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Agency's Discussion and Analysis

The South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) was created as the state agency for receiving and disbursing federal funds made available under the federal Older Americans Act (OAA), and to serve as the lead agency on programs for the aging population.

The South Carolina Department on Aging's (SCDOA) mission and vision addresses the needs of older adults, family caregivers, and vulnerable adults in South Carolina through the OAA. It improves older adults' quality of life by advocating for their needs and developing resources in partnership with governments, nonprofits, and others. The SCDOA strives to help older adults live better lives, allowing them to contribute to their communities, achieve economic security, and receive support to age independently with dignity.

As the number of older adults, individuals with disabilities, family caregivers, and vulnerable adults in South Carolina increases, the Department on Aging plays a crucial role in advocating for and meeting their needs. According to the 2023 5-year American Community Survey, of South Carolina's population of 5,212,774, there are 1,321,095 older adults aged 60 or older. The Department on Aging fulfills its OAA mandate by providing critical support through advocacy, facilitation, education, grant distribution, and regulation of services, ensuring that our most vulnerable population receive the assistance they need.

Beyond its service roles, the department serves as a central source for aging-related data and information, functioning as a think tank to create innovative solutions for older adults, family caregivers, and people with disabilities. With a growing number of individuals aging in place or retiring, it is vital for South Carolina to enhance and expand service delivery, raise public awareness, identify specific needs, tailor services, and remove barriers that hinder access for older adults and their caregivers.

A crucial step to addressing the rapid population growth and gaps in services is to build on external partnerships. We know that funding from the OAA was never intended to meet every need, but it was established to provide "seed money" to encourage states to build external partnerships. This is essential for meeting the needs of those on waiting lists. Implementing effective outreach methods can significantly enhance service delivery. By collaborating, communicating, and cooperating with community partners and government entities, along with the advocacy and networking efforts of community leaders, we can bridge gaps in fragmented services and improve access to Long-Term Services and Supports.

Department on Aging Strategic Planning

Based on the key issues identified above, SCDOA has established a set of focus areas to guide its work. To address these items, SCDOA will concentrate its efforts during its 2025-2028 State Plan on Aging, Bridging Gaps, Building Access: The Blueprint for Aging Services in SC, on the following priorities:

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- Accessibility Improve access to essential services for older adults, adults living with
 disabilities, and family caregivers, especially those facing additional barriers, by
 enhancing service delivery, raising awareness, aligning services with needs across the
 state, expanding options, offering services with various cultural and social
 considerations, providing assistive technologies, and ensuring physical locations are
 fully accessible.
- Workforce Enhance the support and resources available to the robust workforce surrounding aging individuals, including direct care workers, family caregivers, older workers and job seekers, volunteers, and the staff within the South Carolina Aging Network by creating a comprehensive framework that fosters collaboration, training, and recognition to ensure access to necessary tools, education, and support to thrive in each workforce role.
- Quality of Life Enhance the quality of life for older adults, adults with disabilities, and family caregivers by developing and implementing responsive programs that prioritize client preferences. Develop healthy aging initiatives that support and promote comprehensive healthy aging initiatives that encourage independence and empower individuals to make choices that suit their unique needs.
- **Safety & Security** Enhance the safety and security of older adults, adults with disabilities, and their family caregivers by fostering improvements in home and community environments by developing and advocating for community infrastructure, along with programs and services, prioritizing accessibility and safety in public spaces and at home.

South Carolina has been fortunate to receive state support that enhances core services under the Older Americans Act (OAA), helping us achieve our established goals. Recently, the SCDOA received additional state funding, which has allowed us to expand our Home Stabilization Program. This program now assists with minor home modifications to help older adults age in place. Additionally, we have launched our Dementia Care Specialist Program, which is supported by this funding, and will place ten regional Dementia Care Specialists statewide.

Older adults, family caregivers, and individuals living with disabilities represent a significant segment of South Carolina's population, each group possessing distinct needs and required services. As a relatively small state characterized by numerous rural areas and limited resources, South Carolina faces challenges in addressing the evolving needs of its older adult population. Furthermore, the state's appeal as a desirable retirement destination adds to these complexities.

The South Carolina Department on Aging employs various methods to gather data and understand the intricate needs, preferences, and desires of older adults in the state. This analysis incorporates findings from essential assessments, planning initiatives, and evaluations conducted by the state office, regional Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs), and other esteemed partners and organizations. Such efforts include, but are not limited to, the SC4A Needs Assessment, Regional Area Plans and presentations, federal reports such as the Older Americans Act Performance System (OAAPS), Statewide Presenting and

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Unmet Needs data, the annual Senior Day celebration event, and the Live Healthy South Carolina's State Health Assessment Companion Report. The goals, objectives, and strategies outlined in the State Plan on Aging are aligned with insights gleaned from these reports, ongoing monitoring processes, the SCDOA's annual Aging Summit, and regular training sessions with AAA Directors.

ARPA Expenditures - SCDOA continues to oversee ARPA expenditures and encourages the Area Agencies on Aging to use these funds for innovative programs. We are proud of our aging network's creativity in addressing the unmet needs of older adults. Through these efforts, some agencies provided dental services and pest control, generating the data that enabled us to successfully secure legislative support to fund these services through our HCBS program. These ARPA funds are set to conclude on September 30, 2025.

Partnerships

Operation Spread the Joy - For the fifth consecutive year, SCDOA partnered with the South Carolina Department of Corrections to provide holiday gifts to residents of nursing homes and assisted living facilities. As part of this ongoing tradition, inmates produced nearly 1,600 handmade items—including hats, blankets, cards, and other gifts—which were distributed to approximately 1000 residents within twenty-one participating facilities, fostering comfort and goodwill during the Christmas season.

Ditch The Pitch - The South Carolina Department of Consumer Affairs (SCDCA) released its newly updated scam guide, "Ditch the Pitch." The publication, first released in 2015, arms consumers with information to spot and avoid scams. SCDCA partnered with the South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) to distribute "Ditch the Pitch" to more than 9,000 consumers statewide who received home-delivered meals through the aging network.

Team South Carolina County Days - The South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) actively participated in all Team SC Days and Team South Carolina County Days, a series of events organized by Governor Henry McMaster and Lieutenant Governor Pamela S. Evette to support residents affected by disasters, particularly Hurricane Helene. These events brought together state, federal, and nonprofit agencies to provide a onestop opportunity for individuals to access relief resources, receive direct support, and connect with multiple agencies working collaboratively. Through their participation, SCDOA helped strengthen community resilience and ensure that affected residents could quickly access essential services during times of crisis.

Department on Aging's Significant Activities

Permanent Establishment of the Dementia Care Specialist Program and

Expansion - According to the Alzheimer's Disease Registry maintained by the University of South Carolina's Office for the Study on Aging, 125,538 people in South Carolina are living with a diagnosis of dementia. In August of 2022, the SC Department on Aging utilized funds from a Public Health Workforce Grant through ACL to pilot a Dementia Care Specialist Program. In July of 2024 the state budget granted \$1.1 million request to hire

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10 statewide Dementia Care Specialist. To date, 7 Dementia Care Specialist have been placed regionally across the state with plans to have all 10 in place by December 2025. Our Dementia Care Specialist provide community education and support to those living with a dementia diagnosis as well as help build resources for long-term support.

In FY25, Dementia 101: The Basics was attended by 1,422 people, Dementia 201: Positive Interactions was attended by 944. Attendees included persons working in long term care facilities, family caregivers, and the general public seeking more information. The Dementia Care Specialists also provide care consultations to families living with a dementia diagnosis, in FY 25 141 care consultations were provided by the DCSs.

Home Stabilization Program - The Older Adult Home Modification Program (OAHMP), funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), began at the South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) in October 2021 and concluded in October 2024. While the program improved the lives of many older adults in South Carolina, its reach was limited by both funding and HUD eligibility requirements. Unlike SCDOA, which serves individuals aged 60 and older, HUD restricted participation to those 62 and older. Additional requirements included home ownership, a household income at or below 80% of the local Area Median Income (AMI) or the Federal Poverty Guidelines, and residence outside of designated flood zones. Because of these restrictions, HUD approved the program in only 29 of the state's 46 counties. To address these gaps, the state-funded Home Stabilization Program was established to serve all 46 counties.

The South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) administers the Home Stabilization Program, which provides minor home repairs and modifications to support older adults in maintaining safe and functional living environments. Many older adults wish to remain in their homes for as long as possible, but lack the financial resources to address necessary repairs due to limited income. The program is designed to reduce injuries, hospitalizations, and nursing home placements resulting from falls, thereby enabling older adults to age in place safely and independently. Assistance of up to \$8,000 per home may be provided for a range of modifications, including the installation of wheelchair ramps, grab bars, and handrails; floor repairs; the replacement of standard toilets with comfort-height models; and the provision of adaptive equipment such as shower chairs and tub transfer benches.

The overarching vision of the program prioritizes individuals facing challenges in performing Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (IADLs), which include bathing, dressing, transferring, and meal preparation, thus facilitating greater independence. Occupational therapists collaborating within the minor home repair framework employ a person-centered approach, equipping older adults with strategies aimed at mitigating environmental hazards and providing education on fall prevention.

A critical aspect of the program is assessing fall risk among older adults. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) initiative, "Stopping Elderly Accidents, Deaths, & Injuries" (STEADI), offers valuable resources for fall prevention, including a structured questionnaire to identify individual fall risk. During the Area Agency on Aging (AAA) assessment process, older adults are encouraged to self-report any falls experienced

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within the past year, the frequency of such incidents, and any existing fear of falling. By integrating information related to ADLs, IADLs, and fall risk, aging services personnel are better equipped to assess the needs of older adults, thereby enhancing safety and well-being within their home environments.

Eligibility for the Home Stabilization Program requires that applicants be age 60 or older and maintain residence within the State of South Carolina. Applicants must be the owner or co-owner of a single-family or manufactured/mobile home, as rental properties are not eligible for assistance. Furthermore, applicants must demonstrate a substantiated need for services, with priority consideration afforded to those whose living environments present fall risks or other significant home hazards.

Older Adults Service Information System (OASIS) - Following a multi-year procurement process, the South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) launched the Older Adults Service Information System (OASIS), a modular technology platform, in the last state fiscal year. OASIS replaces a system that had been in place for more than twenty years, marking a major modernization of the agency's information infrastructure. This investment has advanced the Department and the statewide aging network by decades in terms of data management, usability, and technological capacity. The platform consolidates data into a centralized system and enables advanced analytics, thereby strengthening accountability, improving oversight, and supporting a shift toward evidence-based decision-making.

Core modules within the solution include a survey tool that generates dynamic instruments to collect targeted and policy-relevant data; a service data collection module that allows providers and recipients to enter information at the point of delivery, resulting in real-time reporting and enhanced program monitoring; and a case management module that equips regional partners to manage client records and funding allocations with greater accuracy and fiscal responsibility. Together, these capabilities ensure that public resources are administered efficiently, services are better aligned with the needs of older South Carolinians and their caregivers, and policymakers have access to timely, reliable data to inform future planning.

Accountability

The South Carolina Department on Aging (SCDOA) implements a comprehensive monitoring and programmatic evaluation framework designed to ensure the efficacy and compliance of its initiatives. This framework encompasses various activities, including Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) monitoring, targeted training sessions, technical assistance, advocacy endeavors, data analysis, and client prioritization. The insights garnered from these processes, along with updates from the Administration for Community Living (ACL) and recommendations derived from state legislative reviews, serve to inform the agency's policy revisions, procedural updates, and long-term strategic planning.

SCDOA conducts annual on-site programmatic and fiscal monitoring of each AAA, during which the fiscal and program managers engage in direct oversight. These visits are aimed at assessing compliance with established policies, identifying exemplary programmatic successes, and diagnosing challenges that may necessitate technical assistance. Monthly,

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both fiscal and program teams meticulously review expenditure reports accompanied by payment request forms prior to the disbursement of funds to the AAAs. It is mandated that these payment requests are substantiated by documentation and the AAA accounting general ledger. Additionally, AAAs are responsible for overseeing their contracted service providers, ensuring that service unit data is validated before submitting payment requests to the state.

Regular training sessions held monthly or bi-monthly foster collaboration between the State Unit on Aging (SUA) staff and AAA program personnel. These sessions focus on program access, procedures, and developmental strategies, while also allowing for discussions on improving service delivery. Additionally, training initiatives encourage regional staff to share success stories and challenges, promoting a collaborative environment for brainstorming and identifying best practices.

The South Carolina Department on Aging systematically analyzes findings from monitoring visits, desk-top reviews, client prioritization reports, and various data sources to ensure adherence to the stipulations outlined in the Older Americans Act, as well as to state-supported aging programs. The outcomes of these evaluations have significantly informed the SUA program staff's efforts to align with the four strategic pillars of the State Plan, which encompass accessibility, workforce development, quality of life, and safety and security.

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Department on Aging Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

Our agency has continued to work with the aging network and our federal, state, and public/ private partnerships to meet the needs of our older population, which has quickly become the fastest-growing population in the US. We know that we must coordinate and collaborate with these stakeholders to meet the needs that will continue to keep our older adults, caregivers, and those with disabilities actively engaged and living healthy, independent lives while they are allowed to age in place with dignity and choice. There is a need to increase the aging network's capacity to provide person-centered services for seniors, persons with disabilities, caregivers, and vulnerable adults. In order to meet this need, there must be a qualified workforce to handle the demand.

Failure to meet this goal could result in declining levels of health among the senior population and greater levels of costly institutionalization. Considering that we already have a nursing home bed shortage, this would exacerbate the problem.

As well as continuing to meet our goals to keep our older adults active in their communities, we have also continued to advocate and intervene to prevent abuse, neglect, and exploitation of seniors and adults with disabilities living in long-term care facilities. Should SCDOA not be able to meet the agency goals and objectives, the most potential negative impact would be the detrimental impact on the health, safety, welfare, and rights of residents in long-term care facilities.

In 2023, four facilities closed, resulting in the loss of 123 beds, including 8 beds for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) and 115 beds in community residential care facilities (CRCF). In 2024, the number of facilities rose to 16 with 664 beds; however, this growth was offset by significant losses, including 16 IDD beds, 40 nursing home beds, and 608 CRCF beds. In 2025, 13 facilities with 499 beds closed, all reflecting reductions in CRCF capacity.

It is anticipated that this trend we are witnessing in LTC and CRCF closures is on the rise and will continue to raise concerns about the availability of long-term care options for vulnerable populations.

To mitigate the potential negative impact on the population we serve, we must continue to communicate and collaborate with our stakeholders and other agencies to ensure we are meeting the needs of our older adults. Some of these partners serve senior clients, but without the strict laws, regulations, and requirements that SCDOA must adhere to be the federally designated state unit on aging.


The restructuring of our federal awarding agency, HHS-ACL, and the resulting reduction in force (RIFs) have led to the loss of SCDOA's regional ACL contacts. This disruption has created a pause in communication and processing with our federal partners, raising concerns about the continuity of information flow. If unresolved, the situation could result in delays in funding for the FFY25 and FFY26 grant years, potentially impacting the ability of the aging network to sustain services. To mitigate this risk, SCDOA may need to seek assistance from state congressional contacts to ensure timely updates and support.

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
Options for General Assembly

- 3. The General Assembly could consider allocating additional state resources to address potential shortfalls in federal funding for aging programs.
