina Office of Resilience (SCOR) to develop, implement, and maintain the Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan, and to plan and coordinate statewide resilience and disaster recovery efforts. While SCOR currently has an adequate operations and personnel budget, but recurring funds would allow SCOR plan for and implement much needed long-term resilience programs, hazard mitigation projects, and disaster recovery efforts; therefore, increasing SCOR's ability to meet its statutorily directed purpose and mission.

Since SCOR's start as the Disaster Recovery Office, it has primarily relied on federal grants and a few large, but one-time, funding allocations. The Disaster Relief and Resilience Act established SCOR and created the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund to develop, implement, and maintain the resilience plan, provide disaster relief assistance, provide hazard mitigation, and implement infrastructure improvements. The Fund was initially capitalized with \$44 million, and in Fiscal Year 2023-2024, the legislature appropriated an additional \$200 million to the Fund. With the Fund's dual purpose of immediate disaster relief and long-term resilience, SCOR is committed to a minimum of \$30 million held in reserve for immediate disaster relief, which limits the funding available for other long-term resilience projects. As shown with Hurricane Helene, and storms increasing in frequency and intensity, another storm could hit at any time, and we may face multiple storms in a year, increasing the need for a larger fund to be held in reserve. At the same time, to serve the second purpose of the Fund, recurring monies are needed to facilitate resilience projects that increase the ability of South Carolina's communities, economies, and ecosystems to anticipate, absorb, recover, and thrive when presented with environmental change and natural hazards.

The high demand for SCOR's current services and the exhaustion of one-time federal and state funds underscore this critical need. Additionally, data indicates a continued rise in risks from natural hazards, coupled with South Carolina's expanding population, compound the needs for all three areas of SCOR's operations – mitigation, resilience planning and coordination, and disaster recovery.

### *Increasing Risk and Vulnerability*

The Statewide Resilience plan outlines climate trends related to temperature, storm events, and precipitation. Storms are expected to become more intense with increased wind and precipitation. As South Carolina's population increases, additional measures are needed to mitigate the impacts of these environmental changes and natural hazards on communities and infrastructure and build resilient communities. Changing land uses can put new development areas and existing areas at an increased risk for natural hazards. Developed areas can experience flooding as natural systems are changed into developed areas with non-permeable surfaces.

### *Specific Solutions to Address and Mitigate Risks and Funding Needs*

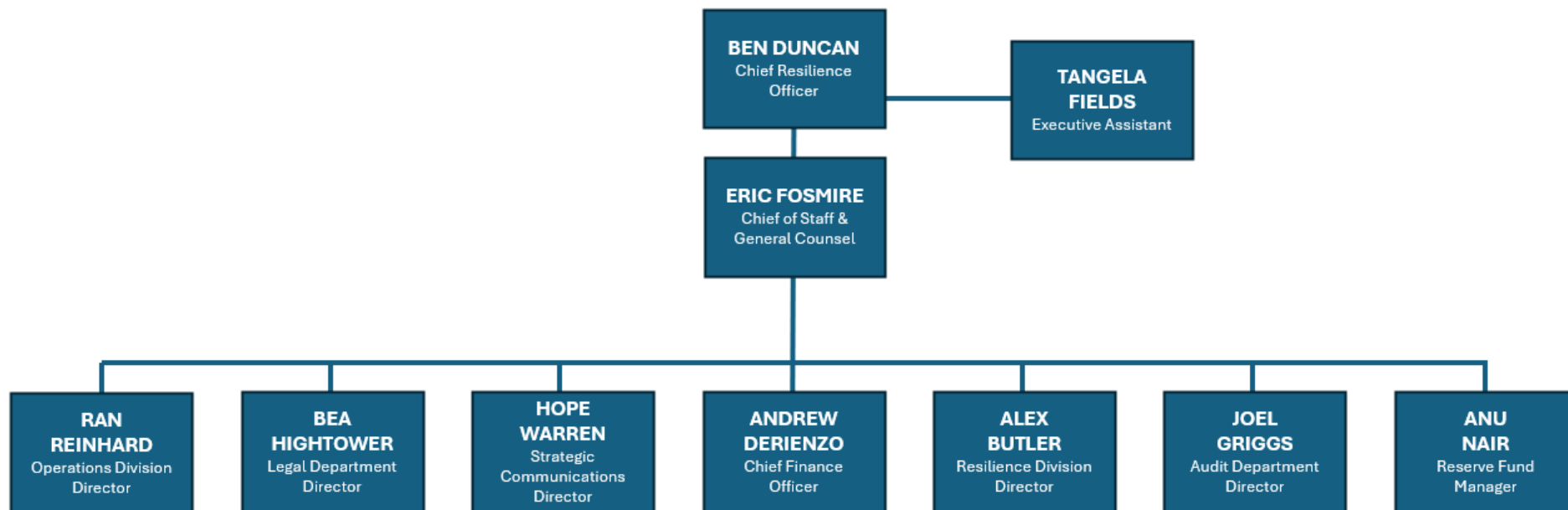
Recurring Funding Is Needed for All Four Areas of SCOR's operations listed below in order to deliver a pipeline of resilience solutions that address current and future risks and enable the communities, economies, and ecosystems of South Carolina to thrive as we continue to be faced with environmental change and natural hazard

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- A. *Data and Resilience Planning Coordination:* Prior to Hurricane Helene, few South Carolinians could imagine a hurricane and flooding in the Upstate. However, looking at climate trends SC Climatology Office and flood risk data from First Street, SCOR’s statewide resilience plan highlighted the risk and vulnerability of the Upstate Region. In fact, SCOR’s planning team estimates that a slight change in track could have resulted in even more devastating impacts in South Carolina, much more like what was seen in western North Carolina. This speaks to the need for continue data collection and coordination to adequately plan and design our communities and its infrastructure for events of this type in the future. It is also an important reminder that it is important to plan for resilience and implement policies, programs, and projects across the state that mitigate risk.
- B. *Disaster Relief & Recovery:* Hurricane Helene demonstrated the high costs of widespread storm damage. Federal funding for Helene is insufficient to meet the needs, with three times the number of FEMA Individual Assistance applications compared to the past three disasters in 2015, 2016 and 2018. Even in those storms, SCOR’s CDBG-DR housing recovery programs had many unserved citizens, while prioritizing the low-to-moderate income citizens. SCOR’s Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund has enabled deployment of SCOR’s disaster case management program post-Helene, and allowed the development of a state-funded housing recovery program. However, recurring funding is needed to maintain a consistent pool of recovery dollars and to continue resilience and mitigation projects without depleting disaster recovery reserves. Additionally, the timing of Federal long-term recovery funding following a disaster is dependent on a specific Congressional disaster appropriation. Because the funding is time dependent, the allocation of the appropriation in South Carolina’s most recent disasters has taken anywhere from four months to over a year and a half. The Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund is available to cover that time gap and allows to state to recover and thrive more quickly after a disaster. In addition, while FEMA provides immediate response funding, the funding is time-limited and is currently capped at \$42,500 for home losses even if the home is destroyed. The FEMA housing funding solution is insufficient. Currently SCOR is working to lessen the recovery gap through widespread coordination with voluntary organizations.
- C. *Hazard Mitigation and Infrastructure Improvements:* SCOR’s current mitigation programs are currently at capacity and utilizing one-time funds. The CDBG-MIT program (funds allocated in 2020) is particularly limited to 17 most impacted and distressed counties. ARPA funding (allocated in 2022) was limited, and while statewide, had a short turnaround period, making many communities without “on the shelf” projects ineligible. This was an issue for under resourced counties in both programs. Similar fund limitations and timing constraints will be similar with the 2024 Hurricane Helene CDBG-DR mitigation set aside program. Consistent funding would allow SCOR to structure a program to ensure these communities are not left behind and develop a project pipeline to deliver solutions to communities most at risk and in need. Events like Helene and Debby (2024) have showcased the positive impacts of SCOR’s hazard mitigation work. Projects like the Ehrhardt Tunnel and Mingo Pond have reduced flooding severity and frequency. SCOR’s buyout programs and conservation efforts are also making significant strides in reducing flood impacts by maintaining and restoring the natural function of floodplains. Currently, SCOR has a list of over 100 infrastructure projects that we were unable to fund during previous rounds of available funding, totaling more than \$300 million. A recurring budget would enable SCOR to study, design, and implement these projects, particularly in communities that lack the resources to manage large-scale projects, study their flooding issues, and design long-term resilient solutions. It is also important to note that SCOR has many “state run” projects that takes the program management burden off the community and ensures the projects and funding is used efficiently and effectively.
